> As the Census tells us, poverty may not be common but it does exist, and that all depends on what you consider poverty. Yet, there may not be a desolate poverty in a neighborhood for their to be a ghetto boy. Our inner cities today are tattered with temptations to go astray from God, and ultimately to develop a criminal record. The lack of the standards that America used to have over 80 years ago has lead to a younger generation that is being tantalized by vices of sexual deviance, violence, drugs and alcohol, and an utter lack of concern for other individuals.

> The stakes are against the teenager and young man who grows up in this environment, and it seems feasible to say that without the old fashioned standards coming from a church, being repeatedly taught by a pastor, the teenager has no proper role model. But there was a man who grew up poor on a farm in Missouri who became one of the most wealthy department store founders in history: James Cash Penny (JC Penny's).

With out his job he can not care for his wife and children, let alone himself. JC Penny's work was that of an entrepreneur, and not of a construction worker, but he was not an idle man. Mr. Penny kept at it and would not give up on his desire for success. Likewise, the ghetto boy's first goal, outside of his relationship with God, ought to be a good job. That may result from college, or a trade school or just on-thejob training. But his biggest shadow will be a failure to make the money he needs to survive and beyond that—to live a comfortable life.

Churches that have a bus ministry and are concerned about teaching kids old fashioned values are certainly making a contribution to the ghetto boy's cause to rise out of poverty and the abominations of his neighborhood.



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
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...And the Wealthy Went to Jesus He directed most of his ministry at the poor and working class

"Crucify him, crucify him" said the mob when Pilate asked if he could let Jesus go. The account of Jesus' crucifixion can be found in <u>Luke 23</u>. But most of these men, woman and children who chanted against Jesus were just no more than a day ago worshipping him and hailing him a king.

Since the poor are generally ignorant to the magistrate's devices, they can be easily persuaded by leadership. Where else do they go for council? The Pharisees and religious leaders at the time of Jesus' ministry were commonly able to persuade the masses of working class and poor, the same people Jesus cared for during most of his ministry. At the same time Jesus was teaching his people how to love one another, and healing them of diseases, the council of religious leaders were plotting to kill Jesus for making them jealous because they could not heal. During Jesus ministry, the wealthy were known to corner him with hypocritical questions, and the only two wealthy men who ever were known to show him any respect were Joseph and Nicodemus, both of whom went to Christ in secret so as not to be found out by the other religious leaders.

Jesus understood that a poor man who was idle and refused to work (if he had the means to work) was not privy to his help. But very often the common man who was toiling, and those who were disabled or had underwent some kind of catastrophe, were in Jesus' arms of care. And Christ taught them how to work and how to become wealthy, while at the same time to be content with what God had given them. And moreover, Jesus <u>multiplied the bread and fish</u> and *healed the sick*—perhaps the greatest gift he left for us outside of his crucifixion for the atonement that saves us from hell.

Original Sin From the Garden of Eden A curse on all men for one man's disobedience

When God created man and woman in the Garden of Eden, he gave them a complete paradise with one rule: do not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. (Genesis 2:8-25, Genesis 3).
