High Holy Days 5782: Return Again

I don't think I'll ever forget the truly surreal feeling of sitting in our family room and watching myself introduce our Rosh HaShanah morning service through a YouTube app on our TV. For those of us who live and breathe Temple life, the High Holy Days are so special for a number of reasons. We work tremendously hard in the months leading up to the big days to prepare sermons, readings, and reflections. The choir practices for many long hours to get those beautiful choral pieces just right. The Shabband rehearses a number of times for the Shir Shirim service. The building is cleaned, set up, and ready. And then, the magic happens. Our ushers greet our congregation at the door, people reunite after a year away, our congregation brims with the excitement of seeing old friends, sitting with beloved family members, feeling that we are one holy community, at least a couple days a year. But last year we didn't have that. Our staff and musicians worked hard to put together some meaningful online services, and we were blessed to be able to gather in the parking lot for a few services. But like so many of you, sitting in my home on Rosh HaShanah, I had this deep feeling that I was missing something. The smiling faces. The welcoming hugs. Watching people fall asleep who were so moved by services (that's why they fell asleep right?!). While there were many bright lights in the darkness of last year's High Holy Days, I found myself searching for something more; for that human connection, the feeling of a full congregation, the buzz in the air.

For these reasons, and many more, we are thrilled to announce that we will be back in person for this year's High Holy Day season as we welcome 5782. While we are still ironing out the details, in consultation with our COVID-19 Task Force, we have come up with a plan for this season. Our services will be a mix between indoor services in the Sanctuary (at this moment we are going to allow up to 250 people per service in there) and outdoor services in our Outdoor Sanctuary. If you haven't had a chance to see our new Outdoor Bima that was built this Spring thanks to the generous support of Marilyn and Roger Friedman, I invite you to come and check it out. As I write this in late June, we are planning to have seating for 350 people outside in the Parking Lot. Our intrepid Executive Director Bobby Covitz is working with a number of companies to get very large tents that will provide both shade and protection from rain. Bobby is even investigating different types of air moving devices to keep the Outdoor Sanctuary feeling comfortable.

Because of the 250 person limit in the sanctuary, we have asked that everyone please sign up to let us know which services you will be attending. You'll find that information online and **on p___ here in the Window**.

Back by popular demand this year, will be our annual Kiddush Luncheon, that will be held outside under the big tents. We will be working with our COVID Task Force as well as the Kiddush Luncheon group to develop a safe and easy way to get lunches in hand, giving us a chance to socialize with each other after so many months of being separated.

As will likely be the case forever, we will also be streaming many of our High Holy Day services to our website, Facebook, and Youtube. If you prefer to attend services virtually, that will certainly be an option!


In the book of Exodus there is a famous line that God says to the people, one that we have inscribed on the wall in our Mezzanine. God says, *v'asu li Mikdash veshachanti b'tocham* – Let them make me a sanctuary, that I may dwell among *them*. Notice it says “that I may dwell among them” – the people, and not it, the sanctuary.

While we have been away, our sanctuary was still a sanctuary, but it is only when people gather together that it truly becomes a holy space. And when we gather in our unconventional Parking Lot Outdoor Sanctuary, that space too is transformed from the ordinary into the holy, from a slab of asphalt into something magical. In each other's eyes, when hugging a long-lost friend, in coming together we feel God, we see goodness, that we witness humanity. May the new year, 5782, be a year marked with good health, abundant strength, and many opportunities to gather together in our holy community.

Brand New Small Group Hebrew to Start at TBS!



Last year's Religious School year at TBS was unprecedented, just like all aspects of our lives during the COVID pandemic. As we reemerge to a "new normal," and a fully in-person program, we also have an exciting opportunity to innovate. We've heard feedback over the years from our community about the advantages and challenges of our program - specifically, the Hebrew program. While we are blessed to have one of the largest religious schools in Columbus, teaching and learning Hebrew in a large classroom can be challenging. While a one day a week program is desirable for many families, this model may not be as convenient for students who have other priorities later on Sundays. These were some challenges we sought to address as we re-envisioned what Hebrew at TBS Religious School can look like.

After significant research and discussion, we're excited to announce an exciting change to TBS Religious School's Hebrew program: we're transitioning to a **small group Hebrew model!**

This small group model has seen great success at many religious schools across the country! Students learn more Hebrew, have more time with the teacher, and work at the pace of a small group rather than a large class.

