## A little history behind the Widmann Hotel

**C**onstruction of the Widmann Hotel was begun in the fall of 1902 on the southeast corner of 1st and Main Street in Mitchell, SD (where Casey's is now) and completed in October 1904. There were 110 sleeping rooms on the second, third and fourth floors. 30 of those had a bath! There were two stairways to each floor as well as an elevator.

The heating and lighting plants were in the basement as well as extra rooms used by business enterprises and sample rooms. Two boilers furnished steam heat and hot water to each room in the hotel. They also furnished steam for the generators. These boilers also furnished heat for the Navin Hotel across the street.

Fred Widmann was born in Wiesenberger, Germany on Oct. 1, 1846. He came to America in 1865 and eventually on to South Dakota in 1882. After tasting rather poor whiskey in several saloons he was able to buy a better whiskey and sell it for a good price. He built a building on Lawler Street and was soon making \$85 to \$100 a day. That's a lot of whiskey at 12 1/2 cents a shot. With his new-found fortune he started buying land and thought he might try farming. He didn't care about that so he went back to the

saloon business and bought lots in the city. The four lots that the hotel was on cost him a total of \$6,300.

Fred never managed the hotel himself. He always leased it out to several people and corporations over the years. For example, in 1913 one corporation paid \$595 per month for rent.

### A NEW STONE BUILDING.

**Fred Widmann Will Erect a New Building as Soon as Possible.**

One of the first new buildings for the year erected in Mitchell will be a stone structure, which is to be built by Fred Widmann on his inside lot at the corner of Main and First street. Mr. Widmann expects to commence operations on the new structure at once. It will be built of Sioux Falls granite, with dressed stone for the front, the sidewalls being left for building on either side. The dimensions of the building are 27x60 feet, and will be converted into two rooms one of which will very likely be used for a saloon and the other will be for rent. Mr. Widmann also expects to make some improvements on his Main street property by the addition of a plate glass front and a tile floor. Fred says he will have the finest saloon in the state when he gets through with his improvements.

Fred was first married around 1870 in Chicago. They had two children in 1877 and 1878 but then he divorced her about 1880. He then married Louisa Donner with whom he had six children. Louisa died in 1904 from

pneumonia. He and his son, Fred Jr., went to Germany in 1908 and while there he met and married his third wife, Mathilda Engels.

In 1906, Fred retired from business and seven years later he died at home at 400 East Third, Mitchell, SD on December 23, 1913.

The hotel is probably most famous for burning down! On April 14, 1950, a maid reported a fire on the

second floor to the desk clerk who quickly called the fire department. There were 46 guests who had to be awakened and evacuated. Fire Chief Asa Wheeler was out of town so Assistant Chief John Spry directed the firemen. With such a big building the concern was that the whole town could be destroyed. Mr. Spry called for help from thirteen towns around the area.

Eleven businesses were destroyed with the hotel with an estimated loss of \$500,000. The crowds watching the fire became very large and there are many people today who remember standing around watching it burn.

The tokens shown might have been used in the café, the bar, the cigar stand or the liquor store.



# MAKING THE CARNEGIE MORE WELCOMING — ONE SINK AT A TIME!

The Carnegie Resource Center is a treasured historic landmark in our community, built in 1903. Like many buildings of its era, it was constructed without many of the modern conveniences we rely on today. While updates have been made over the years—including the later addition of indoor plumbing—the building still lacks several amenities essential for current use.

As the Center has grown to host a wide variety of programs, meetings, events, and community gatherings, the need for additional improvements has become clear. One significant challenge is the absence of a kitchenette with a sink and running water. Currently, water must be carried in by staff or collected from the bathroom sink for basic needs such as making coffee or tea. Drinking water must be purchased in bottles, and after events, staff often take dishes and supplies home for cleaning due to the limitations of the bathroom sink.

A small kitchenette with a functional sink and cabinetry would greatly enhance the usability of the facility, improve sanitation, and provide a much better experience for the many groups and individuals who rely on the Carnegie Resource Center. This simple addition would allow us to better support community meetings, social

gatherings, educational programs, and special events—many of which involve food and beverages.

