Dear Friends,



Hanukkah comes early this year on December 7 as the first night. We will be celebrating it together on the 2^{nd} night which is Shabbat Hanukkah this year— December 8. Our annual Shabbat Hanukkah dinner will begin at 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall and will again be by reservation only with members +1 as those who can attend unless otherwise permitted by our board. We do this as a condition for those who identify themselves with us as members as a perk, since this dinner, like others we provide, is gratis to those who come.

The service will commence with the Hanukkah prelude in the sanctuary at 7:25 pm played by our own Ty Woodward which will be followed by the service conducted

by Hazzan Lance and Ty which will include the lighting of the Hanukkiah, Shabbat candles, and the retelling of the story of the miracle of this festival.

Hanukkah always presents issues to us as it is a post-biblical holiday mentioned in a book that is not contained in the Bible, rather in the Jewish Apocryphal literature—The Books of the Maccabees. It is the story of struggle against the oppression of our beliefs and our traditions in our lands that were ruled at that time by the Syrian-Greek forces which wanted to Hellenize us and take us back to idolatry.

This concern is ever more present today with the tides of antisemitism that swirl around the Israel/Gaza war and Ukraine/Russia conflict. We do not wish harm to any civilian whether Israeli, Palestinian, Ukrainian, Russian, etc. But defense of freedom and religion do come at a high cost as our history and tradition has taught us. We must continue to be steadfast in our ideals and beliefs even though the world at large may wish to assail them.

THE SIDDUR

The "Siddur" is a combination of a number of things. It is a book of Jewish law, as it contains selections from the Bible and the Talmud concerning certain rules and regulations. It is a book of Jewish history, for it contains many memorable events that happened to our people in the past. It is also a book of general questions as it contains the beliefs and traditions of our religion expressed in poetic prayers by prophets and rabbis.

The "Siddur" is universal in that wherever you travel, in any synagogue you enter, it is essentially the same "Siddur" as your own. The prayers that comprise each service have not been changed since they were compiled in 850 C.E.

Types of Prayer Now three types of prayers that are prominent will be discussed. They are as follows: prayers of Praises, thanksgiving, and requests.

- 1. PRAISES We praise G-d as the creator of heaven and earth. We declare His presence in all parts of the universe. We declare the power of G-d to do his will. We testify to His lovingkindness and ask all nations to praise Him for it. We express the thought that all G-d's creatures praise His name, which will live forever.
- 2. THANKSGIVING Prayers of thanksgiving are recited every day by Jews worldwide. We thank G-d for the blessing of life. We thank them for the
- 3. blessings. He granted our forefathers years ago and for the many blessings He has personally granted us. We thank him for giving us Torah and providing us with food, clothing and shelter.
- 4. REQUESTS Most people think that all prayers are requests. They think that the only time that it is necessary to pray to G-d is when they want
- 5. something. This attitude is wrong. Requests are really only one of many types of prayer. In these requests we ask G-d for peace throughout the world. We ask Him to teach us to care for and bless us with a happy and healthy life devoted to Torah and Jewish ideals. We ask for the victory of the Israel forces in the current war, and the rebuilding of our Temple in the spirit of the Torah as it was predicted centuries ago.

The above are three of the basic types of prayer found in "SIDDUR". All of our pryers are recited expresses our deepest feelings to G-d.

Looking at the "Siddur" closely. In the table of contents we find a long list of prayers for every occasion. These prayers are recited most often like the morning, afternoon, and evening services are found at the beginning of the "Siddur". They are followed by the services for "Shabbos". The rest of the "Siddur" is devoted to prayers for special events: the Hallel" which is a service of praises and thanksgiving to G-d recited on holidays, Grace After Meals, prayers before going to bed, and part of the services recited on festivals and the High Holidays.

Shemoneh Esrei These two words in Hebrew mean the number 18. It is a prayer composed of 18 blessings (an additional blessing was later added for weekdays). It said standing because of its importance and so we can concentrate better upon reciting it. Remember this prayer is sent to almighty G-d and must be made with respect, dignity and sincerity. It is a prayer that contains parts of respect, thanksgiving, and request. The "Shemoneh Esret" is an all inclusive prayer that is part of every service. These services will be discussed in my next addition to Mishboker.
