> GATE 3: MAIN GATE - WALK-THRU ONLY OPEN 3PM - 11PM DAILY

> > GATE 4: LIVESTOCK OPEN 6AM - 11PM DAILY

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- **TRAFFIC REGULATIONS**: Absolutely no parking on roadway. Any person obstructing any fire lane, drive or street with any vehicle will be requested by the police to remove the vehicle immediately. Failure to do so will result in expulsion from the grounds and/or arrest. PARKING IN FRONT OF EXHIBIT BUILDINGS, EXHIB-ITS, GRANDSTAND, AND MIDWAY CONCESSIONS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED. AMPLE PARKING SPACE IS PRO-VIDED FOR ALL VEHICLES. SPECIAL AREAS HAVE BEEN DESIGNATED FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS, CAMPERS, EMPLOYEES AND OFFICIALS. ALL VIOLATORS WILL BE TOWED ATOWNER'S EXPENSE.
- **RECREATIONAL AND OTHER VEHICLES**: No person shall be allowed to bring or use upon the Fairgrounds, any motor scooter, motorbike, motorcycle, coaster sled, skateboard, roller skates, rollerblades, bike, ATV, golf cart or diminutive vehicle during the period of the Fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Such policy does not include wheelchairs or other medically necessary devices or vehicles to be used by Fair Board directors in their duties.

**TRAILERS**: Livestock trailers must be parked in designated area. Violators will be towed at owner's expense.

#### After unloading livestock, check with superintendents for instructions on parking trailers.

Parking is prohibited in the livestock area between 2 pm and 9 pm Monday through Saturday. (Only exception is for loading and unloading livestock.) Vehicles in violation will be towed at owner's expense.

- **GROUNDS REGULATIONS:** No outside coolers, cans, or bottles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except for the use by campers in the campgrounds. Coolers, cans and bottles will be confiscated at the gate. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds.
- **ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:** Alcoholic beverages, except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds, will be permitted only in the beer barn and grandstand areas and must be purchased from vendors on the Fair-grounds.
- **PETS:** Absolutely **no pets**, including any type of animal, shall be allowed on the Fairgrounds during the period of the fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Animals for the handicapped are excluded. **This includes the campgrounds.**
- **SOLICITATIONS:** Solicitation of any type, including the distribution of trinkets, flyers, pamphlets, baubles, or other merchandise or material shall not be allowed without having been requested or invited to do so and approved by formal action of the Northeast Missouri Fair Board.
- VAGRANCY: Vagrancy is not allowed on the grounds.
- **OVERNIGHT:** Persons staying on the grounds overnight must present a ticket or entry pass when asked to do so by the Fair Board.
- SMOKING: NO SMOKING in livestock barn by order of the City Fire Marshall.
- **CLAIMS FOR INJURY:** No claims for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted, nor suit instituted or maintained against the NEMO Fair, or its officers or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees. If any damage, loss, or injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful acts of any persons, firm, or corporation or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on said fairgrounds, or occupying a space thereon the NEMO Fair shall, in no manner, be responsible therefore, and in case it be subject to any expenses or liability all persons causing same or liable therefore, shall indemnify the said NEMO Fair.

UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES WILL THE NEMO FAIR BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH, THEFT, DAMAGE, OR IN-JURY TO ANY PERSONS, ANIMAL, ARTICLE OR VEHICLE.

**RESERVATION OF RIGHTS:** The NEMO Fair Association Board of Directors reserves the right to do the following: Reject any entry.

Continue, discontinue, or cancel the fair due to bad weather, unfavorable, or unavoidable conditions.

Suspend, amend or add general rules/regulations without notice.

INDIVIDUALS VIOLATING ABOVE POLICIES WILL BE REQUIRED TO LEAVE FAIRGROUNDS.

