But what about the **environmental impact of boat cleaning products**? It is not easy to find out all the details from the descriptions on product containers, but a little digging around is worth it. Marinas are already tasked to follow strict guidelines as to run-off from cleaning and maintenance products, so it only makes sense that we as individuals do so

from so little.

The website Eartheasy.com provides some very interesting cleaning alternatives that have a lesser environmental impact than some of the conventional cleaners marketed by boating businesses.

We all know that marine life, seabirds and other wildlife need clean water

We all know that marine life, seabirds and other wildlife need clean water to survive. Toxic runoff, even in small amounts can have disproportionately harmful effects. The site compares the volume of hydrocarbon and oil pollution spilling into North America's waters to more than 15 times the amount of the Exxon Valdex oil spill!

Non-toxic cleaners can help reduce the amount of toxins that spill every year - even under strict adherence to the guidelines.

Here are a few of these cleaning alternatives:

Fiberglass Stains - make a paste of baking soda and water. Use a sponge or soft cloth and gently rub the mix into the stain. This paste can also be used to clean onboard showers and heads. While baking soda is an excellent all-around cleaner, keep in mind that it is abrasive, so use with care. Use lemon



all-around cleaner, keep in Help keep this harbor seal and its wild friends mind that it is abrasive, so healthy and happy by reducing toxic runoff.

or lime juice as a final wipe-down for a shiny, fresh-smelling finish.

Windows and Mirrors - mix vinegar, lemon juice and warm water. Fill a spray bottle with the solution. Spray it on your windows and wipe with paper towels or newspapers.

Chrome - use apple cider vinegar on a soft cotton cloth to rub it clean. Then, use a fresh cloth with a dab of baby oil to restore it to a bright shine.

Brass - clean with a Worcestershire sauce, vinegar and salt solution

Copper Fittings - make a paste of either lemon or lime juice and salt. Rub gently to clean.

Stainless Steel - clean with a cloth dampened with undiluted white vinegar.

Aluminum - using a soft cloth, clean with a solution of cream of tartar and water.

Plastic Surfaces - use a mixture of one part white vinegar and two parts warm water.

Decks - use a mixture of one part white vinegar and eight parts warm water.

Interior Wood - can be cleaned by using olive oil or almond oil. The oil will provide natural moisturizers for the wood and add shine at the same time. Don't use these oils on exterior surfaces, however, since they don't hold up in direct sun.
