## AUDUBON BIRDATHON

### 1992 BIRDATHON: ANOTHER SUCCESS!

From Amistad Reservoir on the east to Phoenix on the west, we put a record 36 Birdathon counters in the field May 2 - 3. And, despite a dearth of migrants, we found a healthy 162 species of birds in the El Paso area, shy of 1990's record 167, but up from last year's 158.

Top find for the weekend was the amazing breeding-plumaged Glossy Ibis tucked in with a group of White-faced Ibis at the Ft. Bliss Ponds. Barry Zimmer initially found the bird, a first El Paso-area record, on April 30, and it was good enough to stay through Birdathon.

Warbler numbers were low, but warbler quality was exceptional. The 12 species recorded included a Lucy's Warbler along the Rio Grande below Ft. Quitman, a Blackpoll Warbler in Memorial Park, and a Prothonotary Warbler found dead in central El Paso.

Other noteworthy finds included a Little Blue Heron at Doniphan Marsh, a late Snow Goose at the Ft. Bliss Ponds, a Peregrine Falcon in extreme eastern El Paso County, a Brown Thrasher and a Rose-breasted Grosbeak at Hueco Tanks, and a Clay-colored Sparrow along the road into the Tanks.

Heroic birding by all concerned. Why go to such effort? It's fun, of course. But our counters were also on a mission, raising needed money for our scholarship and Audubon Adventures programs, for our Franklin Mountains Fund, for Chihuahuan

Desert Wildlife Rescue, and for Audubon's Southwest Regional Office. In that mission, they were also highly successful, as they were backed by at least 250 generous sponsors who had pledged Birdathon contributions.

For five of those sponsors, Birdathon was particularly rewarding. Lucky winners in our Birdathon drawing were Craig Braginton ("Baltimore" Oriole porcelain figurine), Ruth Braun (Columbia Sportswear sweatshirt), Daryl Cole (hi-Tec sports bag), Josie Villanueva (Audubon Perspectives: Fight for Survival) and Grand Prize-winners Mr. and Mrs. George Dix (Russell Waterhouse watercolor).

A lot of preparation goes into Birdathon. Richly deserving thanks for their work getting us ready for the event are Helen Barto, Jane Fowler, Bob Johnson, and Lorraine and John Snelling. Special thanks go to Suzanne Michaels for being our celebrity Birdathon counter, Russell Waterhouse for donating our superb Grand Prize, Sarah Jane Dodds for her work on prize acquisition and preparation, and Nancy Wilson for graciously tackling the toughest job of all, keeping the Birdathon books.

And, of course, thanks are due all of you who supported this year's Birdathon! It was a huge success, as you'll learn in our next newsletter.

# ON THE TRAIL

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## TEXAS BREEDING BIRD ATLAS

Sat., Jun. 13th - The Canutillo topographic quadrangle will be the focus of our last 1992 data-gathering effort for the Texas Breeding Bird Atlas project. We'll look for evidence of breeding by birds on the west side of the Franklin Mts. and in the adjacent river valley, then review our findings over a picnic lunch in the Tom Mays area of the Franklin Mts State Park. Meet John Sproul (545-5157) at 7:31 AM at the corner of I-10 and Transmountain Road.

## GLENWOOD - LUNA

This area of the Gila National Forest will be the location of our June weekend and outing. Camping in the forest or enjoy a motel, in Reserve; Whispering Pines (505-533-6555), in Glenwood 3 to choose from. This trip will be a good one for Western Bluebirds, Nuthatches, Lewis's Woodpecker and maybe an American Dipper. Also a good view of a Prairie Dog Town, and a visit a fish hatchery. Call the leader for trip itinerary, Nancy Wilson (833-3907). This will happen on the 20th and 21st of June.

## RANDALL DAVEY AUDUBON CENTER

Come any part of the weekend, Fri-Mon July 3-6, to Santa Fe, New Mexico. A great chance to see birds seldom seen in El Paso (Lazuli Bunting, Black-billed Magpie, Gray Catbird and more). On the last 2 trips we have seen an adult Dipper feeding young in the same location, lets try for a third. We'll also visit the Randall Davey Audubon Center and campers can roll out their sleeping bags on the premises. For those liking more comfortable accommodations there are a number of Motels in Santa Fe. For Details call Sid Shopperd (566-2162).

## AGUIRRE SPRINGS

This BLM/New Mexico State Park is located on the upper east slopes of the Organ Mts. above White Sands Missile Range. Hairy and Acorn Woodpeckers are probable, as well as many other good birds. A uphill hike (med. steep trail) of about 2 miles total is part of the tour. Bring lunch and water. John Sproul (545-5157) for details of Sun Jul 19.

## RANDEL'S POOL

Start at the crossroads ponding area, then walk Lombardy, on to Meadowlark and finally end up at Randel's Pool. Hope to see Mississippi Kites, Phainopepla, Verdin and ????. Meet Pat Brasfield (584-8739) on Sat. Aug 1st, time 7:32 AM at Mesa and Doniphan.

## WATER CANYON

We'll tour a large chunk of central New Mexico, visiting habitats ranging from river valley to Spruce fir forest. On the itinerary: Bosque Del Apache NWR, Water Canyon and other sites in the Magdalena Mts., the Plains of San Agustin, NM highway 52 west of the Magdalenas. Sat. night you can camp in Water Canyon or stay at a Motel in Socorro, NM. All should be prepared for rain and ready to see Jays, Clarks Nutcrackers, Red-faced and Graces Warblers, Cassin's Kingbirds and maybe Lewis Woodpeckers. Your leader will be Jim Harvey (532-6001) Call for meeting times and places, this will all take place on the 15th & 16th of August.