#### **CAMPING RULES AND PROCEDURES**

- Camping spots not paid by March 31st will be released to the general public. Reservations may be made by calling Jim Keim at (660) 341-5310. PAYMENTS: Must be mailed to P.O. Box 287 Kirksville, MO 63501, Jim Keim: 17151 West Lone Pine Dr., Queen City, MO 63561 or brought to the Fair Office byAppointment.
- 2. Camping spaces will be numbered and specific spaces may be requested. Campers will be assigned a numbered space and must be parked in that assigned space.
- 3. The camping rate will be \$160.00 (30 amp campers).
- 4. Campers moved onto the grounds before July 15, will be assessed an additional fee of \$20.00 per day.
- 5. Campers must be removed no later than 5:00 P.M., July 24 or additional nights can be purchased at \$20.00 (30 amp) per night. Pets must be removed by July 17.
- 6. No stock trailers are allowed in the campgrounds unless equipped as campers. All stock trailers must be parked in the designated area or they will be towed at owner's expense.
- 7. You may purchase 1 extra tag for \$20.00. Vehicles parked in the campgrounds **MUST** have a hang tag or be subject to towing at the owner's expense. **NO REPLACEMENT HANG TAGS WILL BE PROVIDED**.
- 8. No advertising, sales, flea markets, solicitations, etc., shall be allowed in the campgrounds without prior approval by formal action of the Fair Board.
- 9. Campers are responsible for rules concerning the campground under General Rules. Please contact Jim Keim at (660) 341-5310 with any camping questions when on the Fairgrounds.
- 10. Campers or anyone going to the campgrounds must use Gate 2 from 3 pm 11 pm <u>ONLY</u>. Gate 1 from 11 pm 3 pm the following day.
- 11. PETS: ABSOLUTELY NO PETS, INCLUDING ANY TYPE OF ANIMAL, ARE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUNDS DUR-ING THE PERIOD OF THE FAIR. NO DOGS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUNDS STARTING JULY 17, 2023.
- 12. RECREATIONAL & OTHER VEHICLES: No person shall be allowed to bring or use upon the Fairgrounds, any motor scooter, motorbike, motorcycle, coaster sled, skateboard, roller skates, roller blades, bike, ATV, golf cart or diminutive vehicle during the period of the Fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Such policy does not include wheelchairs or other medically necessary devices or vehicles to be used by Fair Board Directors in their duties.
- 13. POOLS: DUE TO INSURANCE LIABILITY, ABSOLUTELY NO POOLS OF ANY KIND WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUND.
- 14. GROUNDS REGULATIONS: No outside coolers, cans, bottles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except for those that may be used by campers in the campgrounds only. Coolers, cans and bottles will be confiscated at the gate. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds.
- 15. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES: Alcoholic beverages, except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds, will be permitted only in the beer garden and grandstand areas and must be purchased from vendors on the Fair-grounds.

## 2023 PIE BAKING CONTEST

- 1. Drop off Pies at Multi-Purpose Building Monday, July 17 10-11am
- 2. Pies must be entered in the name of the person who made/baked it.
- 3. Pies should be in disposable pie tins.
- 4. Pies become the property of the NEMO Fair and will be shared with Fairgoers after the Opening Ceremony.
- 5. All Pies must be homemade. Pre made crusts are allowed.
- 6. Entries limed to 1 pie per person per category.
- 7. Categories are
  - a. Berry Pies (Strawberry, Blueberry, etc)
  - b.Fruit Pies (Apple, Pear, Cherry, etc)
  - c. Cream Pies
  - d.Nut Pies
- 8. Entries will be judged on Taste, Texture, Appearance etc. Pies will remain anonymous to the judges. All decisions of the judges are final.
- 9. Awards will be given for 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each category. Then an Overall Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected.
- 10. Winners need not be present to win.
- 11. By participating in this event, entrants agree to abide by the contest rules and decisions of the judges, Entrants will agree to release NEMO Fair and all who participate in this event from any and all liability without limitations.
- 12. Winners will be announced and awards given following the Opening Ceremony.

#### 2023 NEMO FAIR QUEEN PAGEANT RULES AND REGULATIONS



The NEMO Fair Pageant competition is held annually in conjunction with the NEMO Fair in Kirksville, MO. Pageant will be held at the NEMO FAIR GROUNDS Multi-Purpose Building on Sunday, July 16th, 2023

- Contestant shall be citizens of the United States and residents of the state of Missouri for no less than six months immediately preceding July 4, 2023.
- 2. The NEMO Queen/Teen/Young Miss will automatically relinquish her title if she has a child, enters into a marriage contract, or chooses to cohabit with a male in lieu of a marriage contract. A contestant must have never been convicted of any crime or have any criminal charges pending.
- Royalty must be present for ALL obligations as determined by the Queen Committee including Saturday before the upcoming Fair regardless of circumstances.
- 4. Contestants for the Division of Queen shall be between the ages of 17 years old and 22 years old. Contestants for the Division of Teen Miss shall be between the ages of 13 years old and 16 years old. Contestants for the Division of Young Miss shall be between the age of 9 years old and 12 years old. All of the above Divisions shall be of age by September 1, 2023.
- Entries shall be postmarked no later than June 24, 2023. You may Email your form to <u>nemofairqueens@outlook.com</u> or messaged to The NEMO Fair Queen Pageant Page. All images of contestants must be sent digitally please.

