OPERATIONS

Well, it's finally here! Medvil's very own packer. It was a long journey but well worth the wait. We used it for the first time today (18th) and I'm happy to report that it couldn't have gone better! I want to thank Fred Bowrey for fabricating steps for the truck, making it a little easier for the volunteers to climb up onto the side platforms. Thank you, Fred, they worked out perfectly!

We were able to pick up the recyclables for the entire community with one trip to the transfer station. Trash pickup was done for the entire community with just two trips to the transfer station. The old method typically would take between four and five for the whole process. I'm sure you'll agree that the compactor makes a significant difference. Not only did we make fewer trips but it was done with just one truck and not two, saving the cost of fuel.

More important is the safety factor. This truck is set up in such a way that you can constantly see the two people doing the throwing. The platforms are on the side of the truck, not the back, so both men are constantly in the driver's vision.

With this new truck, the number of volunteers needed is down to two. I want to thank all the volunteers who donated many, many hours over the years helping with trash pickup. They are: Rich Piccollo, Rich Drouin, Kim Capen, Mark McDougle, John Gunn, Jack Cyr, Steve Rush and David Wyman. Your devotion to the department will never be forgotten.

I would like to thank the members of the community and Board members who supported this endeavor and were able to see the need in keeping our employees safe and changing the method of doing trash. Your support is very much appreciated.

There was much concern regarding dogs being allowed in the blueberry bush areas, for obvious reasons. We have since put up signs stating "no dogs allowed in this area" and they seem to be doing the job. Thank you to the dog walkers who are respecting this area.

Upcoming Board Elections

It will soon be time to elect a few new board members. This year, the election will be for vice president, treasurer and two directors-at-large. Some residents have expressed an interest in running but confess they don't know all of what the positions entail so we've asked our ROC-NH Housing Cooperative Specialist Carlos Rincon to come to the June 21st board meeting to make a short presentation to the audience (both in-house and Zoom). His focus will be on what it means to be on the board and what the duties and expectations of a board member are.

We've developed a synopsis of duties for those open positions; please review them prior to next month's meeting and come prepared to ask Carlos your questions at the end of his presentation.

Are you ready to throw your hat into the ring? If you have additional questions, either now or after next month's presentation, reach out to Anita O'Brien, Nominating Committee chair at Medvil21@comcast.net or at 603-494-4246. You should also feel free to reach out to any current board member with your questions.

Treasurer Duties

The Treasurer will oversee a contracted bookkeeper or a management company that is under contract. Disbursements, collections, invoicing, and financial documents, e.g., previous fiscal year's information, returned checks, monthly reconciliation of accounts, etc., will be overseen by the Treasurer. Treasurer will insure that all checks drawn on Cooperative accounts are signed by two (2) of these officers: President, Vice President, Treasurer, or Secretary. A qualified contracted bookkeeper or a management company under contract will gather, prepare and manage the financial data and reporting of Medvil Cooperative financial information. Financial data will be electronically maintained, off site, by contract bookkeeper or a management company that is under contract. All backup procedures must be monitored by Treasurer. The Treasurer will receive and disseminate financial information and reports to the Medvil Board of Directors and the membership.

Vice President

The Vice President presides at all meetings in the absence of the President or at the President's request. He or she performs duties delegated by either the board or the President. The Vice President reports on the activities of the President to the board in the absence of the President. Typically, the Vice President is often learning the job so that she/he is prepared to assume the Presidency at the next election. Sometimes, the Vice President will head one of the committees. The Vice President oversees all committees.

Director at Large

The Directors at Large attend and participate in meetings. They act as positive role models for all members, consistently following all community rules, paying carrying charges (rent) in full and on time, as well as ensuring that the bylaws, community rules, and policies and procedures are applied consistently and fairly. They follow the bylaws of the corporation and amend as

needed, in accordance with the existing bylaws of the corporation. They enforce community rule, amend as needed and follow a comprehensive set of policies and procedures for conducting co-op business. Directors at Large exercise loyalty to the co-op by assuring that the co-op complies with legal and lender requirements and bylaws. They exercise duty of care when contracting with outside service providers and help develop a workable budget, keeping in mind the needs, requirements and expectations of the cooperative. They act on budget items and determine carrying charges (rent), collect lot rent and act on all delinquencies, according to the approved Past-Due Rent Collection Policy. They authorize legal action, as needed, including action against members who do not comply with the rules and/or pay the lot rent and/or fees. They also ensure that the corporation is adequately insured, including maintaining bond insurance for all members who manage funds in excess of \$1,000. Directors at Large also take responsibility for duties and projects assigned to them by the president of the board.

The week of June 12-18, 2022, is designated as "National Flag Week" commemorating the anniversary of June 14, 1777, the day the

Continental Congress adopted the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States of America. Do you have an American flag that is tattered and torn? 

TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE

On April 22, Medvil purchased a one-year, 10-license subscription to the Norton Small Business internet security package for the protection of Medvil-owned computers and other devices used by Medvil officers and Board of Directors members conducting business on behalf of the cooperative.

I have personally installed three instances of the software – on the all-in-one computer in the board office used by Stacy, on the laptop used by the membership committee, and the old Windows 7 machine in the real estate office that's used occasionally by the committee members. Karen Kirkpatrick installed it on her Medvil laptop from an emailed link. I have emailed an installation invitation for the laptop used for the Medvil newsletter to MB Wulf, the principal user of that machine, but haven't received a response.

This still leaves five more licenses available for any member of the board who wants the higher levels of protection offered by Norton, which is pretty much the gold standard of consumer internet security. I'd urge taking advantage of the opportunity.


I will install Norton for any board member who wants it and contact me, or you may also self-install from an emailed link. The process is very simple, only requiring you to download one file and click on the installer program. Norton works on both Windows and Mac computers and all sorts of smartphones. Operating systems it works with include Windows, Android, MacOS and iOS (iPhones.)

Things have so far gone smoothly, and there have been no reports of problems or slowdowns from users. The management console for the installations isn't showing and issues.

We embark upon Year Two of... THE FERAL CAT PROJECT







Goal: Kindly reduce feral population, place kittens in loving homes, and eventually return the species Felis catus to happy domesticity.







TASTY TIDBITS by Cat Pragoff

It's starting to feel like summer, isn't it? The sun is shining, the sky is bright, and the berries are plentiful. So here are some delicious no-bake dessert recipes to make use of those luscious fruits to share with your friends and family without heating up the kitchen.

Mixed Berry Lady Cake

(makes 10 servings)

Ingredients:

3 cups fresh raspberries

1 cup heavy whipping cream

3 cups fresh blueberries

2 cartons mascarpone (8 oz. ea.)

2 cups fresh blackberries

2 packages ladyfinger cookies

2 cups fresh strawberries, sliced

1 cup fresh orange juice

1-1/3 cups sugar, divided

1 tsp. vanilla extract

4 tsp. orange zest, grated

Additional berries for decoration

Directions:

- Place berries in a large bowl. Mix together 1/3 cup sugar, orange zest and orange juice. Toss gently with berries. Refrigerate, covered, for about 45 minutes to 1 hour.
- Beat cream until soft peaks form. In a separate bowl, mix the remaining sugar, mascarpone cheese, and vanilla extract. Gently fold in the beaten cream.
- Drain the berries over a shallow bowl, reserving the juices. Dip the ladyfingers in the reserved juices. Allow the excess juice to drip off, then arrange the ladyfingers on the bottom of a large glass serving dish (13x9 is best). Layer the cookies with half the berries and half the cheese mixture; repeat the layers, starting with the cookies.

• Cover and refrigerate overnight. Top with additional berries before serving.

This next one is great to make with the grand-kids, and fun to eat with them, too! Just be sure to multiply the ingredients for the appropriate number of servings.

Easy Cheesy Berry Parfaits

(makes 2 servings)

Ingredients:

2 ounces cream cheese, softened

1 cup fresh raspberries

4 Tbs. graham cracker crumbs

1 cup fresh blueberries

2/3 cup marshmallow creme

1/2 cup frozen whipped topping

Directions:

- Beat the marshmallow creme and cream cheese together until well blended. Fold in the whipped topping.
- Sprinkle 2 tablespoons graham cracker crumbs into each parfait glass or dessert dish. Layer each with 1/2 cup cream cheese mixture, 1/4 cup blueberries, and 1/4 cup raspberries. Repeat the layers. Cover and refrigerate until serving, at least 1 hour.

Berry Cloud Pie

(Makes 8 servings)

Ingredients:

1-1/4 cups miniature marshmallows

1/2 cup cold water

3 Tbs. butter, cubed

2 cups heavy whipping cream

2-1/2 cups crisp rice cereal

5 Tbs. confectioner's sugar

1 pkg. (3 oz.) berry blue gelatin

1-2/3 cups fresh blueberries 1/2 cup boiling water Additional blueberries for garnish

Note: This will make a blue pie. For a pink pie, use strawberries and red gelatin.

Directions:

- In a large saucepan, combine marshmallows and butter. Over medium heat, stir until marshmallows are melted. Stir in cereal. With greased hands, press into the bottom and sides of a greased 9-inch pie plate. Set aside.
- In a large bowl, dissolve the gelatin in the boiling water, allowing at least one minute for it to completely dissolve. Stir in the cold water. Refrigerate until it is partially set, about one hour.
- In a small bowl, using cold beaters, beat the cream until it begins to thicken. Add the confectioner's sugar; beat until soft peaks form.
- Fold berries and 3 cups whipped cream into gelatin mixture. Pour into rice crust. Refrigerate pie and remaining whipped cream for up to 4 hours. Just before serving, garnish with remaining cream and additional blueberries reserved for this purpose.


