

Realities and questions ...

- Realities:
 - >America is a small but significant player
 - >Christians are a minority but significant group
- Pertinent questions to consider:

 - 165,600 per day!
 - 60,444,000 per year!

World population net growth

- World population: ~7,735,000,000
- World population net growth:
 - 155 every minute
 - 9300 every hour
 - 222,400 every day
 - 81,468,000 every year

Here's a fascinating look at world population:


- ✓ Note the population explosion at the bottom of the graph
- ✓ Note the race between India and China toward the end
- ✓ Note the disappearance and reappearance of the U.S.
- ✓ Note the predominance of Asian population
- ✓ Ponder how the statistics were determined
- **✓** BCE = Before Common Era (aka BC)
- √CE = Common Era (aka AD)
- ✓ Watch quickly!

U.S. Population Growth

- Population: ~330,000,000
- One birth every 8 seconds
- One death every 12 seconds
- One international immigrant every 33 seconds
- Net gain:
 - **≻One person every 13 seconds**
 - ≥60 people every hour
 - **>1,440** every day
 - >525,600 every year

- World population: 7,735,000,000

 - ➤ Roman Catholics: ~ 16% of world population: 1,200,000,000

 - >Lutherans: ~ 80 million
 - ~ 3.3% of world's Christians
 - ~ 1.1% of world's population

 More than 160 different Lutheran groups/church bodies with 80 million members:

>Europe:	~ 35 million
>Africa:	~ 24 million
≻Asia:	~ 12 million
≻North America:	~ 7 million
≻Latin America:	~ 1 million
>Australia/Oceania:	~ 50,000

Lutherans in North America

 North America: 40 different Lutheran groups and church bodies with ~ 6,000,000 members:

>LCMS:	1,900,000 members?
>WELS:	360,000 members
>LCMC:	300,000 members*

38 now defunct Lutheran groups have come and gone

LCMS in the World

- Approximately 2.4% of the world's 80 million Lutherans
- Approximately 0.1% (1/10th of one percent) of the world's 2.4 billion Christians
- Less than 0.03% (3/100th of one percent) of the world's 7.7 billion people
- Essentially, when the LCMS speaks, not many people are listening or even know we exist!

Archival Data Research: Demographics

Findings

- More Lutherans in Midwest than other regions.
- Lutheran denomination has very few non-whites.
- Two-thirds of Lutherans are married.
- Slightly more than one-fifth have been divorced.
- Two of five Lutheran attenders are parents.

Archival Data Research: Demographics

Findings

- Lutherans slightly younger than mainline attenders.
- Lutherans have a higher median income than others.
- More Lutherans have a college degree than others.
- Three of five Lutherans are female.

Archival Data Research

Theolographics

George Barna's description of "the faith variables of belief, activity, affiliation, and identity."

Archival Data Research Theolographics

Findings

One of sixteen Lutherans is an evangelical Christian:

- √ "Born Again"
- ✓ Believes that the Bible is without error
- ✓ Believes in God as described in Bible
- ✓ Believes in Satan as real being
- ✓ Believes in salvation by grace alone
- ✓ Accepts personal responsibility to share the Gospel
- ✓ Says faith is very important to daily living

Archival Data Research Theolographics

Findings

- √ 83% of Lutherans pray to God
- √ 47% of Lutherans attend church
- √ 34% of Lutherans read the Bible
- √ 28% of Lutherans volunteer at church
- √ 16% of Lutherans attend a small group
- √ 15% of Lutherans attend Sunday School

Archival Data Research

Insight

Lutherans tend to be less involved in those activities that bolster life-transforming faith.

The Lutheran Church: National Imaging and Positioning Research A National Survey of U.S Adults

Commissioned by Aid Association for Lutherans

Conducted by Barna Research Group, Ltd.

August 2000

Purpose:

To determine how the U.S. public perceives Lutherans

<u>Methodology</u>

- ✓ Barna quarterly OmniPollTM tracking study
- ✓ Nationwide sample of 1,012 U.S. adults
- √ 95% confidence level; ± 3 percentage points

Awareness

Q: Do people know there is a Lutheran church?

A: 85% of U.S. adults have heard of the Lutheran denomination.

Key Learning

30.8 million U.S. adults claim no awareness of the Lutheran Church.

Favorability

Q: Do people view the Lutheran church positively?

A: When asked to describe their perceptions of Lutheran churches, three of five people had no impression or image whatsoever.

