Grade 6 Religion class has completed a chapter in which Solomon has succeeded his father, David, as the king of Israel, and will rule in a different manner than his father. They will be tested on this chapter today. **Grade 7 Religion** class has started a chapter which focuses on the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity, the Holy Spirit, in his roles of Helper and Guide in the plan of humanity's salvation.

Grade 8 Religion class has begun a chapter explaining how the abuses within the Church would lead to the Protestant Reformation.

Grade 6 Math class has finished a section on Exponents and their utility in multiplying. Following a test on this information, the class moves to a study of Prime factorization - a very useful skill.

Grade 7 Math class will be working with factors, exponents, and fractions and witnessing their utility when working in Scientific Notation.

Grade 8 Math will be graphing equations with two variables by using the y-intercept method.

Grade 6 Social Studies: our class is working on Ancient Greece. Ask your child to tell you about the geography of Greece! Ask your child to tell you the cause of the Trojan War!

Literature: we finished reading "The Runaway King". We are starting "The Shadow Throne." Book reports came out awesome!

Grade 7 has been working hard on their research papers. Ask your child, "what is your thesis?"

Grade 8 Social Studies: we have been looking at the Civil War. Ask your child to tell you about civil war photography!

Literature: We have been enjoying "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn." Ask your child, "do you think Huck is racist?"
