DAI LOY GAMBLING HOUSE MUSEUM

Attendance at the Dai Loy Museum in Locke totaled 11,579 visitors during the 1982 season. Tourists from forty states and twenty-four countries signed the guest register; among the more exotic countries represented were Fiji, Singapore, Thailand, South Africa, and China. In addition to the regularly scheduled week-end openings,

the museum has been made available to school and tour groups by special arrangements. The Exploration Cruise Lines visited the Dai Loy seventeen times this fall. Clarence Pratt served as guide and historic interpretor for these visitors. Also, Clarence welcomed other groups from Channel Star Tours out of Stockton and Yankee Tours and Cherokee Tours from Sacramento several times. Exploration Cruise Lines has already tentatively scheduled seventeen more visits for the spring of 1983. It is the policy of the society to charge \$25 per visit to all groups who come to the museum during closed days or hours.

Clarence has been on hand to greet classes from the Pittsburg schools and Walnut Grove Elementary School, as well as the Galt Scout troop.

The special introductory talk which Clarence gives to orientate visitors has now been taped by Jan Quesenberry. Other staffers can play this recording for those persons interested in a detailed briefing of the museum and points of Delta history related to the Locke area.

The long-awaited ground-breaking for the Sacramento History Center was held November 16, 1982. The site is next to the State Railroad Museum at Front and J Streets. When completed, the museum will be an outstanding example of modern technology used to interpret the past. The completed project will give Sacramento a museum equal in quality and stature to almost any in the U.S. and surpassing most.

Antique Homes

The Sacramento River Delta Historical Society is now compiling material to be used in a book on Delta homes. The Board has completed a contract with Locke artist, Chris Spencer, to illustrate thirty area homes built in the 19th and early 20th centuries. His work in creating the illustrations from original pen and ink/watercolor full-scale pieces is almost finished In addition he will design the format and layout for a quality soft-bound edition.

Each drawing will be accompanied by caption stories about the homes, their histories, architectural data, or other unique information which would set the house apart. Careful research must be done to make the booklet a sound historical record as well as an attractive pictorial account of the outstanding homes in the Delta area. Anyone interested in assisting in gathering, checking, or supplying information is encouraged to call Kathie Graham (775-1041) or Frank Wilcox (775-1371).

Many homes were considered for inclusion in this volume which is focused on the pre-1920 period. A working list includes the following houses in each local area: Clarksburg--Schibig and Munk; Merritt Island--Bunnell and Bump/Thomas; Hood--Rosebud; Randall Island and area--Hollister and Bishop/Dean; Courtland--George Smith; Grand Island--Leary, Goldman, Meyers/McDowell, Wm. Smith's "the Castle", L. Meyers's "River Mansion", Reynolds, and Eising; Pierson Distrist-- Talmadge, Runyon, Dorsey, Runyon, Carmany/Greene, and van Loben Sels' "Amistad"; Walnut Grove--Brown; Andrus Island--Robinson; Rio Vista--Gregorsky, Bader; and

Montezuma Hills--Mayhood. This tentative listing illustrates the difficult task of accurately reporting the past, in that there are many different ways of naming or designating each house. The policy set by the Board for information contained in the book would insure that exact locations or contemporary data would not be included in order to protect the privacy of owners, and each current owner must give written permission before a home will be included.

The Society undertakes this project to fill a need for accurate records dealing with the history of the Sacramento River delta area. In the effort to document these early homes, the group hopes to foster a further awareness and appreciation of the past and build a broader understanding of the need of preservation to prevent careless compromise with the Delta's heritage.

This will be the SRDHS's first major publishing venture. The Board hopes for moderate success which could lead to a second volume. A publication date will be announced as soon as the preliminary research and lay-out is complete.

MEMBERSHIP MEETING

Members attending the SRDHS meeting in September enjoyed the talk and slide show presented by Professor Gregg Campbell of Sacramento State. He is currently researching the social history of the Pocket area, tracing the intertwining stories of the Portuguese and Japanese who first settled the region.

There are a number of items which may be of interest to Society members. "Sacramento on Stone: A Display of Historic Urban Views 1849-1981" is at the State Library for an extended show. Lithographs and prints are

the State Library for an extended show. Lithographs and prints are featured from the collection of the State Library, State Archives, Sacramento History Center and private collections.

For those interested in California Gold Rush lore and artifacts, there is an excellent display on the concourses off the main terminal buildings at the Sacramento Metropolitan Airport.

The largest collection ever displayed of historical surveying artifacts is now attracting interest at the Huntington-Hardford building at the California State Railroad Museum. The exhibit will close April 8, 1983.

The Delta Natural History Assn. at Brannan Island S.R.A. now has a Park Visitor Center with several displays featuring the Delta and local flora and fauna. During the Rio Vista Bass Derby a seminar on striped bass fishing was conducted by John Tremeroli of Hap's Bait Shop.

The Rio Vista Museum is undergoing renovation and will reopen after the New Year.

In a report on the Sacramento City-County History Week observed in August, it was noted that "if you get a chance to see the Sacramento River Delta History Society's display at the old gambling hall in Locke, it's well-worth the drive."


Project

100 YEARS AGO: There were several interesting articles in the "Sacramento Union" Thanksgiving Day re-publication of a few pages from its July 31, 1882 issue. Of note was the Sacramento County Republican Primary Convention Notice, which resolved, Article 7 that "The places for holding said primary election and the names of the persons constituting the Election Board at each of the said places, and the number of delegates allowed each of the said places are as follows, viz: (among those mentioned)--Franklin-3 delegates. Polls at Korn's Store. Inspector J.E. Hall and judges H. Erhardt, J.B. Bradford. Richland (Hood)-2 delegates. Polls at Schoolhouse. Inspector William Johnson, judges Charles Gammon, Isaac Bryan. Courtland-3 delegates. Polls at Myer's Store. Inspector, Dwight Hollister, judges M.H. Myers and J.R. Olsen. Walnut Grove-3 delegates. Polls at Sharp's Hotel. Inspector Joseph Wise, judges B. Westfall, William Jackson. Isleton-3 delegates. Polls at Hotel. Inspector Hart F. Smith, judges P.H. Gardiner, R. Webb. Emmaton-2 delegates. Inspector J.M. Upham, judges D.L. Perkins...
