A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF SOUTH VIEW, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, TO REMOVE A PARK RESERVE DESIGNATION FROM CERTAIN LANDS AND TO CONFIRM AN ENVIRONMENTAL RESERVE DESIGNATION TO CERTAIN LANDS.

WHEREAS, the Summer Village of South View ("the Municipality") is the registered owner of the lands legally described as

PLAN
2647KS
BLOCK 1
LOT P (PARK RESERVE)
CONTAINING 1.08 ACRES MORE OR LESS
EXCEPTING THEREOUT ALL MINES AND MINERAL AND
THE RIGHT TO WORK THE SAME AS SET FORTH IN
TRANSFER 7849JV
("Lot P")

AND WHEREAS, the Municipality has noted that the "Park Reserve" designation assigned to Lot P is not a recognized designation of land under the current *Municipal Government Act* ("MGA") and that the designation of Lot P most closely resembles an "Environmental Reserve" designation under the current MGA,

AND WHEREAS, the Municipality has, following lengthy investigation, determined that there may have been errors made in the boundaries of Lot P at the time of registration of the subdivision that created Lot P, such that certain lots adjacent to Lot P did not extend to the shoreline of Lake Isle, as intended. These errors resulted in the adjacent landowners constructing improvements that encroach onto Lot P and the Municipality has also levied and collected property taxes in a manner that reflects the mistaken belief that the boundaries of the certain lots extended to the shoreline of Lake Isle,

AND WHEREAS the Municipality has determined that the result of their investigations indicate "an omission, error or other defect in the certificate of title" for Lot P, and "an encroachment problem and other concerns" with respect to Lot P, within the meaning of section 676(1)(d) of the MGA,

AND WHEREAS, the Municipality may, by Bylaw made in accordance with section 676 of the MGA, change the boundaries of an Environmental Reserve in order to correct an omission, error or other defect in the certificate of title, or to rectify an encroachment problem or other concern,

AND WHEREAS, the Municipality wishes to remove the "Park Reserve" designation from Lot P in order to correct the identified problems and concerns prior to subdivision of Lot P,

AND WHEREAS, the Municipality wishes to add an "Environmental Reserve" designation to a portion of Lot P in conjunction with correcting the identified problems and concerns outlined above;


AND WHEREAS a portion of Lot P is also to be subdivided to assist with correction of the problems noted above, a copy of the intended subdivision plan for which is attached as Schedule "A",

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Summer Village of South View, in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

- 1. THAT this Bylaw may be cited as the "REMOVAL OF PARK RESERVE DESIGNATION BYLAW";
- 2. THAT the Summer Village of South View shall remove the reserve designation from all of Lot P.
- 3. THAT the Summer Village of South View shall designate Lot 6ER as identified on the intended subdivision plan at Schedule "A" as Environmental Reserve.
- 4. THAT this Bylaw shall come into force and have effect on the date of the third and final reading.

RE: LILSA Membership Drive Challenge

As lake communities, we are in a unique position and have an important role to play in the protection of our lakes and watershed; they are vital to our local economies and the long-term viability of our communities. As you are aware, the Lake Isle and Lac Ste Anne Water Quality Society (LILSA) is an organization that helps maintain and improve the quality of our lakes.

For a small organization they have the ability to have a large impact on our lakes and environment. From hosting education and training sessions to taking a lead role in the eradication of invasive species, such as flowering rush, LILSA has done a lot of work with few resources and low membership. LILSA takes on projects that help our lake communities survive and thrive, work that otherwise may not get done or fall onto municipalities to take care of. In particular, their leadership on the flowering rush infestation has been instrumental in securing GoA support and grants to help find solutions for the problem.

Alberta Beach believes that it is in our best interest to support LILSA, whenever possible. However, like all other municipalities, we are under budget constraints and know that it can be difficult to shore up funds to help. To support LILSA, Alberta Beach has offered to sell memberships at our administration office. If possible, we encourage you to do the same.

Additionally, we are challenging local municipalities to a friendly competition to see who can get the most people to sign up for LILSA memberships. Memberships are \$20 per family and allow the member to vote in the AGM. The money raised goes directly into the costs associated with running LILSA, their programs and events, and applying for grants. We propose that the membership drive competition run from May 1 to June 30. Dear South View Township,

This letter is to alert you to Bill C-68, another piece of interventionist federal legislation that will have a negative impact on your municipality, and on the property rights of your ratepayers.

