It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in holy communion with high delight—"we proclaim the Lord's death."

The prophet Micah, having pronounced judgment upon Judah, speaks of a future shepherd-king who, like David, will come from the small town of Bethlehem. (Ephrathah refers to the area around Bethlehem.) This king will restore Israel and bring peace. New Testament writers understood this passage to be referring to Jesus.

Α <sup>2</sup>But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days. <sup>3</sup>Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labor has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return to the people of Israel. <sup>4</sup>And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God. And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth; <sup>5a</sup>and he shall be the one of peace.

# SECOND READING

The author of Hebrews uses the image of religious sacrifice to convey the significance of Christ's coming. Through obedient acceptance of God's will, Christ allows his own body to become the greatest sacrifice of all, one through which we are made a holy people.

<sup>5</sup>Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said,

"Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired,

but a body you have prepared for me;

<sup>6</sup>in burnt offerings and sin offerings

you have taken no pleasure.

(in the scroll of the book it is written of me)."

Chrismon Ornaments on the Christmas Tree: The word "Chrismon" is a combination of the words "Christ" and "monogram". The word Chrismon has been adopted to refer to special Christmas tree ornaments that have been developed to display symbols of Christ. The designs of the Chrismons has over the years been extended to represent symbols of Christianity. All the ornaments are done in white and gold. In 1957 Chrismon ornaments were made and displayed on a Christmas tree at the Lutheran Church of the Ascension in Danville, Virginia. Through this church patterns were made available, and the idea of having a Chrismon tree has spread. Over the years more ornaments have been developed so that now a Chrismon may be a monogram, a sign, a symbol, a type, or a combination of such figures. The only requirement is that it refer primarily to Christ and God. The symbolism of the ornaments on the Christmas tree in the Nave are as follows:

<u>The Irish or Celtic Cross</u> is a normal cross with a circle in the middle to symbolize eternity.

<u>The Triumphant Cross</u> represents the earth with the cross on top. It symbolizes Jesus is triumphant over anything we can face in the world.

<u>The Jerusalem Cross</u> It can symbolize the Four Gospels in the Bible, the spread of the Gospel to the four corners of the earth or the five wounds of Jesus when he died on the cross.

<u>The Furca or Upsilon Cross</u> comes from the Greek letter Y. It is also called The Thieves' Cross from the two robbers who were crucified on each side of Jesus. It also symbolizes the choice between good and evil.

The Anchor Cross reminds Christian's that Jesus is the anchor of their faith.

<u>The Fish</u> is one of the oldest Christian symbols. The letters, from the Greek word for fish (ichthus), stand for Jesus (I), Christ (X), God (Q), Son (Y), Savior (S). Some of Jesus' disciples were fishermen

<u>Alpha and Omega</u> are the first and the last letters of the Greek alphabet. Used together, they are the symbolize that Christians believe Jesus is the beginning and end of all things.

<u>The Chi-Rho</u> looks like a 'P' with an 'X' on top of it. These two letters are the first two letters of the Greek word 'Christos' which means Christ.

<u>The Star of David</u>, sometimes called the Star of Creation, is a symbol that Jesus was a Jew and a descendant of King David.

<u>A Five Pointed Star</u> represents the five wounds of Jesus on the cross.

<u>The Nativity Star</u> is the symbol of the Star of Bethlehem or Epiphany, when the Wisemen visited Jesus.

An Eight Pointed Star represents baptism and regeneration.

<u>The Crown</u> is the symbol that Jesus in King. It shows that Christians believe Jesus is ruler over heaven and the earth.

<u>The Shepherd's Crook or Staff</u> remembers that Jesus sometimes called himself a shepherd. It can also represent the shepherds who were the first people told about the birth of Jesus.

Both of these symbols represent the Christian 'Trinity' of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. <u>The Triquerta</u> is made of three loops making a triangle representing the three parts of the trinity. The <u>Trefoil</u> (at the bottom) is three equal circles intertwined to form a whole.

Hands in Prayer help Christians remember that they should pray to God.

The Scroll represents the Bible.

<u>The Dove</u> is the symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit. It is shown pointing down to represent the Holy Spirit that appeared as a Dove when Jesus was baptized.

<u>The Lamp</u> and The Candle both represents that Christians believe Jesus in the Light of the World.

<u>The Shell</u> is a symbol for baptism. It reminds Christians of the water that they are baptized in.

<u>The Keys</u> are a symbol for the Church in all the world. Jesus told his friend Peter that "I will give you keys to heaven", so this means that Christians have to tell other people about Jesus.

The Ship is also a symbol of the Church, sailing towards heaven.

The Cup or Chalice is a symbol Communion. It also represents God's forgiveness

<u>The Angel</u> reminds Christians of the angels who told the shepherds about the birth of Jesus. It can also represent the second coming of Jesus, which the Bible says will start with an Angel blowing a trumpet.

Babe / Manger represents Jesus as a baby at Christmas

The Lamb is a symbol for Jesus who is sometimes called 'The Lamb of God'.

The Butterfly is a symbol for transformation and the immortal soul.

<u>The Lion</u> is a symbol for Jesus who is sometimes called 'The Lion of Judah'. Jesus is also represented as Aslan the Lion in the Chronicle of Narnia books by C S Lewis.

The White Rose is a symbol for purity and can represent Mary.

<u>The Cross</u> symbolizes that Christians believe Jesus Christ died for everyone on a cross.

<u>The Latin Cross</u>, also sometimes called the Roman Cross. The base of the cross has three steps that symbolize faith, hope, and love.

<u>The Eastern Cross</u> is used by many Eastern or Orthodox churches.<u>IHS</u> are the first three letters of 'Jesus' in Greek. They've been added to a Cross as it looks more interesting!

The Heart is a symbol of love and reminds Christians that God is love.
