Four Business Appreciation Award Recipients Honored

The Kansas Department of Commerce announced 19 Regional Business of Excellence Award winners and 44 Merit Award winners as a part of the 2017 Business Appreciation Month that took place in June. Kansas businesses are recognized for the contributions made to their communities and the state economy in one of four categories, including service, retail, manufacturing/distribution and hospital/non-profit.

"Business Appreciation Month gives the Commerce Department the opportunity to show its support, recognition and gratitude for the businesses who work hard to excel in the State of Kansas," said Kansas Commerce Secretary Antonio Soave.

A total of four (4) award winners were nominated by the City of Garnett and were presented their awards during the June 27th Garnett City Commission meeting. They are as follows:

Farmers State Bank

The Farmers State Bank of Blue Mound has 3 locations in Kansas: Blue Mound, Garnett and Pleasanton. The Farmers State Bank of Blue Mound purchased the

The McGhee family took on a restaurant after years of catering events. "We (The City) are mindful of the commit-

"They could have remained just a catering company. Because they saw a beautiful building sitting idle, and a community that had a craving for an exceptional restaurant, Prairie Belle's answered the call and came to our rescue. They have never received any awards or accolades of which they are very deserving of."

Prairie Belle's, located at 130 E. 5th Avenue is owned by Danelle McGhee and her mother-in-law Christy McGhee. They believe their partnership is a unique piece of information when accepting this nomination. When seeing this pair at work you know immediately what a great combo they make. Danelle and Christy work alongside their employees each day and perform the same tasks and duties as their employees, from washing dishes to cleaning bathrooms. They take pride in presenting a very clean restaurant with homemade, fresh food each day.

They are very attentive when it comes to their display and degree of elegance with their catering.

Rockers Photography

Rockers Photography is a family owned, full service studio located at 32528 NE Norton Road in the Old Rock Schoolhouse at Scipio (rural Garnett). For 35 years they have served numer-



ous generations in Anderson County and surrounding areas. Rockers Photography has remained a leading senior portrait studio in southeast Kansas. Their storybook weddings create priceless keepsakes for couples and their family and children's' portraiture. The Rockers team are seen frequently throughout the Garnett area photographing events and sports activities.

Summer is here in all its glory and so are many "DIY'ers" and professionals alike, getting ready to begin new projects and home improvements. I'd like to remind everyone that if you're considering sidewalk replacement in the front of your home, the City does offer financial assistance to help with cost. There is an application to fill out prior to the work being done.

No matter what your task, above all else, make safety priority one when doing those improvements and repairs. Good planning makes for performing and completing good projects.

During the planning stages consider if you may need a permit and inspection for that repair, remodel or construction project. We are here at City Hall to help you obtain the proper application or permit, if required. Just a simple call will help decide if one is needed. Information, frequently asked questions, and printable application forms are also available online at www.simplygarnett.com (see Zoning link).

Yoder's Country Store and Deli

Yoder's Country Store is one of those unique gems a community is lucky to have. This country store sits a couple of miles outside of Garnett and over the last 3 years has become a regular daily stop for many locals, while enticing people from surrounding counties.

Yoder's provides groceries at discount prices and keeps its deli

and ice cream counter pricing where everyone, from a small child to a retired farmer, walks away full and happy. Each day you will see farm trucks, tractors, horse and buggies, as well as family cars parked in the large gravel parking lot. In the summertime it is the place to stop on the way to Garnett's Cedar Valley Reservoir. RV's and campers, boaters and ATV enthusiast stop by Yoder's Country Store to stock up for their weekend adventure at our city lakes.

Those who enjoy the holidays and baking traditions love this store with its huge variety of baking and cooking supplies, from chocolate chips to flour, to spices and herbs packaged by weight in different sizes depending upon your desire.

On occasion, Garnett Tourism has made Yoder's Country Store a tour stop when bus tours come to town for its country charm and small town hospitality that many city folk just can't find. They were a 2017 nominee for Business of the Year during the Garnett Area Chamber of Commerce Annual Banquet.

"Yoder's Country Store fills a void; an experience, that is a precious commodity in our community", says City Manager Joyce Martin. "Until you can say you've eaten a Rooster (name of their biggest deli sandwich), you haven't lived."

Here are a few safety items I'd like to share with you:

- ► Watch out for falling tools. Never leave them on top of ladders or framing... What goes up may fall down.
- ► It's dangerous to make assumptions about electricity. Always check the wires with a voltage tester and double-check all wires in the box with a non-contact voltage tester before doing any electrical work.
- ► It's surprising how quickly sheet metal can be twisted from your grip while drilling if it's not clamped. The lesson is clear. Slow down and clamp your work before Drilling. It may save some fingers or sliced hand.

Again, think safety first.

An Important Message From the Gas Department...

For safety's sake, read this!

Things you should know:

- How, when and where to report a possible gas leak, gas odor, or carbon monoxide problem;
- Call Kansas One Call before you dig;
- Carbon Monoxide (CO) is known as "The Silent Killer";
- Gas appliance connectors;
- Be aware of bare steel gas service lines.

It is that time to inform our customers on the hazards of natural gas, and what precautions to take to keep us all safe. Natural gas is very flammable, potentially hazardous, and can be explosive under certain conditions. You can recognize a gas leak by using your senses. Seeing bubbles appear in a wet or flooded area, dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise healthy environment, or a sometimes quiet to rather loud hissing sound can be signs of a gas leak. However, in most cases a leak can be recognized by a weak to strong smell of odorant. Our gas system is always odorized so that people can easily detect a leak by its smell.