## SHOREBIRD MIGRATION

On Sat. Aug. 29th Hugh Jameson (751-7952) will lead you around the Fort Bliss Ponds. Migration has started and a good chance of spotting at least 6 species of ducks and 6 of wading birds. Maybe you'll see the elusive Sora and possibly Red-necked Phalarope. The trip will be over by noon but snacks and water are recommended. **OUR FIELD TRIPS****FIELD TRIPS: READ WHAT YOU MISSED**

On Sun. mar.29th a trip to Percha/Caballo Dams was enjoyed by 5 birders. Birds seen; White-throated Sparrow, Western and Clarks Grebes, White Pelican Brown Creeper, and Lucy's Warbler.

Only 4 people showed up for the trip to Owens Farm on Sat. morning the 9th of May. Great birding! Seen were a Little-blue Heron at the Doniphan Marsh, and Wood Ducks and Mississippi Kites on Lombardy. At Owens Phainopepla and Black-headed Grosbeak topped the list. The Burrowing Owl on McNutt Road was also enjoyable.

Of course the big trip during the last two months was to Sierra Vista, Az. Many of the 14 that went saw life birds that included; a Northern-beardless Tyrannulet building a nest over the path, 2 baby Great Horned Owls sitting on a open branch, a Buff-breasted Flycatcher preening on a low branch, the Gray Hawk flying over the Patagonia Sanctuary, and the baby Red-tailed Hawks sitting on a ledge. However the best was a Violet-crowned Hummingbird and the pair of very rare (in the U.S.) Flame-colored Tanagers in Ramsey Canyon.

Do you want to miss more good birds? If not plan on coming on the summer trips that are scheduled, because some good ones will be seen.

**STILL COLLECTING ALUMINUM CANS****HUMMER/BIRD CELEBRATION**

The Fourth Annual Hummer/Bird Celebration will be held in Rockport-Fulton, Texas September 17-20, 1992. This event celebrates the spectacular fall migration of the Ruby-throated Hummingbird through the area and increases our knowledge and appreciation of all birds.

The Celebration will be more than just birding for one species. There will be 14 speakers with subjects ranging from shorebirds to butterflies. There will also be boat and bus trips through the area for more birding. There's even birding for the visually impaired!

**AUDUBON ACTIVITIES****OPPORTUNITY TO SAVE WETLANDS BY  
REFORM OF FLOOD INSURANCE**

Action Needed: Letters, calls and mailgrams to your Senators urging them to support S.1650 (The National Flood Insurance, Mitigation, and Erosion Management Act)

Until the Savings and Loan Bailout, the Federal Flood Insurance Program was the second largest entitlement program in the U.S., second only to the Social Security System. Originally conceived to prevent development in flood prone areas, the program has evolved into a federally guaranteed insurance program that actually encourages development in wetlands and other flood prone areas by backing flood insurance in those areas. Counties are supposed to certify that developments in flood prone areas meet certain requirements and lenders are supposed to make sure that developments in flood prone areas carry insurance against flooding. Neither counties nor lenders are doing their job. Among other things, S.1650 would do the following:

- Require better lender compliance
- Direct the National Flood Insurance Program to recognize and promote better management of floodplains
- Promote water quality, ground recharge and fish and wildlife habitat preservation

As Congress seeks ways of cutting expenses and stretching the federal dollar the farthest, a major reform of this program is especially in order. It makes little sense for taxpayers to continuously bail out people who choose to rebuild, time after time, in flood prone areas.

Senator Phil Gramm is especially important as a target for calls and letters from Texans. He serves on the Senate Banking Committee, which began marking up the bill in May. Gramm has always had the reputation of a fiscal

conservative and has traditionally opposed federal subsidies for private choices.

**NEW AUDUBON CAMPAIGN**

THE SOLAR BRIGADE hopes to save the planet 170 million tons/year of carbon dioxide by pressuring electric utility companies to convert to 10% solar energy by the year 2000. We are asking people to send a monthly message to their utility company when they pay their bill that says "We want 10% solar in 10 years". This single stroke could wipe out 170 million tons/year of carbon dioxide and help provide a long term future for wildlife and humans. After Audubon collects the names of these participants and their utilities, Audubon will be in a strong position to negotiate with the utilities about switching more to solar.

Public pressure has worked before: for instance, in launching recycling programs and getting environmentally friendly products in the supermarket. We want it to work again in reducing our dependence on fossil fuels (coal, oil, gas) that contribute so much to acid

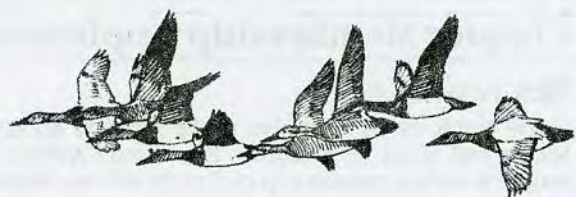
rain, global warming, and the exploitation of precious land.

The Solar Brigade intends to create a national referendum for the safest and cleanest energy available to us: solar. Since the cost of solar technology has dropped 75% in the last ten years, utilities have no choice. Surveys show that Americans want a cleaner environment, even if it costs a little more at first, because in the long run we all benefit. The voices of million consumers on behalf of solar can make a huge impact.

The key to this campaign is getting as many people as possible to register their name, address, and utility with Audubon, as well as to send the message WE WANT 10% SOLAR IN 10 YEARS to their utility. Solar Power + People Power = the Solar Brigade. Act now!

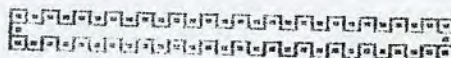
