#### **Keep Our Neighborhood's Storm Drains Clean!**

By City of Sugar Land ordinance, it is a violation to blow or sweep grass clippings, leaves and other yard waste into our storm drains. This includes "sweeping" grass and leaves into the street with leaf blowers as they eventually wash down the

drain. Why is this a problem? Yard waste can block the flow of water and lead to flooding. Decomposing

grass and leaves deplete the oxygen in the water which can stress fish and other aquatic life.

Never place or allow anything to go down the storm drain. This includes cigarette butts, trash and even newspapers. Intentionally pouring paint, motor oil, antifreeze, pesticides, fertilizers, pet

waste, litter, etc. into the street gutters or storm drains can affect the water quality of waterways and lakes, is dangerous to the environment and is ILLEGAL. If you see anyone dumping any contaminants, yard clippings, leaves, etc. into the drain, please call the City of Sugar Land Stormwater Hotline at 281-275-2450.

# CURB NUMBER ADDRESS / CURB REPAIRS

By having a visible curb address, fire, police, and emergency vehicles save precious seconds in finding the correct address and that may save a life and/or stop a fire from spreading.

We are finishing up Phase #4 of the curb painting in the neighborhood. During this project we became aware of many needed curb repairs.

The City of Sugar Land maintains the curbs and will make repairs to cracked and/or broken curbs. The management company is providing a list of damaged areas to the City, but have been advised the owner will need to make the repair request through 311. Please contact 311 to report any curb damage in front of your home. The City of Sugar Land will not repair the curb area in the apron of the driveway. This area is the responsibility of the homeowner.

We instructed the contractor to paint the new curb number away



from the damaged area. However, this was not possible on all homes. Should the new curb number be removed or damaged during the curb repair, please call MASC Austin Properties, Inc. at 713-776-1771 or email Angela Connell at aconnell@mascapi.com so that we can have the curb number repainted.

A certified demand letter, with a minimum \$45 collection fee being assessed to the account, will be sent after March 15th. All past due accounts will be turned over to the Association's attorney for collection after April 15th. The collection process will be pursued to the full extent of the law, including foreclosure if necessary.

#### RESULTS FROM RECENT CITY BOND ELECTION

According to voting results, all four bond propositions on the Nov. 5 Election Day ballot for the city of Sugar Land have voter support. Residents had the opportunity to vote for bond propositions related to drainage, public safety and facilities, streets and a new animal shelter. The drainage proposition, Proposition A, totaling \$47.6 million, has received 2,759 votes in favor of passage, or 72.68% of votes. Proposition B, relating to public safety and facilities and totaling \$26.3 million, has received 2,450 votes in favor of passage, or 64.81%. Proposition C, relating to streets and totaling \$10.26 million, has received 2,711 votes in favor of passage, or 71.78%. The animal shelter, Proposition D on the ballot, saw support for 61.4% of voters, or 2,329 votes.

#### HOME MAINTENANCE TIPS FOR WINTER



Fix cracks in concrete. You should fix cracks in your concrete as soon as you notice them, as they are easier to repair while they are still small. You will preserve the safety of walkways, which can become hazardous if cracks become too large. To fix concrete cracks, you'll need to clean them out and patch the crack with compound or caulk.

Clean exterior windows. Clean exterior windows make your home look nice, and they also protect the lifespan of your windows. Over time, harsh elements outdoors can damage your windows. Weather

damage, pollution, minerals, rust, and other elements can adhere to the glass, causing buildup and damage.

Inspect and insulate outdoor water spigots. Test your outdoor water spigots for leaks. Turn the water on fully and then cover the faucet with your thumb. If you're able to stop the flow, you may have a leak in the line. When freezing temperatures are forecast, make certain to disconnect and put away garden hoses. Insulate your exterior pipes to keep them from freezing and possibly bursting.

Remove fallen branches and clear the yard. Pick up fallen branches from the yard and clear other debris. This will discourage pests like snakes and insects from setting up homes in fall.

# PLEASE REMEMBER TO KEEP YOUR TREES TRIMMED

Sugar Land residents are required by city ordinance to trim their trees if public rights of way are affected. Properly pruned trees ensure large vehicles such as fire trucks, ambulances and garbage trucks can safely navigate city streets with a clear view of traffic safety devices.

The Public Works Department inspects trees every three years for compliance to the Tree Trimming Ordinance. (City of Sugar Land Code of Ordinances Part II, Chapter 3, Article 9, Div. 5 Vegetation, Sec. 3-164., Trees and objects in the visibility triangle or right of way.)

