4. Any premium check not cashed by the last day of September (Sept. 30) will be forfeited to the Tollesboro Lions Fair.
5. Each concessionaire will confine himself to the space assigned him. Failure to do so will subject him to the forfeiture of his privilege without recourse.
6. Purchasers of concessions must keep their spaces in a clean and sanitary condition and meet all requirements of the State and County Boards of Health.
7. The Fair assistants will exercise every reasonable precaution to safeguard the public, exhibitors, employees and exhibits, but positively will not be liable for death, loss, theft, damages or injuries to persons, animals or articles
8. Open classes are open to all exhibitors unless otherwise specified.
9. Entries made in 4-H, FFA, and FHA Classes must have been produced in conjunction with an approved project sponsored by these organizations.

**GENERAL RULES:**

1. All Exhibits must have been produced by the youth between September 1, 2024 – July 21, 2025.
2. All 4-H Exhibits must be made by youth living in Lewis County, KY.
3. Only ONE entry can be made per individual per class. Note: Exhibitors must choose one level in Wood Science, Geology, and Forestry.
4. Projects in each class are eligible to receive premium money and ribbons.
5. Exhibits will be displayed in the Floral Hall at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds during designated times. Lewis County Extension and the Tollesboro Lions Club are not responsible for damage to/of exhibits.
6. Kentucky State Fair entries are chosen from project entries in each category as stipulated by Kentucky State Fair Guidelines. Contact the Lewis County Extension Office for more information at 606-796-2732.
7. All projects will be entered on Tuesday, July 22 from 12pm-6pm. Project pickup is Saturday, July 26 from 8:30am-11:30am. Any projects not picked up at this time will be held at the Lewis County Extension Office until August 1, 2025.
8. Junior Division (9-13 years old as of January 1, 2025), Senior Division (14-18 years old as of January 1, 2025)

**Horticulture and Plant Science**

Exhibits judged on the quality of the primary (horticulture) project work. Youth should not use garden soil in containers. Potting soil should be used. Care will be provided for all plants. However, because of low light, air conditioning, etc., no guarantee can be made that the plants will be returned in their original condition. Plants are entered at the risk of the exhibitor. Vegetable entries should be fresh. Do not stick toothpicks in produce.

**Plant Display**

1. Terrarium (Container should be clear, enclosing the entire plant display, with or without a lid; all plants need to be actively growing.)
2. Dish Garden (desert or tropical) (container should be shallow, with container not exceeding 6 inches tall from base)

**Vegetable Displays: Presented on a white paper plate. Vegetables will not be returned to the exhibitors.**

3. Tomato, cherry (5 per plate) – must be ripe (red or yellow color only)
4. Tomato, beef steak (5 per plate)
5. Tomato, heirloom (5 per plate)
6. Peppers, hot (5 per plate)

7. Peppers, sweet (5 per plate)
8. Cucumbers, slicing (5 per plate)
9. Cucumbers, pickling (5 per plate)
10. Beans, snap or lima (12 per plate)
11. Corn, sweet (in the husk with silks) (5 per plate)
12. Squash, summer (3 per plate)
13. Potato (5 per plate)

**Largest Vegetable Displays: The largest vegetable may not be the highest quality, nevertheless, it is unique.**

14. The largest tomato (by weight), must be ripe (red or yellow color only)
15. Largest pumpkin (by weight)
16. Largest watermelon (by weight)

**Wood Science**

An exhibitor may enter only one wood science class each year.

1. Level 1, made from a kit: simple items which have pre-cut and pre-drilled parts and youth demonstrate knowledge of assembly, selection, and use of fasteners (nails, screws, and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes. Item must demonstrate skills with fasteners, sanding, and appropriate finish (no puzzles). Examples: small birdhouse, non-

- hopper bird feeder, etc.
2. Level 1, NOT from a kit: simple constructed wood item showing knowledge of hand tools, wood selection, cutting, drilling, usage of fasteners (nails, screws, and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes. Examples: napkin holder, letter holder, simple picture frame, wire wiggly, towel holder, serving tray, jewelry box, small flag holder, 4-H book ends, airplane, hurricane lamp, etc.
3. Level 2, made from a kit: more elaborate items which require proper cutting, drilling, and youth demonstrate knowledge of selection and skill in use of fasteners (nails, screws, and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes. Item must demonstrate skills with fasteners, sanding, and appropriate finish (no puzzles). Examples: Jewelry box, tool tray, large birdhouse, pine wood cars, etc.
4. Level 2, NOT from a kit: more elaborate items that demonstrate mastered skills with hand tools, basic knowledge of power hand tools, fastening options, appropriate surface preparations, and finish applications. Examples: puzzle, foot stool, revolving tie rack, 4-H key holder, cutting board, book rack, serving dish shelf, sawhorse, hopper type bird feeder, etc.

5. Level 3, NOT from a kit: Items showing a more advanced knowledge of power tools, expertise in cutting, fitting, surface preparation, attention to fastening details, and finish application. Original Designs are welcomed. The exhibit is to



be made up of two parts: 1) the item and 2) a folder containing photographic documentation of the steps taken in order to complete this exhibit. If the exhibit does not include both the item and a folder containing photographic documentation, then the exhibit will be disqualified. Examples: a multi-purpose box, corner shelf, bookshelf or laminated wood projects, garden bench, planting box, nail and tool box, shop tool rack and shelf, etc.

6.
- Level 4, NO KITS: Exhibits with a “furniture” quality finish, showing an understanding of all woodworking techniques learned in previous levels. Items must show mastery of joint construction and use of special woods and finishes. Original Designs are welcomed. The exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the item and 2) a folder containing photographic documentation of the steps taken in order to complete this exhibit. If the exhibit does not include both the item and a folder containing photographic documentation, then the exhibit will be disqualified. Examples: checker boardroom divider, coffee table, end table, chest of drawers, gun rack or cabinet, etc.

7.
- Level 5, NO KITS: Exhibits do not require a fine finish (painted finish allowable) because of practical use. Items demonstrate knowledge of all woodworking techniques learned in previous levels. Items must show a mastery of cutting, drilling, joint construction, use of special woods, and appropriate finishes. Original Designs are welcomed. The exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the item and 2) a folder containing photographic documentation of the steps taken in order to complete this exhibit. If the exhibit does not include both the item and a folder containing photographic documentation, then the exhibit will be disqualified. Examples: porch swing, chaise lounge, picnic table, lawn chair, large planters, etc.

### Foods

A member may enter up to 3 classes in the food division. Recipes: Entries are to be made using recipes specified in the class description. All recipes can be found in the **4-H Fair Recipe Book—Food in the 4-H Cooking 101-401 Series** or contact Ashley Hunt, Lewis County Extension Agent for 4-H Youth Development ([ashley.mhunt@uky.edu](mailto:ashley.mhunt@uky.edu) or 606-796-2732). Place the baked product on a disposable plate. Place the plate inside a re-closable zip-type bag to maintain freshness and prevent damage.