4th, 5th and 6th grade students will now meet in a small learning "pod" of 3-6 students, that meets with an expert teacher. This will be their Hebrew class for the year. Some of the benefits of small learning pods include:

- There is no "back row" - students are more consistently engaged with the teacher and the material, and therefore emerge with stronger Hebrew skills and a more positive relationship with Hebrew!
- Teachers can teach directly to each student and tailor their lessons to students' learning modalities and interests
- Hebrew pods are convenient with student and family schedules
- Students build strong bonds with their peers and teacher in pods, while still maintaining a full-grade experience on Sunday mornings

How will this work with our Sunday program?

- Our Sunday schedule is now modified: **Kindergarten through 7th grade will have Religious School after services**, during what we used to call "first session." Afterwards at 11am, **4th-6th grades** have the option to continue with their Hebrew pod at the same time as Teen Program.
 - **3rd graders** will still learn the Hebrew alef-bet (alphabet) and vowels as one class with master Hebrew educator Galit Golan on Sundays. Incoming 3rd graders do not need to fill out the form for Hebrew pods.
 - We will still be utilizing madrichim; see below.
- Families will select preferences for their students' learning pod to be either Sunday morning pod right after Religious School at the New Albany JCC, or a weekday Tues-Thurs evening option at Temple Beth Shalom.

For families who prefer the one-day religious school model, very little will change for your student on Sunday morning. Your student will just have Religious School in the morning and Hebrew right after!

Frequently Asked Questions

How does my student sign up for a Hebrew pod?

Please fill out the signup sheet on our website to share your 4th, 5th or 6th grade student's preferences for a Hebrew pod. We will do our best to match students with their preferences. We will then share placements before the start of school!

How many students will be in a Hebrew pod? Who will be teaching it?

Hebrew pods have a minimum of 3 students and a maximum of 6 - it depends on who signs up for which pods. Each pod will be taught by an expert Hebrew teacher, and Sunday morning pods will be assisted by our 11th and 12th grade madrichim.

What will my students learn in Hebrew pods? How is it different from last year?

Teachers will be using the same curricula as last year! The big difference is students will now be learning in groups of 3-6 students, which will create more effective and engaging learning as well as tailored lessons for students. Here's the breakdown:

- 4th grade: finishing learning the Alef-Bet (Hebrew Alphabet), practicing reading and learning blessings ("Baruch Atah Adonai...")
- 5th grade: reviewing alef-bet and reading; learning the first part of the Shabbat morning service
- 6th grade: ensuring mastery of alef-bet and reading; learning the second part of the Shabbat morning service

Does my student still attend on Sunday morning if they have a weekday Hebrew pod?

Yes! Students who choose a weekday Hebrew pod are signing up for a two-day program. Students who sign up for a midweek pod will only have to attend the first part of the morning for Religious School; during this time they will connect with their grade for a full classroom experience learning about Jewish values, holidays, music, Torah stories and more.

What if I want my student to switch Hebrew pods?

Once the religious school year begins, we will accommodate one pod switch for each student during the year. While students may have changing schedules during the year, it's crucial for small groups and teaching to remain as consistent as possible. Please let Rabbi Lenette know if any extenuating circumstances arise.

What if my student misses a weekday pod?

For that week, your student can join a Sunday morning pod as a make-up session. Please reach out to Rabbi Lenette if your student will be absent.

What about Madrichim?

Our amazing madrichim are a huge part of our amazing Religious School community and they will be just as involved this year, even with these changes! 8th-12th grade madrichim will continue to assist religious school classes as usual. During the second hour, 7th-10th grade students will have their teen classes while 11th & 12th grade madrichim will assist in Aftercare and Hebrew pods.

What about Aftercare, Adult Hebrew, and other religious school programs?

We're excited that all of the programs that make our Religious School great will remain in our program this year! We will still be providing K-2 Aftercare for any of our younger students who will be staying past the second hour. Adult Hebrew will now be taught during the first part of religious school along with amazing learning from Rabbi Bar-Lev and Kopans!

What Does It Mean To Have A “Jewish Home?”

At the end of my weekly Shabbat announcements, I have got into the habit of saying, “Thank you for making TBS your Jewish home.” I cannot profess any particular inspiration for the phrase, but it is not a throwaway line. I would like to share what it means to me on a personal and professional level.

