Jim Donnelly: 61 Years with Troop 78 and Going Strong!

HISTORY

Born in Philadelphia, raised in Glenolden, Delaware Co. Graduate West Catholic High School, 1941 Served in WWII in the US Navy as a radio operator on Liberty Ships in the North Atlantic and in the South Pacific on the Destroyer USS Shubrick Honorable discharge, 1947 Worked for the Red Arrow Line / SEPTA for 44 years, rising through the ranks. Trips to Japan for QC in the manufacture of high-speed trolley cars. RETIRED 1986 - Wow!!! Now, let's talk about his 60+ YEARS of involvement with Troop 78. Joined in 1955 with two sons: Jim, Jr. and Ed. Ernie Heegard was Scoutmaster, and George Bellgrau was Committee Chairman. Meetings were held in the tworoom cabin owned by the VFW on Grubb Road. The first Canadian trip was in 1958 in Ernie's and the Donnelly's cars, with Jim Jr., Miles Stevens and 9 others, as reported by Jim, Jr. & Ernie. (Continued on the next page)

When my parents, my brother Ed, and I moved to Willistown Township in the summer of 1955, Ed and I joined Troop 78. At that time, it was Country in Willistown with a big "C". The troop had 4 patrols, each had 8 scouts.

In 1957, the Troop Leader, Ernie Heegard, decided they would make a 10-day canoe trip to Algonquin Provincial Park, Ontario, Canada via Watkins Glen, Corning Glass, and Niagara Falls. One requirement: you had to be an Explorer, age 14 or older. Two vehicles were needed and only Ernie's was available. My dad was willing to go on the trip and take his son, Jim, Jr., (me) but I was only 13 years old. An exception was made. For someone with only two weeks' vacation, that was a considerable sacrifice for my dad. And it proved to be a fortuitous happening. In the coming years, my dad (Jim) would accompany the scouts on trips to New Orleans, Florida, as well as Camp Horseshoe.

In addition, Jim has been Secretary of the Troop since 1961 and of Friends of Troop 78, Inc. since its incorporation. He was elected as a member to the Order of the Arrow and he was "tapped out" by me, and I enjoyed giving every "tap" on the shoulder! All these years, Jim could be found working at the Radnor Races, being involved with set-up, traffic, and cleanup.

Jim was also honored with Chester County Council Extraordinary Service Award.

This goes back to when I joined the Troop and our main fundraiser was collecting newspaper for recycling. We went around the neighborhoods and put up flyers that said when we would be around to pick up the newspapers. We stored them in Link Rice's garage, and when it was full, we would get a truck, load it up, and drive it to Downingtown Paper Mill.

I could go on and on, but I want to talk more in detail about the Troop's first trip to Algonquin Park in 1958. Planning started in 1957. We rented our canoes at the park and they were extremely heavy since they were canvas over wood/fiberglass. The backpacks were heavy, no freeze paks those days, only canned goods and fresh foods. Also, one portage trail took all day and into the night because it had been wiped out by loggers.

Through Jim's connections at SEPTA, we got our first bus in 1966, and we had "Old Blue" painted, and we still refer to our bus that way. (Continued on the next page)

Gladys' Editorial Note: There is not enough paper or enough room to elaborate how much Ernie has done for Troop 78 over the years, from all the time he was Scoutmaster and all the years since. You have been a wonderful role model for so many young boys. A big THANK YOU from all of us!!!!

That was the beginning of trips for '78; New Orleans with the same cars/drivers, and Florida, which still happens every Spring break. Then there were more trips: Konderstag 1971 (cost in 1971: \$180), 1982, 1986, 2008, 2012. Virgin Islands 1978, 1982, 1988, 1993, 1998. There were many day and weekend trips over the years, too many to list here, to State Parks, historical areas, interesting cities, etc.

