

# **ADEM To Builder:** 'Cease and Desist'

Homebuilding has come to a halt in an Elberta subdivision that saw rivers of mud flowing down neighborhood streets in late August.

The Alabama Department of Environmental Management issued a cease-and-desist order to Wilkes Construction Company after complaints from neighbors made their way from Elberta City officials to the Baldwin County Commission to ADEM. According to a BCC news release, the construction is being done near County Road 20, just inside Elberta town limits. Because of that, the county commission said it has "permitting authority nor any regulatory oversight authority over the development."

I would like to introduce this call to action not as pressure on you. I am only asking for your help. It's only in greater numbers that we get the attention we need to make progress. Let's see if he wants our vote in November 2026! This gives him plenty of time to prove he works for us. Thank you.

-Reintroduce Planning Districts 22, 29 and 33 Text Amendments to local ordinances: It's been since December 5, 2023, when our Text Amendments were denied by the Baldwin County Commissioners. Please ask for our Text Amendments to our local ordinances be reintroduced by the Department of Planning and Zoning, minus any items of concern, as previously identified, as well as minus any items that have since been absorbed into the county's full ordinances. We deserve to have the same protections as other Planning Districts.

-Create a new zoning category: RSF-1.5 (21,780 sq.ft./2 homes per acre) This category is the middle ground (as an additional option) between RSF-1 and RSF-2, which is a large gap in density. RSF-1 (1.45 homes per acre), RSF-1.5 (21,780 sq.ft./2 homes per acre), RSF-2 (2.9 homes per acre)

-Create a new Activity Node around the new Elberta Middle School on County Road 83. This would allow some neighborhood businesses and housing where the zoning is currently only agricultural. It makes sense to concentrate businesses and housing near a school. Thank you for your support in improving Lillian and the surrounding area.



# From Firehouse to Splash Fest: Lillian Fire Updates

August was such an exciting and busy month for Lillian Fire Rescue, and we're grateful for all the community support that helps us keep moving forward. On August 7th, we had the privilege of hosting the Baldwin County Fire Chiefs Association Meeting at Station 2. Around 50 fire service leaders from across the county came together for an evening of collaboration and fellowship. A big thank you to Care Patrol for sponsoring the event and helping make it such a success.

Chief Cantrel continues working with the Insurance Services Office (ISO) to maintain our Class 5 certification. With the addition of our new fire engine, we are now able to send out engines and tankers from both Station 1 and Station 2. This improvement strengthens our response times and will positively support our ISO rating.

We are also rolling out a new software system

called ESO this quarter. This program will allow us to meet the new national reporting standard (NERIS) and make our operations smoother and more efficient.

August brought plenty of fun too with our first annual Splash Fest, held on August 16 in partnership with Lillian Recreational Park. Nearly 400 community members came out to enjoy the day, and it wouldn't have been possible without our dedicated volunteers. A special shout-out goes to Lucy Smith for leading the charge and bringing it all together—we can't wait to make this a yearly tradition!

Looking ahead, we invite everyone to attend the Lillian Fire Department Board's annual general membership meeting on October 6 at 6:30 p.m. at Station 2. This is a great opportunity to learn more about what's happening in your fire department and

ADEM's cease and desist order mandates the operator "immediately cease all construction, building, production, and related activity" at the site other than BMP implementation/maintenance and sediment removal/remediation. All other construction and related activity are not authorized to resume until approved in writing by ADEM."

The waters are clearing and construction workers are returning to the Moccasin Bay area. But the only job they can do is to stabilize the soil and prevent further erosion.

The order requires the construc-

tion company to take immediate action to prevent, to the maximum extent practicable, sediment and other pollutants in stormwater leaving the site and prevent unpermitted discharges of pollutants to waters of the

"Just because the water is clear doesn't mean the problem is solved, said Paul Salman, a long-time resident who has boated and fished in Moccasin Bayou for decades. Paul went on camera to air his concerns on WKRG Channel 5 TV.

