The month of November this year will have two special events for our congregation.

The first event is our annual commemoration of Kristallnacht. This will take place on Shabbat evening, November 8 with a prelude and service beginning at 7:25 pm. This service, again, is in cooperation with our sister congregation, Pestallozzistrase Synagogue in Berlin, Germany. Their clergy—Rabbi Jonah Sievers and Kantor Isidoro Abramowicz and their

musical staff—Dr. Jakub Stefek and Dimitar Dimitrov, have given us their service and legacy which we now use each year for this remembrance service. The Jewish liturgical music of the great composer Louis Lewandowski permeates this service and was the prevailing music of the time before the WWII. Ty and I will make sure to bring the full flavor of all this through what we do during the service. This year, this service is even more poignant as antisemitism has been on the rise, as we know, and our concerns about another round of fascism taking over in the world has unfortunately become a real concern. We have invited clergy and groups to participate in this celebration from the greater Whittier environs and hope you will want to attend. This celebration will include some spoken words and reflections, great music from church and handbell choirs, and I and Aryell Cohen will be performing a liturgical piece from our tradition. A very festive and Thanksgiving themed reception will follow this event. We hope you will want to join with us and be a part of this very important community-wide showing of our solidarity!

The Jewish Calendar

<u>Moon and the Jewish Month</u> Yes there is a difference between the Lunar and solar calendars. The solar (sun) calendar is based upon the revolutions of the earth around the sun and is used by Western civilization. It is the calendar used by the United States of America. The solar year is 365 and one quarter (1/4) days. Each calendar year is a quarter of a day less than a true solar year, therefore, at the end of four calendar years, one day is added (Leap Year) to make up for the one day loss. Our Jewish people calculate their calendar according to the revolutions of the moon around the earth. A lunar is 354 days, that is 11 days less than a solar year.

<u>Problem</u> The Bible tells us that holidays of "Succos", "Pesach" and "Shavuos" are seasonal. They must occur during specific seasons of the year. As an example, let us consider the holiday of "Pesach" which occurs on the 15 day of the Hebrew month of "Nissan", correspondingly occurs on the 15 day of April of that year. The following year since the lunar is 11 days shorter than the solar, the holiday of Passover would occur 11 days earlier - the 4th of April. After a number of years Passover, instead of being a Spring holiday, would be a Winter holiday because it might occur in the middle of January. To avoid this the wise men of Israel added an extra month every second or third year. When the leap year occurs, the extra month is added right after the month of Adar. It is called "Adar Sheni", (which means the second Adar).

<u>The Moon and the Jewish People</u> Just as the moon, day after day, reveals more of itself to us, so that at the middle of the month we see it in its fullness and its beauty, so the Jewish religion from day to day reveals more of itself and is better understood by the nations of the world. One day and I pray that most of us will be present, our people will succeed in teaching the world the full significance of the Jewish way of life. On that time the Jewish religion will shine among the other religions of the world in peace.

As to my understanding of the Talmud put it this way. Just as the moon is sometimes eclipsed and can't be seen, so it is with the Jewish people in world history. However, just as the moon shines brightly the following night, so the Jewish people constantly reappear and can never be destroyed.

The moon does serve us as a reminder of our mission among the people of the world. It has given us courage to continue teaching Torah and service to G-D. For this reason the new moon has always been celebrated by Jews all over the world with song and praise to G-D.

<u>Rosh Chodesh Sabbath</u> On the Sabbath before the new moon, a special prayer is recited asking G-D to bless us with a happy and healthy new month; one devoted to Torah and good deeds. It is customary at this time to announce from the pulpit the day and hour on which the new month begins. This day is called Rosh Chodesh (the head or beginning of the new month).

<u>Sanctification</u> At the beginning of the month when the new moon appears in the heavens, it is an obligation upon all Jews to sanctify the name of G-D and praise him for his creations that illuminate the heavens. This sanctification is usually recited outside the synagogue after the evening service. It is called "Kiddush L Vonoh". It is always recited in the open air in order to see the moon shining.

<u>Rosh Chodesh</u> On the days of Rosh Chodesh the prayer "Ya'aleh V'yovo" is added to the "Shmoneh Esret" and "Halleh" (praises) is added to the service as thanksgiving and praise to G-D. Following "Hallel", the Torah scroll is taken from the Ark and read. Unlike the Sabbath and weekdays, four people are given the honor of blessing the Torah. After the Torah readings the "Musaf" service is recited as in all holidays with a special "Shmoneh Esret" for Rosh Chodesh.
