

# 6 The Buzz with Rabbi B



### Temple Beth Shalom's Open Window Tradition Continues

Recently, Marketing Coordinator Ben Rosen and I started looking around at different Temples' websites, to see what types of logos they used. We found that many Temple logos have something to do with the shape or architecture of their Temple buildings. Some had artistic renderings of the name or initials of the congregation in Hebrew or English. The ones that were the most inspiring to us though, were the ones that capture some of their communities' values, the ones that demonstrated who they were through just a simple image.



The Original Window, 1977-1979

We at TBS have been fortunate that since the beginning, our Temple logo has demonstrated our values. The reason our logo features a Window dates back to the founding of our congregation in 1977. I had the benefit of meeting with many of our founding and long-time members last month, and was privileged to hear some of the wonderful stories of the early days of Temple Beth Shalom. I was reminded during that meeting, that the Open Window design of our logo was meant to show the openness and transparency of our congregation and our congregational leadership. We are an egalitarian congregation, where every person counts, every person is valued, and decisions are made not behind closed doors, but with input from every aspect of the congregation. We saw this concept demonstrated this past spring as we hired our new Assistant Rabbi, Rabbi Lenette Herzog. Rather than having just a select few determine who our next rabbi would be, the congregation was invited to meet every

candidate, and congregational opinions were weighted heavily throughout the process. It was an open and egalitarian process, reflective of our

congregation's history and values.

This past month, a number of TBSers met with a local marketing team to refresh our Temple's logo. Their assignment was to update our logo, but ensure that it continues to represent our values openness and inclusion. I think you'll be pleased with the refresh.

The Arched Window to God's Creation, 1980-2017

Just a bit of history. In December of 1977, following a split from Temple Israel, our 1980-20 congregation was founded with these same values of openness, inclusivity, and egalitarianism.

One of the founding members, Howard Byer, of blessed memory, drew the first logo for the congregation, a double-hung window. This appears on all of the "Window" newsletters from 1978-1979.

In 1980, a member who was both a dentist and an artist, Ralph Rosenblum, reimagined the Window and gave us the arched window "looking out on God's creation," that has been our logo for 37 years. You may even notice that the windows on the Bima as well as the Ark have that same arched design, reminiscent of the tablets of the Ten Commandments.



This past June, the window logo got an update, trading the mountains for trees (we don't have mountains in New Albany), making the window itself look window-ier, and writing our congregation's Hebrew name (Beit Shalom) into the grass.

As we begin looking toward 5778 and our congregation's next chapter, may we always work to maintain the egalitarian, unique, and inclusive values that made our congregation special in 1977 and that continue to make TBS the tremendous community it is today.

# 8 CHAI-er Learning with Rabbi Lenette Herzog

One of my favorite Hebrew words is Hineini, which means "here I am." However, this simple word is not just an answer to one's whereabouts, or something a student might respond to a teacher during attendance! The term Hineini has a far greater power in the Torah - in each of its eight occurrences, the one who utters Hineini is at a pivotal moment in their destiny that will not only change their lives but the course of the narrative as a whole.

The first person who says Hineini is Abraham, responding to God's call; little does he know that God is about to command him to sacrifice his son Isaac. The word is repeated when Isaac calls to his father during their travels, and again when an angel implores Abraham to stop the sacrifice at the last moment. Later in Genesis, an old, blind Isaac prepares to bless his eldest son, but does not realize that the man in front of him is Jacob, disguised as Esau. When Isaac calls to his son, Jacob responds "Hineini." Many years later Jacob will call to his own son Joseph to find Joseph's older brothers; Joseph will respond "Hineini," not knowing that the journey will take him to Egypt and altering his family's path forever. And finally, at the burning bush, an unsuspecting Moses hears God calling to him and responds "Hineini," about to learn of his mission to lead the Israelites out of slavery and into the wilderness.

I'm sure that each of us can identify "hineini moments" in our own lives: a pivotal time when we responded to another person, ourselves, or even a higher power that we were ready and present for whatever the future held.