- One whole Double Crust Apple Pie (p. 97 and 105 of 4-H Cooking 401 or in 4-H Fair Recipe Book – Food): Leave pie in disposable pie pan and place all in zip-type plastic bag. May use spice variation if desired.

- Three Cinnamon Twists (no icing) (p. 42 and 44 in 4-H Cooking 301)

- Three Soft Pretzels (p. 48 in 4-H Cooking 301, use any one topping listed)

- One loaf Oatmeal Bread (p. 25 in 4-H Cooking 401)

### Forestry

Only one entry per exhibitor in the Forestry Division. Exhibitors must include the EXACT number of specimens listed.

1.
- First year Leaf Collection: Collection of 10 leaves representing 10 forest trees native to Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book **4-H Forestry Project Unit 1 – Introducing Yourself to Trees (Activity 1)** are to be followed.
2.
- Second year Leaf Collection: Collection of 20 leaves representing 20 forest trees native to Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book **4-H Forestry Project Unit 1 – Introducing Yourself to Trees (Activity 1)** are to be followed.
3.
- Third Year leaf Collection: Collection of 30 leaves representing 30 forest trees native to Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book **4-H Forestry Project Unit 1 – Introducing Yourself to Trees (Activity 1)** are to be followed.
4.
- Fourth year Leaf Collection: Collection of 40 leaves representing 40 forest trees native to Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book **4-H Forestry Project Unit 1 – Introducing Yourself to Trees (Activity 1)** are to be followed.
5.
- Fifth year Leaf Collection: Collection of 50 leaves representing 50 forest trees native to Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book **4-H Forestry Project Unit 1 – Introducing Yourself to Trees (Activity 1)** are to be followed.

### Geology

Only one entry per 4-H member is permitted in this division. Ideally, display boxes

a.

Should be no less than 14 inches and no more than 17 inches vertically and no less than 16 inches and no more than 24 inches horizontally to fit into KSF display cases. The depth of display boxes should be no more than 4 inches.

- b.
- Should have an acrylic type of cover (such as Plexiglas) that can be easily removed for judging.

- c.
- Hinges and locks must be flush and mounted on sides or top of boxes so boxes will sit level.

Ideally, each exhibit must be secured with a lock. Attach a key to the box with your name and county firmly attached to the key. The key will be returned to the exhibitor upon pick-up. Keep an extra key in case the Floral Hall key is misplaced. If fabric is used, use fabric glue to adhere the entire piece of fabric to box. Suggested fabrics are felt or velveteen. Rocks, minerals, and fossils should be firmly attached to the box. Boxes will be displayed on their side, not flat. Therefore, large specimens must be attached near the lower portion of the box. Rock, Mineral, and Fossil ID labels are available from Ashley Hunt, Lewis County Extension Agent for 4-H Youth Development ([ashley.mhunt@uky.edu](mailto:ashley.mhunt@uky.edu); 606-796-2732) or from the Kentucky Geological Survey website (<http://www.uky.edu/KGS/education/4H.htm>). These are the only labels acceptable.

1.
- First year geology – consisting of 15 different specimens
2.
- Second year geology - consisting of 25 different specimens (up to 12 may be from the previous project year; no more than 2 boxes)

### Needlework

Members may enter up to three classes per category. Categories are crochet, knitting, embroidery, and quilting. Items must be “handmade” by the 4-H member. Items knit with a knitting machine or loom are not permitted. If the pattern/instructions are not from the Kentucky 4-H Needlework Notebook, a copy of the pattern/instructions must be submitted with the exhibit. Label the pattern/ instructions with the entrant’s name and attach to exhibit using a safety pin or binder clip. Patterns/instructions will be returned upon pickup.

#### Crochet

1.
- Small Crochet Items made of medium (4) weight yarn – must include rows of single, half double and/or double crochet stitches. Examples: Scarf (at least 24 inches long), purse, belt, hat, pillow, two wash cloths (made from cotton yarn), or pair of slippers.
2.
- Large Crochet Items made of medium (4) weight yarn – Must include rows of single, half-double and/or double crochet stitches. Examples: afghan, shawl, or vest.

3.
- Crochet Item made entirely with novelty yarn – novelty yarn

is any yarn other than medium (4) worsted weight yard. Do not use standard medium (4) weight yarn. Must include rows of single, half double and/or double crochet stitches. Examples: scarf (at least 24 inches long), purse, belt, hat, pillow, pair of slippers, afghan, shawl, or vest.

4.
- Crocheted Item made using the Granny Square technique – May use any weight yarn, may use single or multiple colors of yarn. Examples: purse, shawl, afghan, or hat.

5.
- Crocheted Item(s) made using intermediate skills/pattern crochet stitches – Includes one or more pattern stitches – shell, arch, diamond, bobble, snapdragon, popcorn, cross, puff, cluster, or seed/granite. Can include one or more colors. Examples: scarf (at least 24 inches long), hat, belt, pair of mittens, pillow, sweater, vest, shawl, baby blanket, doily (made from bedspread (0) weight thread) or set of 5 different ornaments (made from bedspread (0) weight thread using intermediate skills/stitches).

6.
- Crochet Item using intermediate skills for shaping and fitting multiple pieces together – items must include increase and decrease, such as stuffed toys or a pair of slippers.

7.
- Item or pair of items using advanced crochet skills – includes one or more of the following advanced skills: Bead-work, filet crochet creating plaids, geometric designs or checks; making novelty crochet items.

8.
- Item or pair of items using advanced crochet skills to create your own design – original design must include a copy of directions, notes, and diagrams used to create the item(s). Examples: Multi-colored hat, purse, collar (made with bedspread-weight cotton thread), sweater, jacket, afghan, or coat.

### Hand Embroidery

All embroidery projects are to be a “finished” item. For example, the stitchery is framed or made into an item such as a pillow, wall hanging, potholder, eye glass holder, etc. The embroider design or slow stitched design can be created on a purchased item, such as a pillowcase, clothing, tote bag, purse, bib, or dishtowel. Items may be made from purchased kits that meet the individual project guidelines. The sizes mentioned in the classes below relate to the amount of stitching, not the size of the fabric, frame, or finished item.

#### One Type of Embroidery Stitch:

9.
- Redwork: Embroidery item made with a single color of floss. Redwork uses red floss. Must use the stem stitch and have an embroidered area equivalent to 3X3 inches or larger.
10.
- Stamped Cross Stitch: Cross stitched design stamped (printed/drawn) on plain woven fabric and have an embroidered area equivalent to 3X3 inches or 2X16 inch border or larger.

#### Multiple Types of Embroidery Stitches:

11.
- Stamped Embroidery: Embroidery design printed/drawn on plain woven fabric or felt. Must include three or more of the following different stitches: stem/outline, lazy daisy, running, straight, French knot, satin, blanket, chain, or back

stitch. May use more than one color of floss. Embroidered area must be equivalent to 3X3 inches or larger.

