Catch The Action

November On The Water

It’s that time of year we start to combine summer and winter fishing together. As cool fronts begin to arrive our waters are cooling down, fish are transitioning from summer to winter patterns, yet we still have plenty of mild days.



November can be a great month for targeting redfish and snook if it doesn’t get too cold too quick. Redfish can tolerate a sudden drop in temperature, but snook not so much. Snook are on the move from their summer homes around the beaches and relocating throughout the inshore waters. If it remains relatively warm, they may be found feeding over inshore flats, oyster bars, shorelines, and sand holes. If it turns cold quick, they will seek shelter from the cold in protected areas like canals, rivers, and shorelines with deep water. Large schools of redfish that prowled the inshore waters over the last few months will move offshore or break up. It’s still possible to run into a school, but most reds will be in pairs or small bunches. Look for reds tailing over shallow flats on the lowest tides and in the same areas as previously mentioned for snook.

As water temperature drops, gag grouper will become more abundant in nearshore gulf waters and inshore. Most anglers target grouper in the gulf waters, but if you find some underwater structure inshore it could hold some good fish. Docks, piers, bridges, or any type of underwater debris is a good place to look, and it doesn’t have to be very deep, often less than 10 feet.

For fun and action, mackerel, bluefish, small sharks, ladyfish, and jack crevalle are foraging on bait schools inshore and along the beaches. A short distance offshore bait pods get harassed by both Spanish and king mackerel, plus bonito, and an occasional blackfin tuna. Expect some big sharks hanging around the feeding activity as well.

As the month wears on and the water gets cooler, large sheepsheads are on the move and will relocate around structure in gulf waters offshore and inshore. Target them in the same areas mentioned for grouper, along the beaches and passes, and around deeper oyster bars and docks or bridges. Our first run of sheepsheads generally show nearshore reefs and hard bottom or ledges. Last winter we had a great sheepshead run, hoping for more of the same this year.

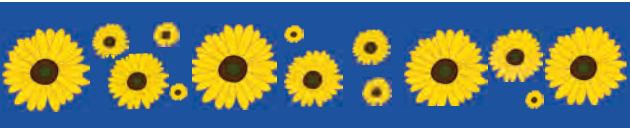
Nearshore reefs are a good place to run into everything from tasty snapper to giant goliath grouper. Coordinates for all man-made artificial reefs are available to the public and make a great day trip on a calm day. Some of the most productive reefs are well within the sight of land.

With our coastal waters cooling down, it brings a host of fishing possibilities. As we move into our “busy” season and the holidays are in sight, it gets crowded in Southwest Florida. There is no better place to be than on the water and away from the crowds and traffic.

Please keep updated on all current fishing regulations for the area you fish. Redfish, snook, and sea trout remain closed for most of Southwest Florida; however, you can still enjoy catch-and-release fishing for all three species. Visit www.myfwc.com to get the latest rules and regulations.

