## Call for Papers

The East Coast American Society of Eighteenth-Century Studies (ECASECS) invites to its 55<sup>th</sup> Conference from October 9<sup>th</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup>, 2025, hosted by Washington College, the first college chartered after the American Independence. This year's theme is "ebbs and flows." Honoring the maritime legacy of Chestertown, MD, one of the leading royal ports in the eighteenth-century, we seek panel and paper proposals that deal directly or indirectly with aspects of this theme broadly conceived:

- Proposals that address the natural rhythms and fluctuations, the highs and lows, of aquatic realms, with a particular focus on bodies of water during the eighteenthcentury, centering the Atlantic, the Pacific, the Chesapeake Bay, the Caribbean, etc.
- Proposals that consider theoretical, empirical, or analytical approaches to the idea of contact zones as those in which environmental and/or social bodies meet and collide, recede and advance, etc. These would consider markers such as coasts, rivers, bays, oceans, as well as coastal cities, beaches, archipelagos, and other types of sites of both contact and boundaries, be geographic, political, interpersonal, or personal.
- Proposals that metaphorically consider the theme of "ebbs and flows" as one that delineates an understanding of the rise and fall of trends, patterns, belief systems, ideologies, and social values of and around eighteenth-century studies.
- Proposals that reflect on how mainstream trends belie the often messy and sometimes violent coexistence of countertrends, delays, drags, and outliers.
- Proposals that consider the use and reuse of materials, and interdisciplinary approaches that challenge and expand the boundaries of traditional perspectives. We hope to have a rich discussion on the multiple iterations of eighteenth-century studies, where the field has been, what has ceased to exist, what has remained, and what we envision for its future.
- Proposals dealing with any other aspect of the long eighteenth century in any geographic area.

Considered during the mid eighteenth century as the second royal port of entry in the Chesapeake Bay, and nestled along the banks of the Chester River, Chestertown offers ECASECS participants a town with a uniquely eighteenth-century appeal and legacy, as well as an environmentally-centered community. For lodging, the conference organizers privilege the Comfort Inn, a pet friendly hotel that offers free parking, free WIFI and free hot breakfast, and that is a short walking distance to campus. Downtown, there are inns such as the White Swan Tavern, a small colonial-era guesthouse. Traveling to Washington College is a 90-minutes car ride from Philadelphia or Baltimore's airports; and a 60-minutes car ride from the Amtrak train station in Wilmington, DE or New Carrolton in the DC area.

We encourage undergraduate and graduate students to present and to graduate students to submit their papers to the Molin Prize. Students pay a reduced registration fee of \$25.00 due to the generosity of ECASECS members.
