### **Our Ghana Girls**

If you have been reading the *The Pointer* or have attended SIGP meetings you will recall our girls in Damongo, northern Ghana and their quest to complete studies at St. Anne Girls High School. SIGP has supported this effort in a big way with a large grant, another grant application, and individual and club donations. Several articles on this topic have been printed.

Well, something the Head Mistress (Mary T.) wrote to us a few days ago touched my heart. Perhaps you will appreciate her words as well. I emailed to her my last article printed in *The Pointer* describing the importance of finishing school for these young students. Mary T. promptly responded by saying she loved the description and that it was a---well, she meant to say "masterpiece, " I believe. That description is stretching it, for sure, but what is precious is her spelling mistake.

She wrote "master peace" instead of masterpiece.

First I chuckled at the mistake. Then I thought more deeply about it.

" Masterpeace. " Reach out to help those in need and make this a better world. This is exactly what it means to "master the art of peace."

Peace is not brought about by bombs or force or violence. Peace is brought about by caring for each other. Feed the hungry. Give drink to the thirsty. Clothe the naked. Visit those in prison. Educate those who thirst for knowledge so they may feed and clothe themselves, and improve the community around them.

Do these things with each person in need. This is what SIGP is all about. Help the pregnant moms with a birthing clinic in Papua, New Guinea. Offer parenting and computer classes for women at Positive Images. Brighten their residence with art and lace and curtains to increase their sense of welcome and warmth and worth. Present scholarships to young women who yearn to educate themselves and in so doing provide a better life for themselves and their families. Fight the scourge of human trafficking. Do whatever is possible to free young women from the shackles to their hearts and minds that keep them in bondage to " human monsters."

These are all actions that we in SIGPare taking on behalf of those in need.

And in a far off developing country our Ghana girls, once they finish high school, will be able to better provide for their families and their communities. A lower poverty rate, a better understanding of this complex world, and an increase in good will are the results.

Truly, on this troubled little planet, this is what it means to "master the art of peace, "or at the very least, take a good first step.

### Soroptimist Celebrates 60 Years

Sixty years ago on July 14, 1956, eighteen women from Grosse Pointe met to charter *Soroptimist International of Grosse Pointe (SIGP)* as part of the world's largest international service organization for women. Earliest projects included gifts to nursing homes, donations to the Foundation of Exceptional Children and tuition for women to attend college. From the 1960's through 1984 a pledge to Cottage Hospital resulted in a contribution of \$25,000. In the 1980's SIGP formed a partnership with Positive Images, Inc., a residential center for women in Detroit recovering from alcohol and drug addiction. Over the past 25 years *SIGP* has written and received grants totaling \$18,000 to support Positive Images. Grants include creating a Resource Center which established a computer lab, refurbishing the residential house on E. Grand Blvd., providing nutritional workshops for clients, creating a library and decorating the dining room in the residential center, and annually supporting clients at Christmas and Mother's Day with gifts.

Since 2008, *Soroptimist* has been a frontrunner in the awareness of human trafficking bringing information to the community and also being a member on the Michigan Task Force Against Trafficking. Sadly, Detroit is a major city for trafficked victims as it is an international border and is located close to Toledo, Ohio where major interstate freeways make it easy to move victims from state to state.

Today, *Soroptimist International of Grosse Pointe* is 51 members strong! We celebrated our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary on April 8<sup>th</sup>at the Assumption Cultural Center where we shared a delicious meal prepared by Marchiori Catering with our many friends and supporters who bid on multiple auction items resulting in a very successful fund raising evening. Decorations included flower bouquets by Full Circle Foundation students.



The highlight of the celebration was the presentation of awards. Noudiamintoya Molsby won the Virginia Wagner Award of \$2000. She went on to win District and Region for an additional \$5000. Noudiamintoya is pursuing a Bachelors Degree in Business Management at Baker College. A \$2000 Live Your Dream (LYD) Award was won by Alexis L. Mitchell and a \$1000 LYD won by Lakissa Purnell. Interestingly, both women are working on Bachelor of Social Work degrees at Wayne State University. During the past decade, to assist with obtaining education past high school, SIGP has awarded \$57,000 to women in the Detroit metropolitan area through their awards programs.

Rebecca Minardi was the recipient of the Ruby Award for Women

Helping Women where she works for Kids-TALK Children's Advocacy Center. She was honored with a donation of \$500 to Winning Futures, a nonprofit created to mentor teens.

*Soroptimist* is committed to "Educate to Lead". *SIGP* has funded the high school education of six girls in Damongo, Ghana, Africa, for the past two years at \$1100 per girl and they plan to see them graduate!


#### 60th Anniversary Finance Committee Update:
