January 2025 A Journey on the Troop 78 Bus The long and winding road..... By Judah C., Troop Historian

Have you ever wondered what the story of the Troop 78 bus is? Well, if you join me on this journey and read this article you can find out!

Back in 1966 the story of the troop bus began because that was the first time that bus #1 was used. It was a 1953 INTERNATIONAL gasoline engine manual transmission. Its first trip with the troop was winter camp at Camp Horseshoe. The Troop decided to paint it blue and white in May of 1967. Just a year later, the engine gave out and needed to be replaced. Replacing the engine cost \$691.95. The new engine extended the bus' life until a new bus was purchased in 1975. One cool story is that this bus would "break the sound barrier" because when you went above 55 mph it would shake violently but when you hit 60 mph it would get quiet and still. Also no surprise to anyone, Ernie installed a full kitchen on one side of the bus equipped with running water and full counter for making sandwiches on long trips so you wouldn't have to stop. Hope you like meat or fluffernutter sandwiches because that was all that was served.







The second Troop bus was a 1966 INTERNATIONAL (pictured here) from Gross Equipment purchased for \$3,057 and the old bus was sold for \$500. The troop installed a two speed differential in the rear but unfortunately on the way to Canada it broke on Rt. 476 and a caravan of station wagons had to be called to take the troop the rest of the way. One other memorable technical issue with this bus was on the way back from Florida on a stretch of I-95 in Virginia the engine blew out and the troop was stranded on the side of the road. Fortunately Malvern Troop 7 was going the same way and



picked up the scouts but since there weren't enough seats scouts had to take turns standing all the way back to Malvern. After using the bus for about 9 years, a new bus was purchased in 1984 for \$6,500 and the old bus was sold for \$2,000.

The third Troop bus was a 1974 INTERNATIONAL (shown here). Not many details were captured about this bus but as with bus #1 and #2 lots of blown tires and technical challenges were experienced. Which is why when we purchased the current bus (bus #6), new tires were one of our first purchases. Bus #3 along with bus one, two and four had bunk beds which allowed for sleeping on long trips. After nine years a new bus was purchased in 1993.

The fourth Troop bus was a 1984 gasoline engine bus that was also purchased from Gross Equipment (pictured here). A memorable story about this bus is that coming home from a rafting trip up on the Leigh River, it was a very hot day and the defogging fans on the windshield suddenly stopped working. The troop pulled off to the side of the Northeast extension of the PA Turnpike by the Lehigh Tunnel to call Mr. Stevens who was the committee member in charge of the bus. He said to disconnect the wire to the alternator (which was the part that went bad) but that meant the battery couldn't charge so the headlights could not be used and it was getting dark.





By some magic the bus got home just as the last bit of sunshine left the sky. Ten years later another bus was purchased.

The fifth Troop bus was a 2000 International that was purchased in 2003 for \$30,000. It was the troop's first diesel bus and much more reliable than its predecessors. But on a beach trip down to Jersey shore, the troop was coming home on the Atlantic City expressway and the alternator went bad and the bus broke down. NJ transit had to come out and pick up stranded people and take them to the closest place to get them where they needed to go. So NJ transit sent a bus and took the entire troop to center city Philadelphia to the train terminal and the troop rode in style on a train all the way back to Paoli. This bus was later outfitted with side compartments installed at Wolfington for increased storage. It is the last bus we attached canoes on the roof because new canoe trailers were purchased. We sold this bus in 2018 for \$5,000 after purchasing bus number six (our current bus) in November 2017 from Florida.





Our current bus (bus #6) is a 2008 Thomas Saf-T-Liner HDX Activity Bus, Mercedes diesel rear engine with AC! It is arguably the nicest bus we have ever had. In true Troop 78 style, we added our own modifications. We took out the bathroom and converted it to a storage room (but you still find the sewage tank underneath). We put in reclining seats, a table for games and installed a technology package of backup cameras and navigation. The paint job came with it but we applied our own Troop 78 name to the side. According to our drivers one key upgrade is having the engine in the back.



Since 1966 having a troop bus has been one of the important parts of building a strong Troop 78 culture. As someone said to me, often the best part of a troop trip is the bus ride! It provides more fun for scouts, strengthens camaraderie, more relaxing for adults and makes planning trips so much easier. While there has often been discussion about whether having a bus is really worth it because of all the maintenance and continual need for drivers, but for me and for all the scouts from 1966 onward, a Troop 78 bus is an important part of our culture and gives so much more than a seat to ride on.

Now we have reached our destination in this story... Hopefully you better understand the history and meaning and value of the troop bus.