- 6. A Complete entry MUST include the following:
  - \$40.00 fee non-refundable (check made to THE NEMO FAIR ASSOCIATION)
  - Completed Entry Form
  - Short BIO (we will review the bio's and offer assistance for this portion)
  - 1 digital image of contestant
  - Failure to include all 4 items listed above will result in contestant being ineligible to compete in contest.
- Each Contestant/ pageant division winner under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian during the duration of the 2023 NEMO Fair, while representing the NEMO Fair Association.
- 8. Conduct deemed to be improper and determined by the NEMO Fair or the Queen Committee will be reason for disqualification and dismissal by the Queen Committee.
- 9. If Miss NEMO Fair fails to complete her term, the title will be passed to the runner-up in the order of their rank, beginning with the first runner-up.
- Selection of the division winners will be based on the following scoring basis: Personal Interviews: 40%. Public Speaking or Talent: 40%. Evening Gown: 20%. Talent is limited to 2 minutes. (Scored under State Fair stipulations)
- 11. The NEMO Fair Association will furnish the following for the contestant competing for Missouri State Fair Queen: Entry Fee for Contest
  - One night lodging for the candidate and chaperone with the Sedalia Welcome Committee
- 12. Missouri State Fair Queen contestant must provide her own chaperone per State Fair Queen contest rules.
- 13. If you are running for the MO State Fair Queen Pagent for another organization, you are ineligible to compete.
- 14. NEMO Fair Queen Committee has the right to change rules to meet the needs of the contest.

## **Chad Brock**

Contemporary country singer/songwriter Chad Brock was born and raised in Ocala, FL. Despite performing in the church choir throughout his youth, his initial love was athletics, and he was a highly touted high-school football player. After joining the school chorus, however, Brock also emerged as a star soloist, and became so enamored of music that he turned down a collegiate athletic scholarship to pursue a career as a performer.

Relocating to Nashville to work as a songwriter in 1998, Brock signed with Warner Bros. and issued his self-titled debut later that year. The second single, "Ordinary Life," was a breakout hit, climbing into the country Top Five, and "Lightning Does the Work" was also moderately popular. Brock's follow-up was 2000's "Yes!", and the title track -- a story song about meeting and romancing his wife -- became his first country chart-topper, debuting at #1 on the Billboard chart.

Today, Chad is in the studio working on a new album and is the host of the new TV show, "The Chad Brock Show." The Chad Brock Show will be airing on TCN (The Country Network) in 2023.



## **Darryl Worley**

#### Friday, July 21, 2023 8:00 PM

The rich, reedy tones and all-American, blue -collar themes in his #1 hits "I Miss My Friend," "Awful, Beautiful Life" and "Have You Forgotten?" are reminders of the downto-Earth, Haggard-like Darryl Worley you always knew.

The island vibes and blue-eyed soul in new songs "It's Good To Be Me," "Lay It On Me" and "Lonely Alone" suggest there's another, almost-funky, version of Worley that's been kept under wraps.

The alternate sides are both on display in Second Wind: Latest and Greatest, a project that mixes the traditional-country history he established in Nashville with the ragged soul that's deep in the bones of Muscle Shoals, a musical Alabama hotbed where Worley got his start. The area hosted hit sessions for Aretha Franklin, Bob Seger, Wilson Pickett and



The Rolling Stones, and the sweaty swagger of the region's recording studios was a perfect fit for Worley as he recorded an album that re-establishes him in country culture. "It's like we stumbled onto something in an attempt to stumble onto something," Worley says. "We were just kind of feeling our way around in the dark."

Produced by guitarist Billy Lawson (Sammy Kershaw, Mo Pitney), *Second Wind* was built with a relaxed atmosphere. Little attention was paid to the clock by Worley and his longtime band, who helped bring the hits forward to their 2017 sound while pumping some ultra-human attitude into the new stuff as well.

Born and raised in southern Tennessee by a Methodist minister and a church-choir mom he describes as a "prayer warrior," Worley started his musical career at the FAME Studio in Muscle Shoals, under the tutelage of producer/publisher Rick Hall (Mac Davis, Jerry Reed), where he remained for a solid five years. He played clubs almost nightly, honing his stage craft at the same time he was woodshedding his songwriting skills, and as Worley gained confidence, he found his way to Nashville. There, he secured a recording deal in 1999 on the basis of some demo recordings that showcased his authoritative vocals and his understanding of the hardworking country audience.

"I'm a traditionalist," he proclaims. "I came to Nashville because of mentors and heroes like Merle Haggard and George Jones. I'm sure people hear that until they're blue in the face, but to me, it's very true."

Coming in early 2019 is Darryl's Greatest Hits album, *Second Wind: Latest and Greatest*, which will include 7 favorites and 6 brand new songs.

SSM country artist, Jarrod Turner is an up-andcoming singer/songwriter ready to bring his narrative to country music. 