We had initially expected to secure funding for this project; however, that opportunity did not come to fruition. We are now reaching out to individuals, businesses, and organizations who value the Carnegie Resource Center and its role in our community. The total cost for the kitchenette unit and necessary plumbing is approximately \$10,000.

Thanks to the generosity of two early supporters, we currently have a \$2,000 matching grant in place—meaning your contribution can go twice as far toward making this improvement a reality.

Your support will help us preserve the historic character of the Carnegie Resource Center while ensuring it remains a functional, welcoming space for all who use it. Thank you for considering our request and for supporting the continued vitality of this important community resource.


# Carnegie Boiler Room News

*From the facilities dept.  
November 2025*

**O**n June 20, 2024, the clouds opened up and gave everyone in Mitchell an unusual amount of rain, some 9-10 inches fell over a short period.

This caused unusual flooding over most of the city causing many sump pump hoses to appear in gutters all over town. The Carnegie Resource Center was not spared as the storm drains at 3rd and Rowley could not handle the amount of water from the immediate area. This brought the flood line up to our front steps and worst of all brought some 4 feet of water into our outside stairway that leads to the boiler room.

As luck would have it, the fairly new steel door did hold but was sprung. Our sump pump had nowhere to remove the water as the yard and storm drain were flooded. This put about 18 inches of water in the boiler room, but a closed door saved the rest of the basement from this severe flooding and only let about 2-3 inches in the rest of the basement.

The 18 inches of flood water in the boiler room flooded the boiler covering the gas valve and other electronic controls. After much clean up and drying we were able to bring the old 1950 vintage boiler back to life and crossed our fingers we could make it through the winter of 2024. Our hopes were fulfilled as the boiler did make it through the winter of 2024, but we knew a replacement would have to be installed for next winter.

Quotes were requested from three trusted sources and Krohmer Plumbing was awarded the project in May of 2025. The old boiler was removed, and two new high efficiency condensing boilers were installed and ready for the winter of 2025. These two boilers are networked together so they alternately share the load unless it gets very cold then they both join the battle. From an efficiency standpoint we will have moved from a system that was 50% efficient to 96% which will save quite a lot in our utility bills from now on.

Thanks to donations and some savings we will be able to almost cover the \$45,000 cost of removal and installation but further donations will be much appreciated to return our meager savings back to where they were.

I have included two photos, one showing the before pictures of the boiler and flood line and the completed system ready for winter.

I want to thank everyone that donated to this project as it will keep us able to retain and keep the history of the Mitchell area.






↑Above: A photo of Susan Lamotte working at the Rug Company in Mitchell, SD circa 1913.

Retha Albertz has a picture of her grandparents, Deddrich and Susan Lamotte. On the back it only says Mitchell Rug Factory, but she wanted to know more. We searched our records and online and found the following... On the 1860 and 1870 census he

was living in Clinton, Iowa with his parents, Alexandre & Rosette Lamotte. By 1880 he is living with his wife, Susan Thompson and lists his occupation as well driller. By 1900 he is in Cedar County, Tipton Iowa with his wife and five children, Clara, Rosetta, Albert, Sarah and Mary Grace.


On September 4, 1906 he filed Homestead Papers for the NW1/4 11-04-20 in Stanley County, South Dakota and on October 17, 1907 an affidavit was filed by John Fischer that the quarter of land had been abandoned and he had never lived there nor improved it nor farmed or grazed it.

He is listed on the 1910 census still living in Stanley County. The 1913 Mitchell City Directory lists him and wife Susan as carpet weaver at 515 Main where they also live (probably upstairs or in the back). Daughter (Mary) Grace is also listed with the same address. On October 14, 1942 Mary Grace files for a belated birth certificate from the Iowa State Department of Health- Division of Vital Statistics.

Deddrich died in 1918 and is buried in Colorado.

Throughout our search there were different spellings, Deddrich A. Lamotte, Deed A. LaMotte, Diedrick Albert Lamotte, Deidrick A. Lamott, Dedrick A. Lamotte, Debrick Larmott, D.A. Lamotte, Deedrich Lamott, Deidrich A. LaMott, Deed A. Lamott and Deidrick A. Lamotte.
