Last Sunday our parish community celebrated our 100th Anniversary as a Church in Russell! Our sincere thanks to everyone who attended, it was wonderful to celebrate together as a family in faith. We were very honored to have Archbishop Murray Chatlain preside at this Mass along with our Pastor Fr. Paul, Fr. Jay Korban (St. Mary's) and Deacon Darin Douglas. Deacon Conrad Plante and his wife Jeannine were also in attendance along with our other special guests that included parishioners from St. Theresa's in Rossburn and St. Mary's Ukrainian Catholic parish in Russell.

The Benediction Sisters were remembered for their part in our community as they established a hospital here in 1929. They served as nurses and were a very prayerful presence in our parish for many years. Sr. Marcelline Pasloski was invited to attend but sent her regrets due to ill health.

Photos of the very first church building built in 1925, this church that was built in 1961, and today's church building with the addition, have all been put together in a custom frame that will be displayed in the church in remembrance of this special 100th Anniversary. Dear Padre,

At a recent gathering, a relative questioned my family's continued participation in the Catholic Church because of the sexual abuse cover-up. What is the best way to address this question?

Resist the temptation to argue or make any response that is not respectful. Choose to respond with empathy and understanding; perhaps something like this: "I understand and respect your feelings. Some have made the difficult choice to leave the Church. Others find the choice to remain also difficult.

"As a mature and discerning person, I am not making excuses for behaviors that are inexcusable. I cannot and will not defend behavior that should not be defended. I choose to remain in the Church because I choose to remain in a relationship with Jesus, and that relationship



includes my reception of the sacraments of the Church. I value the sacraments even as I remain vigilant about the conduct of those who have been entrusted with celebrating those sacraments. I retain my practice of the sacraments and, at the same time, I retain my responsibility to be alert to abusive behavior. This is not acceptance or approval of what most certainly happened. It is continuing to participate in what is beautiful and wise and true so that, in the company of other believers, I may become more like Christ."

ore than anything, we want to be wanted.

As infants, we reach out, wanting to be wanted. When we begin school and discover others who might be friends, we want to be wanted. As teenagers discovering the stirrings of something new and deep, we want to be wanted. And when we grow old, then still we want to be wanted.


The parables Jesus told were always about how God moves in our lives, how God is powerfully intertwined in all that is. Jesus told parables to give us a hint of where to find God. This Sunday's parable is about a rich man with a steward about to be dismissed. The steward then finds ways to ingratiate himself into others' lives so when he is dismissed, he won't be left

out in the cold. It's not the rich man who is the Godperson in the parable. The rich got rich by abusing the poor. Rather, it is the steward who is the image of God—a God who, like the steward, is desperate to be accepted, to find a way into our lives. We might say clever...or even sneaky. It is God who finds a way into our lives when we are afraid, when we face the loss of love, when our worlds are falling apart, when we go looking for him. There, then, is God, eagerly wanting to be wanted.