- Entries will be accepted after this date at the fair office until check-in. Double fees will be collected. The NEMO Fair Association states that a Season Pass or Day Pass is required for admittance to the fairgrounds.
- All 4-H and FFA classes at the NEMO Fair will follow guidelines set forth by the Missouri 4-H Youth Development Program. For a complete listing of all rules and regulations please see the 4-H and FFA section in the 2023 Missouri State Fair Catalog. Some rules may be superseded by rules in this book.
- 4. Articles or animals will not be placed on exhibition unless entered in the Superintendent's Book and entry tag (if required) attached.
- 5. All entries are to be in place at times and dates specified in schedule.
- 6. The superintendent in each department will be responsible for assigning space and arranging exhibits, and their directions must be followed. If you are in the wrong area/pen you must move and must clean the pen.
- 7. Exhibitors must accompany their animal/exhibit to the Fair, care for them, and exhibit them. If this regulation cannot be followed, a letter of circumstance must be submitted to the 4-H July Council Meeting. Superintendents may permit another 4-H/ FFA member to show an animal in case of illness or physical handicap.
- 8. Home raised entries must have been born, raised and owned by the 4-H/FFA exhibitor or immediate family (Defined as mother, father, grandparents of the exhibitor or legal guardian) as part of the exhibitors project.
- Uncontrollable animals or animals which the exhibitor cannot handle alone may be disqualified by the Superintendent and required to leave the ring and/ or grounds.
- 10. In cases where a member has more than one animal in a class another 4-H/FFA exhibitor must show the second animal.
- 11. Minimal assistance is allowed by another 4-H/FFA exhibitor at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 12. Showmanship classes will run oldest age category to youngest. There will be no master showmanship classes; exhibitors will not be required to advance to next age category after winning in their category.

(ages as of 1/1/2023; 14 and over, 11-13, and 8-10 for beef, sheep, swine, poultry and goat)

- 13. Unless otherwise stated, no exhibitor will be allowed more than two (2) entries in an individual class and one (1) entry in a pen class in the beef, sheep, swine, poultry, rabbit, bucket calf, goat departments. Each exhibitor will be limited to four steers regardless of breed.
- 14. Each exhibit shall be owned by the exhibitor and shall represent work accomplished in a project in which the exhibitor was enrolled during the past year. A written statement by the leader, stating that the exhibit is bona fide work, must accompany each exhibit, if requested by the Superintendent.
- 15. No red ribbon entries for championship.
- 16. An Adair County 4-H & FFA Show will be held as well as a NEMO Fair 4-H & FFA Show.
- 17. Believing it is in the best interest of all 4-H/FFA exhibitors to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image, 4-H and FFA members are expected to conduct themselves according to the best traditions of their respective organizations. Inappropriate conduct (drinking, stealing, vandalism, and indiscreet behavior) WILL NOT BE TOLERATED. Any violation of this rule will be grounds for disqualifying the exhibitor and/or livestock involved. Further, any premium monies earned will be forfeited.
- 18. All non-exhibitors will be expected to vacate barns by 12 midnight each evening.
- 19. State Health Regulations will apply to all livestock entries, unless specified otherwise.
- 20. Exhibitors are not permitted to show the same breed in both 4-H and FFA. For example, if an exhibitor shows Chester White hogs in 4-H, he/she cannot show Chester White hogs in FFA, or if an exhibitor shows market steers in FFA, he/she cannot show market steers in 4-H. Animals are designated (4-H or FFA) at the time of entry and may not be switched to another division after entries have been received prior to the Fair.
- The Adair County Fair states that any exhibitor (4-H/FFA) may only show in one county fair as "in County" in one calendar year. If violated, the exhibitor will accept the punishment set forth by the Joint Fair Committee.
- 22. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year.
- to next age category after winning in their category. 23. All exhibitors must clean their pens before they will

be released by Superintendent. If pens are not cleaned, NO MONITORY awards will be given until the pen is clean and superintendents can deny entry into the fair the following year.

- 24. Missouri Show Me Quality Assurance (MSMQA): By June 1, 2023, all 4-H exhibitors enrolled in food animal projects including beef, sheep, swine, dairy cattle, meat and dairy goats, rabbits, and poultry must complete the appropriate level of MSMQA certification to be considered an exhibitor in good standing in that project.
- 25. If the fairgrounds office doesn't have a copy of your SMQA card you are not allowed to show.
- 26. Treatment of animals (livestock): Failure to properly care for livestock will be grounds for dismissal at superintendent's discretion. No medication can be administered unless by veterinarian. Sick animals will be asked to leave.
- 27. If you are in the same immediate family and you only have 1 animal per child you will be assigned same pen as sex of animal allows.
- 28. NO FITTERS RULE: All animals are to be groomed by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor with assistance from immediate family or other 4-H or FFA exhibitors only. (Immediate family is defined as father, mother, brothers, sisters, step-parents, step-siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians of the exhibitor.) All animals will be groomed in the barns or immediately adjacent to the barns. If a Fitter or a person other than specified in above statement helps prepare the animal for the show ring in any manner, the child's animal and the child will be DISQUALIFIED and asked to leave. Fitter will be asked to leave.
- 29. All Exhibitors must display a stall card that includes exhibitor name and club name.
- 30. All registration papers must be in hand. No electronic copies will be accepted.

