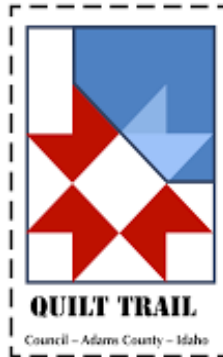


Welcome to the Council Quilt Trail

Part of the Rocky Mountains, the Seven Devils Mountains (7900’) are visible from Hwy 95 on the northwest horizon near the summit of Mesa Hill. Early settler’s mining claims dotted the mountainous landscape.

Prior to the railroad, all supplies and provisions for the area mines and inhabitants were hauled by wagon on a two-day trek from Weiser. The railroad shortened the trip to 2-3 hours.

The community south of Council was named for the wintering area of the Shoshone Indians.

The first homes in the area were made with unsawed logs. As settlers came, sawmills followed, to keep up with the demand for cut lumber. Council's stay as a sawmill town lasted for decades until the mill closed in 1995.
