# 6 The Buzz with Rabbi B



#### The Call of our Shofar: Mourning, Celebration, and Hope

There is a wonderful story about an American tourist who stops an Israeli on the street and the following conversation ensues:

"Can you please tell me the time"

"/am sorry," replied the Israeli, "/ don't have a watch."

"You don't have a watch! How do you know what time it is?"

"During the day, it is simple; I just ask someone."

"But what do you do at night?"

"For that, my friend, I have a shofar!"

"A shofar? How do you tell time with a shofar?"

"That's simple! If I wake up in the middle of the night and want to know what time it is, I open my window and I blow the shofar as loud as I can. A neighbor will always call out, "You idiot! Why are you blowing the shofar at 3:30 in the morning!" Now I know what time it is!"

As I write this article, we are about to move into the month of Elul. Elul is the month that leads us up to the High Holy Days, the month in which we are reminded every day to start to slow down and turn our focus inward. What am I proud of from this past year? What have been my successes? How have I treated people this past year? What kindnesses did I bestow upon others? How did I stay connected to my community even in these dark and isolating times? We also ask ourselves the tougher questions. Where did I miss the mark this year? Where did I fall short of my goals? Whom did I hurt this past year? What actions do I regret?

The irony of the shofar joke above is that the shofar's main role IS TO WAKE US UP (perhaps not at 3:30 am). The call of the shofar reminds us that now is the time when we start thinking more deeply about our lives and the choices we have made. If we have slept through a chunk of our lives, we have truly missed the mark.

For me, the sound of the shofar also brings a certain familiarity with it. While the sound is supposed to be jarring, hearing its unique tone can also transport some of us back to another time. As you've likely heard me discuss before, my family was not very observant in our Judaism when I was a kid. But we would always make it to Temple on the High Holy Days, and hearing the call of the shofar reminds me of sitting in our huge sanctuary and anticipating the last shofar call of the service when the person sounding the shofar would hold the note as long as he or she could. To be honest, I don't remember a lot about High Holy Day services as a child, but I do remember the sound of that shofar. I remember delighting in hearing its sound, and seeing just how long the note would last before the *ba'al tikiyah* (shofar sounder) would start turning red.

The dual nature of the High Holy Day season, the idea that it is supposed to wake us up to be better versions of ourselves and at the same time, warmly connect us to our past versions of ourselves is what makes this time of year so special. While we take stock of our lives and our choices, we think of those who came before us (even if they weren't Jewish) and the choices they made. We work hard on improving ourselves and at the same time perhaps we eat the same honey cake that a beloved grandmother made, or if we adopted Judaism for ourselves, we think of our own childhood experiences and remember lessons learned.

As we approach the High Holy Day season this year, we know that it is going to feel much different than it usually does. While there are a lot of creative and interesting ways that we will connect to one another in 5781, we must first acknowledge the sense of loss that so many of us will feel as we observe these holy days differently than in other years. I was upstairs in the sanctuary this morning and thought about how this is the time of year when we would usually start getting the building ready to accommodate the entire congregation. We take out the High Holy Day prayer books, sometimes the bima gets a fresh coat of paint, we order flowers, we print programs, we look forward to this wonderful and meaningful time when we can see one other, hug old friends, and come together as a community.

This High Holy Day season will, God willing, but an outlier. Perhaps we will always remember 5781 as our Pandemic High Holy Day Season. We must allow ourselves to mourn not just for this season, but for all the darkness and isolation that this pandemic has brought.

While we should let ourselves mourn, we also should rejoice that there will be many opportunities during this season for connection, meaning, and closeness. Most of our High Holy Day services will be conducted online through Facebook Live, our Temple website, and Youtube live. Our staff has been working hard since July to make sure that we provide the best content possible. Gail Rose, along with Debbie Costa and the Sharyonim choir have been recording choral music that will be woven together in a special video. To ensure the very best quality sound and picture, many of our High Holy Day services will be pre-recorded (and for many a bonus: shorter than usual). We will be able to interact with each other in the comments section on our website and on Facebook and Zoom. We are asking everyone in the congregation who is able to send in a 20 second clip of them wishing our community a Shanah Tovah, a Happy New Year (details elsewhere in the Window) enabling us to have a "virtual Rosh HaShanah luncheon."

