Wyoming Water Law

Program Co-Chairs

Kara Brighton concentrates her practice on water and natural resources issues. She has worked for the State of Wyoming on issues related to Nebraska v. Wyoming. She currently represents the Wheatland Irrigation District, and previously assisted with the North Platte litigation settlement negotiations and implementation.

Thomas Davidson practices in the Denver office of his international firm. He has extensive experience as a litigator in both state and federal environmental law issues affecting. Wyoming and the Rocky Mountain states. Prior to joining his firm, he served as Deputy Attorney General in the Division of Water and Natural Resources in the State of Wyoming.

Harriet Hageman focuses on water and natural resource issues. She has experience working for the State of Wyoming on endangered species issues, National Forest management matters and water resources management. She has worked on the Nebrasha w Wyoming Case, and she has represented the Wyoming Stock Grower's Association, the Wyoming Wool Grower's Association and several timber companies. She is a member of the Board of Directors for the Wyoming Water Association.

Keynote Presenter

Fred Parady is the Speaker of the Wyoming House of Representatives. A Rock Springs Republican, he has worked in the minerals industry, in both coal and trona, doing environmental permitting for the last 25 years. First elected to the House in 1994, he served as Chair of the Labor, Health and Social Services Committee and Majority Floor Leader before his current term as Speaker of the House. Known as an outstanding debater and leading progressive of the House, he has moved legislation ranging from Business Ready Communities and KidCare to seniors and a wildlife trust fund.

Keith Burron emphasizes water, environmental and natural resources law. He was previously Senior Assistant Attorney General for the State of Wyoming. In this position, he represented the Department of Environmental Quality and the State Engineer.

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Craig Cooper is a Riverton native and served in a number of state capacities related to Wyoming water for over 30 years. He retired from state government in 2002 and formed a small consulting firm in 2003, with interest in assisting Wyoming water users with issues regarding Wyoming water. He contracted with Sunrise Engineering in October 2003 to compile a comprehensive history of Wyoming water rights, water administration, water law and water development for the Wyoming Water Development Commission. The book, A History of Wyoming Water Law, Water Rights & Water Development in Wyoming: 1868-2002 was published in November 2004.

Kate Fox is a former clerk to Federal District Court Judge Clarence Brimmer, and now represents landowners in matters pertaining to CBM development. She has recently been involved in prorracted litigation in federal court and before the Wyoming Environmental Quality Council arising from water quality issues.

Laurie Goodman directs Trout Unlimited's Wyoming Water Project, which opened in January 2001 and is the only conservation organization in the state dedicated exclusively to protecting and restoring instream flows to benefit Wyoming's rivers and fish.

Mary Guthrie is the Executive Director of the Wyoming State Bar. She previously cierked for the Honorable James E. Barrett and worked for the Wyoming Attorney General's Office.

Anne MacKinnon is an adjunct assistant professor for the University of Wyoming's Haub School of Environment and Natural Resources and a consultant in natural resource policy education programs for the University, state agencies, and other entities. She is a member of the state Water Development Commission and former editor-in-chief of the Casper Star-Tribune.

Todd Parfitt concentrates on coalbed methane matters for the State Enigineer's Office.

Todd Rhodes provides water rights research, assessment, and management services to ranchers, farmers and other landowners throughout Wyoming. Before founding Wyoming Water Rights Consulting in 1992, he worked as a Hydrographer-Commissioner for the Wyoming State Engineer's Office at Casper and Worland for nine years.

Jennifer Scoggin previously served as an Assistant Attorney General for the Wyoming Attorney General's Office, where she represented the Wyoming State Engineer's Office in the Big Horn River Adjudication. She also provided counsel to the Wyoming State Engineer regarding water policy matters, general water law and permitting issues. Prior to law school, Jennifer worked as a journalist and a husiness communications professional in Texas and Alberta.

Brian Shuck assists clients with real estate, water rights, environmental, federal land and Indian law issues. He formerly served as counsel to the Wyoming State Engineer's Office. He has also represented Wyoming on various stream issues, FERC re-licensing issues, tribal concerns, and as co-counsel in the Big Horn River Adjudication.

Dale Strickland has over 24 years' experience in ecological research and wildlife management. He serves as the Executive Director of the Platte River Endangered Species Partnership. He and his staff oversee the implementation of several pilot projects designed to test protocols and provide baseline information for use in evaluating the hiological response of the program's four target species.

Patrick Tyrrell handles issues such as filing of water rights for industrial and municipal users, municipal and busin-wide water planning studies and studies related to instream flow matters. He is a past President of the Wyoming Water Association.