<u>Judging</u> - Competent judges have been secured for all departments.

- 1. No one shall act as judge for any class in which he or she is exhibiting.
- 2. A judge, at his/her discretion may withhold any or all awards if an article or animal in his/her judge-ment is not worthy of award.
- Decision of judges shall be final subject only to protest for good reason and under the procedure hereinafter described under the heading "Protest".
- 4. Anyone attempting to interfere with the judges

during the adjudication, or publicly expressing disapproval in the area or grounds of decision of the judges, shall forfeit any or all awards and be excluded from further competition.

#### Protest - ALL PROTESTS MUST BE MADE IN

WRITING to the Joint Review Board. The protest should include the reason for the alleged ineligibility and the rule governing the case must be noted. All protests must be signed. Such protest must be filed with a Joint Review Committee by or before 8 a.m. the day following the date the award is made.

#### Liabilities of Exhibitors

- In no event shall University of Missouri Extension, Adair County University Extension Council, University Extension Staff or Adair County 4-H Council, its officers, directors or members be held responsible for any loss or damage to the property of person or exhibitor or other persons while on the fairgrounds whether said loss or damage shall arise from accident or any cause whatsoever.
- 2. Entry form will serve as agreement that you understand and accept responsibility for following all guidelines and understand that failure to do so will result in dismissal from event or activity.

<u>Release of Exhibits</u> - With the consent of the division superintendent, exhibits may be released only in the event of an extreme emergency, or for the purpose of attending a conflicting show by showing the proper papers. Failure to comply will mean automatic forfeiture of all awards due to exhibitor.

- 3. NO FITTERS RULE: All animals are to be groomed by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor with assistance from immediate family or other 4-H or FFA exhibitors only.

(Immediate family is defined as father, mother, brothers, sisters, step-parents, step-siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians of the exhibitor.) All animals will be groomed in the barns or immediately adjacent to the barns. If a Fitter or a person other than specified in above statement helps prepare the animal for the show ring in any manner, the child's animal and the child will be DIS-QUALIFIED and asked to leave. Fitter will be asked to leave.

- 4. Breeding cattle to be shown in a breed class must be recorded in an association recognized by the National Society of Recorded Associations, except that calves dropped this year must be eligible for registry. Registration papers may be called for at any time during the Fair. All registered breeding animals must show in their respective breed class if that breed has a represented class. Breeding beef classes may be available for the following breeds: Angus, Chianina, Hereford, Limousin, Maine Anjou, Shorthorn, Simmental, All Other Breeds, and Crossbred/ Commercial. Other breed classes may be available depending on number of entries in that breed. Must be 5 head per breed, per gender to show as breed class. Additional Classes may be added at Superintendent's discretion.
- 5. Breeds will be shown in alphabetical order by breed with crossbreds showing last.
- 6. Each exhibitor shall parade his/her animal when requested to do so by the Superintendent in charge.
- 7. Market heifers will show against steers in Champion Drive.
- In all championship classes the second place animal in the class from which the Champion is chosen will be eligible to show for Reserve Champion provided a blue ribbon has been awarded to the second place animal.

- 3. Ewe lambs may be shown as market lambs, but 15. All breeding sheep must be recorded in their respective breed associations in exhibitor's name. Registration papers must be supplied at check-in.

- 3. Each exhibitor is allowed a limit of 50 entries with a maximum of 5 rabbits per class.
- 4. All animals must be entered, exhibited, handled and shown by the project member, if at all possible.
- All exhibited animals must be free from any visible signs of infection or contagious disease or parasites. Exhibitors will be asked to remove any project animal not in good health. Dismissal will be at the discretion of the superintendent or judge.

- 6. All rabbits are released to go home following the show, except premium livestock sale meat pens.
- Mixed Breeds: Only first-year <u>4-H/FFA Rabbit Project members</u> may enter the mixed breed class.

#### **Showmanship**

 You may use any purebred rabbit you own for this competition. It must be checked for disease at check in. For instance, a rabbit with known disqualifications (DQs) can be useful in this competition to show off your knowledge of DQs.

- 3. The Ultimate Show Person will be judged on the following criteria:
  - a. Knowledge: Test (8-10: Rabbits 1 book, 11-13: Rabbits 2 book, 14 and over: Rabbits 3 book, plus Standard of Perfection)
  - b. Showmanship: 8-13 year olds must get a score over 80, 14 and over must get a score over 90.
  - c. General: 1. Good sportsmanship, 2. Helpful to others, 3. Correct show etiquette & 4.Eager to learn. This will be judged during the show so be sure to wear your name tag.
  - d. Good care of rabbits at the fair: from check-in and until released by superintendent after the show.

