

A Puzzle for You

You like trains, or train watching, but have you ever wanted to go to an OPS (Operating Session) and run trains on someone else's



layout, but were afraid you wouldn't know what to do?

Model Railroad Operation is a fun and interesting role-playing game where the players (operators) use model trains to simulate the movements of the prototype railroad. Operators fill the roles of railroad employees like engineers, conductors, yardmasters, dispatchers, and more. Many of our SCWD members participate each month at multiple layouts to enjoy this fun and stimulating practice of critical thinking and problem solving in the context of railroad operations.

Now, there is a way for you to get your feet wet in this critical thinking and problem-solving railroad environment in the privacy of your own home through the use of railroad switching puzzles.

In July, a group of SCWD members started a project to introduce more of our members to the enjoyment of

railroad operations, or as our wives call it, playing trains. Some of us have been engaged in operating sessions for 20 years or more, and would like to get more of you involved.

The project involves getting one to solve a series of train switching puzzles (on paper, or your computer) in the least number of moves possible. You can then submit your solution to see if yours was done in the least number of moves.

Beginners can start with **3 introductory puzzles** to show the kinds of skills used in railroad switching operations. Then, you can advance to a series of more advanced puzzles written and based on actual SCWD member area layouts. Or, if you have already been to an OPS session, you could do an introductory puzzle, and jump right into the more challenging ones.

AP Corner

Since we have been quarantined almost a year ago, I have received questions about how members can still pursue their Achievement Awards. The major problem is that some categories that require merit award judging normally require in person evaluation for point scoring. This is necessary to accurately judge the quality of the modeling, which sometimes cannot be clearly seen thru photos or video. I contacted Frank Koch, NMRA Achievement Program Chair about how other regions such as Pacific Northwest, have been doing virtual evaluations. Here is his reply.

"Most Regions and Divisions are using some form of distant evaluation in these difficult times. Unfortunately, some models (motive power, cars, structures) still MAY require some form of in-person evaluation to determine if they are of Merit quality. for all the models that do not have to be of Merit quality, distant evaluation is fine. Read on to see the guidelines that all are following. In the end, you and the Region AP Manager and then me need to all agree that the models do meet the requirements, especially for those of Merit quality. I have seen a tendency for some to ignore the evaluation matrices and give inflated scores.

"The simple answer is that all the certificates can be earned using distant (virtual) evaluation under certain conditions. All certificates do have specific requirements that must be met, but they can be met in several ways. I'll go through several examples.

"First, those that require service, participation, or publication - Volunteer, Author, Official, and Dispatcher. Provide evidence that you have fulfilled the requirements and all can be done virtually except the actual service.

"Second, those that require a demonstration of skills and completion of model railroad elements - Civil, Electrical, Prototype Models (most of it) and Scenery. Written descriptions, photos, videos and the like can be used to demonstrate that the requirements have been met as long as all the elements are clearly demonstrated in a video of some sort. For prototype models, some of the models have to be separately evaluated for Merit Awards, but the overall evaluation can be done via distant evaluation."

Third, for those certificates requiring evaluations to show Merit level quality of the models - Motive Power, Cars, and Structures - distant or virtual evaluations can be done in some instances if the model is clearly way below or way above the 87.5 point mark - say outside the range of about 82-92 or so. The evaluators will use a combination of your descriptions (be extra specific when describing the various elements and be sure to cover all five areas that are evaluated), photos, and videos (via ZOOM or Go To Meeting or Skype, etc.) to evaluate the model. For models in the "not quite sure" range of 82-92, some form of in-person evaluation may still be necessary. This can be done in any number of safe ways and members have been creative in finding safe venues for evaluations - parking lots, garages, picnic tables, large rooms with no one else present, parks, etc. There is nothing that compares with actual in-person evaluations where the variables can be controlled. Certainly, for those models not requiring Merit Awards, distant evaluation can be used easily...and might even result in a Merit Award in some circumstances."