When construction soil runoff seeps into waterways, it leaves them ever more shallow and destroys environments for water species. Salman isn't sure how long he'll have enough water to keep his boat afloat.

"It came to the surface, one layer with a black muck, then underneath that layer with a white clay like would come up when you move a boat," Salzman said.

Moccasin Bay neighbors say they are grateful that ADEM took action. But they don't believe the problems with the 70- acre development are over.

"I can look up and say, 'Hey, they don't care. They really truly don't care. All they care about is the almighty dollar."







# **Astronomical Events in September 2025**

Ahh, fall is almost upon us. Autumn officially begins Sept. 23 and for many, it will mean cooler temperatures – a welcome reprieve from the summer heat.

Fall also brings football, pumpkins, and a Harvest Moon to watch for in the sky. Save the date of Tuesday, Sept. 17. With a clear sky, people in the Northern Hemisphere will see a partial lunar eclipse, making the full supermoon on Sept. 17 extra super.

When only a part of the moon enters Earth's shadow, the event is called a partial lunar eclipse. Image Credit: Brad Riza

In a partial lunar eclipse, the umbra – the shadow's darkest part – "takes a bite out" of just a fraction of the Moon. The dark bite grows larger, and then recedes, never reaching the totality phase. In a total lunar eclipse, by comparison, the Earth's



full shadow falls across the face of the Moon. Learn more information about lunar eclipses <u>here</u>.

"From Huntsville, the penumbral phase will begin around 7:41 p.m., and people should start noticing a 'reddish bite' being taken out of the top part of the Moon around 9:12 p.m.," said Bill Cooke, who leads NASA's Meteoroid Environment

Office at the agency's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama. "The maximum eclipse will be at 9:44 p.m., and the partial phase will be over at 10:15 p.m.. The penumbral phase will end about an hour and a half later, at 11:47 p.m.."

The September full Moon is often called the Harvest Moon due to its association with autumn harvests in the Northern Hemisphere. So, bring on fall and the pumpkin spice. As Neil Young sang in his song "Harvest Moon" – "Let's go out and feel the night." And perhaps take a sweater. And skywatchers, grab your cameras!

Times will vary by location in the U.S., with only Alaska and Hawaii missing out on the event.

### SEPTEMBER 4-21: MOON, VENUS AND REGULUS MEET

This is a very neat conjunction of the Moon, Venus, and Regulus, with all three easily fitting within the same 10x50 binocular field of view. Venus and Regulus will appear together through binoculars from the 14th, but are closest on this date, when half a degree separates them.

Half a degree is also the diameter of the Moon's disc, and you'll get the opportunity to make a comparison this morning as the waning crescent Moon joins the pair. If you live on the East Coast, you'll see that all three are aligned, while those in time zones further west will see it to the left or lower left of Venus.

Either way, this should make for a lovely sight in binoculars and one that astrophotographers will want to capture for posterity—especially with Earthlight visible on the darkened portion of the Moon's surface. The best view will probably come about an hour before sunrise.


After the 19th, Venus and Regulus will go their separate ways and will last appear in 10x50 binoculars together on the 24th. Meanwhile, the Moon will turn new on the 21st before returning to the evening sky the following evening.

# SEPTEMBER 20-23: SATURN AND NEPTUNE AT OPPOSITION

Both Saturn and Neptune reach opposition this month, and just days apart, which can only mean one thing: the two planets are extremely close to one another in the sky. This happens once every 35 years or so and won't happen again until June 2061.

Technically, this year, Saturn and Neptune were closest in July, when just under a degree separated them. Now, with both planets at opposition and perfectly positioned for observation, the gap has widened to two and a half degrees, but that's still close enough to place them within the same field of view of many binoculars (although you may need dark skies to spot Neptune).

