

"We admitted we were powerless over alcohol - that our lives had become unmanageable."

**He said:** Happy New Year! And thank you for allowing me to be of service in 2013.

**Re-examining each of the 12 Steps** for the GIS Newsletter will help in my personal growth as I share my experience, strength & hope. I believe AA is a program about perpetual growth of the mind and spirit.

#### I have two specific thoughts about Step 1.

**My first thought** might seem subtle however when examined becomes obvious. I believe the original authors of the steps chose their words carefully as we see the word "WE" being used twice; a very important concept. It allows me to recognize that I am not alone in my recovery as I associate with the fellowship of AA. Our common problems are not ignored, denied or minimized but are shared in our collective experiences; trials, tribulations, solutions, and victories. Our common welfare is where the "WE" of the program exists, and it is void of any social or economic differences. It is beautiful, simple, and of primary importance.

**My second thought** is in examining the word "ADMITTED." The very first day I walked into an AA meeting I knew very little about the process, however I *knew* it was going to work. I realized I was DONE. DONE ... trying to control my drinking. DONE ... trying to pretend I didn't have an issue. DONE ... as my will to live was being compromised by the life I was creating for myself.

At that first meeting I said, "My name is Jay and I am an alcoholic." Initially that phrase had no meaning for me and I simply repeated what every other person in the room was saying as they introduced themselves. However, it was during the first month of sobriety, while working the First Step, that I absolutely believed it to be true. Then as I introduced myself, I had a clearer picture of what it meant for me.

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She said: I used to try and control my consumption of alcohol by only drinking in the bars, only bringing a few dollars and no plastic cards, only having one drink at home, only going out to the bar to have three cocktails, only drinking when someone else drove, making a vow, not buying alcohol from the store, only having coffee with a few shots of Kahlua and Irish cream, only bringing one bottle of vodka to work, only having 3 glasses of cocktails while making dinner, talking "friends" into coming over so I didn't drink alone "taking hostages", not leaving the kids unattended while I went out with people to clubs, making plans so I could not drink and then breaking them, and trying to attend religious organizations to change my drinking habits. I would drive while under the influence of alcohol on a daily basis! I would destroy sacred relationships with my irritability for alcohol. My rude behavior would cause such violent and dangerous situations with those around me.

The first step has two parts for me: 1) admitted powerlessness and 2) my life is unmanageable. When I began this journey of sobriety, I did NOT want to admit defeat to a liquid. I felt humiliated and ashamed of my behavior due to my alcoholism. Definition of admittance is 'to permit as true or valid,' therefore I validate the statement, "I am powerless over alcohol" because when I consume alcohol I have an allergic reaction that causes my body, mind, speech, and behavior to become inappropriate, illegal, illogical, and especially immoral. Definition of unmanageable is 'unable to handle or direct with a degree of skill.' I admit that my life is unmanageable because I use to do the same thing over and over trying to obtain a different result.

**Today, I am different** because I have hope, faith, and love. From my Higher Power's grace and mercy I now *(continued on page 2)* 



**He Said:** *(cont)* I actually admitted I was powerless over alcohol and that my life had become unmanageable with its influence! It soon became obvious to me that the only thing for me to do was to remove it completely from my life. For me that meant working towards a new self image; from drinker to non drinker. As a drinker I was always trying to escape life and control my drinking and my actions. As a non drinker I have learned to experience life's lessons and grow spiritually.

**Remember alcohol is cunning,** baffling and powerful! And the most important word for me here is ... REMEMBER!


### Some Significant Dates In Our Timeline:

**November 1937: A meeting was held** in Akron to consider **Bill's idea for the writing of a book**. After Bill's presentation it was narrowly passed by a majority of two.

**November 1939: Bill receives a letter** from Hank P. advocating autonomy for all groups ... this was 7 years before Bill would write **the 12 Traditions** and another 4 years before the membership accepted them at our first International Convention, July 1950.

November 1951: Both Dr. Bob and Bill W. considered Intergroups essential to "The panorama of AA in action." In the November 1951 issue of the 'Grapevine' Bill said bluntly that "Intergroups do those chores that no single individual or group could. The unify regions; they make AA tick."

## **Tradition I:**

Our common welfare should come first: personal recovery depends upon AA unity.

1. **Am I in my group a healer,** mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories?

**2. Am I a peacemaker?** Or do I, with pious preludes such as "just for the sake of discussion," plunge into argument?

3. **Am I gentle** with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?

4. **Do I make competitive AA remarks**, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?

5. **Do I put down some AA activities** as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?

6. **Am I informed about AA** as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of?

7. Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?

8. **Do I spout platitudes about love** while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?

9. **Do I go to enough AA meetings** or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?

10. **Do I share with AA all of me,** the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?