12.
- Free Embroidery: Embroidery design used to embellish a base fabric without the design being drawn on the fabric. Must include three or more of the following different stitches: stem/outline, lazy daisy, running, straight, French knot, satin, blanket, chain, or back stitch. May use more than one color of floss. Embroidered area must be equivalent to 3X3 inches or larger. Embroidery may embellish design lines on the item.

### Knitting

All items must be made by hand. No knitting machine or knitting loom items will be accepted.

13.
- Small/Simple knitted item(s): Items such as a hat, small pillow, purse, scraf, belt, or two washcloths (no larger than 10”X10” each). Use medium (4) worsted weight yarn. Wash cloths should be made from worsted weight 100% cotton yarn. Items are limited to those that include garter stitch, stockinette stitch, and/or ribbing stitch.

14.
- Knitted Item created using Self-stripping or Variegated Yarn(s): Use some yarn other than single color medium (4) worsted weight yarn. Examples: purse, scarf, hat, leg warmers, fingerless mittens, etc.

15.
- Larger/Simple knitted item or pair of items: items such as a pair of mittens, pair of slippers, shawl, cowl, or lap/baby blanket. May use yarn other than worsted weight yarn. Multiple colors and at least one pattern stitch may be used in addition to garter stitch, stockinette stitch, and/or ribbing stitch.

16.
- Knitted project focused on Shape – Garment or Fashion Accessory: Exhibit one item or pair of items using pick up stitches and/or knitting in the round. Item must include increase and/or decrease. May use yarns other than medium (4) worsted weight yarn. May include simple color changes (stripes or duplicate stitch) Examples: gloves, hat, mittens, fingerless mittens, socks, skirt, sweater, or vest.

17.
- Knitted project focused on Shape – Stuffed Toy: Exhibit of one item using pick up stitches and/or knitting in the round. Item must include increase and/or decrease. May use yarns other than medium (4) worsted weight yarn. May include simple color changes (stripes or duplicate stitch).

18.
- Knitted project focused on Color Design: Exhibit of one item or pair of items using charted designs or your own design. Charted designs may include color changes such as Fair Isle, Intarsia, and/or Mosaic knitting. All entries must include a copy of directions, notes, and any diagrams used to create the item. Examples: throw pillow, afghan (minimum size 45x60 inches), shawl, holiday stocking, purse, pair of socks, sweater, etc.

19.
- Knitted project focused on Textural Design: Exhibit of one item or pair of items using charted designs or your own design. Charted designs must include multiple pattern stitches such as Aran Isle Knitting or lace knitting. Knitting with beads is also acceptable. All entries must include a copy of the directions, notes, and any diagrams used to create the item. Examples: throw pillow, afghan (minimum size 45x60 inches), shawl, holiday stocking, purse, pair of socks,

sweater.

### Sewing

A member may enter up to three classes within their age division in the Sewing Division. Items must be “handmade.” No ready-to-wear or factory-made items will be accepted. Doll clothing does not meet the requirement for Clothing Option classes. Documentation is only required in Junior Unit VI non-clothing option, Up Cycle Jr and Sr, and Smart Clothing Jr and Sr projects.

### JUNIOR DIVISION, FOR 4-H’ERS AGES 9-13

Junior members may complete the projects in any order and may repeat a level for more than one year. The curriculum includes instructions for making “practice” items. “Practice” items do not fit in classes in the Clothing Division.

#### Unit I – Let’s Learn to Sew: Beginner Skills

1.
- Clothing Option: shorts, pants, or skirt with casing waistline (elastic and/or drawstring). Garment must be made from woven fabric and include the following: straight machine stitching, appropriate visible seam finish, and machine stitched hem.
2.
- Non-Clothing Option: Apron or Carrier Bag (i.e. Drawstring backpack, shoulder bag, tote bag, or laundry bag). The bag must include some type of handle. Item must be made from woven fabric and include the following: straight machine stitching, appropriate visible seam finish, and a casing. Machine stitched hem on apron is acceptable.

#### Unit II – Let’s Get to the Bottom: Beginner Skills

3.
- Clothing Option: Skirt, shorts or pants. Must be made from woven fabric and include the following: enclosed seams, appropriate seam finish, interfacing, zipper, and a casing or waistband.
4.
- Non-Clothing Option: Bag with zipper (i.e. tote bag/purse, garment bag, sling-type bag or duffle/gym bag) Must be made from woven fabric and include the following: enclosed seams, appropriate seam finish, interfacing, and zipper.

#### Unit III – Top It Off: Beginner Skills

5.
- Clothing Option: Shirt, simple jacket, one piece dress with no waistline, cape with a hood or collar, bathrobe, or vest with lining or facing. Garment must be made from woven fabric and include the following: buttons and buttonholes. A simple lining, trim, collar, and sleeves may be included but are not required.

6.
- Non-Clothing Option: Backpack or sports bag with lining or facing, applied trim, and button/buttonhole closure.

#### Unit IV – Stretch Your Knit Skills: Beginner



Skills

7. Stretch Your Knit Skills: 1- or 2-piece complete outfit made from knit fabric, such as a dress, top and bottom, pajamas, or nightshirt. ALL garment pieces must be made from knit fabric with a limited amount of one-way stretch. Rib knit may be included for neckband and arm/leg band trim only.

Unit V – Moving on Up: Intermediate Skills

8. Moving on Up: One-piece complete outfit made from woven fabric, such as a dress, coveralls, or jumpsuit. Item must include at least a zipper and/or buttons and buttonholes. A waistline, simple lining, trim, collar, and sleeves may be included but are not required.

Unit VI – Put it All Together

9. Clothing Option: Two- or three-piece complete coordinating outfit, such as athletic wear, dress with jacket or coat, swimwear with cover-up, jacket or shirt with slacks/skirt. At least one piece must include sleeves and a collar/hood. No simple casings. Fabric choice may be woven, knit or a combination of the two.
10. Non-Clothing Option: Download a pattern from a site of your choice for tote bag, purse, luggage, etc. Be creative with your design. Required elements include pockets, functional zipper, and creative stitchery or applied trim to personalize your bag. If bag is not lined, the seam allowances must be finished with a bound seam finish. Optional elements: linings, button(s), hook and loop tape, or snap(s). In the documentation, include your name, your county, the name of the unit, class entered, cost, and the design source.

Up Cycle It!