The two will draw closer again, and on February 20<sup>th</sup>, 2026, a little under a degree will separate them



So take a moment to enjoy the two planets together, and at their best, while you can. Opposition means that the planet is opposite the Sun in the sky, so both Saturn and Neptune will be visible throughout the night, rising at sunset and then setting at sunrise.

Saturn is at opposition first, on the 20<sup>th</sup>, with Neptune following on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Saturn will be easily visible to the naked eye as a bright, pale yellow "star" rising in the east-southeast in the evening, but you'll need binoculars or a telescope to spot faint Neptune.

# Ever Hear of This Flea? It's Small, Round and Redheaded

What's the difference between a redheaded flea beetle and a flea? One hops on you for a snack, and the other just hops! The redheaded flea beetle (RHFB), *Systena frontalis*, has been reported statewide in Alabama since the 1970s. RHFB is native to the US and is pretty much everywhere except the West. "*Frontalis*" is derived from the Latin word "frons," meaning "forehead" or "brow". "*Systena*" (where we get the word 'system' from) refers to 'systematically' grouping the same sort of things together, which are in this case beetles.

Redheaded flea beetles are small, shiny, oval shaped beetles, about 0.2 inches in length, with metallic-black colored bodies. Females are slightly larger than male beetles. RHFB adults jump when disturbed, like a flea. On the last pair of legs, the femur is wider and swollen with muscles, which is useful for jumping from plant to plant

They have red-colored heads which give them their brightly colored moniker. A pair of light-brown serrate antennae originates below the eyes. Here's a fun pest control fact for you, antennae are a Critical Piece of Information when identifying insects. Serrate antennae, like in the RHFB, look like poorly made saw teeth in a precarious, single stack line.

If you need help identifying an insect, it is useful to see as much of the bug as possible including the antennae so "lightly" squish it. Capturing it whole is much preferred! If you are using a smart phone to take a picture, ensure the image is NOT Blurry and the **Insect** fills the Entire Phone Screen! The number of times that we have seen the insect from 6 or more feet away, Oy Vey! Our eyes are getting "ahem" older and need your assistance with the best image possible!

Like all beetles, this insect is "holometabolous". This mouthful is a word for "experiences the complete life cycle of egg, larvae, pupae and adult. There is another mouth-bending word for insects who experience this process, "endopterygotes". Science. . . always making our lives . . . better?

RHFB overwinters as eggs. The larvae are small, off white, oval-ish in shape and similar in size to a pencil eraser or 5-10mm in length. The eggs and larvae can be found in the soil or potting medium while the adults feast on leaves.

These beetles have a wide range of hosts. RHFB will begin their adult lives start feeding on the freshly unfurled leaves of deciduous plants—like hydrangeas and weigela — and then move to evergreens, like hollies, later in the year. Why are hydrangeas such great listeners? Because they're always "rooting" for you! Hibiscus, salvia, and forsythia are also frequent hosts. These beetles may use weeds as a host before moving into a nursery.

The redheaded flea beetle causes an interesting pattern of damage to leaves. They do not chew entirely through the leaf, so their feeding could cause a brown spot. That brown spot could open a Pandora's Box of leaf diseases. Do you know how many plant issues begin with a brown spot? Too many! Way too many! These spots can become severe enough to prevent plants from being sold from landscape supplies or nurseries.

The adult beetles tend to seek plants with new tender growth. RHFB adults search for a plant with a high nitrogen content in the leaves. They will devour the plant until either controlled by mechanical, biological or chemical means or until the plant is defoliated or has lost all its leaves. Consuming the leaves from well-fertilized plants can improve the survival of adults or produce more offspring. Which is why the RHFB is such a serious nursery pest!

Damage to the leaves is the obvious sign of an RHFB infestation because larvae cause no noticeable signs of damage. When outbreaks occur in nurseries, producers have a limited number of options. In fact, nurseries and growers get double whamm-ied by this insect. The first effect is when they cannot sell a plant due to brown spotted leaves, the second hit is when they spend their dollars attempting to control it!


