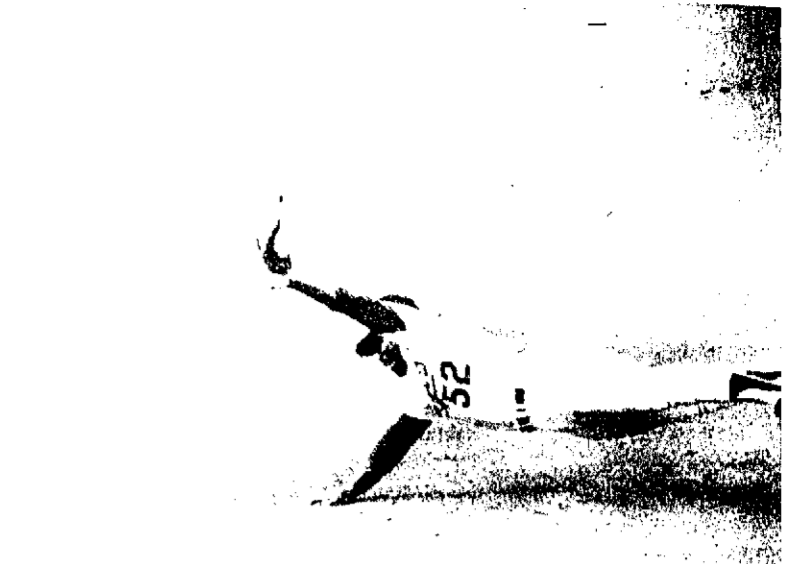

by a sore left wrist, stole second. But Mike Scioscia popped out to short to end the inning. The Dodgers started their big sixth inning, again with one out, and again it was Madlock who got things going. Madlock hit a hard ground ball to shortstop Ozzie Smith's right. When Smith tried to backhand the ball, it ran up his arm and bounced into left field. Madlock raced to second with what was ruled a double.

Guerrero was walked intentionally and one out later Scioscia singled up the middle to score Madlock and send Guerrero to third. Candy Maldonado followed with a bunt to third. Pendleton fielded it, but his throw toward home struck Tudor as Guerrero scored on what was ruled a bunt single. Scioscia went to second on the play and scored when Sax doubled to left. Valenzuela flew to left to end the inning.

The Cardinals scored their only run and finally ended Valenzuela's outing in the seventh inning. Pendleton singled to lead off and went to second on a grounder to first by Darrell Porter. Pendleton was forced to hold at third on a sharply hit single to left by Smith, but a single by pinch-hitter Tito Landrum finally scored the Cardinals' first postseason run. That chased Valenzuela, and Niedenfuer got the speedy Vince Coleman to ground into a double play to shortstop. Coleman had grounded into only three double plays during the season.

In each of the first two innings, the Cardinals had runners on second with two out, but each time failed to get the key hit to bring in a run against Valenzuela. Tommy Herr doubled to left field with two out in the first, and Valenzuela then walked Jack Clark on a 3-2 pitch. But Cesar Cedeno blooped out weakly to Sax at second and the inning was over. With two out in the second, Smith singled for the Cardinals, then stole second base. But Tudor grounded out to second and another threat had evaporated against the clever Dodger left-hander.

Tudor, meanwhile, retired the first seven batters before giving up a single to Sax, who drove a 1-0 pitch up the middle. Sax was sacrificed to second by Valenzuela for

the second out of the inning, and Mariano Duncan grounded out to third for the final out. Again in the fourth inning, the Cardinals had a two-out runner after Pendleton reached on a bunt single to third. His bunt was fielded by Madlock, whose throw looked to be in time but pulled first baseman Enos Cabell's foot off the bag. Pendleton, however, was quickly dispatched when Valenzuela picked him off first and the Cardinal baserunner was put out in a rundown. The Cards got the leadoff runner on in the following inning, but again failed to score. Porter led off with a single to right, but Smith followed with a routine fly ball to left. Valenzuela then struck out the next two batters, Tudor, on an attempted two-strike bunt, and Coleman.