But of course this does not come about without fundraising, and there was plenty: We sold cook books, candy bars, tickets to the Music Fair (now long gone), pumpkins, Burpee Seeds, tickets to McDonalds, driveway Bricks, popcorn, Scrip; ran food concession at the Devon Horse Show; did tree work, seal-coated driveways, painted parking lots; and don't forget the Christmas tree sale every year, and this list could go on and on.

Oh yes, and those who ran the hoagie business for so many years: Jane & Charlie Fry – 18 years; Ruth & Bruce Balmat, and Laurie & Scott Vercoe – 2003 until 2 years ago and now the Schallacks, the new, young members who have taken over these tasks! It's appreciated.

One day, 27 years ago, one of our now deceased Troop members, Doc Lenker, a dentist, had a patient who was involved with the Radnor Three-Day Races at Radnor Hunt. She explained it was getting more and more difficult to get volunteers to staff the Snack Bar, and they wanted out. Doc brought this to the Committee, and all the members agreed to go for it. The rest is history! It has been beneficial to both Radnor and the Troop, and it meant no more Christmas tree sales! It has been great for the Scouts, a sense of giving back. And Radnor Races? They love the fact that 78 takes complete control on Race Day!

Finally, this tribute to Jim Donnelly would not be complete without recognizing the many everyday people who have contributed so much to make '78 so successful. Most importantly, the now deceased **Frank Hurley**, Willistown Supervisor, who saw that we had the ground that the present cabin sits on today; **Betty Moran**, who has supported "her boys" generously during the building of our new cabin, and our entire program; **Ernie Heegard**, who has been here forever and still is to this day, long before Jim got involved in 1956, and, of course, **Steve D'Antonio**, who has been doing such a fantastic job as Scoutmaster since September **1994!** There is not enough room here to name all the people who have given their time and energy to make '78 what it is today. My hat goes off to all of you!

Gettysburg Historic Park Tour & Campout

The Troop bus rumbled away from the cabin at 6:00 PM sharp Friday, April 29th. We went down the road for a weekend trip to Gettysburg with 31 scouts and 9 adults. This trip rounded out our multi-year effort to learn about the Civil War. In recent years we have toured Harper's Ferry, Antietam and Baltimore (where Fort McHenry of War of 1812 fame was used as a Civil War military base and field hospital).

Friday night we set up camp at Tuckahoe Scout Reservation just down the road from Gettysburg. Saturday morning we met a private tour guide at Gettysburg National Battlefield for a driving tour of the park. With Mr. Dinsmore at the wheel of the bus and the guide in the front, we drove the park, stopping to get out and take in information and commentary from our guide. Several hours were required for us to have an understanding of the battle which took place over a three day period, July 1, 2, and 3, 1863. You may recall this was America's' bloodiest battle ever, after all every casualty on both sides was an American. After three days there were 53,000 casualties (missing, wounded, and killed). The Union started with about 100,000 soldiers and had 25,000 casualties. The Confederates started with about 75,000 soldiers and had about 28,000 casualties.

The battle was considered a Union victory and ultimately led to the defeat of the Confederates, but the war would drag on for two more years. Of course one of the immediate problems after the battle was how to handle the dead and wounded. It was decided a National Cemetery should be placed in Gettysburg. It was the dedication of this cemetery which brought President Lincoln to Gettysburg on November 19, 1863, where he delivered his now famous address. The address defined in the most direct and simplest terms the purpose of the United States and its national government. In the address Mr. Lincoln defined the purpose of the Civil War, which at the time was still underway, as a struggle not only for the preservation of the country, but for equality of all of the country's citizens.

After the driving tour we went to the Visitor's Center, where we had a picnic lunch and then a walk-through of the Center's displays.

We completed our tour of the Park with a hike of about 5 miles around the battlefield, with the scouts following a Historic Tour guide, qualifying for a patch for their uniforms. Then it was back to Camp Tuckahoe for a delicious Dutch oven dinner cooked over an open fire. We closed the day with a campfire and snack. Once again Troop 78 has reserved the Dan Beard campsite at <u>Camp Horseshoe</u> for two weeks.

Week One starts on Sunday, June 26th and ends on July 3rd.