#### **How To Trim Crape Myrtles**

Also, though many people plant crape myrtles, few people prune them correctly. Correct pruning yields gracefully shaped trees with more blooms that are held upright on strong stems and flowers arrive earlier than do those on unpruned or mispruned plants. So, here's some tips for trimming crape myrtles:

Good pruning while crape myrtles are young will mean less maintenance when the trees are older.

Start at the bottom of crape myrtles and prune back suckers and additional trunks.

For most crape myrtles, choose three, five, or—at most—seven main trunks. An odd number of trunks is more pleasing to the eye than an even number, which often looks like soldiers in formation.



Remove low branches. Branching should begin 6-8 feet off the ground. It looks better and is more practical.

Remember, to thin the crown. The upper branches look best if they spread in different directions, so remove any that are growing into an area already occupied by another branch. Make your cuts slightly above a bud that faces the direction in which you want your new branch to grow. Prune unwanted low branches all the way back to the main trunk. Your final cuts will be to prune out any branches or stems smaller in diameter than a pencil. Leaving wood that small on the tree results in weak new growth, which will have a difficult time supporting any flowers.

#### FOUR HOME HAZARDS YOU MAY NOT KNOW **ABOUT**



You have smoke detectors. Your doors have good locks. The bathtub has a slip-free pad. By all accounts, your home is a safe and secure place for your family to live. However, there are some hazards that many homeowners don't consider or even know about.

#### For instance:

- 1. Blocked eavestroughs. Eavestroughs clogged with leaves and other debris can cause rainwater to overflow next to your foundation and create a leak.
- 2. Clogged dryer vents. High temperature air combined with lint is an ideal condition for a fire. Check and clear the dryer vent at least once a year.
- 3. Dirty faucet heads. Kitchen and bath faucets often have built-in screens to spray the water evenly. Unfortunately, dirt and other contaminates can build up on these and possibly affect the quality of the water. Clean faucet heads regularly.
- 4. Tripping hazards. You could step around a loose section of carpet for years and then one day, in a moment of distraction, trip over it and fall. When you see a potential tripping hazard in your home, don't ignore it. Fix it.

Being diligent about home safety takes a little bit of time. But, if it prevents one injury or illness, it's worth the effort.

#### When You Park Your Car ...

- Park in a well-lit area.
- If you are parking during the day and returning to your car after dark, check for street and building lights.
- ALWAYS lock all your doors.
- Remove all electronic items, and all packages from your car. Carry them with you or place them in the glove compartment, out of sight.
- Look around the parking lot for suspicious persons before you get out of your car.
- Avoid carrying large handbags. Carry only what is necessary.
- Shop in groups whenever possible. Use the "buddy system".
- Don't get out of your car until you are ready. If you don't feel safe, stay in the car or drive away.
- Remember where you parked your car. \*Note\* take a picture of your parking location (section number and mall entrance) on your cell phone. This will make it easier to find your vehicle later.

#### When You Return to Your Car ...

- Only make one trip to your car. By making multiple trips to place merchandise in the trunk, it makes your vehicle a target for burglary. Thieves are watching!
- Use a courtesy cart or ask for security to escort you.



- Have your car key in hand, ready to unlock your door.
- Stay off the phone while shopping or walking to/from your car. This distraction makes you a target to thieves.
- Check the parking lot for suspicious people and look around before you exit the store.
- Place all packages in the trunk compartment and out of sight.

## When You Are Returning Home ...

- Frequently check your rearview mirror to see if you are being followed. If you feel like you are being followed, DO NOT go home! Call the police immediately and our dispatchers will direct you. Also ...
- Avoid carrying cash. Use a prepaid credit/debit whenever you can, so thieves don't have access to your entire bank account!
- If someone tries to take your purse or merchandise, let them have it. Your life is worth much more than any purchase you may have made.

## TRASH REMINDER:


Please do not put trash out before 6:00 PM on the night before the scheduled pickup day. Trash cans must be stored out of public view.



## CALL BEFORE YOU DIG!

Building a deck? Planting a tree? 811 is the new number you should call before you begin any digging project.

A federally-mandated national "Call Before You Dig" number, 811 was created to help protect you from unintentionally hitting underground utility lines while working on digging projects. People digging often make risky assumptions about whether or not they should get their utility lines marked due to concerns about project delays, costs and previous calls about other projects. These assumptions can be life-threatening.

Make a call for every digging job – even small projects like planting trees or shrubs. If you hit an underground utility line while digging, you can harm yourself or those around you, disrupt service to an entire neighborhood and potentially be responsible for fines and repair costs.

A recent study revealed that nearly half of homeowners who plan to dig this year won't call 811 to learn the approximate locations of buried gas, electric, communications, water and sewer lines before digging, putting their safety and the safety of others at risk. According to data collected by CGA, when an individual makes a call to 811 before digging, damage occurs less than 1 percent of the time. So, before you dig, call 811.
