And The Speed Limit In Eagle Ridge Is Still A Robust 25 MPH

The speed limit in Eagle Ridge is 25 miles per hour, unless posted otherwise.

Those signs posted around the neighborhood that say "25" are not simply suggestions. After all, we are a neighborhood of walkers, runners, bicyclists, children and pets on leashes – on the roadways since we have no sidewalks. It's not fun to have cars speed past us as we get out and enjoy our neighborhood.

And now that school is open and school buses and their flashing lights are a fact of life on our roadways, it is more important than ever to be cognizant of our speeds and the buses that carry our children.

Time To Address Stained Driveways And Roofs

As a reminder, the Deed Of Restrictions Committee makes monthly rounds to assure that the Deed of Restrictions are being followed.

However, during the rainy summer months, the committee tends not to cite stained driveways and roofs.

In October, however, committee members plan to resume issuing notices, based on what they observe on their monthly rounds. The committee sent an email in early September to give residents advanced notice so that driveway and roof problems can be addressed before the October review.

Most times, driveways can be brought back by power washing, but sometimes driveway paint is the best solution. Painted driveways are often less susceptible to the black mildew type stain.

Several homeowners have reported good luck with a

product called Wet and Forget, which is usually available in places like Ace Hardware and Home Depot. It is best applied with a garden sprayer after power washing. It takes a while to work but seems to prevent re-staining for a longer period of time.

Stained roofs are not a good job for most homeowners and should be left to licensed contractors. They can also be cleaned by power washing, but the presently preferred method is chemical cleaning. Many contractors offer a discount when doing both roof and driveway.

Fraud Alert

Scammers Impersonating LCSO, Again!

From the Office of Lee County Sheriff Mike Scott

Scammers are once again using the name and phone number of the Lee County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) in order to steal cash from residents in what is known as "caller ID spoofing."

Over the past several days, callers to the fraud line have reported receiving suspicious calls from someone claiming to be a "sheriff's office employee" demanding they pay up or face arrest for an outstanding bench warrant.


Would-be victims say their caller ID shows the sheriff's office name and number, but they quickly realize the call is fraudulent when the imposter instructs them to purchase reloadable gift cards in the amount of \$500. According to the scammer, all monies will be returned once the "victim" shows up for a scheduled court date at the Lee County Court House.

"This scam is being used to trick the residents of Lee County into believing a lie by using fear and intimidation tactics," said Sheriff Mike Scott.

"The Lee County Sheriff's Office will never call you asking for money or threatening arrest if you don't pay up," he said. "It's also important to realize you can no longer rely on the caller ID system when determining whether a call is legitimate or not."

Residents should always be cautious when it comes to purchasing prepaid cards at the request of a stranger. Scammers love these cards because they are difficult to trace, no photo identification is needed to collect or spend the money, and you can move cash immediately off the card using the card's account number and PIN.

Local Roots Farmer's Markets Begins Ninth Season Announces New Days And Times



The weekly farmer's markets at Lakes Park and Florida SouthWestern State College will occur on a new day of the week for this coming season.

Beginning Oct. 5, the Lakes Park Farmer's Market will take place each Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. until April 26, 2017. Lakes Park is located at 7300 Gladiolus Drive in Fort Myers.

"After seven years of holding this market each Friday, the county requested we move it to Wednesdays and we were happy to be able to fulfill their request," said Betsy Ventura, who, along with Jean Baer, owns Local Roots LLC and will run the market each week.

With this change, Roots has moved their weekly FSW Farmer's Market to Fridays beginning Oct. 7 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. through April 28, 2017.

According to Ventura, this market located at 8099 College Parkway in Fort Myers will also include crafts and food trucks in addition to other green items.

Parking is free during the weekly events at both locations. "Our vendors are very excited to be returning to these South Fort Myers locations to promote their locally produced products and wares to neighboring communities," said Baer.

Ventura and Baer also operate the Bonita Springs, Coconut Point, Fenway South and Sanibel Farmer's Markets as well as two downtown Fort Myers markets – every Thursday in Centennial Park and Saturdays starting in November in Cornog Plaza.

Baer's son, Tyler, a graduate of the University of Florida

and Ventura's daughter, Sims, will be joining the duo this season to assist in managing the markets.

"It is so great that our business has grown enough to bring our kids in," Ventura said. "So many of our vendors work as a family in their small businesses, too."

She added that the goal of each of their markets is to strengthen the surrounding community by showcasing vendors that are selling produce and artisan products that are grown or produced locally. Products are packaged by owners in an environmentally friendly way and the locations of markets are clean and safe and reflect a community atmosphere.

doors and windows to enjoy the cool breeze. Burglars are also looking for those cracked and open windows as an opportunity to come in and steal your property. Remember when you are away from the house and at night to button up your house. Lock all doors. Close windows and window coverings. Close and lock garage doors both interior and outer. Put secondary locks on all windows and sliders. Set the alarm.