We will also be celebrating some aspects of the Holy Days together in person as safely as possible. On the afternoon and evening of Thursday, September 17 (Erev Erev Rosh HaShanah), we will be offering drive-in Shofar Blasts in six locations throughout our community at specific times for those folks who want to in-person, fulfill the mitzvah of hearing the shofar. Weather permitting, we will be holding drive-in style services for both Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur Shir Shirim Musical Services, with RSVPs ahead of time. We will also be doing our Yikor Memorial Service on Yom Kippur afternoon as a drive-in service as well. All of these services will also be streamed live via our website, Facebook, and Youtube, and if the weather doesn't cooperate, the services will still happen online. On Rosh HaShanah afternoon we will have the opportunity to do a personal self-guided Tashlich service. We will have two entrances to the creek on our property, recorded music playing, and instructions and meditations for Tashlich available. Bring your own bread to cast into the water, demonstrating the casting away of our missteps.

The High Holy Days of 5781 will certainly be memorable. Let's spend some time mourning our losses, but also spend time celebrating the creative ways in which we can still safely engage. And we will maintain hope. Hope that we have seen the worst of this pandemic. Hope that a vaccine is on the horizon. Hope that we will soon be together again. British Rabbi Hugo Gryn wrote about his time as a boy in Auschwitz. One winter evening in the barrack, Gryn's father drew him into a quiet corner, explaining that it was the first night of Hanukkah. He watched in amazement as his father plucked a few threads from his prison uniform for a wick and lit them in the day's now melted butter ration. Then the boy became angry; how could they waste this precious food for a makeshift menorah? His father replied: "My dear son, you and I have seen that it is possible to live for a very long time without food. But Hugo, a person cannot live even for a day without hope." Hope has sustained us in the past, and we turn once again to hope to sustain us.

On behalf of Lauren, Sammie, Jake, Asher, and Noah, I wish you strength, sweetness, and hope this Holy Day season. We are in this together.

Rabbi B's interests include teaching lifelong learning, engaging with Jewish music, and blowing the shofar at inappropriate times during the High Holy Day season (even if it's online).

# Cantorial Corner with Gail Rose



#### Meet your 5781 High Holy Day Musicians!

King David is credited with establishing the first Israelite orchestra and choir with the purpose of enhancing the spiritual mood of sacred services. Most of the musicians and singers David employed came from the tribe of Levi. David told the leaders of the Levites to appoint their brothers as singers to sing joyful songs, accompanied by musical instruments: lyres, harps and cymbals, joyfully making their voices heard.

In Jerusalem's Second Temple, there were never fewer than twelve Levites standing on the platform (as a choir) but there was no limit on the maximum number of singers. The singing of the Levitical choir served as a constant accessory to the sacrificial ritual.

Following the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 C.E., the Rabbis abolished the sacrificial rite and its accompanying instrumental and vocal music. So, even as most other elements central to the Jewish tradition survived the destruction, the musical culture was lost.

The Jews longed for the elevating sounds of the choir. Even Maimonides, the great twelfth-century Jewish philosopher, permitted the choir to sing God's praise in the synagogue and at all religious feasts.

Just as our ancestors longed for the choir, we heard from the High Holiday Task Force that if the Sharyonim choir would not be heard singing their traditional and new melodies, it would be a great loss during the 2020 High Holidays.

So will there be a choir? YES! A Virtual Choir.

The Virtual Choir did not begin due to COVID-19. It began in 2009 as a simple experiment in social media. Composer, arranger and director Eric Whitacre received a video that was shared on YouTube from a young woman singing his composition, "Sleep". Impressed with the video, Whitacre responded by sending a call out to his online fans to purchase the recording, record themselves singing along to it, and upload the result. Eric was so impressed by the result that he decided to push the concept to the next level by recording himself conducting 'Lux Aurumque', asking Virtual Choir members to sing along with it and the first Virtual Choir was created. Whitacre's Virtual Choir has grown

From 185 singers to more thatn 8,00 singers, aged 4-87, from 120 countries during his 2020 Sixth Virtual Choir.



