FROM THE TREASURER

Thanks to the Board of Directors and the Finance Committee for their help in getting next year's budget ready for the membership meeting on 11/2/24.

The budget requires that the monthly lot fee be raised from \$500 to \$510. This is due because of the large increase for the water budget which by itself should raise the rent by \$20. But due to lower real estate taxes and lower electricity costs we were able to do an offset. There will be a Help Sheet in the annual meeting packet that explains each income and expense item. Be sure to open your packet that will be delivered in October prior to the meeting so you may be ready if you have any questions.

Also note that there is a required Census Form in the packet to be completed that you can turn in at the meeting or at the office.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at the annual meeting.

September 13 is the deadline for all proposed changes/additions to by-laws and rules. Please make sure your proposed changes/additions are in the format of a rule and not just suggestions.

PLEASE MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO ATTEND THIS MEETING. If our quorum is not met, we won't be able to conduct any business that requires a vote (e.g. budgets, new board members, etc.) A quorum is two thirds of Medvil's eligible voting households, one vote per household.



Staffing for the second maintenance position has been a struggle for a long time. Don, who has been here less than two years, has

had no fewer than four people in that position. Very difficult position to fill because of the varied skills. IE: If your skill level is snowplowing and carpentry you have no liking for picking weeds for hours or picking up trash every week. The sign at the entrance has been our best method of at least attracting candidates, so the search continues as many applications are received, but few qualified based upon work and salary history. We are not alone; most businesses are finding it difficult to find quality workers.

Infrastructure issues we are addressing: Donald Drive front entrance culvert needed replacement and that is finished. This was a town mandate as the culvert was not working as intended and was about 40 years old--it's original. The water main coming in on the east side of the community has not been used to service the community for years as the west side main has been able to service the whole community, however, our not being able to use it prevents us from isolating leaks and providing service for half the community when there is an issue on the other half of the community. The system needed several repairs to make it routinely operable, which is underway. A new meter, new backflow preventer and shut offs are being installed in the next week or two and that should help as we try to isolate water leaks in the future.

As you may have heard, there is a large grant available to cooperatives across the country as part of the PRICE ACT congress passed last year. Len Stuart, Frank Boudreau and I are a committee working our way through the extensive process of applying for several million dollars for infrastructure needs with aging septic systems and aging water lines. With that application comes a fair amount of due diligence for us to qualify. One will be an income survey of our residents. This is a double-blind survey (meaning there are double precautions that no person can be identified with their survey. You will be receiving information on this, and this could mean substantial revenue for our community to save us from major repair/replacement costs in the future, saving us all rent increase to cover these costs. Our 40-year-old infrastructure is due for some updating.

Events committee request of the board was passed: 30 x 40 concrete pad for picnic area to accommodate clean area for tables and place to cover and store them in the winter. This will be paid for by your support of the events committee events each month. Our hope is that this will help keep the picnic tables from rusting out from being on the ground and we can possibly have a tent on the area for the summer to accommodate bad weather events. Again, all cost will be borne by the earnings the committee has had over the past ten years or more.





A deteriorating electric pedestal was replaced without service interruption to other homes, as was the case in the past. The plan is to again start pedestal replacements on an as-needed basis, but to be pre-emptive so as not to face issues in the winter. Pedestals on the west side are not protected as well but have lasted nearly 40 years.

This has been a very busy year so far and thanks to Don, it has gone quite seamlessly for the residents, with a lot of dedicated hard work on his part. Thanks to all of you for your patience and support as we navigated some minefields along the way. Get out and enjoy this fall weather while it is here.

A FEW WORDS FROM THE NOMINATION COMMITTEE

Every position on the board is important, and each one has an equal voice in representing the 301 homes in our community. ROC provides information and training for these positions. Please go to ROCUSA.org and register for an account. They will need your address and the name of your community, (i.e. Medvil Cooperative.) Once you have your login, go to the Rocket tab.

These are the positions that will be on the ballot at the 2024 Medvil Cooperative Annual Meeting:

You may assume you need business experience to have this role when truly what is needed is organizational and people skills. This role requires you to sit in for the President in their absence and to take on tasks assigned by the President.

Treasurer:

You may assume you need to have financial background to be our treasurer, but our financial reports, all our checks, and payroll are completed by Evergreen, our property management company. The role of the treasurer is to ensure our expenses are coded correctly, and to work with the board to develop the yearly budget. Our budget is based on the previous year's expenses with consideration of price increases, and new capital projects. The Treasurer is also the chair of The Finance Committee whose members meet monthly to review the expenses, make sure the budget is on track, and provide guidance and assistance when needed. And help from our contact at Evergreen is always just a phone call away.