It will take more effort now to complete the applications for the modeling certificates but for Volunteer, Author and Dispatcher, you can simply complete the paperwork and send it to me with any other required documentation. I will work on getting the required witness signatures and get them submitted.

For the other awards, please let me know when you have your paperwork ready and models set to be evaluated. I will be contacting those members who can judge the models to establish our procedures and then be in contact with you with specifics.

So, use the extra time you probably have now to prepare for virtual judging and get those projects finished. Oh, I should talk. I still don't have my first car anywhere near completion so I better take my own advice. Tempus fugit.

Inside, Looking Out at a Model Train Show

Like you, I'm missing this year's Model Train Shows. So, sit back, relax, and imagine.

It begins Friday afternoon when I leave my husband and home for the weekend to spend it with "the guys." Inside my minivan are the mysterious and unusual tools of my trade. I have large plastic totes, cardboard boxes, cloth bags, a tool box with wafting scents of glue, hand-held vacuum cleaner, and a bucket. I am a woman model railroader. Three weekends a year I pack my vast array of train stuff, grab my small bright red suitcase, and leave my husband behind. I drive to convention centers in Milwaukee, Green Bay, or Madison to exhibit at Wisconsin model train shows along with a dozen or so club members.

I am a multi-scale modeler with a 4' x 8' N scale layout in my basement which continues to be a work in progress. And, I'm slowly giving up my G-scaling that was once in my Herb Garden. For my module unit I am HO all the way. Friday afternoon, at the convention center we attach our sixteen waist high two feet by six feet portable train module tables to each other. This creates a very large rectangle topped with cities, mountains, factories, military base, junk yard, road construction, lakes, coal mine, and so much more. It takes the better part of four hours for set-up. My personal module is a depiction of many small towns in Wisconsin. With its historic brick buildings, park-like town square, city park with a pond, train station, dozens of miniature people, and a seemingly burning house. There is actual smoke billowing from the burned out roof, red and orange lights flashing inside the home to simulate fire, and real water comes out of the fire hose snaking its way up a hook and ladder fire truck. Yes folks, I said "Real" water. Thus the need in my supplies for a bucket and a circulating pump. I even have the American Red Cross responding to the fire, since I have been a Red Cross disaster volunteer for over twenty years.



But that isn't what I want to talk about. I want to share what I see looking-out from the inside, as I sit perched atop my high wooden four legged bar stool peering over my module to watch passing model train enthusiasts. It's a fascinating perspective. So, let me share...

The doors of the convention center open early Saturday morning and the patiently waiting line of girls and boys, women and men, begin filing in to observe, participate, and have fun. All senses will be thoroughly engaged. Already our model trains are running, carrying their heavy loads from here to there, around and around and around.



Railroad fans arrive in clusters to observe, and imagine. I engage them by pointing out details they might find interesting. We have a "Can You Find?" sheet of paper where visitors of all ages can search the layout for details they might have missed; like the eagle circling over the hills on Al's section of the layout or the deer set in the woods of Tim's Army base. I tell the visitors "If you need help finding any of the items, just let me know, and I'll give some hints." Excited toddlers bounce like Tigger to strain up and see the excitement brought by the many flashing lights atop police cars and fire trucks. Twin girls pass by, their facial features mirroring their mother, with unicorns on chests and identical pony tails. The only discernible difference is the color of their hair tie. Speaking of hair, it's all there - Gray, blond, brown, red, black, blue, bald, long hair, short hair, big hair, and man buns. On top of heads are train engineer hats, yarmulkes, hijab, and hoodies. Ball caps are the most common and a proud way to express military service, preferred sports teams, political leaning, or favorite railroad. Ears are adorned with headsets, ear buds, headphones, and pink puffy earmuffs.