Personal

My wife and I are transplants to Columbus (I am from Boston and she is from Northern Virginia). Even though we have both been in Central Ohio for a significant period of time, we don’t have in-state or regional connections through NFTY and/or

GUCI (to use but a couple of common examples). Once we started our family in 2015, it became vital to my wife and me to find and create our Jewish “hub,” that group of other young families that we could celebrate Shabbat with, or grab dinner together after a late Saturday afternoon Tot Shabbat. I am so happy to say that TBS has been instrumental in helping my wife and me connect with other young families, and we have made friends that we truly cherish.

This is but one small example of the power of TBS as a modern synagogue that can meet people where they are, regardless of age or interests. Whether it is connecting with people with similar interests through TBS’s affinity groups, getting involved with the Purim spiel, or helping with a program like Mitzvah Day, there are a handful of ways to meet fantastic people and create your “Jewish home” and community within TBS.

Professional

Unlike in years past, Jews across the country have a multitude of choices when it comes to where and how to spend their money. Locally, Columbus is blessed with many amazing nonprofits that also compete with our community’s synagogues and Jewish agencies for philanthropic dollars. Furthermore, joining a synagogue is a choice. It is a strong statement of a person’s Jewish ideals and values, and I would argue that supporting Jewish life is critically important right now if the next generation is going to benefit from TBS and Jewish agencies.

All of this is to say that even though we are all bombarded by competing interests and have no shortage of opportunities to spend our hard-earned dollars on things that are not “Jewish,” over 450 households have made a very strong statement that TBS is very important to them. As the rabbis and staff serve at the pleasure of the community, thank you for choosing TBS along your Jewish journey.

In conclusion, “thank you for making TBS your Jewish home” is all about helping people find multiple entry points into Jewish life, and then working hard to constantly reaffirm people’s belief in all the wonderful things that the Temple has to offer. I sincerely hope that if the last year demonstrated anything, it is that the rabbis and staff of TBS will do anything and everything to keep our community engaged and connected.

- ✧ As we start having events in the Temple social hall, we are planning for signage that will direct you to the correct waste disposal bin which will include recycling bins, composting bins, and a bin for the landfill.
- ✧ We have been in contact Rabbi Lenette and are planning for environmental speakers for the religious school for Tu BiShvat in January. The program will include a speaker for the younger children and another speaker for parents and older religious school participants.
- ✧ We have received permission from the board to plant a pollinator garden which is planned for Mitzvah Day at the temple. We are hoping to get the religious school, and anyone interested in helping up plant the garden.
- ✧ With the Facebook site up and running we hope the community will use the Facebook site as a resource, a discussion board, a place to post events associated with sustainability, the environment and conservation.

Looking Back, Looking Ahead, and Finding Balance

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens.
(Ecclesiastes 3:1-8).

The pandemic has taught us much about balancing – balancing the hopes and needs of our Temple Beth Shalom *kehillah kedusha* (sacred community) against the pains and troubles of COVID. Thank you for keeping the faithful balance with us to be:

Joyful: TBS has always celebrated the joyous events, and sought joy even in dark times. We've balanced the harmony of joyful music and meaningful messages against the cacophony of COVID.

Personal: TBS has always been about our personal connections to each other, to our congregation, and to the divine. So whether it's drive-in Shabbats, in-person and virtual life cycle events, online programs, the green team and environmental justice, or the return of maj jong, we've balanced our ways to stay connected and engaged against physical distancing, masking, and capacity limits.

Accessible: TBS has always striven to be accessible so that congregants can engage in myriad and multiple ways. While the pandemic closed doors elsewhere, TBS has remained open to all. We've balanced safety while connecting together, even while apart, through enhanced online experience and an amazing outdoor bimah.

Sometimes, part of balancing involves saying goodbye. As many of you may know, Haneef Muhammad, TBS's beloved Facilities Manager for the past 12 years, has left TBS to pursue another opportunity that will afford him greater balance in his work and family life. I remember one Shabbat when I watched Haneef prepare the Sanctuary for services. I watched him carefully set the challah on its plate, remove the challah cover, and gently place it over the challah and tuck it in. Haneef isn't Jewish. His care and tenderness in attending to our important rituals epitomize the type of community TBS is and inspires in others to share.

Other times, balancing involves welcoming others into our sacred partnership. Our tradition teaches that a leader cannot be appointed without the community's approval. At our Annual Meeting in June, the congregation elected these TBS members to their new positions on Board:

Todah Rabah to each of our Board Members and Officers for their continued commitment and efforts on behalf of TBS to help navigate through these challenging times and remain a synagogue family that is *joyful, personal, and accessible*.