- 1. Vaccination requirements all dogs must be current on immunizations. Proof of current vaccination may be requested.
- 2. Dogs must be owned and trained by the exhibitor. The exhibitor shall have been in possession of the dog as of April 1, 2023.
- 3. Any abuse (rough handling) of dogs on the show-site or in the show ring will result in immediate disqualification. There will be a monitor watching handlers.
- 4. Bitches in season may show in Junior Showmanship and at the end of their obedience class or ring schedule, at the judge's discretion, if properly bathed and deodorized.
- 5. Dogs with AKC titles must shown at the next highest level.
- AKC Rules and Judging Procedure apply to Showmanship, Obedience and Rally Classes. The exhibitor is responsible for knowing and understanding these rules before the show.
- 7. Only one Obedience class per dog. Only one Rally class per dog. Only one Showmanship class per person. Only one Agility class per dog.
- 8. Baiting/Food in the ring is not allowed in obedience, rally or agility. Baiting is allowed and encouraged in Junior Showmanship.
- 9. Off-leash dogs in agility, rally & obedience must be under the handler's control at all times. Leashes must be put back on before exiting the ring.
- Agility will be a timed event where time deductions will be made with the completion of "Bonus Obstacles" and additional time will be applied for course faults. Fastest time wins.
- 11. Puppies signed up for Puppy Class must be no younger than 12 weeks of age (fully immunized up to that point) or older than 6 months of age.
- 12. Judges decisions are final.

#### JUNIOR SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

#### DIVISIONS

Showmanship will be divided into novice and open divisions. Novice is a 4- H/FFA member competing in Junior Showmanship for the first time or for those who have not earned a placement in a previous Junior Showmanship class within the past year. Open is a 4-H/FFA member who has competed one or more years in the Junior Showmanship, have been awarded a placement in a previous Junior Showmanship show or who has competed in Junior Showmanship in other venues such as, but not limited to, AKC or UKC.

#### PROPER DRESS IN THE SHOWMANSHIP RING

- 1. In Junior Showmanship, it is especially important to present a clean, well-dressed appearance for both the dog and the exhibitor. Commercial identification promoting a product or breed is discouraged. No shorts or capris. Girls should have skirts or dresses. Boys should have dress slacks and preferably a suit coat and a tie. Exhibitors should always look neat and well groomed.
- 2. Flat shoes with non-slip soles are recommended.
- 3. A pocket is most helpful for such things as treats, comb, brush, etc.

#### SHOW PREPARATION AND EQUIPMENT

- 1. The dog bathe and groom the dog(s) at home prior to going to the show.
- 2. A crate large enough to house your dog completely.
- 3. Water & Pail/Bowl
- A show lead and/or collar and leather or fabric leashes of 6 feet. No prong collars or electric collars will be allowed.
- 5. Whatever equipment you find necessary for the grooming of your breed. Towels, brushes, combs, scissors, clippers, shampoo -- either dry or wet, perhaps both, and nail trimmers.
- 6. First-aid equipment should always be included with show equipment, even though seldom used.
- 7. Folding chairs are recommended.
- Bait Used to reward the dog for a good response and to stimulate an alert expression while in the ring. Note: Bait is NOT allowed in any performance events (Obedience, Rally, Agility).
- 9. You are responsible for keeping your area clean and cleaning up after your dog.

#### **SPORTSMANSHIP**

Showing dogs is a great sport. Good sportsmanship is expected of all exhibitors, their families and friends at all times. Being pleasant and respectful of others is as important in the grooming area and at the ring side, as it is in the ring. A positive attitude will be transmitted to your dog, the judge and to the spectators. Exhibitors must keep their attention on their dog. Poor manners or ill tempers are not appropriate at the show. Have a winning attitude regardless of placement in the class.

Attend crated dogs - unattended dogs may become

nervous and bark continuously. Barking dogs are a distraction to those showing, as well as to the spectators.

#### SHOWMANSHIP PURPOSE OF SHOWMANSHIP

In showmanship classes, the exhibitors are judged on their ability to groom and handle the dog in the show ring.

#### **HANDLING - SHOWING THE DOG**

Movement of the handler and dog - the ability of the handler to show the dog to its best advantage.

Coordination between the dog and the handler. Reaction of the dog to the handler and communication between the dog and handler.

#### **KNOWLEDGE OF THE DOG**

Judge may ask handlers questions about grooming, health, breed information, parts of the dog, and/or first Obedience classes will be judged according to AKC aid.

#### POISE AND APPEARANCE OF THE EXHIBITOR

#### **GROOMING AND CONDITION OF THE DOG**

#### **RING PROCEDURE**

The judge will examine each dog individually for grooming. When setting up the dog for the individual examination or when in the line, try to stack or position your dog according to the breed standard. Mixed breeds should be positioned according to the breed standard the dog most closely resembles. Each exhibitor and dog will be asked to do one of the following patterns chosen by the judge. Exhibitors should be familiar with all the patterns.

