Roofing Update

Bradford D. Beldon, Senior Vice President of Beldon Roofing Company will present a program about the latest developments within the roofing industry. Everyone did such a fantastic job preparing for the Building Engineer of the Year Awards. A special congratulations goes out to Bernardo Chapa of the Crown Plaza St. Anthony Hotel and Charles Mikolajczyk, Jr. of the Forum Building for co-winning the Year 2000 Building Engineer of the Year award.

Bernardo started out as a Laundry and Kitchen Mechanic 17

years ago, and now supervises the hotel's engineering department with 14 employees. His accreditation includes Electrical Maintenance Technician, pursuing the SMT and SMA and is a member of the SAWS Community Conservation Committee. Bernardo has been a Building Engineer for 12 years and has been an active member of SAABE for 12 years.

The Crown Plaza St. Anthony Hotel is a 402,000 square foot historical hotel, which was originally built in 1909 and had additional floors added in 1911 and again in 1941. The building was completely renovated in 1982. The hotel is a 24 hour facility, and with little or no time for preparation, we found the facility's condition immaculate. All life safety inspections were up to date and all equipment was appropriately marked. There was absolutely no debris on any of the floors within the kitchen,

mechanical rooms, or work rooms. The mechanical room was very clearly and neatly marked and painted. The building has some very antiquated equipment (circa 1940s and the elevator equipment was from the 1960s) still fully operational within the facility and was in premium condition.