How to report a possible gas leak

If you smell gas inside or outside a home, business or other structure, please report it to the gas department by calling Garnett City Hall at 785.448.5496. Call the Law Enforcement Dispatch Center at 785.448.6823 after normal business hours. If you have a gas emergency and the odor of natural gas is very strong and seems to be everywhere, DO NOT operate any light switches or try to air out the building, or even use your phone.

EXIT IMMEDIATELY to a safe area away from the potential gas leak, such as going to a neighbor's house, and then call 9-1-1. Wait at your safe place for emergency personnel to arrive.

Our natural gas system transports gas to businesses and homes within the city of Garnett. Overall, this system is very reliable and in good condition. We have procedures, such as gas leak surveys, to determine where problem areas may exist and adapt as necessary. Accidents on gas systems are extremely rare but they can occur.

The gas department regularly trains with local emergency personnel, including fire, police and dispatchers. When a gas leak or related incident is reported, the proper department can be dispatched to provide public safety assistance and to respond to the gas emergency.

Dig Safe - Call BEFORE you dig!

Always call Kansas One Call before you dig to have utilities marked. Do this not only for your safety, but because it is the law. Kansas One Call will notify utility companies to mark the area with paint and flags, if their utilities exist. If there are no utilities in the project area usually "OK" is painted on the ground along Page 8

with a flag, or the utility company will contact you by phone. Contact Kansas One Call by dialing 8-1-1 (not 9-1-1) or by calling 1-800-DIG-SAFE. If you see what appears to be unauthorized excavation or destructive activities around our gas system, please give us a call at city hall at 784.448.5496 so we can investigate.

The Silent Killer!

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a very toxic and sometimes deadly gas that is colorless and odorless. This gas is a product of incomplete combustion. Whenever you use your furnace, wood stove, hot water tank, stove, automobile or even your charcoal grill, CO is the gas that is produced and vented out of your home through a chimney, flue or vent pipe. All gas burning equipment needs to be inspected and maintained regularly to keep it in good running condition. Chimneys and vent pipes need to be vented and kept in good working order as well. Carbon monoxide poisoning gives you flu like symptoms. So if you are seemingly not feeling very well, especially when at home, it could be a carbon monoxide problem. Call us. We can help by checking if carbon monoxide is a problem in your gas burning appliances. Every home should have a carbon monoxide detector and a smoke detector to help ensure your safety.

Gas connectors are corrugated metal tubes used to connect gas appliances in your home to gas supply pipes. Some of these old brass colored connectors can have a flaw in how the tubing was made and over time can separate causing a potentially serious gas leak. These uncoated brass connectors have not been made for almost 30 years now, but many are still in use. Although not all brass connectors have a flaw, it is very difficult to tell which ones do. Therefore, any uncoated brass colored connector should be replaced with either a plastic coated brass or stainless steel connector. Connectors can wear out from too much moving and bending and should always be inspected closely whenever an appliance is replaced or moved from its location.

Any additional gas safety related information is always free and available at Garnett City Hall.

Bare Steel Gas Lines

Do I need to have my bare steel gas line replaced?

The Answer: Yes.

All bare steel gas lines are slowly corroding and will eventually leak and have to be replaced. We don't know when these lines may begin to leak which is why they need to be replaced before any leakage occurs. The Garnett Gas Department already has an ongoing program to replace all of the city's bare steel mains and service lines.

On August 28, 2007, the City Commission passed an ordinance

requiring the replacement of any existing customer owned gas service line at the time of the sale of the property or when any change in ownership occurs . It usually takes less than a day for one of our local, qualified plumbers to replace most bare steel service lines. Most of these plumbers will give you an estimate of how much it will cost.

Fall Clean-Up Week - September 11-15

3. Paper

The Garnett City Commission has designated *September 11 through September 15, 2017 as Fall Clean-up Week* for residential areas. The City of Garnett provides for the pickup of unwanted items as a free service to all city residential refuse customers, with consideration of the following guidelines:

RESIDENTIAL PICK-UP

- A. Crews will start at the north end of town and proceed south until the entire town is covered. City Crews will not return to an area they have already been to.
 - B. The following items must be placed in separate piles:
 - Brush
 Leaves and lawn clippings
 - 4. Metal (no car or vehicle parts) 5. Appliances 6. Furniture
 - 7. Lumber 8. Rock/Concrete 9. Shingles 10. Sheetrock

Please Note: Items not placed in separate piles as stated in (B) will not be picked up. The City also requests that you keep clean-up items separate from weekly solid waste trash that is picked up by the refuse department.

Any appliances containing Freon, such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, etc., will not be taken. Also, materials to be disposed of from torn down dilapidated buildings, or that of construction projects will not be picked up; nor such items as tires, batteries, paint, e-waste (computers, etc), or any other hazardous waste items.

Please Note: Free pick-up for commercial businesses is no longer available at the request of the Anderson County Commission.

BURNING REQUIREMENTS

The Garnett City Commission rescinded the need for residents to obtain written authorization to burn within the city limits. However, it is still a requirement to notify the Law Enforcement Center Dispatch Office by calling 448-6823 before you start burning. The Garnett Fire Department and Anderson County Emergency Management ask that you please adhere to the following instructions for your safety and that of your neighbors:

- Burning of grass, leaves and tree limbs must be in manageable piles that are attended at all times (no wood, lumber, furniture or mattresses).
- Burning must not occur in right-of-way or in streets. Location
 of fire must be clear of overhead lines and clear from any exposure threat to any structure.
- A source of water shall be available or a means of extinguishing piles at all times.
- Burning to be conducted during daylight hours only.
- No burning during adverse weather conditions, such as winds over 15 mph, fog exists or visibility is hampered. Citations can be issued.
- Controlled burn is to be completely extinguished before leaving burn site unattended.