And, of course, in these challenging times, balancing requires weighing the responsibility of *pichuach nefesh* (preserving life) against the desire to "get back to normal" (whatever that new "normal" may be). An African proverb teaches that if you would go fast, go alone. But if you would go far, go together. Our TBS community has come this far through the pandemic – safely – because we've moved together, keeping in mind our responsibility of and to be accountable for the most vulnerable in our community. Our COVID-19 Task Force has met – and continues to meet – regularly as the pandemic has evolved, as health orders have changed, and as vaccines have finally emerged. In this way, we've kept TBS accessible to all during the pandemic.

So today – for now, we are excited that we may at last worship together, without capacity limits and without masks (if vaccinated). And looking to the High Holy Days, we expect a mix of indoor and outdoor service offerings. "How good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" (Psalm 113).

Finally, in the Talmud, it's written that "as my parents planted for me, so do I plant for my children." TBS has balanced the present and future needs of the congregation through sound budgeting and the generous membership renewals, contributions, and the Life & Legacy campaign. By doing so, they help ensure the continued growth and viability of our congregation.

In the end, the balance rests with you, our fellow congregants. As TBS reopens, and we reconnect physically, we hope you will become involved with a TBS committee, volunteer to work at a fundraiser or other event, join an affinity group, and/or look to serve in another way.

OUR TBS RODEF TZEDEK/JUSTICE MINISTRY HAS CELEBRATED THESE VICTORIES

- We pushed for and celebrated \$12.6 million from the Columbus City Council and Franklin County Commissioners to help people stay in their homes during the pandemic.
- The Franklin County Commissioners continue to approve \$6.5 million for affordable housing to help at least 200 families per year access safe, decent housing.
- Franklin County has an Affordable Housing Trust Fund with revenue of about \$4 million of public dollars in 2020 that has financed the development of over 12,000 units of affordable housing since 2001.
- Nine Restorative Justice Circles are in place to prevent children from entering the Juvenile Justice system. These circles should save the people of Franklin County approximately \$2.2 million dollars by diverting these children from the court system.
- City Council invested \$430,000 for two separate contracts with the National Network for Safe Communities to implement Group Violence Intervention Strategies
- Neighborhood blight is disappearing through the Franklin County Land Bank with annual revenue of about \$3.5 million dollars. The land bank has demolished nearly 4,000 vacant units.

Thanks to everyone who has been a part of the Tzedakah Collective (TC)! Though our recent meetings have been virtual, our impact has been just as significant. Our newsletter will provide information and updates on the TC and nonprofits we fund.

Eight years of growth

The TC began in 2014 with 17 Women of Temple Israel members who wanted to pool their individual contributions to support nonprofits that work to improve the lives of women and families. That year \$1,020 was granted to one organization. Fast forward to 2021. This year we have 41 paid members, with new women joining monthly, and contributions of \$3,695, with only half the year complete! We have members from every central Ohio Reform synagogue and from Conservative synagogues, as well as members who are unaffiliated. Much of this growth is a result of outreach by synagogues and Sisterhoods and word of mouth from members.

The impact of collective giving

Since, 2014, the TC has donated a total of \$13,780 to 17 nonprofits. These are some examples of the funded organizations and how TC grants have made a difference:

- [Local Matters](#), \$1,050 (2020) toward the purchase and maintenance of an additional Veggie Van to bring produce to underserved areas.
- [Moms2B](#), \$1,050 (2020) for care packages for newborns and their siblings in underserved populations.
- [Harmony Project](#), \$500 (2019) for sheet music and supplies for their women's prison program and youth programs.
- [Freedom a la Cart](#), \$1,050 (2018) for personal care items for women who are survivors of sex trafficking.
- [US Together](#), \$525 (2018) for items to help refugees arriving in Columbus set up an apartment.
- [Planned Parenthood of Central Ohio](#), \$1,640 (2017) for health services including mammograms and birth control for low-income women.
- [Scholarship Opportunities for Success](#), \$1,000 (2016) for laptops, books, and support for underprivileged women who are enrolled in college.

The local organizations that we have invited to be considered for 2021 funding are: [The Starfish Assignment](#), [The Artmobile](#), [Learning 4 Life Farm](#), and [Alive in My Heart](#). ***The more members we have, the greater our impact will be with our grants.***
