Now...Tell me what you have been doing to raise funds for AEF.



The 1st quarter is already at an end! Each month I am focusing on one of the areas mentioned in the August newsletter. This month: **Promote American Legion Auxiliary scholarships and award local scholarships at the department and unit levels.**

There are a number of ways that Members and Units can promote scholarships:

- Assign a member to communicate with school guidance counselors/teachers regarding scholarship applications. Make copies of the applications (found at www.ALAforVeterans.org/Scholarships) and provide them to the schools.
- Inform school-aged children in your community about National, Department and Unit scholarship opportunities.
- Volunteer to be on the scholarship selection committee in your District or Unit.
- Make a donation to American Legion Auxiliary education scholarship funds (Children of Warriors National Presidents' Scholarship, ALA Foundation at www.ALAFoundation.org or Department, District or Unit scholarships).
- Create a Unit scholarship fund to award scholarships to local students.
- Prepare a news release with scholarship information for local media and your Post/Unit newsletter.
- Publicize the winners of Auxiliary scholarships at a school presentation and through the media.

National American Legion Auxiliary scholarships awarded in each Division include the Children of Warriors National Presidents' Scholarship, the Non-Traditional Student Scholarship, the Spirit of Youth Scholarship and the Junior Member Loyalty Scholarship. The Department of Arizona also awards the Wilma Hoyal-Maxine Chilton Memorial Scholarship to a second-year or upper division student in Political Science, Public Programs or Special Education at Arizona State University, Northern Arizona University or the University of Arizona.

Be sure to review all the material in the Education packet distributed at the Fall Conference. It contains the rules and application forms for all of these scholarships, as well as the report forms for the mid-year and year-end reports. Don't forget *American Education Week*, November 16-20, 2020.

Throughout the year through this bulletin I will post ideas of projects you can do with your Juniors. I would also like it if you have any ideas that you share with the rest of us, by sending them to me. In as much as we are celebrating the 100th birthday let's make it a fun year!

Ideas:

- ❖ Get your school or unit involved in making Pocket Flags for Veterans Day, see if you can have all the classes in your school fold flags for military personnel. Talk to your principal or counselor and explain that you are a member of the American Legion Auxiliary. Explain that you want to teach classmates about Veterans Day and that they can make a difference in a military service member by doing little projects like folding Pocket Flags. You could also use this as an opportunity to work towards a patch. You could give a presentation about what the flag represents and the meaning behind it. Your school may not be able to pay for the flags, so talk to them about fundraising ideas. You could sell suckers at lunch on every Friday for a month. - Write thank you letters. Contact a nursing home or veteran's home near your unit and ask how many veterans live there. Then get other Juniors in your unit or friends together and write thank you letters to them. To tell how much you appreciate their service and sacrifice they gave to our country. You can even include drawings of flags, or a picture of poppies.
- ❖ Collect items for the Give 10 to Education project. With other Juniors in your unit or with friends collect items for students in your school who has a parent in the military or National Guard. Work with your teacher or school counselor on how to get the items to the students.

Legislative November 2020

Greetings Members,

As you all know by now, we are not going to be able to meet in person in Tucson for Fall Conference. I miss all of you and I hope we can get together soon. As of the writing of this bulletin, Department has not announced the date as of yet for a virtual conference. However, the announcements for awards will be presented then.

On October 7th, Vice President Mike Pence and Senator Kamala Harris had an in person Vice Presidential debate. Wednesday night's vice presidential debate marked a return to a more traditional affair. Typically the vice presidential debate doesn't change the decision of most voters, however in this case it might. Four takeaways from the debate include; the 2020 election still hinges on the coronavirus, there was an actual debate this time unlike the Presidential Debate a week prior, but not necessarily answers to the moderator's questions, candidates' strategies reflected the state of the campaign – Pence attacked Biden-Harris as extreme; Harris pivoted to Trump's record on the coronavirus, and one solitary fly generated the most buzz, no pun intended.

As of October 9th, the second presidential debate was officially canceled, due to President Trump contracting COVID-19. His stay in the hospital was brief, as he was showing mild symptoms. He was admitted to Walter Reed Medical Center as a precaution only. The debate was scheduled for October 15th. The nonpartisan Commission on Presidential Debates confirmed the debate would take place virtually. Trump refused at holding the debate in that format, and Biden scheduled a town hall with ABC News for that night once Trump announced that he would not participate in a virtual debate. Trump's team later said that he would hold debates as scheduled once his doctor cleared him to hold public events. The Commission said it would not reverse its decision. The third debate is scheduled for Oct. 22 in Nashville, Tenn.

On October 12th, President Trump returned to the campaign trail as he was cleared by his doctors. Biden continues his campaigning.