Toddlers sit on mom and dad's shoulders observing from high while they pull rhythmically on their parents' hair. Babies chew on rubber toys and blankets and teddy bears. Toddlers pull on arms to hurry and see more. Little ones reach up for a better view. I see eyebrows raised, eyes wide open with surprise. Some heads cocked with curious observation. Winter coats are carried over arms, stuffed into big purses, hanging out of back packs, and piled in red radio flyer wagons. Staff endlessly sweep up popcorn and trash. Police officers meander by with seeming disinterest.

It's a compilation of society including firefighters, and veterans. There are smiling faces, all races, with much wealth or little, many disabled and many abled. Walkers, strollers, red flyer wagons, wheelchairs, canes, scooters all pass by. Well-dressed, ragged jeans, favorite sports team on T-shirts - Packers, Marquette, UW-Madison, Green Bay, Stevens Point, and good-hearted adversaries - The Bears. Other modelers stroll past, then stop to observe. In their shirt pockets are wire cutters, strippers, rulers, nippers, pencils, and pens. And friends return to show off the joy of their purchases from the many vendors in attendance.

Old men with blank stares don't expect to see anything new to attract their interest. They've seen it all in their time. Their slow shuffling gait is suddenly halted. Backing up a step. Looking again. A slight tilt up to their lips. Is that a smile beginning to break loose? "Is that real water?" they ask incredulously. Real fire fighters analyze the scene for accuracy. They nod their head with confirmation of a job well done. With seriousness early teen girls and boys ask "How does that work?" I invite them into the inner sanctum. On their knees they crawl under the yellow plastic rope (which tries to keep curious little fingers at bay) pulling aside the black skirting that was once a bedsheet. Under the wooden base of the module, they emerge, where I show them the bucket of water, black pump intended for an outdoor water fountain, and tubing recirculating the water. The mystery is now dispelled. They leave with a better understanding of how the magic happens behind the scene, or in this case beneath my module.



There are wonderful noises surrounding me. Train whistles, a nearby lecture about making miniature trees, crackling paper cones of the Heavenly Roasted nut wrappers. Exclamations of excitement, reprimands not to touch, conversations, scratchy PA announcements, clickety-clack clickety-clack. As the day wears on crying toddlers, whining "I don't want to go" or "can we go now." A mournful low train whistle sounds with homemade bellows and organ-like pipes releasing its haunting call into the air. And, there are lots of exclamations "Wow, I love all the little details."

Oh, the smells. As varied as the people. Have you ever experienced the heavenly sweet scent of roasting nuts almonds, cashew, and pecans? There is a vendor nearby with wafting smells of warm brown sugar and melting butter or whatever magic ingredients they use. Other nearby concessions with the spicy scent of cooking brats along with the savory smell of buttery popcorn. I sit behind the smoke rising out of my model scale burning house. Filling my lungs with oily fumes, inhaled for two days. Passing by is the scent of an occasional baby diaper not yet changed.

Photographers of every skill level try to catch the realism and bring home ideas for their own train layouts or dreams of one. There are mostly phone cameras. But still, some pocket cameras, a few big cameras with tripods and fancy zoom lenses, and some have old fashioned video cams.

Jim draws a crowd at his coke plant with its many towers, catwalk, and unearthed dinosaur bones. So does Al with his moving elevator going down its shaft into a coal mine. As people crouch to peer into the mine he presses a button to activate sound calling out "Fire in the hole." Friends visit, stopping by to say hi. Looking to see if there is anything new on my module. I recognize faces of repeat visitors.

The best part of people-watching from my inside vantage point is seeing the happiness and joy of sharing a wonderful hobby with so many visitors. There are oohs and aahs over the many details that bring our scenery to life. It's the sighting of the Grim Reaper skulking in the cemetery behind the church, while a wedding party observes the miniature fire fighters at the house next door, and Bob's circus train chugs past. I look out and see dads sharing their love of model railroading with their sons. Woman showing daughters girl power. "See, this isn't just a hobby for men." Grandparents bonding with grandkids, guardians providing fun outings, scoutmasters having a teaching experience. I see a small representation of our larger world. Open to all, united together just for the fun of it. There is only one objective - To Have Fun.