#### "L" PATTERN

**TRIANGLE PATTERN** 

"T" PATTERN (Judge will indicate to turn right or left to start)

**"UP AND BACK" PATTERN** 

(Optional patterns which may be used by the judge are "reverse L pattern," "up and back with partner," and "reverse triangle pattern.")

Examples of these patterns are attached at the end of these guidelines.

#### SUMMARY

The 4-H'er and dog are being judged as a team. The dog is not to be judged on its conformation.

The judge's decision is final.

#### **OBEDIENCE CLASSES**

The purpose of obedience is to teach the dog to obey the handler. The dog is not judged on looks, but on how well it performs specific exercises. The difficulty of these exercises increases with each obedience level.

#### **GENERAL GUIDELINES**

Exhibitors should always look neat and well groomed. Dress clothes are not required for this class. Shorts are still not recommended!

A 4-H'er may enter only one dog per class.

Dogs or handlers should not enter the ring before called.

Baiting the dog with food or use of squeakers is not permitted.

Graduate Novice (for exhibitors with an AKC CD title)

#### RALLY CLASSES

In Rally, the exhibitor and their dog navigate a course, side-by-side, as they steer him through a course of 10-20 different signs. Each of these signs provides instructions regarding the skill that is to be performed. The dog and handler move continuously throughout the course with the dog under control at the handler's left side. There is a clear sense of teamwork between the dog and handler both during and between the numbered signs. Although each performance is timed, having a good race time is not the goal; it's all about working as a team while performing the skills, with the dog under control.

#### **GENERAL GUIDELINES**

Exhibitors should always look neat and well groomed. Dress clothes are not required for this class. Shorts are still not recommended!

- 1. A 4-H'er may enter only one dog per class.
- 2. Dogs or handlers should not enter the ring before called.
- Baiting the dog with food or use of squeakers is not permitted.

#### **CLASSES AND SCORECARDS**

Rally classes will be judged according to AKC rules and scorecards as follows:

#### **Rally Novice (on leash)** – for 1st year dogs. No dog with an AKC or UKC Rally Novice Title shall compete in Rally Novice (RN or URO1).

There are 10-15 stations to complete with no more than 5 stationary exercises; exercise performed vary from turning 360 degrees to changing paces during the course; exhibitors at this level may clap their hands and pat their legs through the course.

Maximum total score: 100 points.

**Rally Advanced (off leash)** – for 2nd or 3rd year dogs, or Weave Pole dogs with an AKC or UKC Rally Novice Title (RN or URO1) deductions Handlers may show until they have a Rally Advance title. the course.

There are 12-17 stations with not more than 7 stationary exercises; exercises include a jump as well as calling your dog to the front of you instead of to a heel position.

Maximum total score: 100 points.

# **Rally Excellence (off leash)** – for dogs with an AKC or UKC Rally Advanced Title (RA or URO2)

There are 15-20 stations, with no more than 7 stationary exercises; handlers are only allowed to encourage their dogs verbally; physical encouragement is not allowed at this level; exercises include backing up 3 steps, while the dog stays in the heel position and a moving stand, while the handler walks around the dog.

Maximum total score: 100 points.

#### AGILITY CLASSES

Dog agility is a sport where you direct your dog through a pre-set obstacle course within a certain time limit, or competing for the fastest time. Courses typically have between 14-20 obstacles, which can include tunnels, weave poles, tire jumps, seesaws, and pause tables where the dog must stop for a set amount of time. At each trial you and your dog will race around the unique courses designed for that day. All of this is done with your dog relying solely on the cues and body language you use to direct them on course.

#### **GENERAL GUIDELINES**

- 1. A 4-H'er may enter only one dog per class.
- 2. Dogs or handlers should not enter the ring before called.
- 3. Baiting the dog with food or use of squeakers is not permitted.

4. Off-leash dogs should be under control at all times when on the course, and must be leashed before exiting the course.

#### **CLASSES**

Open Senior (14+) Open Intermediate (11-13) Open Junior (8-10)

#### **SCORING**

This is a timed event – the fastest time wins!

There will be "BONUS OBSTACLES" – completion of these bonus obstacles will result in time deductions. Examples of bonus obstacles could be properly completed Weave Poles, Tunnels, Teeter. Bonus obstacles and time deductions will be assigned by the judge after setting up the course. There will also be faults, which will result in time being added, applied to the following:

**5** Second Penalty

\*Knocking a jump bar.

#### 10 Second Penalty

\*Not hitting contact zones on A-Frame, Dog Walk or Teeter (if not being used as a Bonus Obstacle).

\*Going off course, taking the wrong obstacle \*Coming off the pause table before the 5 second pause is up.

\*The dog relieves themselves on course.

#### PUPPY CLASS

Puppy Class will be offered to exhibitors wanting to show their puppies that are 6 months of age and younger. Puppies in this class must not be younger than 12 weeks of age. Proof of vaccination will be required for puppies being shown in Puppy Class.

