

I am sorry to announce that Gerald (Jerry) Reeg passed away on August 12, 2022. The Navy was a proud military accomplishment for Jerry - this farm kid from Wayne, Nebraska. Every Veterans Day, Memorial Day, and other days, his

American flag flew in fron of our house. He was 17 years old in 1956 when his father had to sign for him to join the Navy.

He had a great time in Corpus Christi on the Lexington as he brought his family in June of 2009 to show what his life was like on board this big ship.

Jerry has a complete history of his years in the Navy; all of his ports of call, and one conflict he talked about when China tried to take over Taiwan and Lexington went to the Formosa Straits for 40 days, until China finally left.

Jerry worked as a truck driver for 34 years and a proud Teamster and union steward. He could have signed up again for further Navy service, but he wanted home... marriage and family. We have 4 daughters; two teachers, a nurse, and a pharmacist. He always wanted a good education for his daughters, and there were always rules for his girls, too.






Lost Warrior

If it is okay with you, I might take a short nostalgic trip back in time to and era of CVA's. It was 1959 and Big 16 boat was cruising in Westpac. (Note: salty old tars are excused for using the term "boat" whereas boots, laymen, and airdales are relegated to using the word ship. Also, nobody ever said deploy... it was always "cruise."

Some of you AVT'ers might not be familiar with the deep water navy, so I'll acquaint you with some old time reality.

There was in the days of CVA16 such a plane as an A3D Sky Warrior. Along with being the largest carrier-based aircraft at the time, it was unequivocally the prettiest bird in the air. If you saw it in flight it might bring to mind a graceful swan or a majestic condor.

A squadron of three was attached to Lady Lex on each far east cruise. They are twin engine bombers with 21,000 pounds of thrust and listed as 600 mph on the top end. However, keep in mind, it's not likely they were ever designed for any kind of aerobatics.

One bright leisurely day, many of the crew were topside enjoying the sun while the sky warriors were off on a mission. Everything was tranquil including the sea, the wind, and everyone's disposition. There was the obligatory stench of spent fuel oil from the stack, but not enough to spoil the mood.

With no warning, from out of a literally clear blue sky, the birds appeared from aft. Flying low, the headed diagonally port to starboard right over the ship. Single file, they each consecutively executed a barrel roll. All of us witnesses stood in jaw-dropping awe. You can imagine a byword: "Did you see that?" The experience may have been the definition of "forever etched in memory." One could suspect, however, the air boss may not have been so thrilled.

At that time, yours truly was attached to E Division in the lighting shop. One duty of such an electrician was standing watches, along with signalmen, on searchlights during night air operations. It was always windy up on the 07 level,

especially while turned into the wind. We would take the canvas covers off the searchlights and crawl inside to block the wind. With sound powered headsets, we could pick up aviation bridge activity where our orders originated.

One busy night, in recovery mode, the sea was relatively calm and everything seemed normal. One ill-fated A3D caught the hook and somehow skidded to port. It slipped far enough for the port landing gear to drop over the deck edge. It leaned at a scary, sharp angle.

The order came to light off the port searchlight. It was

the first time I was ever pressed to spring into urgent action. I jumped up and threw the power switch and checked the inspection window all in about 5 seconds. The mechanism was running properly, so the signaltook over. man opened the shutter and suddenly it was like daylight. The light trained on the teetering plane while there was much ado on deck.

The ship took a slight, slow roll to star-board, and a similar roll to

port, It was just enough for the big bird to slip further sideways. It fell over and momentarily disappeared from view. Half a barrel roll later, it appeared in the light, flat on it's back in the briney.

One could feel the main engines shut down as we floated away from the plane. Finally stopping adrift, probably most of half a mile away, we never lost sight of the plane in the intense light. Within a few minutes, the plane's belly hatch opened and a collective sigh of relief came over all, as the three crew members emerged onto the belly of the inverted plane.

Our plane guard Destroyer Escort quickly launched a whale boat which expertly collected the crew. They seemed unscathed, but we might expect they were a little traumatized.


Shortly, The D.E. began firing 3 inch shells. Boom!.... Boom! We got underway, and for at least 15 minutes it was Boom!...Boom! They may have been continuing firing, but we could have been out of earshot. I wondered if the gunners needed to go back to Artillery 101.

So, it was a happy ending although, sadly, there was the loss of a multi-million dollar, beautiful, graceful bird.






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