In Congressional news, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell says that he is scheduling a procedural vote for a GOP COVID relief plan. The House still has not come to a conclusion on another stimulus. President Trump nominated Judge Amy Coney Barrett to fill the vacancy left by the death of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg, into the U.S. Supreme Court. She is currently undergoing her confirmation hearings. As of the writing of this bulletin, members of Congress as well as some state and city governments throughout the nation are still discussing defunding law enforcement or reforming police agencies due to excessive use of force incidents and police brutality lawsuits.

In conclusion, these are trying and challenging times for our nation. In the last few weeks alone, we have gone back decades in the progress we have made as a nation. All I ask is if you do protest and exercise your 1st Amendment right, please do so in a safe and peaceful manner. We don't want any of our Legion Family to get hurt. ALSO, PLEASE VOTE!!! YOUR VOTE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE!!!!

Hello ladies of the great state of Arizona!!! This month I want to share with each of you about Blue Star and Gold Star Banners, Yellow Ribbons and USO information. With all that is still going on in our country, we need to be reminded of our Veterans and their families.

Blue Star Banner. Rich in their significance and history, Blue Star flags were originally displayed starting in World War I and were used as a symbol to recognize the **family member or members that were away, in service of their country.** The blue stars, amidst the white field, represent **each member of the family that is in active duty**.

Gold Star Banner. The gold star represents a family member killed during active duty and stands for sacrifice made for honor and freedom. Banners, also called <u>service flags</u>, containing gold stars indicates service members from that particular family were **killed in combat**.

Yellow Ribbons began appearing in large numbers after the Gulf War when we began sending large numbers of **troops overseas to the Middle East**. What is the history behind the display of ribbons? For a **long time, ribbons have been kept as a symbol of remembrance of men and women who served in places far from home**. Yellow ribbons continue to be a symbol of support for troops.

USO. The USO strengthens America's military service members by keeping them connected to family, home and country, throughout their service to the nation.

For over 77 years, the USO has been the nation's leading organization to serve the men and women in the U.S. military, and their families, throughout their time in uniform. From the moment they join, through their assignments and deployments, and as they transition back to their communities, the USO is always by their side. USO airport centers throughout the country offer around-the clock hospitality for traveling service members and their families.



An effective public relations program can bring in new members, new resources and new volunteers. To be its most effective, it needs certain attributes which I am calling the 7 C's (lol-- get that—like seven seas?), which we will explore over the coming months. First:

Commitment- Commitment is first because it is such a critical factor in PR success.

- Your Unit leadership needs to be committed for the long term. This means that your leadership recognizes the value of the program and is willing to put resources behind it, including financial and personpower. It means that building a positive presence in your community takes time—you will not be successful if you go into it with another mindset. For example, will your Unit be ready to respond when a local business wants poppy distribution? Will your Unit go en masse to a City Council Meeting when your Proclamation is read? Will you make sure that members are wearing branded clothing at events and that photos are taken with branding in mind?
- Your program chairman needs to be committed for the long term. You need a reliable and available "face" to your program--someone who wants to develop relationships with "influencers"—wants to go to events, shake hands, introduce themselves, speak about the mission and about your unit. When the Mayor calls, for example, will your chairman be able to take or return their call—not just today but next year too? Will they be able to speak on behalf of your Unit?

In the coming months we will explore the other "C's":

Consistency, Creativity, Communication, Credibility, Cooperation, Collaboration

VA&R REPORT TUCSON VA MEDICAL CENTER November 2020

All events are suspended until further notice. Thank you volunteers for your help!

Southwest Bind Rehabilitation Center is now accepting a limited number of new patients. They have requested that service organizations provide delivery of in house meals. There will be no volunteers at these meals. There is NO visitation at SAVAHCS. Monetary donations are being accepted at this time. American Legion Auxiliary Gift Shop will have to be done differently this year. The hospital is asking for lists from nursing staff of items needed by Veteran patients. They have requested that all service organizations work together to fill these needs with no duplication. VAVS Committee meeting will be held virtually on October 28th. Further discussion on holiday events will be on the agenda.

The grand total of monetary donations for the American Legion Auxiliary for May 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020 is \$600.

The grand total of material and activity donations for the American Legion Auxiliary for February 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020 is \$30,377.27. This amount includes the Christmas Gift Shop donation for 2019 Thank you Unit 7, Unit 24, Unit 66, Unit 68 and Unit 132 for your generous donations to support our programs.

Three registered hospital volunteers donated time which was credited to the American Legion Auxiliary. The grand total of registered volunteer hours May 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020 is 63. **S AVAHCS is in the process of bringing back volunteers.