Giants homeless after Oakland rejection

OAKLAND (AP) — "Plan A" fell through for the San Francisco Giants Wednesday as the Oakland Coliseum's board of directors unanimously rejected the club's proposal to move in with the A's until a new stadium is built to replace Candlestick Park. So what is "Plan B?" "There is no 'Plan B,'" said Giants vice president Corey Busch. "This thing made so much sense, we thought it would go through without a problem. Now we'll have to sit down among ourselves and regroup." The rejection left Giants' owner Bob Lurie with a decision about whether to stay at cold and windy Candlestick Park, attempt to move to another city or sell the club. He has said the club will no longer play in Candlestick Park under his ownership.

"We had no hidden agenda," Lurie said by phone from Scottsdale, Ariz., where he is attending the club's annual organizational meetings. "We were very confident this would work out. Sure, I'm disappointed and surprised." Lurie said the Giants "had lots of meetings" with the A's this year about moving in with them, and believed they would support the plan. Now, he's not certain why they changed their minds. "I don't want to talk to the A's," he said. "I have my ideas about why they did it, but I don't want to get into it anymore." Coliseum president George Vukasin said the board's 8-0 decision was final, and he called it simply a "business decision."

Bucs trade Green to Dolphins
TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — The Miami Dolphins moved to bolster their defense Wednesday, acquiring two-time Pro Bowl linebacker Hugh Green from the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in exchange for a pair of high draft choices in the 1986 National Football League draft. The Bucs, winless through five games this season, will receive the Dolphins' first-round pick next year as well as the No. 2 selection the defending AFC East champions obtained from the Minnesota Vikings for the rights to former United States Football League star Anthony Carter.

Edmonton has ingredients for NHL dynasty

"I don't know how long we can keep this up. I just know that it's great while it lasts," Wayne Gretzky said as the powerful Edmonton Oilers began drilling for their third consecutive National Hockey League championship. "We have a great nucleus for continued success," Gretzky, the crown jewel of the Oilers' sparkling lineup, said. They begin the defense of the Stanley Cup tonight against the visiting Winnipeg Jets in one of nine Opening Day games. In other games tonight, it's Toronto at Boston, Hartford at Buffalo, Montreal at Pittsburgh, Chicago at Quebec, Washington at the New York Rangers, New Jersey at Philadelphia, Minnesota at Detroit, and Vancouver at Los Angeles. The Oilers skate better than other teams, have toughness and are blessed with the NHL's foremost player in Gretzky, the league's six-time scoring champion. But the Oilers also have another thing going for them this year which is equally as impressive: their median age. After winning their second straight Stanley Cup last year, the Oilers' average age was 25.4, one of the youngest in the league. Paul Coffey and Grant Fuhr are 23 years old; Gretzky, Mark Messier and Glenn Anderson all are 24, and Jarri Kurri is 25. Only a handful of regulars are in the 30s neighborhood. The nagging thought around the NHL is that the Oilers have yet to reach their peak. Teams given the best chance of upsetting them are the Philadelphia Flyers, last year's Stanley Cup finalists, Quebec Nordiques, Winnipeg Jets and possibly the Washington Capitals. The Oilers have no visible weaknesses and coach Glen Sather isn't the type to let complacency get in the way of another Stanley Cup. "Right now," he says, "the Edmonton Oilers may not be a dynasty, but we are absolutely the best hockey team in the world. I'd love to play anyone who thinks they're better."

One out later, Henke walked Buddy Biancalana, but Smith then struck out and pinch-runner Concepcion was caught stealing for a double play. A hit batter seemed to rile the Blue Jays in the sixth, and they quickly struck for two runs that made it 3-3. With two outs, Bell was hit by the side by Kansas City starter Bud

Black. Bell, suspended earlier in the season when he kicked Boston pitcher Bruce Kison after getting hit by a pitch, stared at Black as he slowly walked toward first. Black walked toward Bell, but home plate umpire Dale Ford got between them before anything developed. Cliff Johnson followed with a single that moved Bell to second, and Black bounced a wild pitch that put runners on second and third.