Bill C-68, which is currently before the Senate, reverses changes to the Fisheries Act – changes which municipalities similar to yours requested our previous Conservative government to make.

Specifically, we amended the "HADD" provisions of the Act, (Harmful Alteration Disruption or Destruction of fish habitat).

One of the most significant problems identified by municipalities about the HADD provision was its broad application and restrictive nature, which ended up costing property taxpayers thousands of dollars, with no real or apparent benefit to the environment.

Municipalities which needed to install culverts or other flood mitigation work were in too many cases faced with negative enforcement after work was completed, with inconsistent guidance when they sought direction for compliance.

In addition to repealing our amendments, the current Federal Government has expanded the definition of "habitat," and added a new concept to the Act, "water flow."

By explicitly adding in the concept of water flow, which was not in the old legislation, the scope of offences municipalities can be charged with, have been greatly expanded.

Worst of all, rather than specifically listing what is and is not an offence under this legislation, including fines or jail, this power has been handed over to the unelected technocrats, to determine by regulation, what the penalties for non-compliance will be, after they have determined what is non-compliance.

As the longest consecutive serving Conservative MP in Ontario, representing a predominantly rural riding, I am very aware of the challenges rural and small-town municipalities have faced dealing with the Federal government.

As a part of that regulation, they are responsible for meeting the requirements for emergency advisory committees, emergency management agencies, regional collaboration, and emergency management plans by January 1, 2020.

Local Authority Emergency Management Regulation Summary

When will the Local Authority Emergency Management Regulation come into force?

The regulation will come into force on January 1, 2020. Local authorities must meet the requirements for emergency advisory committees, emergency management agencies, regional collaboration, and emergency management plans by January 1, 2020.

Specific timelines for training and exercise requirements are outlined below.

Emergency Advisory Committees

The emergency advisory committee must be appointed by bylaw, and that bylaw must at a minimum:

- Set out the purpose of the committee both during and outside emergencies.
- Establish that the committee provides guidance and direction to the emergency management agency.
- Establish procedures that must be followed when declaring a state of local emergency.
- · Identify the committee membership and chair by title or position.
- Set out a minimum meeting frequency, which must be at least once per year.
- · Outline quorum and procedural requirements for decision making, unless they are set out in another bylaw.

Emergency Management Agencies

The emergency management agency must be established by bylaw, and that bylaw must at a minimum:

- Set out the responsibilities of the agency.
- Appoint a person as the director of emergency management, or state that a person who holds a specified
 position or title is appointed as the director of emergency management by virtue of holding that title or position.
- State that the agency is responsible for the administration of the local authority's emergency management program.
- Identify how often the agency must report to the emergency advisory committee on agency activities, which
 must be at least once per year and include an update on the agency's review of the emergency plan.
- State that the command, control, and coordination system prescribed by the Managing Director will be used by the agency.
- Indicate if the agency is acting on behalf of more than one local authority, and identify these local authorities.

The Managing Director of Alberta Emergency Management Agency will prescribe a command, control, and coordination system that must be used by emergency management agencies. This system will be identified through a notice posted at aema.alberta.ca.



Regional Collaboration

- If a local authority has delegated some or all of their powers under the Emergency Management Act to a
 regional services commission or joint committee, the local authority must establish a bylaw setting out the
 powers and duties which have been delegated.
- If the local authority has delegated powers to a regional services commission, their bylaw must indicate
 whether the local authority will maintain an independent emergency management agency.
- When summer villages delegate powers and duties under the Emergency Management Act to another local authority, the local authority accepting the delegation of the summer village may delegate the powers to a council committee.
- When a summer village delegates powers and duties under the Emergency Management Act to another local authority, the summer village and the local authority must establish in bylaw which powers and duties have been delegated and accepted.

Training Requirements

Training requirements will be prescribed by the Managing Director by posting a notice at <u>aema.alberta.ca</u>. The requirements are as follows:

Elected Officials

Must complete the following course within 90 days of taking their official oath, or by January 1, 2021:

The Municipal Elected Officials Course

Directors of Emergency Management

Must complete the following courses within 18 months of being appointed, or by July 1, 2020:

- Basic Emergency Management,
- Incident Command System (ICS) 100, 200, and 300
- The Director of Emergency Management Course

Municipal Staff

Staff who have been assigned responsibilities respecting the implementation of the emergency plan must complete the following courses within six months of being identified for this role, or by January 1, 2020:

- · Basic Emergency Management
- ICS 100

The Managing Director of Alberta Emergency Management Agency may grant exemptions or extensions in some exceptional cases, and may approve alternative courses. For more information, please visit aema.alberta.ca or speak to your field officer.