My arrival to Temple Beth Shalom has been the most pivotal hineini moment for me to date. As soon as I moved and said "I am here," I was immediately embraced by this warm and gracious community, and you have helped me feel settled and at home. I want to thank each and every one of you for your incredible hospitality. And now, as I am thrilled to embark on this new journey as your assistant Rabbi at TBS, I am honored to say Hineini, "I am here for you." Whatever shape or form that may take, I am looking forward to being present for and with you whether it be at services, religious school, lifecycle events, or just chatting over coffee. As we finish reading the book of Numbers this week, we traditionally recite "chazak chazak v'nitchazek" - "strength, strength, and may we be strengthened." As we are called, in both big and small ways, to be present for each other and ourselves, may we all go from strength to strength together.

**Temple Finances 101** 

#### What is the Facility Upkeep/Security Fee?

This fee is assessed to every family and covers the cost to maintain our building and provide live security for temple events. Each year we look at the cost of maintaining our building (including the heating/air conditioners, plumbing, and fire system), and divide that amount by the number of families at TBS.

#### What does TAH or SAH mean on my statement?

These are billing codes that we use to categorize our membership.

TAH=Two Adult Household, and SAH=Single Adult Household.

#### Why is my statement so confusing?!

Our statement can sometimes be hard to read. Our statement only lists items that are still outstanding. Once a payment is made, the line item will disappear. As an example, once you send in your payment for the first quarter membership (dated 7/1/17), that line item will disappear from future statements. You can always call our office if you have any questions regarding your account-we are here to help.

#### Is there a fee to use my credit card?

Currently TBS does not charge an additional fee to use your credit card because we want to make your payments easy and convenient. However, it costs the temple roughly 3% to process a credit card transaction, and last year, TBS spent over \$6,000 on credit card transaction fees. Please consider using ACH, or when you make a payment with your credit card, consider donating the optional fee to help TBS offset our additional costs.

# Cantorial Corner with Gail Rose



#### Let's Pray = Let's Sing

Do you consider yourself a singer? Do you sing along when you are in services at Temple Beth Shalom? Do you choose to sing in private places, like when you are alone in the car or the shower? What part does singing play in your life?

At Temple Beth Shalom, singing is a big part of **every** service - whether it is our weekly Friday night, Saturday morning, High Holiday, holidays and festivals, and religious life-cycle events. Jewish prayer relies heavily on music because it provides the opportunity

to deepen our spiritual connection to ourselves, our community, and a higher power.

King David is credited with establishing the use of music in the Temple services. He used songs, instruments and a choir with the purpose of enhancing the spiritual mood of the sacred services. The choir was composed of 12 Levite men and 12 other Levite men who played the following instruments: Nivel (harp), Kinnor (lyre), Shofar, chatzutzera (trumpet), tof (drum), metziltayim (cymbal) paamon (bell) and halil (flute).

After the destruction of the Temple and the subsequent diaspora of the Jewish people, there was a feeling of great loss. For a very long time music was absent from prayer services to serve as a sign of mourning for the Temple.

In the diaspora, the focus of Jewish worship shifted from sacrifice to the recitation of prayer. The national literacy rate was low and most Jews had to memorize the prayers. Music was again introduced and played a key role, as it aids memorization. We do not know what the early prayer chanting sounded like, but one thing was clear, the structure and decorativeness of the music was secondary to the meaning of the words.

While prayer was ideally recited by each individual, the Talmud provided for cases of illiteracy through the institution of the shaliah tzibbur (messenger of the community). The shaliah tzibbur was to chant the liturgical texts aloud, with the intention that prayer could function for the entire congregation. The role of the shaliah tzibbur developed into the role of the hazzon (cantor) whose responsibility was not only to pray on behalf of the community, but also to sing the service with accuracy and a quality voice. This oral music preserved some of the songs of the Temple itself, but mostly echoed the tunes and modes of the country where the Jew resided.

It wasn't until the 16<sup>th</sup> century that composers started writing music for the Synagogue. The Italian composer, Salamone Rossi (1570-1630) who served as the court composer to the Duke of Mantua, published instrumental, choral, and prayers for services. His music took on the characteristics of the Italian secular madrigals and church music. It is clear that his music was used in synagogue services.

