

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

HOW CAN I TRANSFIGURE MY LIFE THIS LENT?

When God called out to Adam in Eden after he had eaten the forbidden fruit, Adam hid himself from the Lord. When God called out to Abraham in today's first reading, Abraham's first words are, "Here I am!" (Genesis 22:1). Adam's disobedience leads to his unwillingness to face God. Abraham's obedience is displayed by his immediate eagerness to respond to God. Abraham could not have imagined

why God was asking him to sacrifice his only son any more than Adam could have imagined why he could not eat the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. But unlike Adam, Abraham placed his trust in God and responded obediently. So too did Jesus.

Jesus' transfiguration gave Peter, James, and John a vision of Him in glory. But it did not show the price He paid to get there. So unfortunately, they were not transformed by what they witnessed. They continued to misunderstand the kind of Messiah Jesus was. But we know. We know the price. We know how He was raised in glory to sit at the right hand of His Father. As we build the kingdom of God here on earth as it is in heaven, we envision a world transfigured by God's presence. May our vision be transfigured by the knowledge that the Jesus we see in the least of our sisters and brothers is also the Jesus who suffered and died on the cross and is also now the Jesus of dazzling glory.



We may not be on a high mountain right now. Or contemplating setting up tents for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah, but we are still in a holy place and no less in the presence of the Lord. Here in this sacred space we are gathered in His name and so we know that He is with us, too. He offered Himself up as a sacrifice and we, countless as the stars in the sky, are blessed abundantly. We receive Him in the Eucharist, nourishing us in our work to carry on His mission. Indeed, it is good that we are here.

Lenten Almsgiving Religious Ed Project

Imagine your child at the age of 10 being orphaned because of 20 years of war in your country. He is now scavenging through scraps that people throw away to find food and living in the streets. Homelessness among children is a particularly acute problem in South Sudan, with many children living in the streets, cemeteries, markets, etc. They are often subject to violence and exploitation.

Why am I telling you this? For the past 15 or so years, each Lent we sponsor a Lenten almsgiving project that benefits various missions run by the Missionary Society of St Paul, commonly known as MSP, which is the order in which the priests of our parish belong. During Lent the money we save from what we give up is meant to be used to help the poor. This year we plan to help children in war torn South Sudan at an MSP mission.



In a small way, the MSP Fathers try to help these street children at their South Sudan Mission. They presently have rescued 25 young boys between the ages of 10 and 15 from the streets. The 25 boys rescued from the streets will receive an education at the MSP Fathers school program which is considered the best school in the state. They will have food to eat, a shelter where they can lay their heads at night and health care in a country where children die from diseases easily cured. Last year through our Lenten almsgiving we were able to provide the MSP Fathers will donations to care for five children for the year. It presently cost approximately \$450 per year for each child.

I am asking every family in our parish to consider joining us this year by either picking up an almsgiving container in the back of the church on Ash Wednesday or making your own at home from an empty can, plastic container, or zip lock bag. Each day place the change you saved by what you and your family give up for Lent in the container. At the end of Lent, right after Easter, return the container to us. If we each do our small part, collectively we can make the world a better place one child at a time.

He who took our sufferings upon Himself, and bore our sorrows to bring us, through the Cross, to the joy of the Resurrection. Amen.


We seek refuge under your protection, O Holy Mother of God.