This is a judged class where exhibitors will present their puppy to the judge in a similar fashion that they would in Junior Showmanship. The judge may ask the exhibitor

questions about their puppy including, but not limited to, the puppy's breed, age, training, socialization, and grooming. The judge will take note of the thoroughness and accuracy of the exhibitor's responses.

Bait is permitted, but not to be thrown.

Judges decisions are final.

#### **BEST TRICK**

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- Each exhibitor shall be required to wear the official 4-H/ 1. FFA t-shirt of the Fair and their assigned exhibitor number at the time of all judging events.
- 2. Items made by 4-H members should reflect the skills they have learned in their 4-H project during the current program year, the needs and interests of the 4-H'er, and quality workmanship. Use the 4-H project literature and the "Clover" for exhibit ideas and criteria. "4-H is an out- of-school education program. Articles made in school under teachers' supervision and on which students receive school credit do not qualify as 4-H project work.
- 3. FFA member. The 4-H staff, FFA staff, University Extension Council or staff and NEMO Fairboard are not responsible for loss or damage to items.
- 4. Only Adair County 4-H and FFA exhibitors may advance to the State Fair. Exhibits must be of blue ribbon guali-Members are limited to two exhibits in the State Fair 4-H Building.
- 5. Exhibits from outside Adair County 4-H & FFA will have had the opportunity for state fair evaluation in the home county of the exhibitor.
- 6. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year. Items exhibited must be made in the current year and must be the work of the 4-H member submitting the exhibit.
- 7. A member may enter up to three exhibit items per project.
- 8. See the Missouri State Fair 4-H exhibit, demonstration and contest guidelines for more details, restrictions and requirements.
- 9. Projects must use the following dimension restrictions. Items which do not comply with the size or other specifications will not be eligible for State Fair selection.

Posters - No larger than 14" x 22", flat only, do not fasten

items to the poster, except photos and colored paper. No more than 6 posters per county is allowed for State Fair selection.

- All photos should be mounted on a 8"x 10" mat board, using an acceptable adhesive designed for mounting of photographs.

- Photo exhibits must be placed in clear photo sleeves 8 1/4"x 10 1/2" available at the Adair County Extension Center.

All entries must have been grown, produced by the exhibitor as a part of his or her supervised occupational experience program. All samples must have been produced during the year specified for the class. The exhibitor shall be keeping records of such entries in the approved Missouri Farm Business Record Book and reporting such enterprises on the departmental VA-3 (Report of the Students SAE Program) and have on file validating forms with the school's depart-mental records. Only exhibits of high quality and purity will be judged as eligible for premiums. Only blue ribbon exhibits can be selected for a trophy or award.

#### FFA COUNTRY CURED HAMS EXHIBITS

- 1. Hams in this class must consist of hams that have been cured country style.
- 2. Ham weights accepted from 10 pounds to 22 pounds, inclusive.
- 3. Top FFA ham overall (Adair County exhibitors only) will be eligible to sell at the livestock sale.
- 4. The number of entries shall not exceed 2 per person.
- 5. Hams in this class will be divided by weight after they are entered into the show by the Superintendent to equalize class size.
- 6. Commercial hams in this class will consist of whole hams with bone in and may not be cut or sliced. Hams shall be cured mildly and may or may not be tenderized. This class is considered to consist principally of pumped hams.
- 7. To maximize the member's learning experience, members showing in youth classes are encouraged to do their own project work. The parent and child should decide how much the member is able to do on their own, but having someone else totally do the work for the member is inappropriate.
- 8. All hams in this class must be USDA inspected either at the origin or at the end of processing. Verification of inspection should be available upon request.

#### FFA AGRICULTURAL MECHANICS EXHIBIT

- 1. Articles exhibited must have been constructed by FFA members either as part of their agricultural mechanics instruction in agricultural education or as part of their supervised occupational experience programs.
- 2. An article can be shown only once at the State Fair.
- 3. All articles must be painted or properly treated in the case of feeders, etc. All articles must be clean and in presentable condition even though they may have been used.
- 4. Each exhibitor is limited to a total of two entries of the same kind of project.
- 5. The points awarded a project are based upon the amount and difficulty of the work involved, difficulty and cost of moving, and the cost of materials. The Superintendent may award/adjust points as it appears necessary in order to keep the points in balance.
- 6. Projects built to be used as one unit should be entered as one entry and not entered separately. (Ex.: Trailer ramps should not be entered separately from the trailer if the trailer is being exhibited.)
- Exhibits must be checked in Monday, July 17 by noon. All exhibits will be released on Sunday, July 23, 7 am - 9 am. Any items not picked up are left at exhibitor's risk.
- 8. Only blue ribbon exhibits can be selected for state fair.


