The First Lesson

Micah 6:1-8

Reader: A reading from the Prophet Micah. God contends with the people, reminding them of the saving acts done for them and instructing them in the good that God expects.

Hear what the Lord says:

Rise, plead your case before the mountains,

and let the hills hear your voice.

Hear, you mountains, the controversy of the Lord, and you enduring foundations of the earth;

for the Lord has a controversy with his people,

and he will contend with Israel.

"O my people, what have I done to you?
In what have I wearied you? Answer me!
For I brought you up from the land of Egypt,
and redeemed you from the house of slavery;
and I sent before you Moses,
Aaron, and Miriam.
O my people, remember now what King Balak of Moab devised,
what Balaam son of Beor answered him,
and what happened from Shittim to Gilgal,
that you may know the saving acts of the Lord."

"With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt-offerings, with calves a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with tens of thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

The Psalm Psalm 15

Reader: Let us read the psalm by whole verse.

- 1 Lord, who may dwell in your tabernacle? Who may abide upon your holy hill?
- 2 Whoever leads a blameless life and does what is right, who speaks the truth from his heart.
- 3 There is no guile upon his tongue; he does no evil to

his friend; he does not heap contempt upon his neighbor.

4 In his sight the wicked is rejected, but he honors those who fear the Lord.

5 He has sworn to do no wrong and does not take back his word.

6 He does not give his money in hope of gain, nor does he take a bribe against the innocent. 7 Whoever does these things shall never be overthrown.

The Second Lesson 1 Corinthians 1:18-31

Reader: A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. Paul directs the Corinthians' attention to God's way of using what is weak and lowly – even what the world regards as foolish– to accomplish the divine purpose.

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,

and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation. You loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins.

Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

O God, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

People: We praise you, we bless you, we give thanks to you, and we pray to you, Lord our God.

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name. Remember, Lord, your one holy catholic and apostolic Church, redeemed by the blood of your Christ. Reveal its unity, guard its faith, and preserve it in peace. And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, matriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever.

the congregation around the table. When you come up, cross your arms

over your chest, and the priest will give you a blessing instead.

Gluten: Gluten-free wafers are available. Ask the priest for one when you come up.

Healing Prayer: If you would like someone to pray for you for healing of mind, body, or spirit, you're

invited to go to the side chapel at any time during Communion.

Community Meals at Christ Church

Expanded role for Annunciation: A growing team of our parishioners having been working with New Hope UMC to provide a meal and snacks once a month to many families. On January 8, the combined teams from New Hope UMC and Annunciation provided 80 fresh meals and bags of snacks. For the first time, Annunciation will take the lead for our next scheduled Sunday, February 12. We will provide the main course and a bag of nonperishable food for around 80 people. We need many members of the parish to bring food for the bags by **Sunday February 5**, and we will pack the bags during coffee hour.

- 80 -100 16 oz bottles of water
- 80 juice boxes (please bring packs of 40 or more boxes)
- 80 granola or breakfast bars (please bring packs or 40 or more)
- 80 packs of individual wrapped cookies or Rice Crispy treats (please bring packs of 40 or more)
- 80 snack-sized bags of chips (please bring packs of, if possible, 40 or more of same type of chips)

Scout Sunday - February 12th

A Scout is Reverent....

The Boy Scouts of America program (started by Lord Baden Powell in England on August 1, 1907) annually celebrates its founding date of February 8, 1910, on the first Sunday of February. The Scout Sunday tradition is to make people in Houses of Worship aware of Scouting, and to allow Scouts to live into their Duty to God pledge. The Scout Law says that a Scout is Reverent and the Scouts of all ages promise to do their Duty to God and Country. These values strengthen youth character in their family, community and faith.

We will celebrate Scouting on February 12th. Scouts are encouraged to participate and RSVP with Brian Penticoff.

Safe Church, Safe Communities

The Diocese has training for preventing abuse and misconduct in parishes. Those who are in positions of leadership or ministry are required to take part in these training sessions. Over time, it is the plan that everyone will have taken some form of training to continue to keep our communities safe. The vestry, wardens, clergy, and employees will be asked to complete the training by the beginning of Lent. Leaders of ministries will be invited to complete the training by Pentecost. To participate, please let Pastor Jenni or the wardens know and we will get you the codes and log-in information.

Parish Life Pantry and Kitchen cleaning

The kitchen and pantry have gotten out of control in the past couple years. Deb Gallinger and I are leading a group to tear it all apart, clean it all up and put it back together nicely. We have decided to work on the kitchen on Saturday, January 28, at 9 AM. If you would like to help, please contact Deb or me. We will have plenty for you to do. Thank you to those who have already signed up to help.

Soup-er Bowl of Caring

The Super Bowl will take place on Sunday, February 12 so we will have our annual "Souper Bowl of Caring' Outreach event that day. For those who do not know what this is, here's a quick explanation. A seminarian in the 1990s came up with the idea to serve soup to people on Super Bowl Sunday and ask them to bring cans of soup to be given to food pantries across the nation that day. He came up with the following prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us to be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat." Everyone brings cans of soup that day and we build a soup pyramid on a table in the parish hall. We have an assortment of soups for parishioners to choose to eat which are made by parishioners. So, everyone gets to sample some wonderfully tasty soups and help the Lake County Food Pantry stock their shelves with soup. Thank you, ahead of time, to Deb Modde who transports all these cans over to the pantry. We had 208 cans last year. I will have the white board out starting this weekend for you to sign up to make some soup. We need both ones with meat and meatless as well.

I will be keeping the paper copy updated with what is on Sign Up Genius so no duplication will occur.

Hosting coffee hour is not hard and I can help you with it. I normally come in early and make the coffee if the host wants me to. I also will do some sort of decoration to make every coffee hour a bit festive.


