

8 The Buzz with Rabbi B



Help Build Our Community through B.R.E.A.D.!

Elizabeth and Joe were going through a rough financial patch. Joe had worked for years as a contractor for a construction company that had gone bankrupt a year ago. They were able to survive on his unemployment benefits for a while, but those days were over. They couldn't stay in their house, but had access to her deceased grandfather's small house, which was in disrepair. However, the house was livable and had a big yard, but it was gloomy and dirty and small. They painted some of the interior and moved in, both of them upset the whole time.

After a few weeks, one night Elizabeth walked outside to see her daughter Kelly playing in the back yard. Kelly was busy picking dandelions that grew profusely in the yard. "I like our new house mommy," she said, "We have pretty yellow flowers in the yard. Most people just have grass." She looked around the yard beaming, "We have an apple tree and I can get one whenever I want. I hear birds singing in the trees. There are butterflies around all of our bushes, we even have a woodpecker over there! I'll bet nobody else has a woodpecker living in their yard. I think this must be the best place in the whole world to live." Just like that, Elizabeth's daughter had opened her eyes to see the blessings around her. Kids have a way of doing that – of making us see what we don't want to see. They help us get to the core of an issue and confront it.

We pray that every family should be as lucky as Elizabeth and Joe. Even though they hit a financial rough patch, they had enough family support that they had a decent place to live, even a big yard in which their daughter can play. But for many families, even right here in the Columbus area, this is not the case. According to Jim Weiker, writer for the Columbus Dispatch, last Spring a report came out estimating that 227,304 extremely low-income Ohio households cannot find housing they can comfortably afford. According to the Affordable Housing Alliance of Central Ohio, 54,000 area households live in or near poverty and are paying more than half their income for housing. We need not travel far from our front doors to see the problem is real and people are hurting. In the middle of this month, we will celebrate the holiday of Sukkot, during which we are commanded to spend most of our time outside, thinking in part, of those who have no stable roof above their heads. We will contemplate the fragility of life, and acknowledge how lucky we are to, for the rest of the year, feel secure and covered. During Sukkot we reach out of our comfort zones to think of others.

Access to affordable housing is one of the big issues that B.R.E.A.D. has been working on this past year, and continues to work on. What is B.R.E.A.D., you ask? B.R.E.A.D. is an interfaith group in Columbus, comprised of people from many different congregations, across all political backgrounds and faith traditions that comes together to help pursue justice in our community.

We learn from B.R.E.A.D.'s website, "The B.R.E.A.D. organization is comprised of many different congregations, who in turn represent many different traditions. Each of our congregations believes something different – about the nature of God and the name of God. But each of us shares a commitment to pursue justice guided by our faith – to finding, in the things that we share, the strength that unity can bring. As we begin our gathering in prayer, we invite a member of B.R.E.A.D. to offer words of prayer from the stream of their own faith tradition – recognizing that this may be different from our own tradition. We vow to respect each other – for the things we share, and for the ways that we are different.

B.R.E.A.D. uses a four-step process to bring to surface and win issues of justice:

- 1. We *listen* to our members in one-on-one meetings and "house meetings" in order to surface community problems for research and action. The listening process also serves to invite more people to become a part of the justice ministry/Rodef Tzedek (pursuers of justice) networks within congregations.
- 2. We *research* the problems to identify workable solutions.
- 3. We *gather* a large number of people, in order to show our supportive power and attract the attention of the decision-makers who can implement the solutions we are requesting.
- 4. We *follow-up* on the public commitments made by the decision-makers in order to ensure that there is action to address the problem by implementing the requested solutions.

Throughout the last decade and beyond, Temple Beth Shalom has had some years of active participation in B.R.E.A.D., and we would like to reinvigorate our congregation's involvement with the organization. We at TBS have high participation when it comes to direct service type social justice. We are great at serving in soup kitchens, collecting items in need, sitting with people who could use some company, and extending a hand to

anyone in need. B.R.E.A.D. is great because it is a way for us to deal with some of the larger systemic issues around Columbus that lead to so many other problems. According to Mark Ferenchik from the Dispatch, "At their annual assembly, B.R.E.A.D. discussed not only the housing crisis facing the community but also keeping children out of the school-to-prison pipeline, ways to connect seniors to services, and the need for a municipal identification card for poor people and others who have trouble obtaining ID." In our hyper-partisan world, B.R.E.A.D is great because it brings people together from all over the political spectrum. While we may disagree on some things, there is much that binds us all together."

There are two big events for B.R.E.A.D. this year, and I encourage you to join Rabbi Lenette, Laurel Zulliger, Sue Lazerwitz, our group of dedicated volunteers, and me at one or both of them. The first one is the **Annual Assembly on Monday, November 11 at 7pm** at Christ the King Catholic Church (2777 E. Livingston Avenue, Columbus, OH 43209). During that meeting people assembled will vote on B.R.E.A.D.'s focus area for the upcoming year. Then, in the spring on **Monday May 4, time TBA at the Celeste Center, there is the Nehemiah Action Assembly** that brings together 3,000 people dedicated to making our community stronger and more just. Details about the May event are still being planned, but stay tuned!

We hope that during this coming year, as we begin 5780, that you'll make time to do a little Tikkun Olam, to help repair our broken world. We can work together to make Columbus a better place to live for all of its residents. Let's live our Jewish values in our community! Please be in touch if you have questions.



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

Getting Involved In The New Year

As you read this article, you will most likely be reading it during the Ten Days of Awe - a time to reflect and to look at our relationships. In our Presidents' address on Rosh Hashanah, we mentioned the notion of relational Judaism - to have face -to-face meaningful relationships with other Jewish people and Judaism, to engage ourselves to find a path to

meaning and purpose, and belonging and blessing. The High Holidays are actually a reminder that Judaism calls individuals into relationship all year round.

However, we know that congregants have busy lives - working, shuttling their children to after-school activities, volunteering, working out, spending time with family and friends, and in the midst of all of this, hoping to find a moment to relax!

How do we foster sustainable relationships but not get stuck in the rut of being over-programmed? 