11. Clothing Option – item sewn from repurposed garments or household fabric goods and documentation folder. Recycled fabric is to be the major component of the item. Documentation requires your namet, your county, unit, class entered, a “before” photo of all repurposed items used; source of the fabric or garment, how the design was created, and any design drawings that were used in the creation. Place documentation in a folder or plastic sheet protector. “Deconstructed” t-shirts which do not include sewing skills do not fit this class. Items for the home do NOT fit this class. Items which do not include sewing as a major means of reconstruction are not eligible for this class.
12. Non-Clothing Option – accessories sewn from repurposed garments or household fabric goods and documentation folder. Items include tote bag, hat, luggage, purse, etc. Documentation requires your name, your county, unit, class entered, a “before” picture of all repurposed items used, source of the fabric/garment, how the design was created, and any design drawings that were used in the creation. Items for the home do not fit this class.

SENIOR DIVISION FOR 4-H’ERS, AGE 14-18

Senior members may complete the projects in any order and may repeat a level for more than one year.

Let’s Be Casual

13. Clothing Option: 1- or 2-piece complete outfit made from

knit or woven fabric such as a dress, top and bottom, romper, simple pajamas, or robe.

14. Non-Clothing Option: 2 coordinating fabric accessories from the following: apron, oven or BBQ mitt, wallet, garment bag, purse, backpack, or duffel bag.

Dress It Up

15. Dress It Up – 1 or 2 piece complete “dressy” outfit, such as a dress, suit, pantsuit, sport coat and slacks. Fabric choice may be woven, knit, or a combination of the two.

Match It Up

16. Clothing Option: Choose at least one item from each group below to make a complete 3 or 4 piece coordinated outfit –
- a. Shorts, pants, or skirt
  - b. Top, blouse, or shirt
  - c. Vest, jacket, or sweater

At least one piece is required to have regulation set in sleeves. Fabric choice may be woven, knit, or a combination of the two. An accessory item may be included as the fourth piece

17. Non-Clothing Option: 3- or 4-piece coordinating sport/ luggage/travel or fashion accessories set. Ideas include, but are not limited to, a wallet, purse, device carrier, backpack, duffel bag, gym bag or bag for bike or vehicle. Among the items chosen, the set must include the use of applied trim, pockets, and at least one zipper.

Creative Expression

18. Clothing Option: Construct a complete outfit for one of the following activities:
- a. Holiday, theater, cosplay, historic costume, uniform for medical profession, cheerleader, dancer, riding apparel.
19. Non-Clothing Option: Select one of the Following and construct a
- a. Fabric doll or animal with a wardrobe of two outfits
  - b. Creative accessories such as gauntlets, tote bag, hat, purse, etc.
  - c. Machin appliquéd specialty flag or decorative banner (minimum size 24 inches x 24 inches.)

Leisure Time

20. Clothing Option: 2- or 3-piece complete outfit. Choose from the following:
- a. Athletic wear such as yoga, cycling, warm-up, bathing suit and cover up, tennis wear, etc.
  - b. Pajamas and robe (must use specialty fabric such as terry cloth, flannel, fleece, nylon tricot)
  - c. Raincoat and hat or rain suit

Formal Affair

21. Clothing Option: 1- or 2-piece complete outfit, such as a prom dress, bridesmaid dress or tuxedo. Fabric choice may be woven, knit, or a combination of the two.

Up Cycle It

22. Clothing Option: item sewn from repurposed garments or household fabric goods and documentation folder. Recycled fabric is to be the major component of the item. Documentation requires your name, your county, unit, class entered, a “before” photo of all repurposed items used; source of the fabric or garment, how the design was created, and any design drawings that were used in the creation. Place documentation in a folder or plastic sheet protector. “Deconstructed” t-shirts which do not include sewing skills do not fit this class. Items for the home do NOT fit this class. Items which do not include sewing as a major means of reconstruction are not eligible for this class.
23. Non-Clothing Option – accessories sewn from repurposed garments or household fabric goods and documentation folder. Items include tote bag, hat, luggage, purse, etc. Documentation requires your name, your county, unit, class entered, a “before” picture of all repurposed items used, source of the fabric/garment, how the design was created, and any design drawings that were used in the creation. Items for the home do not fit this class.

Outerwear

24. Outerwear: construct an outerwear garment such as a coat, jacket, cape, vest, parka, rainwear, etc. Must include zipper and/or button/buttonhole. Must include hood, collar, or facing.

Photography

All general photography classes are taken from 4-H Photography Core Curriculum (I.e. Focus on Photography, Controlling the Image, and Mastering Photography), then the classes are organized into the Kentucky Core Curriculum.

In General Photography, 4-H’ers can enter 6 classes per year. In Horticulture a 4-H’er may enter any of the classes in addition to general photography.

ALL classes with one photograph must be mounted on WHITE 10”x16” mat board, no poster board or foam core accepted. Single photographs are limited to up to a maximum size of 8”x12”.

ALL classes with multiple photographs must be mounted on WHITE 16”x20” mat board, no poster board or foam core board accepted.

Each picture must be mounted securely, rubber cement or dry mounting tissue is recommended. Do not use photo mounting corners.

Photos, except horticulture classes, must include the following description typed on white paper or a label and placed on the back of the matt board:

- ☐ Class
- ☐ Subject
- ☐ Location

- ☐ Equipment Used (Specific Camera, if a Point and Shoot Camera, cell phone photograph, or DSLR). If using Point and Shoot or DSLR camera, please list specific Lens, Tripod, Trigger Release, Light, etc.)
- ☐ Skill Applied from 4-H Photography Curriculum with the specific page number used.

Natural Resources

1. Forest: Photograph showing a forest (large area dominated by trees) and/or forestry activities.
2. Water: Photograph showing still or moving natural water system or water activity.
3. Wildlife: Photograph showing unrestrained and live wildlife in natural habitat. Domestic animals are not permitted.
4. Natural Scenic: Photograph showing natural scene (man-made object not as subject of photograph)
5. Native Plants: 1-5 photographs of Kentucky Native Flora in natural area (not garden) – a plant that occurs naturally in the place where it evolved.
6. Insect: Photograph of insect(s) unrestrained and live in natural habitat.

Agriculture

7. Livestock: Photograph uses livestock as the main subject.
8. Crops: Photograph uses crops as main focus.
9. Life Cycle: 1-5 photographs clearly showing at least one phase of life cycle (birth, growth, death).

10. Agriculture Scenic: Landscape photograph with agriculture as the main focus.

11. Farm Equipment/Implement: Photograph with agriculture equipment/implement as main subject.

12. Companion Animal: Photograph with a companion animal as the subject.

Leadership

13. Formal/Candid Portrait: Photograph that shows a person as the main subject (A formal portrait is not a snapshot but a carefully arranged pose under effective lighting conditions and a candid photograph is a photograph captured without creating a posed appearance).

14. Uban Scenic: Landscape Photograph showing an urban setting as the main subject.

15. Event: 1-5 Photographs that are focused on a community event.

16. Service: Photograph that displays service learning (community service) as the main subject.

17. 4-H Event: 1-5 Photographs that cover a 4-H event you attended.