Medvil's administrative assistant is always available to help with office procedures such as filing, making deposits, etc.

Director at Large:

You may think this is the role that gets you a seat at the table. It certainly can be a wonderful way to start on the board, however the officer roles do not require you to have been a director at large. In this role you have an equal vote and choosing this role means you are willing to take on tasks and projects as they come up. We have had former Directors at Large take on finance projects, quoting initiatives, and take leadership roles in committees. It's a great way to learn about Medvil and how we operate, and much more than the 'show up once a month and vote' that some residents believe it to be.

TASTY TIDBITS

The farmers' markets are loaded with lovely produce right now—vegetables and fruit galore. So to take advantage of the great variety that's available, here are a few recipes for some new things for you to try. Enjoy!

Pasta Primavera

(makes 6 servings)

Ingredients: 1 lb. penne or other short pasta 1 cup peas 3 Tbs. olive oil 1 red onion, thinly sliced 1 red bell pepper, sliced into matchsticks 2 cups bite-size broccoli florets 1 zucchini, sliced into 1/4-inch-thick half moons 1 yellow squash, sliced into 1/4-inch-thick half moons 1 Tbs. lemon zest & 3 Tbs. fresh lemon juice (from 1 lemon) 1 Tbs. unsalted butter 1 medium shallot, minced 4 garlic cloves, thinly sliced 1 cup vegetable broth 1/2 cup heavy cream 1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan, plus more for serving Salt and freshly ground black pepper Chopped fresh basil, for serving Chopped fresh parsley, for serving

Directions:

• In a large pasta pot, bring salted water to a boil. Add pasta and cook until *al dente* (according to the package directions); two minutes before the pasta is done, add the peas. Drain the pasta and peas and set aside.

• While the pasta is cooking, heat a large skillet (at least 12 inches) on medium and add the olive oil. When the oil is hot, add the red onion, red bell pepper, and broccoli. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the broccoli is slightly softened, about four minutes. Add the zucchini and yellow squash and continue cooking for three to five minutes, until all

the vegetables are tender but still crisp. Season with salt and pepper; remove the vegetables from the pan and set aside.

• Using the same pan over medium heat, add the butter, shallot, and garlic. Cook for two minutes, stirring constantly, until aromatic. Add the vegetable broth. Bring to a boil, then decrease the heat to medium. Stir in

the heavy cream, lemon zest, and lemon juice; bring to a simmer and cook until the sauce thickens slightly, four to five minutes.

• Add the reserved vegetables and pasta with peas to the skillet, stirring to combine. Add the Parmesan, stirring to combine with the sauce, coating the vegetables and pasta. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Garnish with parsley, basil, and more Parmesan as needed.

Sheet-Pan Roasted Salmon & Vegetables

(Makes 4 servings)

Ingredients: 1 lb. fingerling potatoes, halved lengthwise 2 Tbs. olive oil 5 cloves garlic, coarsely chopped 1/2 tsp. sea salt 1/2 tsp. black pepper, freshly ground 4 fresh or frozen skinless

salmon fillets, 5-6 ounces each 2 medium-size red, yellow, or orange sweet pepper, cut into rings 2 cups cherry tomatoes

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1-1/2 cups (1 bunch) fresh parsley, chopped 1/4 cup kalamata olives, pitted and halved 1/4 cup finely snipped fresh oregano or 1 Tbs. dried oregano, crushed 1 lemon

Directions:

• Preheat oven to 425°F. Place potatoes in a large bowl. Drizzle with 1 Tbs. oil and sprinkle with garlic and 1/8 tsp. salt and black pepper; toss to coat. Transfer to a large, rimmed baking sheet and cover with foil. Roast for 30 minutes.

• While the potatoes are in the oven, thaw the salmon if it's frozen.

• In the same bowl used for the potatoes, combine the sweet peppers, tomatoes, parsley, olives, oregano, and 1/8 tsp. salt and black pepper. Drizzle with remaining 1 Tbs. oil; toss to coat.

• Rinse the salmon and pat dry. sprinkle with the remaining salt and pepper. Spoon the sweet pepper mixture over the potatoes and top with the salmon. Roast, uncovered, for 10 more minutes, or just until the salmon flakes. While this cooks, zest the lemon.

• To serve, squeeze juice from the lemon over the salmon and vegetables; sprinkle with the lemon zest.