In South Alabama, damage typically continues through September and October. If they get lucky, nursery personnel or growers might see the larvae around the edge of the potting medium when a plant is pulled from the container. Most beetles are not captured until after there is significant damage to plants.





### You Can Be Adopted By God

In Ephesians 1:7-14 the Apostle Paul proclaims, "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love, he provided adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves." The Apostle Paul says that you and I, through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, have been adopted by God. As we confess our sin, receive God's grace and surrender to God will we become heirs of every good thing God has. We become God's adopted because God wants children with which to share His love. The purpose for our adoption is that we are holy and blameless in God's sight. Paul writes, "For he chose us in Him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love he provided for adoption to Sonship through Jesus Christ . . ." What a beautiful statement. In God's eyes, as he sees us through the sacrificial blood of Jesus! We look as if we have never done anything wrong. How do we get those white robes that the writer of Revelation says we will wear when we surround God's throne in glory? They are white because they have been washed in the blood of the Lamb (Rev. 7:14). Holiness is not something we earn but receive! It is bestowed upon us by God because of what Christ has done on our behalf. It is given and not earned! If you act arrogant and self-righteous, then you probably haven't received God's

free gift of Grace. If you had, you wouldn't act that way! A letter was written to a man on death row by the father of the man who was killed by the death row prisoner. The letter stated: "You are probably surprised that I, of all people, am writing a letter to you, but I ask you to read it in its entirety and consider its request seriously. As the Father of the man whom you took part in murdering, I have something very important to say to you. I forgive you with all my heart. I realize it may be hard for you to believe, but I really do. "At your trial, when you confessed to your part in the events that cost my Son his life and you asked for my forgiveness, I immediately granted you that forgiving love from my heart. I can only hope you believe me and will accept my forgiveness. I also want to make you an offer. I want you to become my adopted child. "You see, my Son who died was my only child, and I now want to share my life with you and leave my riches to you. This may not make sense to you or anyone else, but I believe you are worth the offer. I believe your life is worth redeeming. If you will receive my offer of forgiveness, not only will you be pardoned for your crime, but you will also be set free from your imprisonment, and your sentence of death will be dismissed. At that point, you will become my adopted child and heir to all my riches. "I realize this is a risky offer for me to make to you and you might be tempted to reject my offer completely, but I make it to you without reservation. Also, I realize it may seem foolish to make such an offer to one who cost my Son his life, but I now have a great love and an unchangeable forgiveness in my heart for you. "Finally, you may be concerned that once you accept my offer, you may do something to cause you to be denied your rights as an heir to my wealth. Nothing could be further from the truth. If I can forgive you for your part in my Son's death, I can forgive you for anything. I know you will never be perfect, but you do not have to be perfect to receive my offer. Besides, I believe that once you have accepted my offer and begin to experience the riches that will come to you from me, that your primary response (though not always) will be gratitude. Some would call me foolish for my offer to you, but I wish for you to call me your Father. As you read this, you are thinking – this is crazy! Perhaps it would help to know who the letter is written from and to. The letter is signed - Sincerely, God the Father of Jesus and it is addressed to you. Brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus that's what adoption is all about. We have been adopted by God to become holy and blameless in God's sight. We have a Heavenly Father who looks at us with the eyes of love. As Christians who have confessed and repented of our sin, God looks at us through the sacrifice of His one and only Son! In response to that love, we, in turn, receive His glorious adoption and gracious salvation as a redeemed follower of Christ! I pray you have surrendered your life to Jesus and allowed God to adopt you as His own. If you haven't, I pray you will today.