Emergency Management Plans

The emergency management agency must review the emergency plan at least once per year, and make that plan available to the Alberta Emergency Management Agency for review and comment annually.

A local authority's emergency management plan must include the following:

- A description of the local authority's emergency management program.
- The procedures for implementing the plan during an emergency or exercise response.
- The local authority's plan for preparedness, response, and recovery activities.





- A hazard and risk assessment.
- Emergency management program exercises the local authority will engage in.
- The plan for regular review and maintenance of the emergency plan, and the plan for the review and maintenance of the plan after an exercise, emergency or disaster.
- How the command, control and coordination system prescribed by the Managing Director of the Alberta Emergency Management Agency will be used by the emergency management agency.
- Assignment of responsibilities respecting the implementation of the emergency plan to employees and elected officials by position.
- A training plan for staff assigned responsibilities in the emergency plan.
- The mechanisms used to prepare and maintain contact lists for those assigned responsibilities respecting implementation of the emergency plan.
- The plan for communications, public alerts, and notifications during exercises, emergencies and disasters.
- The plan for providing emergency social services during an emergency or disaster.

Emergency Management Exercises

Local Authorities must complete the following:

- A table top exercise within one year from January 1, 2020, and annually after the regulation is in force.
- A functional exercise within four years from January 1, 2020, and at least once every four years after the regulation is in force.
- Participation in a regional exercise that utilizes the local authority's emergency plan meets this requirement.
- If a community experienced an emergency or disaster in the previous four years that utilized the emergency plan and resulted in a written post-incident assessment that includes observations and recommendations for improvement and corrective action, the requirement for the conduct of a functional exercise will be met.
- Local authorities must submit an exercise notification to Alberta Emergency Management Agency 90 days before the functional exercise, which includes the exercise date, scenario, objectives and participant list.

Please accept this letter as formal communication regarding the approved 2019/2020 Municipal Requisition amounts for your Community.

As per the Lac Ste. Anne Foundation Municipal Requisition Policy;

The municipalities for which the organization provides supportive living accommodation shall be requisitioned annually based on the current year's approved budget. The total requisition shall be shared on the basis of the proportion that a municipality's equalized assessment bears to the total of the equalized assessments of all the municipalities to be requisitioned. Payments shall be made in quarterly installments the 1st banking day of January, April, July and October. Contributing Municipalities with total requisition in the annual amount less than \$20,000 shall pay on the 1st banking day of July. January and April quarterly payments will be equal to the previous year's quarterly payment. By April 1st the current year Equalized Assessment and approved current year's operating/capital deficit will be calculated and a balancing invoice will be issued.

Your total requisition amount is \$3,886.56 based on the 2019 Provincial Equalized Assessment Report and will be invoiced for payment July 1, 2019.

He is a seasoned executive-level business professional with 30 years of experience in the electric utility industry. During his career, he worked collaboratively on business and government relations initiatives on topics that ranged from operational and customer issues to regulatory matters.

ASVA Priorities

Under Mike's guidance and with the support of the ASVA Board of Directors, we will continue advocate on your behalf to ensure that the Government of Alberta and the other Municipal Associations recognize that Summer Villages are sustainable municipalities that are a well-respected, recognized level of government and stewards of our lake and river environments.

We will continue to educate the Government of Alberta on our top priorities, which are:

Municipal Sustainability Initiative (MSI) - to revise the current and future MSI funding formula so that Summer Villages receive a fair and equitable share that is consistent with all other municipalities in Alberta. Summer Villages have the same infrastructure needs as all other municipalities and currently receive only half of the base level funding that others receive.

Provincial Disturbance Standards (Boat Mooring & Dock Placement) — The Government of Alberta is responsible for the majority of lakes and lake shore. That responsibility should be delegated to the Summer Villages and other municipalities that are adjacent to a lake. We are closer to the issues and better positioned to manage them. We have proven ourselves to be lake stewards. Having that responsibility can promote harmony in a community through community based decisions.

Safe Communities – There is a need for improved policing and bylaw enforcement that meets the needs of all Summer Villages. Rural crime has increased and there is a need for an updated approach to policing and enforcement.


