This member-led, member-driven campaign was created to raise money so that Soroptimist International of the Americas (SIA) members and clubs can achieve the **2021-2031 Big Goal of reaching 500,000 girls and women by 2031!**

According to Diane, for Soroptimist to continue to be a dynamic global service organization dedicated to helping women through education, Soroptimist needs to grow its resources. And how to do that? Through updated technology that will enhance gathering information from member and award winner databases. This will enable Soroptimist clubs to apply for larger grants through corporations and other venues.

Postcards from SI Convention in Ireland

KARRIE BLANKENSHIP:

As a first-time attendee at an international convention, I found it very enlightening and exciting to meet like-minded women from all over the world. With a network of 66,000 members in 120 countries, 1,700 Soroptimists attended the convention, representing 64 of the 120 countries.

As the ambassador for our club's poster, "2021: Insights on Human Trafficking," I made contacts with five women: two from Germany, two from Switzerland and one from Denmark, all of whom were interested in our



fight against human trafficking. Most of the women who stopped to ask questions were surprised that the United States has a human trafficking problem and that our region is working to eradicate this horrific enterprise.



In addition, U.S. clubs have been working on other initiatives such as Kenton/Harding, Ohio's poster on "Dignity Bags for Improving the Lives of Girls by Reducing Period Poverty," and "Dream Casters" presented by Fond du Lac, Wisconsin.

As you can see from the front page of this newsletter, the Mid-western Region was well-represented at the convention.

MARY ELLEN BURKE:

Women Leaders Must Step Up and Lead as Never Before

Mary Robinson,* President of Ireland (1990-1997), was the first keynote speaker at this year's SI Convention in Dublin. Her focus was on women taking the lead in handling this planet's current crisis—climate change. As you are aware, we are heading for a catastrophe which requires clean energy for a safe world. Cleaner, safer energy sources include solar, wind, water, and waves. We need to transition as quickly as possible to these sources instead of depending upon fossil fuels. We must live in harmony in nature and practice the following: reduce, reuse, and recycle.

A farming project, called Project Dandelion, is happening on all seven continents. Dandelions are resilient plants that regenerate the soil, and are an edible herb that provides protein, calcium, iron, potassium, and vitamins A and C. She called out to women to become a "Dandelioness" and take climate change personal to make a difference. Women must consider promoting climate change as their duty to their community. She ended her speech challenging us: "Don't Rock the Cradle, Rock the System."

MARY ELLEN BURKE:

Women, Peace and Cyber Security: Securing Our Future

Renata Dwan* gave an update on current conflicts in our world and how they affect women. Currently, violence against women has risen 28%. More women die in Mexico than Afghanistan. Major wars between countries have become common. Women leaders are subject to increased violence.

Women are being challenged to change the future by creating a WPS (Women, Peace, Security) action plan. New security risks for women, especially through the Internet, need to be addressed. Programs, including mentoring and internships, need to be increased to accelerate more women political leaders. Currently less than 1% of women live in a place with gender equity.

To curtail violence against women, both women and men leaders need to focus on providing protection for women and educating men to take women seriously. Countries must work on eliminating violence against women, not just fighting terrorism. Artificial Intelligence based on data needs women's perspectives. Soroptimists can engage in promoting change through the United Nations Gender Equity Forums. Renata Dwan ended her speech with the following quote by John Lennon, "Give Peace A Chance."

Going to Ireland for the Soroptimist International Convention was the highlight of my summer.

I was able to do some sightseeing outside of Dublin with family prior to the convention and reconnect with family members we have living in Ireland. They were so warm and welcoming. We had a great time.

The convention was wonderful as well. It was so amazing to see women from all around the world gathered together to promote our mission, "Educate, Empower and Enable." I enjoyed listening to all the speakers, well maybe not the veterinarian so much, but the rest of the speakers gave very enlightening and interesting talks on key topics related to women's rights of equality, education, health and well-being to name a few.