18. National/International: 1-5 photographs that focus on a National or International experience.

FCS

19. Family: Portrait or Candid Photograph of family members or event
20. Food Preparation: 1-5 photographs showing meal or single food item preparation.
21. Culture: Photograph showing unique perspective of local or global culture.
22. Fashion Portrait: Portrait photograph with modeled fashion as the primary subject.
23. Patterns/Design: Photograph showing natural or manmade pattern/design.
24. Residential: 1-5 photographs showing residence or residential area from inside and outside.

SET

25. Mechanics: 1-5 photographs showing the applied concept of force and energy.
26. Architecture: Photograph showing the product of planning, designing, and constructing buildings or any other structures.
27. Energy: showing the creation or expulsion of energy.
28. Movement: 1-5 photographs of object showing movement (manmade).
29. Construction: 1-5 photographs showing the steps of construction for any built structure.
30. Machinery/Equipment: Photograph showing machinery or equipment used in construction, engineering, or repair.

Health

31. Physical Activity: Photograph that shows physical activity as the main subject.
32. Competitive Sports: Photograph that shows a sport as the main subject.
33. Healthy Lifestyle: Photograph that expresses healthy lifestyles as the main subject.
34. Healthy Foods: 1-5 photographs focused on healthy food or meal choices
35. Careers in Health: 1-5 photographs that focus on careers in the health and service fields as the main focus. Examples: Fire, law, medicine, emergency, education, etc.
36. Dealing with Stress: Photograph that illustrates a hobby or interest that helps an individual reduce stress

Communications/Expressive Arts

37. Music: Photograph showing music (written or performed)
38. Instrument/Art Utensils: Still life photograph using musical instruments or art equipment as primary subject
39. Cultural Arts Event: 1-5 Photographs showing attended cultural arts event (art show, musical performance, etc.)
40. Arts Creation: 1-5 Photographs with the design, construction, and/or creation of the art as the primary subject.

41. Created Art in Your Community: 1-5 Photographs showing completed local art in your county.

42. Word(s): Single word spelled out using built or natural environment or words within the community with personal significance or meaning.

Horticultural Photography Exhibitions

Horticulture is the science, art, technology, and business concerned with intensively cultivated plants that are used by people for food, medicinal purposes, and aesthetic gratification.

Horticulture is divided into two categories:  
The cultivation of plants for food

- ☐ Pomology – deals with fruit and nut crops (not included in photography classes).

- ☐ Olericulture – deals with herbaceous plants for the kitchen, including carrots, asparagus, lettuce, cauliflower, tomatoes, and peas (included in photography classes).

Plants for ornament

- ☐ Floriculture – deals with the production of flowers and ornamental plants, generally, cut flowers, pot plants, and greenery (included in photography classes).

- ☐ Landscape Horticulture: Broad category that includes plants for the landscape, including lawn turn, but particularly nursery crops such as shrubs, trees, and climbers (not included in photography classes).

43. Single black and white. Horticultural subject or activity (max size 8”x12”).

44. Single color. Horticultural subject or activity (max size 8”x12”).

45. Sequence of 4 photographs: B&W or color representing a horticultural event or activity that tells a visual story, chronologically, without the use of words.

46. Horticulture collection. B&W or color, consisting of 6 photographs.

Arts

All classes are from Portfolio Pathways (section A), Sketchbook Crossroads (section B), and Getting Started in Art 4-H core curriculum except for Trends and Heritage Arts.

Junior: Members ages 9-13 not have to fill out an artist statement unless entering Heritage Arts.

Senior: Any member aged 14-19, must submit an artist statement.

Artist Statements are available at the Lewis County Extension Office (606)796-2732. Each Exhibitor may enter only two classes per sections A, B, and C per year. This is a max of 6 entries per year. For all classes without a specific size requirement, the



maximum size is 30”x30”.  
All items must be framed or mounted on the appropriate size matboard. Frames with glass are not permitted.  
Subject matter must be “family-friendly” in context.

- 15. Junior Clay: (pg. 55) create an item from clay. Self-hardening or firing is required.
- 16. Senior Clay: Same as Junior.

This section will highlight the latest trends in art while honoring our heritage. **Documentation of the Heritage Arts Classes in the artist statement is required for both Junior and Senior Classes!** Two entries per exhibitor per

year are allowed.

- 22. Senior Jewelry: One set (at least two items) of jewelry created by youth (Jewelry quality only). No kits or pony beads allowed. No elastic material is used to string beads. Examples: earrings and necklace or bracelet and necklace, etc.).
- 23. Junior Leather Craft: Item made from leather. May or may not be tooled. Kits allowed.
- 24. Senior Leather Craft: Item made from leather. May or may not be tooled. No kits allowed.

Heritage Arts

According to various sources, heritage can refer to practices or characteristics that are passed down through the years, from one generation to the next. Kentucky 4-H believes in celebrating one’s heritage through recognition of art that may be representative of one’s culture. Examples may include baskets, brooms, wood carvings, metal art, mini barn quilts, etc.

- 25. Junior Heritage Arts
- 26. Senior Heritage Arts.

Electric

Exhibits must be made based on the appropriate units in the 4-HCCs Electric Excitement project books. Projects entered using Snap Circuits® kits will be disqualified. One entry per exhibitor in the Electric Division. All exhibits requiring bulbs must have the correct size. Use of molded plug-ins is not prohibited but discouraged. Any electric project observed or judged to be unsafe or potentially harmful to the public or surroundings will be disqualified immediately and disabled for further use. Effective strain relief should be provided for all wire to terminal connections. Knots, clamps, connectors, or staples are acceptable when used appropriately.

Magic of Electricity (All exhibits must be DC

- powered)  
27. Battery powered series and parallel circuits (circuits must include both series and parallel, a simple switch, and can be no more than 9 volts.)
- 28. Homemade Galvanometer (must be able to detect the presence of an electrical current).

- 30. Simple Homemade DC motor (Rotor must turn under its own power.)

- 32. Original design soldered circuit project (Circuit must contain an on/off switch, a motion or tilt activated switch, a light and sound producing device and must be powered by 9 volts. All connections in the circuit must be soldered and a circuit diagram with explanation must be included.)

Wired for Power (All exhibits must be AC

and disconnected from a standard 120-volt  
duplex outlet)

- 33. Display of wire sizes and types with description and example of usage (display must contain at least 12 different examples).
- 34. Simple household or farm use circuit (Circuit must contain one single pole switch controlling one electrical load device. Circuit should be mounted on a sturdy mounting surface and free standing. The wiring should be done with Romex NM-B 12-gauge wire and clamped or stapled appropriately. A circuit diagram with an explanation must be included.)
- 35. Table, desk, vanity or floor lamp, any purpose – original design only (Pop Can Lamp kits will be disqualified).