Key Learning

The image of the Lutheran church is undefined and unimportant for most Americans.

Denominational comparison

How do people view the Lutheran Church in comparison with other Christian churches and denominations?

Denominational Comparison

27% of U.S. adults feel there is an identifiable difference between Lutheran churches and other Christian churches.

Key Learning

A substantial majority of U.S. adults do not differentiate between Lutheran churches and other Christian churches.

Attractiveness

How likely is it that a person would visit a Lutheran church when looking for a church to attend?

Attractiveness

❖ 33% of U.S. adults would definitely not visit a Lutheran church.

Attractiveness

❖ 6% of U.S. adults would only visit Lutheran churches.

Attractiveness

For 17% of U.S. adults, denomination doesn't make much difference.

Attractiveness

❖ 38% of U.S. adults would probably not visit a Lutheran church.

8 Key Learning

Two-thirds of U.S. adults are not wholly closed to the idea of attending a Lutheran church.

Insight

The Lutheran denomination has no meaningful presence in the minds of most Americans.

Overall Inference

Like other churches, Lutheranism has a relevance problem in penetrating post-modern American culture.

AAL/Barna Research

Overall Inference

The Lutheran denomination can grow ... if a sufficient number of local congregations have the will to embrace change.



What comprises this culture that's indifferent/hostile to Christianity?

- Different attitudes toward and perceptions of the church
- Different generations with differing perspectives on life
 - Different communication vehicles and practices
 - Differing ideas about sexuality and marriage
 - Economic needs, realities, and disparities

Different generations with differing perspectives on life

Different communication methods and practices

That was then ...

- Face to face visitation
- Long distance phone calls charged by the minute
- Letters sent via U.S. Mail
- Personal conversations
- Newspapers
- Telegrams
- Email

This is now ...

- Electronic communication
- Smart phones with unlimited talk, text, data
- Emails sent on computers
- Facebook
- Chrome/Instagram/Snapchat
- Linked In
- Texting/Twitter

Different ideas about sexuality and marriage

That was then ...

- Marriage was the norm
- One man, one woman
- Premarital sex was secretive
- Being openly gay was rare
- Pregnancy out of wedlock was secret and shameful
- Abortion was illegal and considered immoral

This is now ...

- Cohabitation before marriage
- Same gender marriage legal
- Open premarital sex/cohabitation
- Homosexuality is quite public
- Premarital pregnancy is common and largely accepted by public
- Abortion is legal still immoral but supported by many

"unChristian" by David Kinnaman – Barna Group - 2007

1. The church is hypocritical.

Perception: The lives of Christian people don't match their beliefs. In many ways, their lifestyles and perspectives are no different from those of anyone around them. Christians say one thing and do another.

2. The church is too focused on getting converts.

Perception: Outsiders wonder if we genuinely care about them as individuals and not just "cheeks in the seats" that represent increased numbers and nickels.

3. The church is anti-homosexual

Perception: Christians are bigoted and show disdain or contempt for gays and lesbians. Christians sometimes emphasize this sin above others and end up being far less loving to homosexual people than the faith really demands.

4. The church is sheltered from reality

Perception: Christians are thought of as old-fashioned, boring, and out of touch with reality.

5. The church is too political

Perception: Christians are overly motivated by a political agenda, representing politically conservative interests and issues. The church's gospel ends up being diluted by its political concerns.

Different attitudes and perceptions of the church

6. The church is too judgmental

Perception: Outsiders think of Christians as quick to judge others. They doubt that we really love people as we say we do.

Why aren't people coming to church today?

- Poor preaching irrelevant and non-engaging
- Ineffective worship unprofessional leadership
- Time of worship lack of flexibility and availability
- Increasing competition not the only game in town
- Song and hymn selection hard or impossible to sing
- Irrelevance of message little connection to daily living
- Sense of exclusiveness communion, clergy, church relations

Christianity without going to church?

- Worship online
- Personal Bible reading
- Intentional Christian witness
- Personal devotions and prayer
- Watch televised worship services
- Participate in a small group Bible study
- "Make music to the Lord in your heart." Eph. 5:19
- "Sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs!" Col. 3:16

Why are people coming to church today?

- Spiritual hunger and thirst are met
- Focus on and reminder of things eternal
- God's presence is discernable and palpable
- Genuine relationships are fostered and nurtured
- Sermons touch the heart and speak to real needs
- Opportunities for meaningful involvement are offered
- Worship stirs the soul and invites heartfelt participation