My favorite speaker was Mary Robinson, the first woman President of Ireland. She was in office from 1990 to 1997. She was also a former UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, Chair for the Elders, and

is a passionate advocate for gender equality, women’s participation in peace-building and human dignity as well as climate justice. What struck me most about this very educated and important individual (see photo at left) was that she had no bodyguard, secret service or even a driver. Mary Robinson left the convention center by herself after one of the Soroptimist from Dublin hailed her a cab! Seriously, I witnessed it myself and when I said I thought this was alarming, those around me from Ireland said, “Everyone loves her, no one would want to do her harm.” Wow, we could learn something from that here in America!

Even if you cannot attend an international convention or even a Soroptimist of the Americas Convention, members should try to attend our Spring Conference. We can learn so much from each other and get inspired to do more when we see what a collective impact we can make together!

MARY BRYK:

For those of you who have never participated in Soroptimist District, Regional, or International conferences, I encourage you to try to attend. It will make you proud of what our club is doing locally and the impact we are making for women and children.

Attending the International Conference opened my eyes into how our organization is advocating for women around the world, both at a local level and by our representation internationally in the United Nations. Our voices matter as we push for women to have better opportunities, equal pay, and equal status.

In the opening ceremony, each of the 64 countries represented were announced to a round of applause. Surrounded by 1,700 women, I was overwhelmed and proud to be a Soroptimist.

One of the keynote speakers was Nicole Ameline, chair of the United Nations Commission for the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDW). Her presentation was titled “Stand Up for Human Rights.” Nicole spoke about how women’s rights are diminishing worldwide, especially in Afghanistan, where women are not allowed to appear in public without a male escort. Women who are widowed may not have any source of income and are unable to shop for food for their families. While this information is extremely disturbing, she spoke about the work being done to call out this oppression by speaking on the need for women in many sectors of society.

Our representatives at the seven United Nations around the world have the opportunity to speak with heads of state. They help form UN policies and Statement Papers. They are a strong voice for women. There are seven cities where nine women are serving: New York, Geneva, Paris, Vienna, Rome, Nairobi, and Bangkok.

To you, Soroptimist International of Grosse Pointe Members: Be proud of the work our club is doing and know it has a lasting ripple effect for women everywhere.

Living in Ghana

Yes, September is upon us and our seven girls at St. Anne in Damongo, northern Ghana, will soon be back to their studies. Some students come from small villages and settlements where life is simple, ever so simple.

At St. Anne they will enjoy clean uniforms and three square meals a day, which is not necessarily the case in their homes. Life here in Grosse Pointe and the neighboring area is a universe away from life in Damongo.

It is not only the big things such as illiteracy and lack of electricity that make life challenging over there. It is a million little things. There may not be enough toilet paper—or even a toilet. Drinking water, even if clean, is warm, and it is 95 degrees outside. A family may have a cell phone. The father needs to call the market to see if the buyer for his produce will be there. He is out of minutes and has no money to buy more.

When I taught in Damongo, most of my students had never tasted chocolate. It was, and continues to be, too expensive. Ironically, cocoa is the number-one product of the country.

The girls may visit a market where a multitude of items call out to them. But new clothing, jewelry and household items are not meant for them. They have little money.

My godchild, 14, is getting a \$500 PlayStation for his birthday. He says all the other kids have one.

A recent visit with a priest from Damongo turned into an interesting conversation. He is doing mission appeals at local churches. One man came up and asked if there were pets in Damongo. The priest responded that people are hungry and a pet may end up in a soup pot. They do not understand why we pay \$130 for a visit to the vet for Fluffy, almost two months wages for a laborer in northern Ghana.

Life goes on. We at SIGP are giving a beautiful gift to our students in Damongo: Education offers a steppingstone to a better life for themselves, their families, and their communities. They are thankful to us, not just for our support but also for the fact that we are in some way walking with them on their journey. The support we offer is a blessing to us all. — *Carol Hofer, SIGP Liaison to Damongo, Ghana*