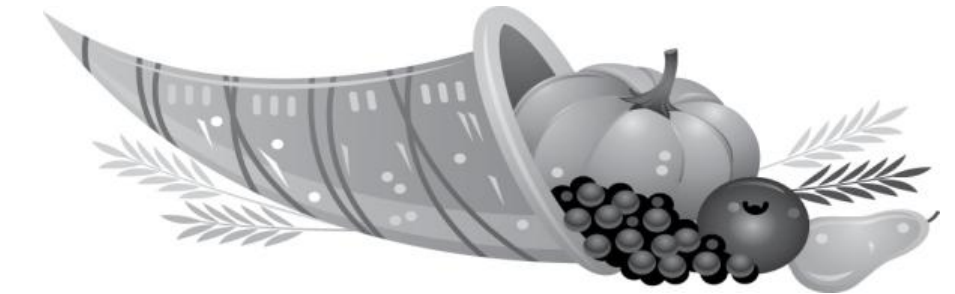

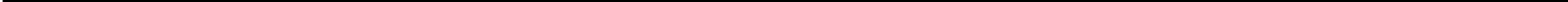
Livestock Show Rules

- 1. The show is open to bonafide 4-H and FFA members until they age out in their respective programs. 4-H members must qualify by completing the 6 hour meeting policy by the tag in dates.
- 2. All 4-H, FFA entries must be nominated and identified with tag numbers.
- 3. The Show is a blow & go show only, no use of adhesives, camouflouging agents, no use of dyes or other coloring agents to camouflage the natural coloring of an animal. The use of false tailltead or switches will be prohibited. Animals may be disqualified at the discretion of the judge or the rules committee.
- 4. All sheep and goats must be scrapies tagged.
- 5. Questions on rules will be referred to the rules committee in charge. Their decision is final. A protest must be made prior to show. Protesters must pay a \$100 non-refundable fee. DNA sampling can be fanned at the discretion of the rules committee at anytime.
- 6. Any action by participants, guardians or parent not in the best interest of the show will result in automatic disqualification from the show.
- 7. No using of ice, no beating, and no injection of fluids in any way to animals.
- 8. Exhibitors must follow the KY 4-H & FFA ownership and possession rule and have a signed form on file with their agent or advisor.
- 9. Showmanship will be determined by age as of Jan. 1, 2016. Senior showmanship classes will be ages 14 and older, Junior showmanship classes will be ages 9-13, and Novice showmanship classes win be ages 8 and under.

Steers

- 1. Steers must be halter broken and must be tied in stalls with neck ropes.
- 2. Only steers are eligible. Steers must be dehorned before weigh-in.
- 3. Steers must weigh 850-1450 lbs. at the time of show.

302 KAR 20:040. Entry into KentuckY

RELATES TO: KRS Chapter 257, 9 C.F.R. Chapter 1 parts 77, 78  
STATUTORY AUTHORITY: KRS 246.295, 257.030, 257.070, 257.550  
NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY: KRS 257.070 requires that importation of animals into Kentucky complies with administrative regulations promulgated by the board. KRS 257.030 authorizes the board to establish necessary quarantines and other measures to control the movement of animals into, through, or within KentuckyY This administrative regulation establishes health requirements for entry, including entry for sales or exhibition, for livestock and animals into KentuckyY

Section 1. General Provisions. (1) All animals entering Kentucky shall be subject to the requirements established in 302 KAR 20:020.  
(2) All animals shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) or other official movement document except for exemptions listed under each species section of this administrative regulation or 302 KAR 20:065. Examples of an official movement document shall include a way bill with a permit number or Federal Movement Form VS 9-3 or VS 1-27.  
(3) If an entry permit is required by this administrative regulation, it shall be obtained by calling OSV at (502) 564-3956, Monday through Friday, 8 AM EST to 4:30 PM EST. The permit number shall be recorded on the CVI or other required species specific document obtained pursuant to subsection (2) of this section.  
(4) If the state veterinarian determines based on an epidemiological evaluation of current disease risks that additional requirements are needed to prevent the introduction or spread of disease, the OSV shall direct a person to comply with the additional entry requirements. The notification of additional requirements shall be written or given orally and confirmed in writing.  
(5) All required tests shall be conducted by a state-federal approved laboratory as defined by 9 C.F.R. Chapter 1.  
(6) A CVI for entry shall:  
(a) Be valid for thirty (30) days from the date of issue;  
(b) Become void upon arrival at the designated destination, except for exhibition animals which may return home within thirty (30) days of the original issue date; and  
(c) State a valid destination address or PIN.

Section 2. Cattle or Other Bovine Species. (1) General requirements for entry.  
(a) Cattle or other bovine species for exhibition, breeding, or feeding purposes, or for sale purposes except as defined in paragraph (b) of this subsection shall meet the requirements established in subsections (2) and (3) of this section.  
(b) Cattle or other bovine species imported directly to a recognized slaughter center or a state-federal approved stockyard shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.  
(c) Cattle or other bovine species imported to a Kentucky premises from an out of state federally approved livestock market shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4)(d) of this section.  
(2) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and Entry Permit.  
(a) All cattle or other bovine species entering the state for sale, exhibition, breeding, or feeding purposes shall be accompanied by a valid CVI as required by 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(3)(c).  
(b) An entry permit shall be required prior to entry for all cattle or other bovine species except steers, spayed heifers, cattle or other bovine species presented for exhibition only. The permit number shall be recorded on the CVI.  
(3) Specific diseases.

- 1. Calves may be any beef breed without any daily influence.
  - 2. Calves must be born January 1- March 31, 2016.
  - 3. At fair time calves must weigh a minimum of 300 pounds and a maximum of 700 pounds.
- Hogs**
- 1. Hogs will be driven.
  - 2. Barrows and gilts are eligible.
  - 3. Hogs must weigh between 200- 280 lbs. Animals under this weight will be placed in an under weight class and those over will be placed in an overweight class.
- Lambs**
- 1. Lambs can be shown with or without halters.
  - 2. Ewes and wethers are eligible.
  - 3. Lambs must weigh at least 80 pounds and have their lamb teeth at show time Any lambs under 80 lbs. will all be put in one class designate 79 lbs. and under.
  - 4. No unsheared lambs; they also must be docked and fitted.

Goats

- 1. Horns are optional, but must be tipped. Tipped is defined as the end of the horn squared off to 1/2 inch in diameter or larger.
- 2. All goats are required to have a complete unbroken mouth and goat teeth and weigh a minimum of 40 pounds at the fair. Any animals underweight will all be placed in a class designated 39 lbs. and under. Animals are subject to be mouthed to check age.
- 3. Goats will be shown by weights.
- 4. Market kids must be clean castrated (banded or surgically removed, clamping is not allowed), and the animal must be clipped slick above the knee and hock joint (5/8 inch or less). No artificial color may be used.
- 5. Exhibitors may enter market wethers or market does. Induced cryptorchids (short scrotum kids) and buck goats may not be shown. Any wether kid showing signs of secondary sexual characteristics may not be shown.

