I won the 50/50 raffle! Ralph brought in slab specimens to sell. John Fusco had two fossil specimens to show the group. The complete skull is from an Oreodont AKA Merycoidodon. Oreodont means "Ruminating Teeth". This was a pig/cow like mammal that thrived during the Oligocene epoch approximately 30 MYA (Million Years Ago) here in North America. The skull is from the Badlands of South Dakota and was collected in the 1950's by Ernest Schug, who was a prominent Wisconsin historian and paleontologist.

The other piece on the green bubble wrap is an Occiptal bone and partial brain case/skull from a Triceratops Horridus, which dates to the Cretaceous period approximately 65 MYA. Based on the size of the skull, it is estimated that the Triceratops would be approximately twelve feet long. This piece was found near the Hell Creek Formation in Montana.

Electronic Rock Hounding by Mike Stone

When I began rock hounding about sixty years ago, I couldn't have dreamed that someday I'd be able to search for rocks, minerals, and fossils from the comfort of my home by simply looking at electronically generated images on a small window into the (World Wide Web).

Recently while I was browsing through eBay, looking at various for sale specimens, I came across what looked like a nice piece of lapis lazuli. The vivid blue color really popped out of the retina display on my Mac laptop. For \$4.83, including shipping, the beautiful piece could be mine.



So I ordered the specimen, waited for more than a month, and finally the tiny package from China arrived. Instead of a beautiful blue specimen, the package contained a small plastic zip lock bag with a few small pieces, chips, and several small, broken lapis lazuli slabs.



I contacted the seller about the discrepancy between what was advertised on eBay and what I received, and he/she suggested that I accept a refund of one dollar. I rejected the offer and the seller came back with a second offer to take half off the selling price. I replied with the following, "I understand that you would like me to accept something that I don't want, something that is of no value to me, something that I didn't order, and something that was incorrectly represented on eBay. But what I want is either a full refund for the purchase price, or the specimen as advertised by you on eBay. Thank you for your attention to this matter."

Of course it wasn't the money, it was the principle. Why should I accept a handful of broken rocks, when what was described on eBay was a single piece of lapis lazuli?

The next day I received a message from the seller, indicating that my PayPal account would be credited with the full amount of the purchase.

Dorwin has been adding to his exceptional collection. Some of his most beautiful speci-

mens were purchased on eBay. I asked him if he had any problems when purchasing pieces through eBay. Here's his reply. "Just once but there is really no problem, eBay will step in and make sure you are paid back in full including the shipping and force the seller to pay shipping to get their merchandise back. EBay does not put up with shoddy sales."

Technology might have taken giant leaps over the past sixty years, but from my one and only experience when buying a specimen online, I think that I will do most of my rock collecting with my rock hammer and chisel.

The Dinosaur Store and Museum

On May 16th Susie and I went with Mark and Leslie Moore to the Dinosaur Store and Museum at Coco Beach, Florida. We had an incredible time exploring the amazing gift shop and fantastic dinosaur museum. The owner, Mr. Steve Cayer, met with us and gave us a private tour.

Fortunately I have had the pleasure of studying his incredible fossil dinosaur specimens over the years. Up on the second floor are the major dinosaur exhibits. It features the skeletons of Diplodocus and Stegosaurus. My favorite skeleton is that of Utahraptor. And in the next hall is the South American giant meat-eating Gigonotosaurus.

I love the fossil dinosaur egg nests on display and the rare skeleton of a pterodactyl with dendrite mineralization, the only one you will ever see!

Mr. Cayer invited us into his lab to see some of his study specimens. He has the leg bone of a giant marine reptile called an elasmosaur, the second ever found in Morocco.

We studied a giant claw of what we believe is an undescribed new bird from the middle Cretaceous Period of North Africa. There is an excellent early fossil man exhibit that features every significant prehistoric hominid fossil skull. Also a Neanderthal skeleton that stands next to a skeleton of a modern man for comparison. On the third floor is the fantastic King Tut Egyptian exhibit, featuring many ancient authentic artifacts. There is even a major Mayan and ancient Chinese exhibit that has numerous art and ancient world-class pieces.

On June 26th I returned to the museum with Dorwin Skinner. We all had a fantastic trip, and again Steve invited us into his amazing dinosaur-lab. He showed us a baby dinosaur raptor skeleton and a rare early bird fossil that had teeth in its jaws and claws on its wings.

I highly recommend that you to visit the Dinosaur Store and Museum, it rivals any of the major dinosaur museums in the world. For information about the Dinosaur Store and Museum and its hours an directions may be searched at www.dinosaurstore.com.

I would also like to express my appreciation to Mr. Steve Cayer for his gracious hospitality and kindness in sharing his expertise and beautiful museum. Also Mark, Leslie, Dorwin, and Susie made those two days a lifetime experience and memory. Nothing is better than sharing your interests with you best friends.

Setting a Rivet

Riveting is usually done with a cross peen hammer, but I've found that it is a lot easier for me to hit the rivet wire when using a small ball peen hammer; and the smaller the better. Shown here is one that I typically use. It's about 3/8-inch diameter on the back of a chasing hammer, but I've been thinking that a 3/16-inch ball might be even better. Look for a yard sale hammer you can modify to work.



Sheet Wax with Adhesive

While shopping in the Los Angeles jewelry district for supplies for our class, I found a new product that might interest some of you. Often before casting, I want to increase the thickness of a model by adding a layer of wax on the backside. For in-

stance, models like a leaf or a flower petal do not cast well unless you add a little extra thickness. The problem is trying to apply a coating of wax that is smooth and even.

The new product I found is an easily moldable sheet wax with an adhesive coating. This lets me easily add thickness to a very thin model. With a leaf, just press it onto the wax, trim excess wax around the outer edges, and then gently bend the sandwich to the contour you would like. The wax is available in a number of different thicknesses from about 26 ga to 14 ga.
