# From the Pastor...

We have so many members at St. Paul's that do so much for our congregation and for our community, I should probably thank each one of you in Cross Connections. I'd probably miss someone but I give thanks to God for faithful servants.

Every once in a while, one member stands out to such a degree that I feel they should be lifted up and given thanks on behalf of us all.

Larry Grovenstein is that person. Larry served for years on our finance team and served with care, love and faithfulness. Larry has quietly on his own saved this congregation money and helped fulfill our caring for creation mission.

Larry has single handedly rewired our lighting and brought our lighting up to the best current standards. Over the last several years, Larry has been at church multiple hours a week.

Below is a list of what he has accomplished:

- All incandescent and CFL/fluorescent and ballasts have been replaced with LED bulbs except the sky lights outside Trinity Hall. Ballasts have been removed or at least de-energized. All new LED's are double end powered. Regarding bulb quality, the goal is to obtain new bulbs with 50,000 hour expected life. All outdoor photo sensors and timers have been replaced as needed to be compatible with LEDs. The LED bulbs can be disposed of in regular garbage when they need to be replaced. Spare bulbs and batteries for Emergency Lights are available in the Property Room.
- Sanctuary (Complete) Chandelier lights Flood lights – 4 foot Fluorescent – have all been replaced.
- The 6 foot bulbs in outside sign and 3 foot in bathrooms have been replaced.
- U-Tube (Trinity Hall and Staff Hallway) have been replaced with LED
- Sconces in Preschool Hall: Replaced with LED
- Brick Uplights in Sacristy have been replaced.
- Emergency Lights Complete

The rough count is 37 emergency light fixtures, 6 outside photocels, 2 outside fixture replacements, 4 inside fixture replacements, 451 fixtures rewired and over 1000 bulbs replaced.

Larry has worked diligently since 2017. On behalf of the congregation — THANK YOU!!!



In the sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life, we commend to almighty God, Charles R. Huggins.

The Rev. Dr. Charles R. Huggins, 87, of Sanford, NC passed away peacefully at home on Thursday,

September 14, after a long well fought battle with dementia. He was surrounded by family and holding the hand of the love of his life.

Charles was born June 14, 1936, in Lenoir, NC, the son of the late Russell J. and Bleeka Carpenter Huggins. Shortly thereafter they moved to Hickory, NC where he spent most of his childhood. He was inspired by his grandfather's sermons and decided to follow in his footsteps and become a third generation pastor. He obtained his Master of Divinity at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary and his Doctor of Ministry from Union Theological Seminary in Virginia.

In 1967 Charles accepted his second call as pastor to Trinity Lutheran Church in Sanford, NC where he would continue to serve for 32 years until his retirement in 1999. After retirement, Charles was an Adjunct Professor at Central Carolina Community College teaching Philosophy and Bible. He was also Interim Pastor for St. Paul's, Durham, Christus Victor, Durham; Abiding Presence, Fuquay-Varina; and St. James, Fayetteville. He continued his ministry in retirement at St. Paul's Lutheran as the Assistant to the Pastor where he again made very special lifelong friends. Upon leaving, he was honored as Pastor Emeritus at St. Paul's Lutheran.

Charles is survived by his wife, Linda Cline Huggins; daughter Susan H. Grainger (Bill) of Clemmons; son Mark R. Huggins (Shawn) of Hickory; grandchildren, Meredith Chadwell (Ryan), Eric Grainger (Abby), Adam Grainger, Steven Grainger, Megan Duggins (Jason), and Brooke Huggins; great grandchildren Saylor Chadwell, Holden Chadwell, Tucker Chadwell, Nash Grainger, Hensley Grainger, Riggs Grainger, and Ellie Mason.

We are about one month into our new school year and the children are settling in well, making new friends and learning their classroom routines. Our



teachers spend the first six weeks of the school year getting to know the children and teaching them new skills such as asking for a turn, using gentle touches and how to ask a friend to play. Using Conscious Discipline, we focus on what we want the children to do, rather than punishing them for doing something wrong. We paint a visual picture for

them to see how to walk safely down the hall, how to sit as a group in circle time and how to use materials such as scissors safely.