Button up your vehicles. In your driveway, garage or away from your house, remember to lock the vehicle doors and close the windows. Put belongings out of sight in your trunk or leave at home. Also, do not keep your vehicle keys hanging by the garage. This gives the burglar access to your vehicle.

Button up your wallet/purse. When going out keep them within your control. Remember not to carry unnecessary personal information around with you like cards with your Social Security number on it.

Button up your social media. Don't tell everyone that you are away from your house or where you will be during the day. Don't advertise your possessions and personal information. Burglars are reading your status too.

Button up your lips. Just because someone asks whether by phone, email, in a letter, or on social media does not mean you have to give them your Social Security number, date of birth, address, phone number or any other personal information unless it is necessary.

Tips From South Trail Fire And Rescue

"Don't Wait - Check the **Date! Replace Smoke Alarms** Every 10 Years" is the theme of the 2016 National Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 9 through 15. Each year the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)

selects a theme for fire prevention week

based on survey and fire incident data. Because working smoke alarms are so important and so successful at saving lives, the NFPA has chosen smoke alarm education as the theme for the past three years. This year's theme builds on the 2014 theme, Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives, Test Yours Every Month and on the 2015 theme, Hear The Beep Where You Sleep: Every Bedroom Needs A Working Smoke

The NFPA reports that three out of every five home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms (38 percent) or with no working smoke alarms (21 percent). Replacing smoke alarms in your home that are older than 10 years, i.e., installed prior to October 2006, will help ensure that your smoke alarms continue to work to provide the early warning needed to give you and your family enough time to escape a fire. Regardless of type, battery-operated or hard-wired, all smoke alarms over 10 years old should be replaced. To determine the age of a smoke alarm, check the manufacture date on the back of the alarm.

As with all electronic items, as the components age, smoke alarms will eventually fail. After 10 years, the accumulation

of dust, insects, grease, and other contaminants reduces the effectiveness of smoke alarms. Pushing the smoke alarm test button and hearing the beep ensures that the smoke alarm is powered, not that the smoke sensors are working as intended - both are essential.

An updated smoke alarm is a definite bonus for replacing smoke alarms every 10 years. Think about the last time that you replaced your computer/smartphone or your television and of all the new features you obtained. Smoke alarms, hard-wired and battery-powered, are now available with 10-year lithium batteries that last for the life of the alarm, meaning that your smoke alarm always has power and that you no longer have to climb a ladder to change chirping

As you replace your 10-year-old smoke alarms, upgrade the smoke alarm system in your home, as much as possible, to meet the fire codes for new one- and two- family homes. Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected so that when one alarm sounds, they all sound. Hard-wired smoke alarms are usually already interconnected, and wireless interconnected batteryoperated smoke alarms are also available.

Catch The Action

Good Fishing Ahead

By Captain Bill Russel

This is a refreshing time for anglers around Southwest Florida. After a long hot summer we will finally see some relief with cooler days and drop in humidity. This combination should set off good fishing opportunities as fish will be active, hungry, and on the move.

October is the month large schools of big redfish devour anything in their path across our inshore waters. Fishing will peak for the big bull reds this month as they begin their migration offshore once the first real cold fronts begin to drop down from the north. Exactly when that will be only time will tell, if the weather remains mild the big fish can entertain us throughout the entire month.

Snook of all sizes will be on the move as they transition from their summer homes around the Gulf beaches and make way towards their winter haunts throughout the inshore waters. Snook are in season, with the size slot (28 to 33 inches) that only leaves 5 inches to work with. While you may catch a lot of snook, catching one of keeper size may be another story. Snook of any size are a blast to catch and if luck is on your side you may just catch one in that legal slot if a fresh snook dinner is on your mind. If you do plan on keeping a snook, make sure you purchase a snook stamp with your fishing license.

Gag grouper is another fish that is on the move as they begin to make their way inshore as the water cools. Catching gag grouper over a shallow water inshore wreck or reef is some of the most challenging fishing you will find. They



hit like a freight train and run straight to the safety of the structure. Unlike offshore, where you fish them vertical or from straight above, inshore you are away from the structure and make a long cast, just like snook fishing. They have the advantage, you break off more big ones than you land, but it's exciting, and if you get a big one to the boat, season is

October is a month you can either target certain species of fish or be less specific and just get in the mix of a feeding frenzy and see what's there. Often a host of different species are ganged up on the same bait pod; it's common to catch a half dozen or more different species from one area. Large schools of bait are moving down the coast all month; look for bait pods both inshore and off, watch for birds. Don't be surprised if there are some larger fish lurking, it could pay to keep a heavy rod rigged and ready for that cobia, tarpon, shark, or whatever else might make a presence.

In my opinion, October is one of the best months of the year to fish our waters. We should have plenty of days with great comfortable weather, lots of hungry fish, plus the winter

crowds have not yet returned, so there's not a lot of fishing competition. That makes for a great combination.