### Katharine Barnwell - The Heart and Soul of Perseverance

In July of 2007, Bible translators from a dozen languages were in Nigeria for a workshop to begin translating the Gospel of Luke. They gathered with a number of outside consultants—some Nigerian, others American and British. At the end of their first week, they gathered their papers, laptops and departed for the evening, eager for dinner. One of them took a small computer thumb drive which they store backups of their work. The group finished eating when a rush of men entered the house firing guns in the air. Would the men rob them and leave quickly, or do something worse? The men had come for the laptops. They took nine in all—and the translation work stored on the computers' hard drives along with passports and credit cards. When the thieves left, the project leader, Katharine Barnwell, rose from the floor. She checked with each translator to make sure they were okay. Then someone spotted something the thieves had overlooked hanging on a nail: the lanyard with the USB drive. The sole backup of their translation work.

Barnwell spoke in a matter-of-fact, British way: "Right. Well, we are not going to let this stop us." Having worked in Nigeria most of her career as a linguist with a translation ministry, Barnwell had experienced her share of brushes with danger. Six times she was robbed at gunpoint and endured multiple rounds of malaria. Barnwell wanted to press forward with the project, and after some discussion, every worker decided to stay and continue the workshop.

There was one difficulty: No computers. But on Monday, when they returned to work, they found that every laptop had been replaced. It was not the result of emails, funding requests, forms, or petitions to Western mission agencies. The computers were gifts from local Nigerian Christians.

With the thumb-drive backup, Barnwell's team quickly restored their work and picked up where they left off. They went on to finish the Gospel of Luke in each of Nigerian languages they had been working to complete.

The incident in northeast Nigeria is a freeze-frame from the great missiological shift that has been playing out over the past 50 years: the transfer of ownership from Western individuals and institutions to leaders in Africa and other parts of the world. This is how the gospel will spread in the 21st century. Local ownership is what saved the projects born from Barnwell's workshop. And it was perhaps poetic: Katharine Barnwell, a Westerner, was one of the earliest champions of empowering local people to take over translation work in their own country.

What if Mother Teresa or Billy Graham lived and worked and nobody knew their names? What if one of the church's most influential missionaries went almost unnoticed?

Meet Katharine (Katy) Barnwell. Within Bible translation, she is a legend. Outside of Bible translation, few have heard of her.

From hiding as a child from Nazi bombing raids, fleeing civil wars, and remaining calm under terrorist attacks and armed gunmen, Barnwell revolutionized the Bible translations world thus giving God's word to more people. All around the world, hundreds of millions of new believers read and hear Scripture in their own language because of Barnwell's work, books, and language training. By some estimates, almost 3,000 different Bible language translations are related to her work. She was involved in The Jesus Film Project's method of translation so hundreds of languages could be added for more viewers around the world.

Given such accomplishments, one might expect Barnwell to be arrogant or aloof, and yet those who know her best report how warm, endearing and patient she is. Her African colleagues call her Mama Katy and truly she is the mother of modern Bible translation and the mother of twenty-first-century missions.

Barnwell earned a Ph.D. in linguistics, wrote several books, lived most of her life in Nigeria and other countries around the world but now into her 80's is still living in her home country of England but not retired. "What else would I do?" Barnwell said. "Would I just sit and twiddle my thumbs? I enjoy my work, and I am glad that I can still do it. And I am very thankful that the physical problems of old age are not in my head so much as in my legs."

Years ago at a military checkpoint a soldier with automatic rifle halted the car in which Barnwell was riding. He scanned the passengers and began to

interrogate the driver. The tone was tense. The soldier bent down and scanned the passengers again. He leaned over, with his head into the window. When the soldier's eyes landed on Barnwell, his expression changed. The soldier flashed a huge smile and said, "Pray for us, Mother Katy."

It's hard to imagine that humans didn't always exist. We are fairly new creatures in the scheme of Earth's age. North America being one of the last places to have people walk on its soil for the first time. Change in the Universe, on Earth and in our everyday life is constant and sometimes epic.

Intellectually we know that change constantly occurs, we see it happening here in Lillian and vicinity in more subtle ways. For instance, just across the Lillian Bridge on the Florida side, was the Paradise Beach Hotel where now is Paradise Beach housing development.
