NEW STUDY OFFERS INSIGHTS ON ADDRESSING HOMELESSNESS



Americans want government intervention with homelessness. So why hasn't there been any?

As the COVID-19 pandemic worsens and we welcome a new administration, homelessness hasn't seemed to be a priority, or even a concern, for many politicians. This could be because homelessness has often been treated with antipathy. Many Americans feel uncomfortable when talking about it because people don't know how to solve the problem and prefer to ignore it.

But to what extent does the American public want to see

change in government response?

The answer: a lot

New research reveals 80.2% of Americans think the government has not done enough to help with homelessness, according to a new national survey conducted for Cornell University by the National Opinion Research Center (NORC) in October.

The study reveals key insights for California, which is experiencing homelessness at an all-time high, with rates of homelessness increasing every year. Results may also provide support for government action on homelessness as a political priority for the public during an election year.

The idea is not new. Various localities have attempted to provide some sort of policy mediating the effects of homelessness, with limited success.

People praise the idea of housing urban homeless populations — until this housing is in their neighborhoods or uses their tax dollars. Most legislation has been fraught with inaction, with government officials stalling while the number of people experiencing homelessness continues to rise.

It is evident America wants to see change now. Conflict over whether this change should occur at a local or broader level is continuing to hold us back and has reached unsustainable levels.

We need to put considerations of ideas of fairness or diversion of blame aside, and instead think about the kind of place we really want to live in. Consider: Would it improve your daily life if homelessness was seriously addressed?

Joe Biden chooses Ohio Rep. Marcia Fudge to be HUD secretary

President-elect Joe Biden has selected Rep. Marcia L. Fudge (D-Ohio) as his secretary of housing and urban development, making her the second Black person to be chosen as a department head in his Cabinet. Fudge is a veteran lawmaker and former chairwoman of the Congressional Black Caucus .perhaps Biden’s most pivotal endorser during the 2020 Democratic primaries and a powerful

backer of the Ohio congresswoman, had confidently predicted earlier Tuesday in an MSNBC interview that she would be tapped for a Cabinet-level job. The next HUD secretary is expected to reverse policies under Trump administration secretary Ben Carson that have eviscerated Obama-era fair-housing protections and enforcement, legal standards meant to keep lenders, land-

lords and insurers from discriminating. Fudge, 68, would be the first woman to lead HUD in more than 40 years. First elected to Congress in 2008, Fudge has established -herself as a straightforward, no-nonsense lawmaker and advocate who has been willing to challenge the most senior officials in the Democratic Party. Before her tenure on Capitol Hill, Fudge was mayor of Warrensville Heights, Ohio.

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For instance, through a central database of homeless persons and available affordable housing, the two can be matched. This can be done per their needs and requirements. Policymakers can also use this data to determine what kind of housing is needed by the vast majority of homeless people. The paper’s proposals say that taking data provid-

ed consensually from various people’s phones can help with this. If this data is fed into a central database, better decisions can be taken to alleviate homelessness. For smart cities homelessness is like any other problem, quantifiable, and solvable. The cities of Seattle and San Francisco have both adopted a system to help homeless people. One is a phone line “311” in both

cities. This number allows residents to report tent cities and encampments where homeless people reside. This has been a direct response to homelessness surging 17% from 2017 to 2019 in San Francisco.

Karla and Marshall Press sat on the couch in their new home and tried to remember how they celebrated Christmas last year.

"We didn't really have Christmas last year," Karla said, turning to her husband for confirmation. "What did we do for Christmas?"

The couple had been homeless for the past couple of

years, and Christmas was just another day. Marshall seemed to remember seeing more drive-bys that day, the term for people who pass through homeless areas to give toiletries and food, but then remembered that they had a meal served by the Salvation Army at Golden Hall in downtown San Diego. This year will be more memorable and meaningful.



Earlier this month, the couple became two of the first of 400 homeless people who will move into one of two hotels the city of San Diego bought to convert to housing.

FORMER HOTEL BECOMES HOUSING FOR HOMELESS IN BAY AREA COUNTY


The second of two new housing complexes for people experiencing homelessness, the former Sebastopol Inn, is scheduled to open in Sebastopol next week, expanding the county's supply of long-term shelter options.

The 31-room supportive housing complex, opening the week of Dec. 28, is the second of two acquired by the county through funds

made available through the state's Project Homekey, county officials said. The official virtual opening ceremony was Dec. 30. The former Hotel Azura, rechristened Mickey Zane Place, opened as supportive housing in Santa Rosa Dec. 14. Taken together, the two facilities will be able to accommodate a total of 100 unsheltered people between them, including those most

at risk for contracting COVID-19, according to county officials.

"It couldn't be coming a more critical time given how the number of COVID-19 cases in our County have more than doubled in recent weeks," Hopkins said. Supervisors approved the purchase and remodeling of both locations in November.