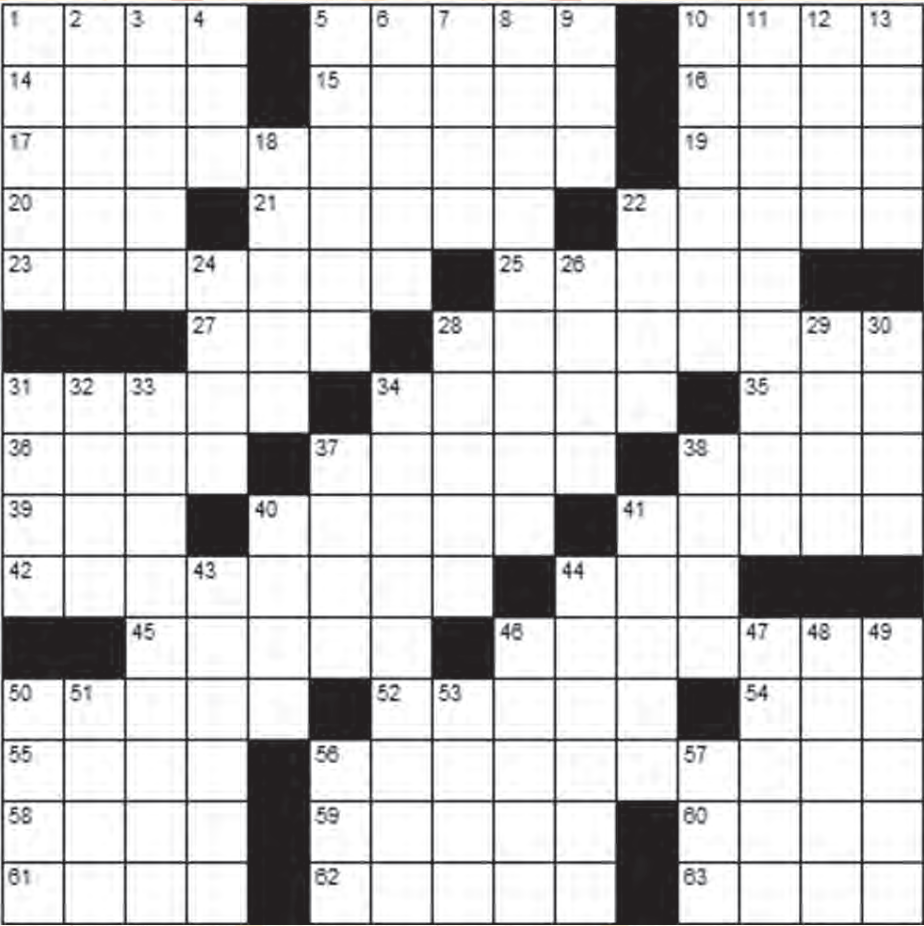

It is National Peanut Butter Lovers Month; National Author’s Day is Nov. 1. It is also Update Your Resume Month and National American Teddy Bear Day on the 14th. It is also Sweet Potato Awareness Month. I have a great sweet potato soup recipe. Give it a try and enjoy!

Sweet Potato Soup

1 tablespoon bacon fat
1 cup onions, chopped

2 stalks of celery, chopped
1 pound sweet potatoes, peeled and diced
5 cups chicken broth (or you can use vegetable broth)
Salt and pepper to taste
½ teaspoon nutmeg
Sour cream for top

Sauté onion, celery, and sweet potatoes in a soup pot using bacon fat for about five minutes. Add broth, cover and bring to a boil, then lower heat and simmer until veggies are tender. Puree in blender and reheat. Add salt and pepper to taste and nutmeg. Serve with a scoop of sour cream on top.

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early.
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.
- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.

President’s Monthly Report: John Spiegel

Condos v. ERPOA litigation: We await a decision from the Second District Court of Appeal on a motion for rehearing filed by the condos after the appellate court ruled in favor of ERPOA on July 10, 2019. Once a final decision is entered by the appellate court, ERPOA will be willing to discuss separate attorney fee settlements with each condominium association, should there be any interest in doing so by the condos.

The Florida Power and Light (FPL) underground work has been put on hold. The homeowner at 7050 Twin Eagle asked FPL to “cease and desist” any further work on his property and advised FPL that he has retained an attorney. The large FPL switch cabinets may end up being located within the existing utility easement close to the house at 7050 Twin Eagle. Stay tuned.

Utilities Inc., Variance Application

The variance request was granted, with conditions, most notably a nine-foot simulated stone wall and nine-foot gate, along with a landscape plan. Hewitt McCloskey, Jr. will report in more detail.

Director’s Report: Hewitt McCloskey, Jr.

The repair of the front entrance center island located at Daniels Parkway and Eagle Ridge Drive is about 90 percent complete. The reason for the delay is there has been some difficulty in finding replacement masonry edging. This matter should be resolved shortly.

The raised planter located in front of the Eagle Ridge directory at the intersection of Aeries Way Drive and Eagle Ridge Drive is a work in progress. I am still looking for six large purple/violet shrubs. Also, more soil and groundcover need to be added throughout the raised masonry planter.

I met with and submitted a landscape enhancement plan to the Florida Power and Light representative, Noel Reese on Tuesday morning, Sept. 17, 2019. The work has been suspended. The owner of 7050 Twin Eagle hired an attorney and asked FPL to “cease and desist.”

Major renovations were performed on both irrigation systems. Intake filters were added to both systems and many irrigation heads had to be replaced.
