On Saturday morning, a group of Troop 78 scouts and adults set out on a two and a half hour drive to the Delaware Water Gap in New Jersey. As we rode the bus to our hiking spot, we were all sleepy, but we kept our eye on the forecast. We got dropped off and ready for the hike. After a little confusion finding the Appalachian Trail, we set off.

There was a short-legged group and a longer legged group. The long-legged group set off at a very brisk pace. We started our 9.5 mile hike by climbing a steep rocky hill and stopping for our first break on an overlook with an impressive view. We stopped at an old fire tower, where scouts got to climb it. Then we hiked to a cool cliff face that everyone stopped at and took pictures. Then we stopped for a break really close to the end and everyone was excited. After walking down a big hill to a parking area, we found out that we went the wrong way and we had to go all the way back up again.

Then we got on the bus and rode to the campsite. Once we got to the campsite, we unloaded Mr. D's truck and the bus. We set up our patrol kitchens and got all our equipment ready to cook dinner. Leaders set Stags' kitchen up, so they helped the other patrols too. We all grabbed our personal gear and helped each other set up our tents. Then we had to cook dinner. It was patrol cooking, so we got all the ingredients for chicken and rice tacos and cooked our rice in a pot and our chicken in pans or on the griddle. We were all hungry after a long hike and dinner was very good. Then we got the ingredients for dessert which were cinnamon buns. We all baked them using our stove top ovens, and they actually turned out pretty good. We had to clean up our dishes and patrol sites after dinner.

After dinner, many scouts started up a campfire, where they attempted a (somewhat half hearted) rendition of the song 6 Pence. We



had a snack of Oreos, which went quick. The fire was going for about 2 hours, but some scouts got bored and went to play flashlight tag, where you have to run away from the people with the flashlights on.

Adults were talking around the campfire. The group playing tag eventually got tired and most people turned in for the night. We got a relatively restful night of sleep, with a wake up call of 6:30-7:00 the next morning.

Early the next day, we got started on a patrol cooked breakfast of French Toast, sausages, and scrambled eggs. There was also a cold breakfast spread of bagels, muffins, and cereal. After this, everyone got to work on breaking down patrol kitchens, packing the bus, taking down tents, and more. We did a quick police line and we were off. We decided to stop for a quick 2 mile hike around a lake in the park. The hike had some fantastic views, and we were able to finish quickly. When we arrived back at the bus, there was a National Park ranger there who took us through what she does and what we can do to help the national parks.

We left for home about 10:30AM and had a relaxing bus ride back. The bus pulled into the cabin at about 1:15 and everyone left about 1:30. It was a great trip, and despite the threat of rain, we got incredibly lucky and got back with hardly any rain. Everyone enjoyed it, and I'm sure many scouts are looking forward to the next iteration of this trip.



### **National Jamboree**

#### Wednesday July 19 - Friday July 28, 2023

Chester County Council is looking to take a group of 54 scouts / 6 Leaders to the 2023 Jamboree as part of our Council Contingent. The National Jamboree is only held every four years, so don't miss out.

The 2023 National Jamboree runs for ten days from Wednesday, July 19 to Friday, July 28 at the Bechtel Summit Reserve in West Virginia. It is open to all scouts that are at least 12 years of age by the first day of the Jamboree but have not reached 21 by the last day. The cost is \$1,875 for scouts and \$1,285 for Leaders and includes all National fees, chartered bus transportation to and from the event, and all meals. Participants will stay two per tent which is also provided.

For those of you not familiar with a Jamboree, the National Jamboree is more than a destination. It's the adventure of a lifetime, and there is simply nothing else like it on the planet. What's a Jamboree? It's not just camp. The National Jamboree is 360-degrees of fun, friends, and fellowship with hands-on adventure that takes you places you never thought you'd go and challenges you to try things you never thought you could. The National Jamboree is 30,000 scouts from across the nation coming together to do all things scouting including shooting sports, biking,

whitewater rafting, rock climbing, skateboarding, zip-lining, canopy tours, aquatics, just to name a few.

Registration is completed in two parts. You will need to register as a participant through the National Jamboree site at <u>https://jamboree.scouting.org/</u>. You will also need to register and pay your deposit through the Chester County Council site at <u>https://www.cccbsa.org/programs/high-adventure/2023-national-jamboree/</u>. Additional details are also available at these two sites.
