How often do we take a moment to reflect in retrospect of where we are vs. where would we be without the footsteps of a predecessor? My maternal grandfather, James Eley followed footsteps into Newport News, Virginia in the early 1900's.

It must've been magic in that he would meet his future wife, forever. The timing did prove right, because she would migrate north from St. Stephens, near the town of Moncks Corner, South Carolina.

The two of them would tie the knot in holy matrimony and later continue a journey together to the northeast into Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. There, two of my grandmother's sisters would also reside. But not before one of them would marry Samuel **Eley** in Newport News, Virginia.

My mother would later be born in Philadelphia. A place they would remain until after "the Great Depression" of the 1930's. During the mid-1940's they would make their final commute to Newark, NJ.

My mother would complete her high school years in 1947 in N.J. Within the next decade she would get married and start a family of her own. From that union with my father (dec), three sons would be born. I became the youngest.

My appreciation for knowing just what little that I have learned is a part of me **preserving the past**. The value we place on our past is often accentuated based on it being good, bad, or indifferent.

I have just recently come to learn after hearing certain names for years that my grandfather, James Eley had quite a few siblings.