- (a) Brucellosis.  
1. The importation of cattle or other bovine species shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 78.
- 2. Animals from class free states shall be exempt from testing.
- 3. Animals originating from a brucellosis certified herd shall be exempt from testing. The herd certification number and date of last herd test shall be indicated on the CVI.
- (b) Tuberculosis.  
1. The importation of cattle or bison shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 77.
- 2. Animals from class free states shall be exempt from testing.
- 3. Animals originating from a tuberculosis accredited herd shall be exempt from testing. The herd accreditation number and date of last herd test shall be indicated on the CVI.
- (c) Scabies. Cattle or other bovine species affected with or exposed to scabies or from an area quarantined because of scabies shall not be eligible for entry into Kentucky except:  
1. In accordance with 9 C.F.R. Part 73 of the USDA APHIS VS; and  
2. If a written permit from the State Veterinarian or an authorized representative is obtained pursuant to 9 C.F.R. Part 73.
- (d) Ticks. Cattle or other bovine species from a state-federal tick quarantined area, as defined by 9 C.F.R. Part 72, shall not be eligible for entry into Kentucky except:  
1. In accordance with 9 C.F.R. Part 72 of the USDA APHIS VS; and  
2. If a written permit from the State Veterinarian or an authorized representative is obtained pursuant to 9 C.F.R. Part 72.
- (e) John'e's Disease. The importation of cattle or other bovine species shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 80.
- (f) Other movements.  
(a) If cattle or other bovine species from a brucellosis class-free state that is also a tuberculosis class-free state move directly from a farm of origin, they may enter a state-federal approved stockyard in Kentucky without an entry permit or CVI. Those cattle or other bovine species shall meet the requirements established in paragraph (c) of this subsection.  
(b) Slaughter cattle or other bovine species. Cattle or other bovine species consigned for immediate slaughter may enter Kentucky without an official test for brucellosis or tuberculosis if the cattle or other bovine species are consigned for immediate slaughter to a recognized slaughtering center or to an approved state-federal stockyard as defined by 9 C.F.R. Part 71, for reconsignment to a recognized slaughtering center. Animals diverted en route shall be in violation of this administrative regulation.  
(c) The seller's name and address and either the animal's premises of origin or PIN shall be provided for cattle or other bovine species imported to a state-federal approved stockyard or directly to a recognized slaughtering center.  
(d) Cattle or other bovine species moving from an out of state state-federal approved stockyard shall be accompanied by a bill of sale or way bill.

Section 3. Horses or Other Equine Species. (1) General requirements for entry.  
(a) All horses or other equidae entering Kentucky for any purpose, except as provided in paragraph (b), (d), and (e) of this subsection, shall meet the requirements established in subsections (2) and (3) of this section.  
(b) Equine purchased by a licensed Kentucky dealer at an out-of-state horse sale shall:  
1. Enter the state on an entry permit;  
2.Be accompanied by a VS Form 10-11 or EIA test form verifying a negative equine infectious anemia (EIA) test within the last twelve (12) months or shall be tested for EIA within two (2) weeks of entry; or  
3. Move directly to an approved Kentucky horse sale.  
(c) Equine entering the state for racing purposes shall meet the requirements established in KAR Titles 810 and 811.  
(d) Equine moving directly to a veterinary facility in Kentucky shall be exempt from subsections (2) and (3) of this section.  
(e) Equine may be moved directly to an approved Kentucky horse sale by an out of state, nondealer owner

- from that owner's premises.
- (2) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.  
(a) A CVI shall be required for equine entering the state except as provided in subsection (1)(b) and (d) of this section and shall meet the criteria established in 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(3)(c).
- (b) Equine Interstate Event Permits from states participating with Kentucky shall:  
1. Be accepted for exhibition purposes in lieu of the CVI and EIA test report if they are within six (6) months of the issue date and there has been no change of ownership; and  
2. Meet the requirements established in 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(5).
- (3) Equine infectious anemia.  
(a) All horses or other equidae, except unweaned foals accompanied by their dam, shall be negative to a USDA official test, pursuant to 9 C.F.R. Part 75, within twelve (12) months prior to entry.  
(b) A copy of the Form VS 10-11 or EIA test form verifying a negative EIA from a laboratory approved by the USDA, pursuant to 9 C.F.R. Part 75, shall be attached to the CVI.
- (4) Approved Kentucky horse sales.  
(a) Horses or other equidae purchased by a licensed Kentucky dealer out-of-state may move directly to an approved Kentucky horse sale without proof of a negative EIA test.  
(b) All horses or other equidae presented without proof of a negative EIA test within the previous twelve (12) months shall have a blood sample drawn for EIA testing by the market veterinarian approved by the OSV pursuant to 302 KAR 20:261, at the seller's expense.

- Section 4. Swine. (1) General requirements for entry.  
(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, domestic swine for exhibition, sale, breeding, or feeding shall meet the requirements established in subsections (2) and (3) of this section.  
(b) Swine imported directly to a recognized slaughtering center or a state-federal approved slaughter-only stockyard shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.  
(c) Swine imported to a Kentucky premises from an out of state federally approved stockyard shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.  
(d) Swine listed in this paragraph shall not be imported for any purpose:  
1. Garbage fed swine;  
2. Wild, captive wild, or feral swine, Sus scrofa per definition, including Russian wild boars or Eurasian wild boars; or  
3. Swine vaccinated with Pseudorabies vaccine.- (2) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and Entry Permit.  
(a) All swine entering the state for sale except as provided in subsection (1)(b) and (c) of this section, exhibition, breeding, or feeding purposes shall be accompanied by a valid CVI as required by 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(3)(c).
- (b) An entry permit shall be required prior to entry for all swine entering for sale, breeding, or feeding purposes. An entry permit shall be required for exhibition purposes from states with less than Stage 5 Pseudorabies status. The permit number shall be recorded on the CVI.
- (3) Specific diseases.  
(a) Brucellosis. The importation of swine shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 78.
- (b) Pseudorabies. Testing shall not be required for swine imported if the swine originated from a Pseudorabies Stage 5 state. Swine originating from a state with less than Pseudorabies Stage 5 status shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 85.
- (4) Swine imported to a state-federal approved livestock market, directly to a recognized slaughtering center, or to a Kentucky premises from an out of state federally-approved stockyard shall be identified with:  
(a) Official identification in accordance with 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(2); and  
(b) The seller's name and address and either the animal's premises of origin or PIN.