#### **High Holy Day Memories**

For as long as I can remember, I have always gravitated towards the High Holy Days. Growing up on the North Shore of Boston during the 90s – an area that is predominantly Irish and Italian Catholic – Jewish culture and traditions were not exactly at the forefront of the local consciousness. Reflecting on this experience, the act of putting on "fancy adult" clothes and not going to school for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur felt important. It felt like an expression of Jewish identity at that time in my life. When I heard the shofar and the different liturgy and songs, I knew that this was an aspect of Judaism that I needed to honor and cherish. These occasions always ended with tzimmes at my aunt's house, and made for moments that felt like the passing of culture and traditions from one generation to the next.

Moving from the High Holy Days to the joy that is Sukkot and Simchat Torah, the same familial and communal experiences will look a little different this Fall. Because you have placed your trust in the Temple to be your Jewish home, TBS's leadership and the COVID-19 Task Force have thought a lot about the importance of maintaining the value of your partnership with TBS. To put this in context, I would like to use an analogy. Before the pandemic, you used to eat out at your favorite pizza place once a week. You have done this for years. Since the pandemic started, this restaurant has been take-out or delivery only. In keeping with your tradition, you bring a pizza home once a week, and it is still the same pie that you know and love. This Fall, while the delivery mechanism might be a little different, the TBS clergy and staff is going to do everything that it can to ensure that the High Holy Days and festivals are alive with the passion, creativity, and fun that TBS is known for. From streaming services to drive-in services, neighborhood shofar blows to High Holy Day gift bags, everyone at TBS is committed to creating an experience that is focused on one thing: you and your enjoyment of this wonderful time of year.

I started as Executive Director on April 6, and it has been a pleasure getting to know many of you. If I can ever be of any assistance, do not hesitate to be in touch. From my wife, Rabbi Stephanie, and our kids Liam and Lily, we wish you a L'Shanah Tovah u'Metukah to you and your family!

"We have been active members of Temple Beth Shalom for 27 years. When we joined, we connected with a vibrant Jewish community who welcomed us (transplanted New Yorkers) and, over the years, learned, traveled, celebrated, and mourned with us. Our sons, Daniel and David, grew up at TBS.

Our ethical will provides the opportunity to share our wisdom and values learned over a lifetime, tell where we found meaning in our lives, and impart what hopes we have for our loved ones going forward.

# 24 Presidential Address



#### "From Every Human Arises a Light" - Thoughts for the New Year

As the High Holy Days approach, typically times of joy, personal reflection, repentance, and forgiveness, we instead find ourselves anxious, angry, and saddened that we are living in a world turned upside down by the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result, we are battling feelings of grief, loss, and isolation, combined with outrage at the social unrest that plagues our society. All of us long for a return to "normal," yet normal seems so far away and undefined. It is against this backdrop that we pondered what to write for our

first High Holy Day message to you.

"From every human arises a light." We were struck by this teaching from the Ba'al Shem Tov. (An 18th century Jewish mystic and healer from Poland who is regarded as the founder of Hasidic Judaism and whose name means "Master of the Good Name.") We realized that ours is the history of a people who have constantly been challenged to move through the darkness and into the light. This has required each person, even during the most difficult and trying situations, to find that spark of light within to ultimately helped the individual and the community move forward.

Our shared vulnerability has allowed us to find new ways to bridge the physical separation, affirming how special our congregation is. We have found new options for connecting, engaging, teaching, learning, creatively passing time, and problem solving. Since March 2020, our TBS community has benefitted from the inspiration and power that comes from harnessing this human light:

