

WW 2 Trivia for July & August 2024

- On this Day . . . Thursday, July 6, 1944 On the Eastern Front...
 Soviet forces of 1st Belorussian Front capture Kovel, 70 east of Lublin. German forces are retreating. Southwest of Minsk, Svir is captured.
- From Berlin... It is announced the Field Marshal Kluge has replaced Field Marshal Rundstedt as Commander in Chief West.
- In Italy... Elements of British 8th Army advance. The Polish 3rd Division (part of Polish 2nd Corps) captures Osemo, south of Ancona, on the Adriatic. German forces are conducting a gradual withdrawal, from river line to river line.
- ♦ On this day . . . Sunday, July 9, 1944
- On the Western Front... Forces of British 2nd Army penetrate Caen. Forces of Canadian 3rd Division and British 1st Division capture most of the city north of the Orne River. Canadian forces es also take Carpiquet Airfield. The US 1st Army continues attacks toward St. Lo.
- In Italy... Elements of US 5th Army advance. The US 88th Division captures Volterra and elements of the French Expeditionary Corps reach Poggibonsi.
- ♦ On this day . . . Tuesday, July 11, 1944
- On the Western Front... German forces counterattack the US 1st Army. The German Panzerlehr Division spearheads the assault against US 9th Division southwest of St. Jean de Daye. US forces hold. The British 2nd Army continues a slow advance. The 8th Corps captures Hill 112, southwest of Caen. Naval gunfire supports operations around the city.
- On the Eastern Front... Other Soviet forces eliminate German resistance east of Minsk.
- In Washington... President Roosevelt announces that the US will recognized the French Provisional Government, led by de Gaulle, as the de facto authority for the civil administration of liberated territory in France. Roosevelt also tells a press conference that he will run for president again if the Democratic Party

- ♦ On this day . . . Monday, July 17, 1944
- In Occupied France... German Field Marshal Rommel is severely wounded in a strafing attack on his staff car by an Allied fighter aircraft. Rommel was returning to his headquarters from an inspection tour.
- From Berlin... Field Marshal Kluge assumes temporary command of Army Group B (Rommel).
- On the Western Front... Forces of US 1st Army penetrate into the town of St. Lo.
- In Occupied Norway... The British carriers Formidable, Indefatigable and Furious escorted by the battleship Duke of York launch air attacks against German battleship Tirpitz at anchor at Kaafiord. The incoming strike is detected and a smoke screen effectively conceals the target.
- On this day . . . Thursday, July 20, 1944 In Germany... Shortly after noon, a bomb explodes in the conference room at Hitler's headquarters at Rastenburg, in East Prussia. The bomb was planted by Colonel Count von Stauffenberg. The conspirators include General Beck, Carl Gordeler, Field Marshal Witzleben and General Halder. Most of them are either aristocrats or Roman Catholics. Many others know about the plot, including Rommel, Kluge and Canaris. After it becomes clear that Hitler has survived the plot falls apart. Several of the leading participants, including Stauffenberg, are arrested and shot in Berlin by the end of the day.
- On this day . . . Tuesday, July 25, 1944 . . . On the Western Front... The US 1st Army begins "Operation Cobra". The main attack is made west of St. Lo by the US 7th Corps with 8th Corps on the right flank and 13th Corps on the left flank. A massive bombardment precedes the assault. More than 3000 planes are involved, including 1500 heavy bombers of the US 8th Air Force. Some American casualties result from the bombers releasing their loads short of their target. Regardless,

the American forces make good progress. Attacks by the British 2nd Army around Caen have drawn away German armored forces and reserves. To the south of Caen, Canadian troops are attacking along the road to Falaise but meet heavy German resistance.

- On the Eastern Front . . . Soviet forces penetrate Lvov and partially surround it.
- On this Day . . . August, 1 On the Western Front . . . The US 3rd Army (General Patton) becomes operational on the right flank and is tasked with clearing Brittany. American forces are now organized under US 12th Army Group (Bradley) and include US 1st Army (Hodges) as well as 3rd Army. Field Marshal Montgomery retains overall command of Allied ground forces and General Eisenhower remains Commander in Chief of the Allied Expeditionary Forces.
- ♦ Sunday, August 6, 1944 On the Western Front . . . Elements of US 12th Army Group continue advancing. The US 3rd Army advances in Brittany. The US 4th Armored Division (part of US 8th Corps) approaches Lorient. Forces of US 15th Corps capture Laval and advance toward Le Mans. Elements of US 1st Army capture Vire.
- In Italy. . . Elements of British 8th Army cross the Arno River within Florence.
- Monday, August 7, 1944 . . . On the Western Front . . . German forces begin a significant counterattack from east of Mortain, opposite US 1st Army (between US 7th and 14th Corps). Elements of German 2nd and 116th Panzer Divisions spearhead the offensive. Mortain is recaptured. Heavy Allied air attacks prevent more significant advances by the German forces.
- ♦ Saturday, August 12, 1944 . . . In Liberated France . . . The first PLUTO (Pipe Line Under The Ocean) becomes opera-

tional carrying fuel from the Isle of Wight to Cherbourg.

- ◆ Tuesday, August 15, 1944 In Southern France . . . Allied forces launch a secondary invasion of France (Operation Dragoon, formerly Anvil) between Toulon and Cannes. Most of the initial assaults are carried out by forces of US 6th Corps (Truscott) as part of US 7th Army (Patch). Also included in the initial landings are French commandos. Three American division come ashore in the first wave at three beaches: Alpha Beach (US 3rd Division) on the left flank; Delta Beach (US 45th Division); and, Camel Beach (US 36 Division) on the right flank.
- Friday, August 18, 1944 On the Western Front... The Falaise gap is closed by a link up of Polish and American troops at Chambois. Considerable German forces remain trapped to the west. To the south, patrols from US 3rd Army reach Versailles as the army advances toward the Seine River..
- Saturday, August 19, 1944 In Occupied France . . . In Paris French resistance members begin an open rebellion against German occupation forces.
- ♦ Sunday, August 20, 1944 On the Western Front . . . During the night, the last elements of German Armies to escape the Falaise pocket. Some 70-80 miles to the east, the US 3rd Army captures crossings over the Seine River 30 miles west of Paris. To the southwest of Paris, the US 20th Corps enters Fontainebleau.
- In Occupied France . . . Marshal Petain is arrested by Germans in Vichy for refusing to go to an area safe from the Allied advance. The French resistance forces (FFI) claim to control 8 departments. In Liberated France, General de Gaulle arrives.