We are enjoying
spending time in the woods as
well! Recently, we had a shed
built in the woods so that
teachers can easily access
materials in the woods



without
carrying so
much back and
forth. Up next,
we are planning
to create a safe
boundary in the
woods so that
children learn
where they can
go and where
they can't. We
will also add a

few benches for sitting and some tables for our science lab. This space will be used for several different areas including a nature art space, building areas, climbing and swinging space, a gathering area, a playhouse/kitchen space and dirt-digging area.

As we create the different areas in the woods, we are planning and choosing elements for durability and low maintenance. Natural areas allow for free exploration and experimentation. Children are

encouraged to get messy, use their imaginations, experiment with a variety of natural objects and feel a sense of accomplishment and personal mastery over the environment.

Stewardship – What is Pledging All About? STEWARDSHIP IS THE BELIEF THAT EVERYTHING WE HAVE IS GIVEN FROM GOD, AND BEING SO BLESSED, WE'RE CALLED TO SHARE OUR GIFTS.

We are all blessed by God in different ways. God calls us to share our blessings – our time, talents, and resources – to care for His creation. Much of our sharing is through the ministries of St. Paul's. You sustain these ministries through your stewardship gifts.

Each year our council must plan a new budget for every ministry. This planning occurs before you give your first stewardship dollar of the new year. How can such a thing be done accurately? We do it by gathering stewardship pledges.

#### WHAT IS A PLEDGE?

A pledge is your estimate of the money you plan to give to the glory of God to help sustain the ministries of St. Paul's. It's not a donation or a contract. A pledge is given in faith.

#### WHY DOES ST. PAUL'S ASK FOR PLEDGES?

Pledges are gathered to create the 2024 budget. A total of all pledges received establishes our best guess of the church's 2024 income. With this income number, we can realistically assume what the operating budget will be and then can assign dollars to each ministry's account.

You can see that if you are planning to give to St. Paul's in 2024, no matter how much, turning in your pledge helps create a much more accurate budget planning document for the Church.

#### **HOW DO I PLEDGE?**

As a St. Paul's member, you will receive a

letter and your pledge card very soon. When you've decided on the support you plan to give, choose the pledge option that is right for you:

- Option 1: Fill out a pledge card and hand it in during the offering on Sunday, Oct 22.
- Option 2: Can't make it Oct 22? Leave your card in the offering on Oct 29, Nov 5, or Nov 12.
- Option 3: Drop by the church and hand it to the Pastor, Vicar, or the Administrator. You can also drop it in the Finance drop-box in the staff hall outside the finance office.
- Option 4: Mail your pledge to the church.

#### HOW CAN I MANAGE MY GIVING IN 2024? Everyone handles gift-giving differently. Here are some options in hopes that one works for you.

- Option 1: Bring your gift to Sunday Worship and place it in the usher's offering basket.
- Option 2: Create an automatic and secure giving account. Go to St. Paul's website, select the "Giving" tab, then go to "Online Giving." Here you can set your gift-giving preferences.
- Option 3: If you already give online, remember to update your preferences as appropriate.

#### GIVE THOUGHTFULLY AND JOYFULLY

Please reflect upon how you can use your time, talents, and resources in 2024. God is working through our actions to accomplish positive change around us. In this spirit, prayerfully consider what your financial pledge and gift to St. Paul's will be in 2024.

The book revolves around Shmuel Ash, a student in Jerusalem who leaves his studies in the winter of 1959 "because his relationship had broken down, because his research has stalled, and especially because his father's finances had collapsed." This biblical scholar, adrift in his young life, finds work as a caregiver for a brilliant but cantankerous old man. a mysterious, beautiful woman also resides there, who entrances young Shmuel even as she keeps him at a distance. Piece by piece, the old Jerusalem stone house, haunted by tragic history and now home to the three misfits and their intricate relationship, reveals its secrets. This powerful novel grapples with multiple themes, including the humanity of Jesus, the basis of anti-semitism in particular and prejudice in general; the hope for eventual peace in the state of Israel; and love. It has received several international awards.

Our final book for 2023 is *Horse* by Geraldine Brooks on November 16. We welcome suggestions for our 2024 reading list which will be chosen in October. We try to select books from different genres to stretch our horizons, as well as to appeal to a wide range of people. so, if you have a favorite book that you think our readers would enjoy, please let us know.