- Our Task Force, through open, honest discussions guided by science and Jewish values, created a planned response that allows our congregation to operate safely. This response (available on the TBS website) addresses the well-being of our Clergy, staff, congregants, and visitors during Shabbat and lifecycle events, Religious School, the High Holy Days, and TBS programming. The Board of Trustees unanimously approved the Task Force's recommendations, and the Task Force will continue to meet to reassess its recommendations based on the evolving state of the pandemic.
- Using our new best friends, Zoom and Facebook Live, we have offered our congregation over 300 virtual but no less real experiences. These creative and innovative experiences have resulted in congregants engaging with us in new and different ways. Highlights include our monthly Drive-In Shabbats, which draw over 100 congregants; Havdalah with the Bar-Lev Family; yoga; a live 10-week tour through Israel conducted via Zoom by an Israeli tour guide; and weekly Torah study and other classes.
- Rabbi Lenette is working with our religious school staff to create unique learning opportunities for our students.
- Our Rabbis and staff are re-imagining the High Holidays so that we can offer meaningful experiences, despite the inability to physically worship and celebrate together as a congregation. You will be able to "hear the sound of the shofar" in your neighborhoods!
- Our Rabbis' continued pastoral support, combined with monthly outreach by staff and volunteers to our families, has continued TBS's tradition of empathetic caring for our congregants.

Harnessing and spreading the light from these activities and programs is not possible without your continued support and engagement. We remain Joyful, Personable, and Accessible because of the commitment made by each of our families. So if you have not done so, please return your Partnership Renewals and renew your commitment to TBS. Our annual High Holiday appeal will be sent out soon. We know that we are living in difficult and uncertain times and that there are those among us who have been physically, emotionally, financially, and socially hurt by the pandemic. We need your support in whatever amount you are comfortable to continue to offer stability, opportunities for connection, and a spiritual home that supports the needs of all the members in our congregational family. And we need your engagement – your light – with our communal worship, our programs, our volunteer events, and the work of your Board of Trustees.

"From every human arises a light." Our sacred community has shone brightly in these darkest of days and remains a beacon for our community. We are grateful to each and every one of you for continuing to believe in TBS and in our work. Like those who came before us, we can and will "get back to better." In doing so, we will be stronger and more appreciative of who we are, what we have, and the world we inhabit.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, and from our homes to yours, L'shanah tovah. Our best wishes for a happy, healthy and sweet New Year. May 5781 be one of blessing, health, and peace for us all.


#### Lo Tov L'adam L'hiyot L'vado – It is not good for humans to be alone

#### From Where Did the Ashkenazim Emerge?

The Thirteenth Tribe: The Khazar Empire and Its Heritage, by Arthur Koestler, 1976, is a rather academic, but nonetheless an interesting book supporting a yet unproven theory concerning the rise of the Ashkenazi (Jews of Eastern European decent). Koestler controversially theorized Eastern European Jews are more ethnically Khazar than they are Semitic. Semitic Jews originated in the Middle East and primarily populated the then diaspora: Spain, Portugal, Northern Africa, Babylonia, Persia, and what became Arab lands, including a greatly reduced population staying in ancient Israel. These Jews are referred to as Sephardim by Koestler.

The Khazars were a pagan tribe of Turkic-speaking people living in a country known as Khazaria, which was geographically positioned in the area between the Black Sea and the Caspian Sea with a southern boarder formed by the Greater Caucasus Mountains covering land in modern day southern Russia, northern Caucasus, eastern Ukraine, Crimea, western Kazakhstan, and northwestern Uzbekistan.

In 740 CE, the Khagan, the Khazar supreme ruler having semireligious character, seeking to make the Khazars more enlightened (in accordance with the times) than their historic pagan ways, converted to Judaism; choosing not Christianity so as not to offend the Islamic people to the south, and not Islam so as to not offend Christians to the West. It was a compromise decision to not provoke attacks from the east or south. Most of the Khazar people followed suit with their own conversion from pagan tribal ways to Judaism.

In 965 CE, Svyatoslav, the ruler of Kiev, attacked the Khazars; it was a devastating loss for Khazaria. The Khazars then migrated to safer lands most notably to Poland where they continued to practice Judaism.

Koestler tries to prove the assertion Ashkenazi Judaism descended from the Khazars -- not from the diaspora of Semitic Jews of ancient Israel. He uses history, migration paths, language development, and genetic dispositions to support his argument.

All-in-all, *The Thirteenth Tribe* is a fascinating read. Read it for yourself to see on which side of the debate you most agree.