- Section 5. Sheep or Lambs. (1) General requirements for entry.  
(a) Sheep or lambs for sale except as provided in paragraphs (b) and (d) of this subsection, exhibition, breeding, or feeding purposes shall meet established requirements in subsections (2) and (3) of this section.  
(b) Sheep imported directly to a state-federal approved stockyard or a recognized slaughtering center shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.  
(c) Sheep or lambs that originate from known trace, source, or infected Scrapie flocks as determined by the USDA APHIS VS in compliance with 9 C.F.R. Part 79 shall not be imported.  
(d) Sheep imported to a Kentucky premises from a state-federal approved stockyard shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.- (2) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and Entry Permit.  
(a) All sheep or lambs entering the state for sale except as provided in subsection (1)(b) and (d) of this section, exhibition, breeding, or feeding purposes shall be accompanied by a valid CVI as required by 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(3)(c).
- (b) An entry permit shall be required for sheep or lambs entering for sale, breeding, or feeding purposes.
- (3) Specific diseases.  
(a) Scrapie.  
1. All sheep shall originate from a Scrapie consistent state meeting the requirements of the USDA APHIS VS Scrapie Flock Certification Program established in 9 C.F.R. Part 79.
- 2. Sheep that require a CVI for movement shall be identified with an official USDA Scrapie Program identification tag or other official identification method and documented on a CVI.
- 3. If enrolled in the USDA Scrapie Flock Certification Program, the Scrapie Flock number shall be recorded on the CVI.
- (b) Scabies. Sheep affected with or exposed to scabies or from an area quarantined because of scabies shall not be eligible for entry into KentuckyY
- (c) Sore mouth. Any sheep or lambs showing lesions of contagious ecthyma shall not be imported.
- (d) John'e's. The importation of sheep or lambs shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 80.
- (f) Other movements.  
(a) Sheep or lambs from Scrapie consistent states may be imported into Kentucky for immediate slaughter if consigned directly to a recognized slaughtering center approved by the USDA or the State Veterinarian or to a state-federal approved stockyard or concentration point if reconsignment from that point is to immediate slaughter.  
(b) Only sheep or lambs from Scrapie consistent states may be imported to state-federal approved stockyards or state-approved concentration points for the purpose of sale.

- (c) VS Form 1-27 shall be required for movement of sheep or lambs from trace, source, or infected flocks to an approved site.
- (d) Sheep or lambs imported to state-federal approved stockyards, concentration points or directly to a recognized slaughtering center or to Kentucky premises from a state-federal approved stockyard shall be identified with:  
1. An identification in accordance with 9 C.F.R. Part 79; and  
2. The seller's name and address and either the animal's premises of origin or PIN.

Section 6. Goats. (1) General requirements for entry.  
(a) Goats entering Kentucky for sale except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, exhibition, breeding, or feeding purposes shall meet the requirements established in subsections (2) and (3) of this section.  
(b) Goats imported directly to a recognized slaughtering center, a state-federal approved stockyard, telemarketing sale, or KDA approved graded sale shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.  
(c) Goats imported to a Kentucky premises from a state-federal approved stockyard shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.  
(2) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and Entry Permit.  
(a) All goats entering the state for sale except as provided in subsection (1)(b) and (c) of this section, exhibition, breeding, or feeding purposes shall be accompanied by a valid CVI as required by 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(3)(d).- (b) An entry permit shall be required for goats entering for sale, breeding, or feeding purposes.
- (3) Specific diseases.  
(a) Scrapie.  
1. All goats shall originate from a Scrapie consistent state meeting the requirements of the USDA APHIS VS Scrapie Flock Certification Program established in 9 C.F.R. Part 79.
- 2. Goats that require a CVI for movement shall be identified with an official USDA Scrapie Program identification tag or other official animal identification in accordance with 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(2).
- (b) Brucellosis. Animals six (6) months of age or older shall have an official negative test within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate directly and immediately from a class free state or a brucellosis-certified herd.
- (c) Tuberculosis. Animals six (6) months of age or older shall have an official negative tuberculin test within sixty (60) days prior to entry or originate directly and immediately from a class free state or a tuberculosis-accredited herd.
- (d) Scabies. Goats affected with or exposed to scabies or from an area quarantined because of scabies shall not be eligible for entry into KentuckyY
- (e) John'e's. The importation of goats shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 80.
- (4) Goats of any age entering a state-federal approved Kentucky stockyard, KDA-approved graded sale, telemarketing assembly point, a Kentucky recognized slaughtering center, or a Kentucky premises from a state-federal approved stockyard shall be identified with:  
(a) An identification in accordance with 9 C.F.R. Part 79; and  
(b) The seller's name and address and either the animal's premises of origin or PIN.

- Section 7. Poultry, Farm-raised Upland Game Birds or Other Avian Species. (1) General requirements for entry.  
(a) Birds four (4) months or older for sale or exhibition purposes shall meet the requirements established in subsections (2) and (3) of this section.  
(b) Chicks or hatching eggs imported shall meet the requirements established in subsections (2) and (3)(a)2 of this section.- (c) All birds imported to an approved slaughter facility and all commercial birds moving between a company's production units shall meet the requirements established in subsections (3) and (4) of this section.
- (2) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.  
(a) All poultry shall be accompanied by:  
a. An NPPI VS Form 9-3 as specified in 9 C.F.R. Part 145 including flock number issued; or  
b. A CVI verifying a valid test date.
- (3) Specific diseases.  
(a) Salmonella pullorum.  
1. Birds four (4) months of age or older shall be negative to an official Salmonella pullorum test within thirty (30) days of entry or originate from a NPPI flock. The NPPI flock number or both the test date and the laboratory of test shall be recorded on the CVI.
- 2. Chicks or hatching eggs shall originate from NPPI flocks or a flock that satisfies the requirements of KRS 257.410.
- (b) Avian influenza. All poultry shall comply with the requirements of 302 KAR 20:250, Avian influenza.
- (4) Other movements.  
(a) Commercial birds moving between company units shall have a way bill or log sheet stating origination of birds and intended destination with flock NPPI number.
- (b) Birds going directly to an approved slaughter facility shall provide the name and address for premises of origin.

Section 8. Psittacine or Pet Birds. The entry of psittacine or pet birds shall comply with 9 C.F.R. Part 82.  
(1) General requirement for entry.  
(a) All psittacine or pet birds imported for any purpose shall meet the requirements established in subsection (2) of this section.  
(b) All psittacine or pet birds shall be identified with official identification in accordance with 302 KAR 20:020, Section 1(2).- (c) All importers of psittacine or pet birds for other than exhibition purposes shall keep records that indicate the origin and date of shipment, the name and address of the breeder, the number of birds shipped, and the name and address of the persons to whom the imported birds are sold.
- (2) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All imported psittacine or pet birds shall be accompanied by a CVI, inspected and found free of infectious and communicable diseases within fifteen (15) days immediately prior to the date of entry.



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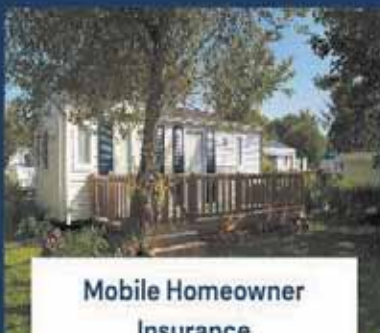
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