Chopped Cucumber and Tomato Salad

(Makes 6 servings)

Ingredients:

1 cup diced red onion
 2 garlic cloves, smashed to a paste with a little salt
 3 Tbs. red wine vinegar
 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil



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2 roasted sweet peppers, preferably orange or yellow, chopped
3 cups halved cherry tomatoes
3 cups chopped thin-skinned cucumber, such as Persian, skin-on, into 1/2-inch cubes
1/2 cup chopped celery hearts, plus leaves
Kosher salt and black pepper
3 Tbs. roughly chopped flat-leaf parsley
4 ounces feta or queso fresco, crumbles (about 1 cup)

Directions:

Put onion, garlic, vinegar, and olive oil in a large mixing bowl. Allow to soften for about 10 minutes.
Add roasted peppers, cherry tomatoes, cucumbers, and celery. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Toss well. Let soften for at least 20 additional minutes, tossing several times with the dressing. [Note: you can also prepare the ingredients in advance and assemble the salad up to one hour before serving.]

• To serve, toss once more and transfer to a wide bowl. Sprinkle with feta and garnish with parsley.

Strawberry Cream Cheese Tart (Makes 6-8 servings)



Ingredients:

For the Berries: 1-1/2 lbs. fresh strawberries, trimmed and halved or quartered if very large 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/4 tsp. table salt

For the Tart: 1/2 cup (4 oz.) cream cheese, softened 1 egg yolk 1 Tbs. granulated sugar 1 Tbs. fresh lemon juice 3/4 tsp. finely grated lemon zest 1 tsp. vanilla extract 1/8 tsp. table salt

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All-purpose flour (for rolling) 1 (14-18 oz.) package puff pastry, preferably albutter, thawed if frozen, but still cold

Directions:

• Preheat oven to 425°F.

• In a medium saucepan, combine strawberries, sugar, and salt. Let mixture sit for 20 minutes, tossing once or twice until the berries get a little juicy. Turn the heat to medium and cook, stirring occasionally, until they are just beginning to soften and the sugar dissolves, about 5 minutes.

• Using a slotted spoon, transfer the berries to a plate to cool. Bring the syrup back to a simmer and let it cook until it reduces by half, 3 to 7 minutes.

• In a medium bowl, use a fork or a wooden spoon to mash together the cream cheese, egg yolk, sugar, lemon juice, and zest, vanilla, and salt until smooth.

• On a lightly floured surface, roll puff pastry into a 13x11 inch rectangle about 1/8-inch thick. Transfer dough to a pre-heated parchment-lined baking pan. With a sharp knife, score a 1-inch border along the edges of the puff pastry (be careful not to cut all the way through!)

• Spread the cream cheese mixture evenly inside the scored border. Arrange the strawberries on top in a single layer.

• Bake until the pastry is puffed and golden, about 22 to 30 minutes. Transfer pan to a wire rack to cool for at least 20 minutes or up to 8 hours before serving.

• Right before serving, gently brush some of the reduced syrup over the fruit and crust to add shine and more strawberry flavor. Serve the remaining syrup as a sauce to drizzle on top of the tart or save to serve over yogurt or ice cream.

THE TRUTH ABOUT VULTURES

Vultures have shared our neighborhood for several years now. How can we miss them, they are so huge! They may not be welcome guests to some of our residents but in doing some research about them, there are some interesting facts to learn.

First of all, how about some measurements?

Average length: 26-32 inches Average weight: 51 pounds

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Average wingspan: 68-72 inches (WOW! That's wider than I am tall!!)

They visit us mainly spring to fall, even though some of them may stick around all year. They like the open area, as we've seen on the high-tension poles, so they can hunt. Yet, they like to be close to the woods for nesting and roosting. And get this, because of their wingspan, they need the height for taking off.

What do these vultures eat? Primarily, it's reported that their main diet staple is carrion or recently dead or decaying animals (roadkill is good). They like fish and small animals like mice and rats. That's a help for us. They also like raccoons, coyotes, and snakes and they also rummage landfills and trash.

Like so many of the bird class, males and females share the nesting job. They nest on the ground, have only one to three eggs and incubate those eggs for 38 to 41 days.

There are two kinds of vultures in New Hampshire: the turkey vulture which has a red head and the black vulture which is all black. Both have "bald" heads. There are other specific details as to what other behaviors they use in their role as a predator but these are not very pleasant details so, should you desire to know more information, feel free to

search the internet under "Vultures in New Hampshire."

And have you seen our beautiful, stately, bald eagles? Occasionally, one will be on the lawn in front of the house or in one of the trees. Quite often you can see them around the Amoskeag Rotary and along the Merrimack River. Keep your eye out for them, they are quite a sight to see!

Editor's note: I pulled a dead vulture off my roof last summer. Never did figure out the story behind that. Navigation error?
