From The Minister's Mac Mother's Day

Do you know who Anna Jarvis is? Born in 1864, the 10 th of 13 children, Anna was one of the 4 siblings who survived to adulthood. She grew up appreciating the role her mother played in her life and admired her mother for starting what were called "Mother's Day Work Clubs" in 1858. Their goal was to help educate other families living in West Virginia regarding precautions they could take to prevent the spread of disease, like boiling water and washing hands before eating. After the Civil War, Anna's mother organized a Mother's Friendship Day, hoping that families from both sides of that tragic war might find a path toward reconciliation.

After her mother's death in 1905, Anna wanted to make another of her mother's dreams come true. Her mother had prayed for a day to honor mothers. Since her mother died on the second Sunday in May, she thought enshrining that day annually to honor the services mothers render to the world would be a fitting tribute to her own mother. In 1908, Jarvis celebrated the first formal Mother's Day in Philadelphia, and there was also a celebration in Grafton, West Virginia, where she sent 500 white carnations to Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in honor of her mother. After a lengthy letter-writing campaign and much public speaking, almost all states in the USA were celebrating Mother's Day. Woodrow Wilson made the second Sunday in May a national holiday in 1914 and the rest is history.

What I didn't know about the holiday until I read an article in Britannica, is that Anna Jarvis also organized the Mother's Day International Association, meant to keep Mother's day from becoming overly commercialized. In spite

of the Association's best efforts, Mother's Day, like just about everything else in our great nation, succumbed to commercialization, with cards, flowers, chocolates, and going out for brunch being the favored Mother's Day gifts. (According to the National Retail Federation, Americans will spend roughly 33.5 billion dollars this Mother's Day.)

Jarvis hated the commercialization of Mother's Day so much that she actually tried to get the day legally cancelled. Thankfully, she was unsuccessful with that.

Yes, it has been commercialized, and yes, there are those who struggle with Mother's Day because of fractured relationships, unsuccessful pregnancies, or recent losses. But I believe we can be sensitive to those who have a love/hate relationship with Mother's Day and still honor the important women in our lives, those who have been positive role models for us and who have had a positive impact on our world. And we can do it without commercialization!

Now, if your mother loves white carnations, by all means, get the white carnations! And if it wouldn't be Mother's Day without brunch at her favorite restaurant then, of course, brunch it is. But I encourage you not to forget those personal touches that create long-lasting memories, like breakfast in bed, and the coupon book for hugs and kisses, or even a phone call that doesn't end with you saying, "Well, I have to go now." This year, let's try to keep Anna Jarvis' original vision of Mother's Day in mind and let these women we love know why we love and admire them. Mothers, grandmothers, aunts, sisters, cousins, friends, educators, piano teachers, next-door neighbors, doctors, lawyers, activists, love- bearers and world changers, have a blessed Mother's Day. This year, may you truly know how amazing you are.
