Recipe for Fun!

In Psalm 95:1-7 the psalmist offers a joyful look at life in these verses of praise. Celebrate life with a family fun day! Set up a picnic table, indoors or out, for serving the meal. To create a fun, loving atmosphere, agree that no criticism or negative comments will be allowed during the meal. Encourage a sense of celebration.

Invite the young people of the household to plan dinner. Consider a circus theme. Serve hot dogs and lemonade. Or, make cookie cutter sandwiches by cutting slices of meat, cheese, and bread using animal cookie cutters. Make snow cones by crushing fruit juice ice cubes in a blender. Pour the mixture into paper cups and add two tablespoons of fruit juice per cup. Serve with straws. For dessert, decorate a cake with animals crackers.

After the meal, invite family members to create their own circus. Set up sideshow booths, indoors or out, using card tables or large boxes. Play old-fashioned arcade games, such as: ring toss, bean bag toss, or bowling (knock down stacked, clean cans with tennis balls). Take instant photos of each other and glue them to index cards to make trading cards.

Have races with tricycles or three-wheeled riding vehicles. Teens and adults get a kick out of trying to pedal! Or decorate the vehicles with crepe paper streamers and have a circus parade. (Don't forget the stuffed animals!)

Create a balloon sweep obstacle course. On a lawn or large carpeted area, set up obstacles, such as: chairs, blocks, a rope to duck under, and a box to jump over. Using brooms, have players sweep their balloons around the obstacles and back to the finish line.

Play miniature golf over the same course. Make "holes" by laying down pieces of yarn in a circle. Mark the holes with flags made from construction paper triangles taped to drinking straws. Add a tunnel made from juice cans (remove top and bottom) or a cardboard box. A board tilted against a brick or log makes an incline to go up and over.

Use a balloon to play volleyball. Stretch a string between two poles, indoors or outdoors. Hit a balloon back and forth across the string.

Pray an "electric prayer." Join hands. The first person prays aloud or silently, then squeezes the next person's hand. Continue in this fashion until each person has prayed.

Full-Time Stewards

God has created and designated us to be his stewards (Genesis 1:28-30). He has charged us with the care and management of his creation. Our responsibilities as his stewards are not in effect only at certain times of the day or days of the week or month. We are not stewards merely on Sundays or other special days. As stewards for Christ, we are to be devoted to full-time effort and commitment to serve the Lord with our lives and possessions. Stewardship involves our entire being, our entire time, and our entire resources. We are not passive managers but active and involved. We are to commit all that we are, all that we have, and all that we will be to God's glory. First Peter 4:10 reads, "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms."

Stewards act as partners with God. Paul tells us, "For we are God's fellow workers" (1 Corinthians 3:9). As our senior partner, God provides everything we need to make our work as "fellow workers" possible. To further his kingdom, we are called to exercise our intelligence and resourcefulness. We are God's instruments through which he works. In essence, we are God's hands, feet, and mouth.

Not only are we God's partners, we are his children. He gives us the privileges and the duties of children. God loves, protects, and provides for us. It is the privilege and the duty of the child to be with, talk to, trust in, love, and obey his father. God has been faithful to us; shall we not be faithful as good children and stewards to him who gives our lives direction, purpose, and hope? Our heavenly Father expects us to be faithful stewards of all that he entrusts to us. "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2). In Romans 14:12 we read, "So then, each of us will give an account of himself

to God." We will be accountable for what we did with his gifts of time, talents, and treasures.



As stewards, we are shaped and transformed by the Holy Spirit. God energizes and equips us for our stewardship journey. God does all and provides all things to make our stewardship lifestyle possible. As we diligently and faithfully serve him, we will hear his words, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" December 2021 Update

Dear Augustus Lutheran Church,

Last you heard from us, we were embarking on a Neonatology Conference during the end of October. We are so grateful to give you a positive report!



We completed what was likely the largest-ever training conference on Neonatology in East Africa, held here in Arusha and hosted by our hospital. *Tiny Feet, Big Steps* was meant to train doctors and nurses from just our zonal region of northern Tanzania. As word grew of our conference, attendance requests increased. We ended up with 160+ nurses and doctors from Tanzania, as well as from Ethiopia, Malawi, Kenya and Uganda! 55 hospitals were in attendance. It was an amazing 3 days of lectures, skills workshops, and learning.

International doctors and nurses came from the United States, Germany and Canada to join our Tanzanian colleagues, and together we created an unforgettable team and conference! One of the most emphatic comments in the evaluations at the end of the conference was, "Please repeat this conference next year!" There was "a buzz" about the place everywhere you looked, in every session, with so many questions and constant engagement. I think it was fair to say, there was not a dull moment.





Throughout our time in Tanzania, we have had a **Vision** for creating a clinical space where every baby, no matter how small or sick, can have the opportunity

to get compassionate, life-saving care. Our **Mission** to teach, train, and improve care in East Africa was at the heart of this conference. Since the conference ended, we have continued to receive requests to host visiting doctors and nurses and train them. Next month, we welcome a pediatric doctor from Ethiopia to learn from us, followed by doctors coming to us from the national referral hospital in Dar es Salaam.




Book Launch

On October 25th the official book launch occurred of "Every Breath Counts: Manual of Neonatal Care & Drug Doses". This 360-page manual for doctors and nurses in a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) will help standardize care of hospitalized babies, and represents the first-ever published Neonatology manual in East Africa, written by and for an East African hospital. The book is now being used in 40 - 50 hospitals, and represents a team effort and years of learning and work.

Since the printing and distribution of this book, we have received numerous calls and texts with stories and videos of how units are utilizing this handbook. We know it will change the care for neonates in Tanzania.

Our outstanding team of Tanzanian pediatricians and registrars at Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre and Selian Hospital. They have been my inspiration.

At this farewell dinner, we said goodbye to our beloved **Dr. Evelyine Mushi** (front row, 2nd from right), who has left for South Africa to formally train in pediatrics. I have worked with Evelyine since 2017, after she completed medical school. Through the ELCA International Leaders Scholarship, she will attend a pediatric residency program at University of Stellenbosch.



As I write this, I know that we are stretched beyond our limits most days. I am receiving calls from the hospital late into the night regarding admissions, and we have no more space in the NICU... but they keep arriving (4 sick babies arriving tonight alone).

We are challenged by a demand for care that is far greater than we can humanly provide. Our reputation now results in even more referrals to our NICU from outside hospitals, and they arrive without advance notice. We face continual shortages of nurses, declining supplies, tired doctors and limited donor funds to cover all our charitable care, equipment and training costs. We want to help every baby and child, and we just can't.

Yet we continue to try because we choose to live in mercy and compassion. We have a deep conviction that God values the smallest and the weakest among us. We depend on your generosity to help us train, equip, and care.