During our High Holiday Services, Temple Beth Shalom members will have the opportunity to deepen their prayers by singing (or listening to) songs of various periods of times and styles. The music will include the 19<sup>th</sup> century composers Sulzer and Lewandowski, the legendary Debbie Friedman, and contemporary Jewish composers, Aronson, Recht, and Rossio.

If you would like to deepen your understanding of the music, service and get the best seat in the house, I encourage you to participate in the TBS choir, Sharyonim.

The only requirements for choir membership are to be able to sing on pitch, attend most of the rehearsals and be present, ready to meet wonderful people, and have a great time.

Please contact me if you wish to be part of this warm and friendly chavurah (friendship group).

The rehearsals are held on Tuesday nights from 7:30 – 9:00 and begin August 15th.

# 12 Presidential Address



#### PITTSBURGH STEELERS vs. TEMPLE BETH SHALOM

No, this article is not about one of those cream-puff NFL pre-season matchups to which fans are compelled to purchase tickets if they want to attend regular season games. With apologies to Browns and Bengals fans, this article is about the many amazing similarities between two successful organizations.

The Steelers are known for their unparalleled stability when it comes to ownership and leadership. The Rooney family has controlled the team since the early 1930's. Over the last 48 years the team once known as the Pirates has only had three (3) head rabbis (i.e. Chuck Noll, Bill Cowher and Mike Tomlin).

With few exceptions TBS has shared similar good fortune since its inception in 1977. Although some in the greater Jewish community may have had names for us worse than Pirates, when it comes to ownership TBS has always prided itself as being a "bottom-up" rather than a "top-down" led congregation. TBS belongs to every member rather than we belonging to it. As far as coaches go, Howard Apothaker (now of emeritus status), Benjy Bar-Lev and Lenette Herzog have provided spiritual guidance to our roster since 1977 and we hope will continue to do so. (Please mark your calendars for Rabbi Lenettes's installation at August 25th's Shabbat and Rabbi Benjy's for the September 8th Shabbat).

The Steelers have played in Forbes Field, Pitt Stadium, Three Rivers Stadium and Heinz Field since the founding of the franchise. Home-field for Temple Beth Shalom has been in the basement of a State Savings Bank branch, Eastminster Presbyterian Church, occasional use of the main JCC and our own building at 5089 Johnstown Rd. in New Albany.

The Steelers share their stadium with the Pitt Panthers among others. TBS has welcomed Temple Israel to utilize our facilities during its transition from one E. Broad St. location to another.

The Steelers training camp has been in located in Latrobe, Pa. for many years. Since the beginning of this decade when our religious school outgrew our building, TBS's similar facility has been based out of the JCC-CJDS New Albany campus.

The Rooneys have a well-deserved reputation for being frugal operators. The TBS Board takes its responsibility for balancing the financial health of the congregation and the cost of affordable membership very seriously. Although TBS had a 2016-17 budget deficit of 1-2% (between \$9000-\$16000), the Board increased charges by only \$50 for 2017-18. Neither organization want any empty seats when events are going on.

Our very talented Board has already met in preparation for another winning "season" in 2017-18. We are looking forward to the implementation of enhanced security technology, maintenance of our building and exciting new programming initiatives for all of our members in the upcoming year. Steeler fans eat your heart out!







## The Kosher Bookworm


#### Is Superman Jewish?

The Kosher Bookworm and the Library Committee extend a hearty "Baruch HaBaa" (welcome) to Rabbi Lenette Herzog as our Assistant Rabbi and Director of Education. Rabbi Lenette confessed during her interviewing process that she has an outside of Judaism passion for anything having to do with comic book superheroes. Let it be known, up until at least now, our Library has not been a

repository for comic book literature, notwithstanding the recent (June 2, 2017 release in the USA) box office sensation of the Wonder Woman movie starring Israeli actress and model Gal Gadot-Varsano in the title role.



However, in our TBS Library collection (shelved as 798.7RIC) is the 2013 book Super Boys: The Amazing Adventures of Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster – The Creators of Superman, by Brad Ricca.
