REPORT ON 2022 WEST COAST CWRT CONFERENCE:

INCOME: 33 + Registrations X \$200=\$6600 + Poultier's donation \$100 + Steve Madden's donation \$1000, sub-total (\$7700)

One left over problem: When the 2021 Conference had less than a dozen signups by Oct 1st, I called the Wyndham and cancelled my room and the ones for our speakers. A month later we received a credit card bill for "No shows" for those rooms! I called the hotel, who said that they could not refund my credit card, but would deduct the \$700 from the 2022 Conference meal expenses.

As we checked out at the end of this conference, the manager said they had not been able to cancel those 2021 rooms, because I had used Wyndham Rewards points. I would have to settle with them. I have called Wyndham Rewards customer service numerous times, but no one has ever answered! I have emailed them, but no response. A lawyer friend recommended I take it to small claims court, but that could create "bad blood" with the hotel and make future conferences with them difficult. Perhaps we will try another venue?

At the end of the conference, there was an idea to have a joint sponsorship with Sacramento CWRT, and use Fresno, due to its central location.

b. NOVEMBER CWRT MEETING:

I misplaced my notes from the meeting! There were 10 persons present. Michael Spencer presented a short talk on Fredrick Douglass.

The following is from Wikipedia:

Born February 1817 or 1818, and died February 20, 1895. He born into slavery, but became an American social reformer, abolitionist, orator, writer, and statesman. After escaping from slavery in Maryland, he became a national leader of the abolitionist movement in Massachusetts and New York. His oratory and anti-slavery writings made him famous. Accordingly, he was described by abolitionists in his time as a living counter-example to slaveholders' arguments that slaves lacked the intellectual capacity to function as independent American citizens.

Northerners at the time found it hard to believe that such a great orator had once been a slave. It was in response to this disbelief that Douglass wrote his first autobiography. Douglass wrote three autobiographies, describing his experiences as a slave. They It became a best sellers.

Following the Civil War, Douglass was an active campaigner for the rights of freed slaves. His last autobiography, *Life and Times of Frederick Douglass, was* published in 1881 and revised in 1892, three years before his death. Douglass also actively supported women's suffrage, and he held several public offices. Douglass became the first African American nominated for Vice President of the United States, as the running mate of Victoria Woodhull on the Equal Rights Party ticket.

Douglass believed in dialogue and in making alliances across racial and ideological divides, as well as in the values of the U. S. Constitution. When radical abolitionists, under the motto "No Union with Slaveholders", criticized Douglass's willingness to engage in dialogue with slave owners, he replied: "I would unite with anybody to do right and with nobody to do wrong."
