FROM THE PASTOR...

Many of you have been to Camp Agape just an hour to our south. Camp experiences put more people into church vocation than any other single ministry, followed closely by campus ministry programs. We currently use the camp for confirmation and for other retreat settings.

The Triangle Conference of the NC Synod has joined forces with Agape+Kure Beach Ministries to share the love of camp with new



generations. As the closest neighbors to the camp, we feel like Agape is part of us. Several of the Triangle churches teach confirmation camp together at Agape, and many of the board members, volunteers, staff, and alumni belong in our congregations. Joined together in our fond memories of Agape and our mutual desire to see it continue to shape lives, seven congregations are part of this effort to secure the camp’s future. To that end, we will be doing a fund raising campaign for Camp Agape in the month of April this year. St. Paul’s has made no commitment as to how much we will raise, but the total goal for the campaign between the seven congregations that are participating, is \$171,000. This will help them with the nearly \$700,000 cost to replace the pool. The \$171,000 is the amount needed to complete this project. Approximately \$130,000 of this has been committed by the two largest area congregations: Christ the King in Cary and Good Shepherd in Raleigh. I would love for us to help make up the gap. Any money raised over the goal will be used to raise compensation for summer camp counselors and help with deferred maintenance at the Camp.

I am quoted in the brochure about the camp below:

“I started going to Camp Agape and Kure Beach in the summer of 1968. Camp is loving, comforting, caring and uplifting. When I became a pastor in 2007, I began bringing confirmation students for a week at Camp Agape. Every camper has found the same things I found at Camp Agape and more. I have held retreats for Councils, bereavement groups, young adults, and sent campers to BYG and held day camps at my

congregations. Camp Agape trains counselors well, encourages a holistic life of faith and is a blessing to the world. We need such places in this world. Places where we can unplug, embrace nature and see the love of Christ become tangible.”

Look for brochures and donation opportunities throughout the month. Donations can be made to St. Paul’s with a notation for Camp Agape.

Dear Friends at St. Paul’s,

A word about media release forms.

Some of you may have been asked, especially if children accompany you to church, to sign a media-release form. A media-release form is a document that gives St. Paul’s permission to use your image (photograph or video) in media publications like: live stream, Facebook, the newsletter, and other general publications of the church. Release forms can be important because they protect the church from liability in case someone objects to having their image used. They also help ensure that we have the consent of the people in the media we publish.

In general, when it comes to pictures we try not to post anything that is embarrassing, objectionable, or hurtful to anyone in the photo. In addition, if someone asks us to take down a photo of them, we will do so. Another note about privacy is that we will never post identifying information of congregants such as phone numbers, emails, addresses, full names, etc., to our social media or website. Finally, we do not seek to profit off any videos or photos we post.

However, it can still be good to know for sure that we have someone’s permission before we post a picture, thus: the media release form!

So far, we have not done a lot with media release forms but as we continue to post on and develop our social media pages, there will be a movement to using them more. We especially want minors to have media release forms to ensure we have permission from their parent or guardian before we use their image in media. We are also searching for anyone who does *not* want their image shared.

If you have a minor in your family or would like to fill out a form, feel free to contact me – whether by email or just swinging by my office. I plan to have forms available for those interested.

Spring cleaning time is here. Time to discard things that are just taking up space on the shelf or in the closet. From electronics, to toys with metal, there are so many items around the home that people aren’t aware can be recycled.



St. Paul’s is celebrating Earth Day by providing an opportunity to dispose of many home items not accepted by local trash recycling.

From **April 9-15**, accepted items can be dropped off in an area that will be clearly marked at the back of the parking lot between the mobile classroom and the shed. Please do **NOT** leave them anywhere inside the church building. Items will be picked up on **Tuesday, April 16** by “Anything With A Plug Recycling” from Raleigh.

Accepted items can include:

- ▶ LCD, LED, or flat screen tvs up to 4 inches thick
- ▶ Computers, printers, copiers and related items
- ▶ game consoles
- ▶ SMALL kitchen appliances
- ▶ cords, cables, stereo equipment
- ▶ Kids’ toys (plastic, bikes, powerwheels)
- ▶ Cell phones, batteries, all plastic except bags
- ▶ Plastic or metal furniture

Items NOT accepted:

Styrofoam, CRT Tube Type TVs, light bulbs, wood items, smoke alarms, large items such as home appliances, grills, and furniture; vhs or magnetic tapes
